Hardy Hibiscus is grown with great success in this locality. As we rode through Haskell last year we saw many yards growing this flower. It even takes to the country. Mrs. Sam Scott who lives between Haskell and Rule, grows a red Hibiscus that has blossoms the size of dinner plates. She cuts the plants to the ground each fall and applies a heavy mulch of grass clippings. In the spring, new shoots appear from the roots and soon the plant is blooming again.
 Mrs. E. L. Wyche, who lives in northwest Haskell grows both the small and larger varieties of Hibiscus with great success.
 Propagation is by root cuttings or from seed. I planted seed in pots last June from the ones we had in Abilene. I put them in my yard here in Haskell in mid July. They were budding when frost killed the foliage. This year the plants have sent up strong vigorous shoots that are already six or eight inches high. As I cross-pollinate my plants, I'm anxious to see what color and kind of blossoms they will produce.
 In growing Hibiscus, there are two things to remember: they take quite a bit of space, and to survive our severe weather changes should be cut to the ground each winter and mulched well.
 A good drink once a week is about all they require to produce flowers year after year. They are found growing wild along streams and in bar ditches. In South Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama we saw only the white with a red center and a pale pink as we traveled through these states.
 The Rose of Sharon or Althea is of the Hibiscus family.

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TORNADO TACTICS ARE USED BY FIREBOYS HERE

The backbone of which is the Fire Department, Sheriff's Department, and its law enforcement personnel.

Fire Chief Tom Watson and Fire Department Supervisor Floyd Lusk reported Wednesday, following the "dry run" that Haskell in its entirety can be alerted for a storm warning using "plectron" mobile units, a unique communication device with which 16 strategically deployed firemen are equipped, "in seven to eight minutes."

Lusk appealed to the citizenship to exercise their own good judgment in "take cover" procedures should a tornado cloud appear, and above all, he asked that the Fire Department telephone number NOT be called under any circumstances, in order to leave this line clear for emergency communication. Should citizens feel the need to provide information or seek help, they should call the Police Department number, 864-2223 in any eventuality, Lusk advised.

Haskellites were also reminded Wednesday that in addition to mobile unit warnings an emergency would bring, the general alarm "take cover" warning of the town siren is a blast "ten times or more."

Having learned through valuable experience, Lusk said he knew if a situation like May 26, 1962, is repeated here, "our townspeople can be depended upon to use their heads to save their lives."

City Hall Here To Expand Its Physical Plant

Haskell's Municipal Building facilities are to be expanded soon for the first time in 38 years, Mayor J. E. Walling Jr., announced Monday.

The Mayor reported the purchase of a 30 by 100 foot structure next door and immediately east of the present City and Fire Halls in the 300 block on North First Street, which, together with the present facilities, will be renovated and refurbished for use by the Police and Fire Departments and the City administration, including City Secretary.

An additional 3,000 square feet of floor space will be provided through the City's acquisition of what is known as the Simmons Building from Mrs. K. D. Simmons for an announced price of \$7,000. This building until recently was partially used by the Starr Welding Company and currently is being utilized as a warehouse for Boggs and Johnson Furniture Company here.

Not since 1926, when the present building housing the City Hall and Fire Hall was erected has there been any addition to Haskell's municipal facilities.

According to Mayor Walling, when refurbished and taken over by the City of Haskell, the Simmons Building will house the Police Department under the supervision of Chief Tom Paul Barnett and its dispatcher's room as well as an enlarged City Council chamber.

The space now occupied by the Police Department and Council Room will be utilized by the Mayor's office, that of City Secretary T. J. Arbuckle, and an expanded tax records section.

One of the principal renovations, Mayor Walling said, will be enlargement of vault facilities for records which have become more and more inadequate in recent years.

The work of renovation and expansion is expected to start immediately, Mayor Walling said. The Haskell City Council has endorsed the move.

Roy Arledge Reports Challenges Of Redistricting, Fiscal Problems

Problems of re-districting, based solely on the basis of population, particularly in this area and throughout West Texas, will present tremendous challenges to the 59th Texas Legislature when it convenes in Austin next January, State Representative Roy Arledge, of Stamford, representing the 83rd district, comprised of Haskell, Knox, Baylor, Jones and Throckmorton Counties, told a Rotary Club audience here last Thursday.

is that "Congressmen could be running against Congressmen" in Texas.

It was brought out that it seemed hardly fair, too, to include 25,000 students at the University of Texas in Austin, 100,000 soldiers at Fort Hood in the Waco-Temple areas, or 12,000 inmates of the penitentiary at Huntsville in redistricting, "since most of them are not able to vote anyway. But they would be included in redistricting by population alone."

The speaker said he felt sure veteran Senator George Mofett, of Chillicothe, chairman of the redistricting joint committee of House and Senate would come up "with something workable" to present.

Turning his attention to the fiscal picture in Texas, Arledge said the next Legislature will be beset with ways and means of "finding new money as usual."

He pounded home a point that Texans only get back about one dollar in federal funds and allocations to this state for eight dollars they send to Washington. In 1962, federal grants of all kinds to Texas totaled one-half billion dollars, while the tax bite on Texans was in excess of four billion dollars, he reported.

Arledge said the budget of the Texas Legislature earmarks spending in the following proportions: public education, 40 percent; highways, 27 percent; general control (expense of running state government) only 13 percent; health agencies and hospitals, 4.9; and welfare assistance, 15.6.

Where does the state government get its money? From the following sources: percentage-wise, according to Arledge: Sales tax, 37.2; federal government, 22.2; motor vehicle taxation, 6.9; property taxation, 2.9; natural resources, like oil and gas, 12.3; and other major business taxes, 7.6.

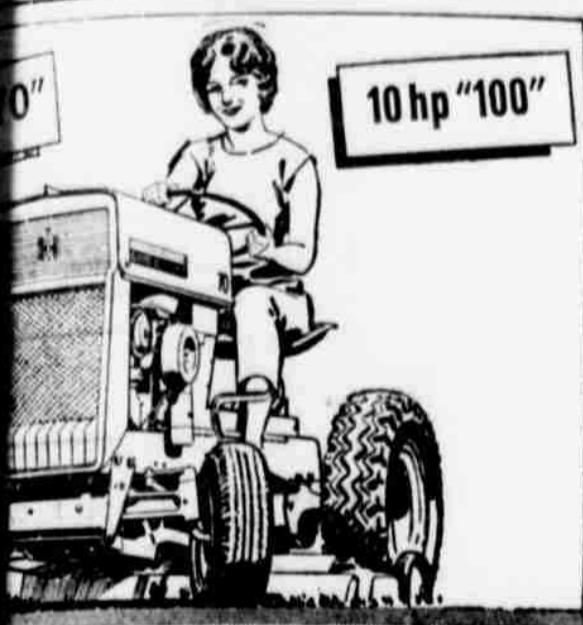
