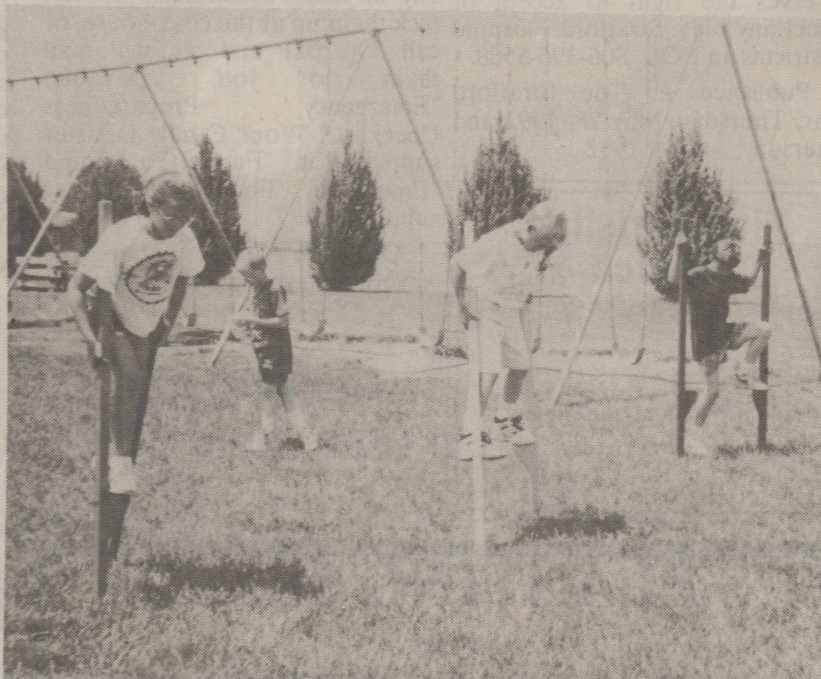
Kitchen Shower Lollipop Junction

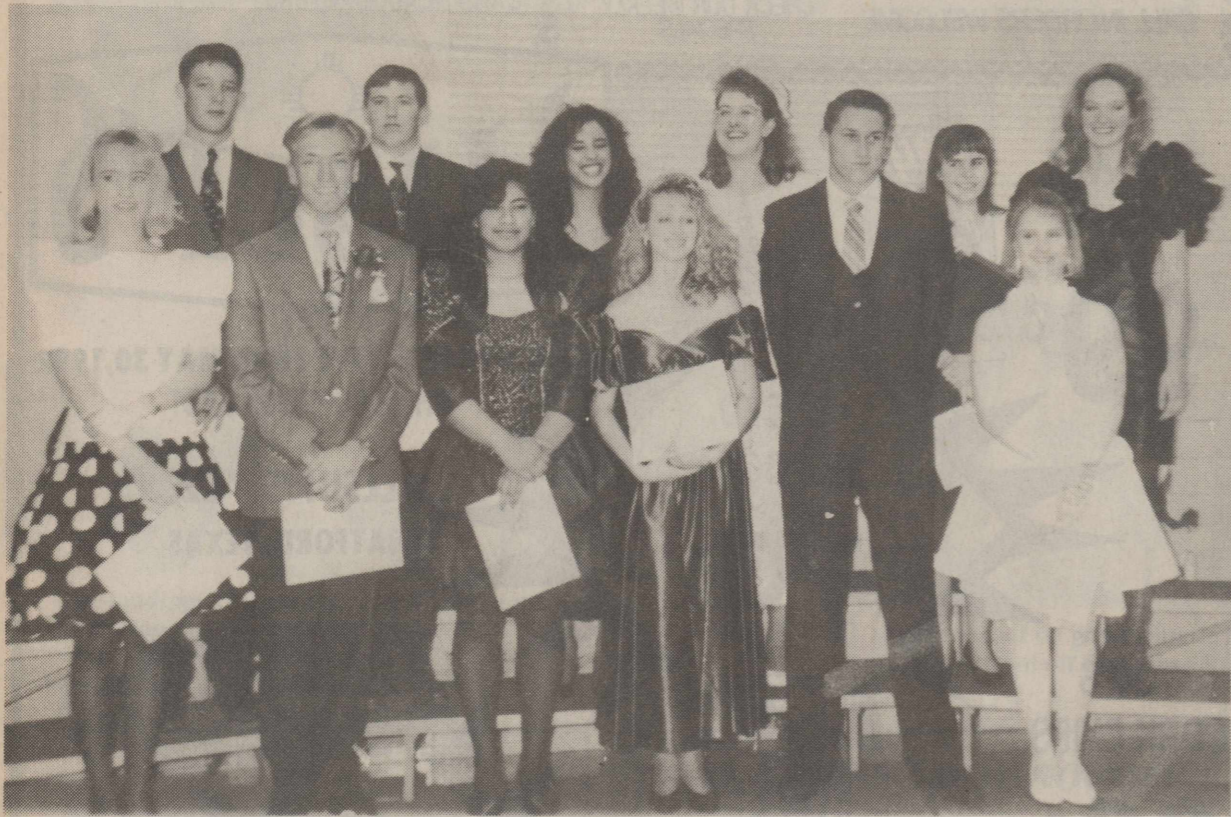

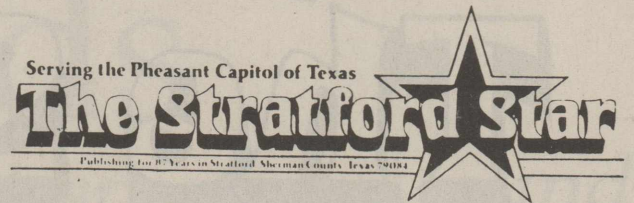

sirens are sounded? Do you know what to do? A "Yes" answer may mean the difference between life and death--YOURS! One long blast is a WATCH. If you hear a long blast of the siren, turn on the TV or radio and listen for further information. a WATCH means the conditions are present/favorable for severe thunderstorms, hail and the possibility of tornadoes. A wavering sound is a WARNING. When the wavering sound is heard, it means to take cover immediately! Do not go outside and get in your car--this is the worst place to be. If you live in a trailer house, find another place to be. It is advised that you plan ahead of time where you will go in the event of severe weather just as you would plan what to do in the event of a fire in your home. The school has a tornado drill so children know what to do at school. It would be sound advice for us to have a tornado drill in our homes, also.

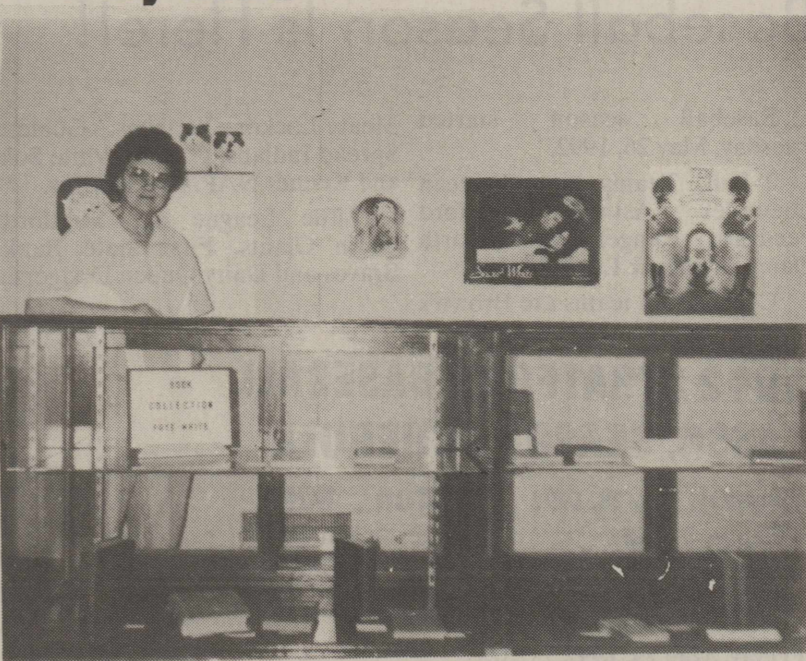

library a collection of books that belonged to her husband's parents and grandparents.

Howard's Mother used many of the school text books in the early 1900's. There are three books of history, two of literature, one grammar, and a speller. The copyright dates range from 1882-1919.

His great uncle, C.L. Chancellor, was an attorney. One of the books bears his name, was copyrighted in 1904, and was one of a series of law books.

Classic literature includes Dickens, Coleridge, Kipling, and Shakespeare. Copyright dates range from 1882-1909.

The oldest book in the collection was printed in 1872, and is a fiction story about the Chicago fire.

One of the more interesting books is a history of Texas written in rhyme. These volumes have been in Howard's possession since the early 1970's.

Howard and Faye moved to Sherman County in 1963. They had lived in Lubbock County prior to the move to Stratford. We appreciate the use of the books to exhibit for our patrons pleasure.

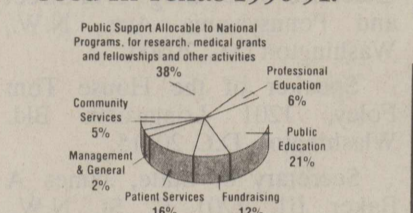

*Use a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15 during all outdoor activities. Avoid Sunburn altogether.

*Avoid direct exposure to the sun between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. If you go outdoors, wear a hat and protective clothing.

*Don't go to tanning salons or use sunlamps—they expose your skin to harmful ultraviolet rays.

*Check your skin regularly for unusual blemishes, moles or other markings on the skin. Have a doctor check any that change in size or color.

"Despite the increased incidence of malignant melanoma, the individual survival rate has improved because of early detection, Steve Sellers said.
