sixteen years old. The family then moved to Hooker, Oklahoma in 1913.

Frank married Mary Margaret (Maggie) Hubbard in 1915 in Guymon, Oklahoma. The couple had to wait several hours in the office to obtain a license for a telegram from her father giving her permission to marry. The family still has the telegram in their possession.

He and his bride moved to Texas County Oklahoma near the Beaver River close to Texhoma in a half-dugout. Their three children were born there, Arthur, LeRoy and Mildred.

Mr. Judd farmed and broke horses and mules for the use of them. The family also milked cows and sold the cream.

In 1922 Mr. Judd bought a section of land east of Stratford from L.M. Price and in 1923 he moved his family to the farm. Here he farmed and worked spare time for Price and Wigington, the Tumbling T Ranch.

Mr. Judd and Mr. Price formed the Judd Cattle Company in 1935. Each at various times, Arthur, LeRoy and Mildred's husband Paul Aduddell bought into the Cattle Company. Sometime later the Judd and Judd Cattle Company was formed by Mr. Judd and Arthur. In 1943 and 1944 the Judds had eight hundred cattle which they had to ship to California to pasture because of the heavy snow in and around Sherman County.

The family like a few other brave families stayed during the dust storms in the 1930's. It was a very hard time for all these people. Mr. Judd trapped, hunted and bought and sold furs to help make a living for the family during this time.

The children attended Coldwater school, Texhoma school and later school in Stratford. Arthur and LeRoy rode their horse "Pet" double five miles to school to Coldwater where they were in the first and second grade.

Arthur married Nina Lou Gay in 1935. They had two children, Clarence Franklin who lives in Stratford and Mary Gay Billingsley who lives in Eschenbach, Germany. Arthur and Nina have

two grand children. Nina was killed in an accident in 1978. In 1989 Arthur was united in marriage to Helen French. They have made their home in Stratford.

LeRoy married Oleen Anderson in 1941. They celebrated their 50th wedding Anniversary in December 1991. Four children were born to them, Lanita Tyson, Indianapolis, Indiana; Donna McNaughton,

Waxahachie, Texas; Delton, Nara Visa, New Mexico and Mary Faith Bradshaw, Canadian, Texas. They have nine grand children. Oleen passed away March 9, 1992.

Mildred married Paul Aduddell in 1937. Paul LeRoy, Denton, Texas; Frankie Shields, Stratford and Cleo, Stratford were born to Mildred and Paul. They have eight grandchildren and four great grand children. Mildred passed away on December 14, 1991.

Maggie enjoyed to knit and crochet and made many tablecloths, bedspreads, doilies and runners which members of the family still have and use.

She had a lovely voice singing in the church choir and at many funerals was something she shared with others. Once a friend asked her, "Maggie, who will sing at your funeral?"

Maggie helped care for the sick, especially when a family added a new baby to their group. She was always there when anyone needed help.

Mr. Judd had several hobbies which he enjoyed more in his later life. One was his paintings. He painted in oil, water color and did some pictures in pencil. He gave many of his pictures to friends and mostly to his children and grandchildren. Several of his paintings were on exhibit in New York for a time. His other hobby was fishing which he did as often as possible, as often as every day!

He and Maggie were dearly loved by their family. They raised their three children to be good christians, respected and to rear good families of their own.

Frank and Maggie left many precious memories for their children and grandchildren.



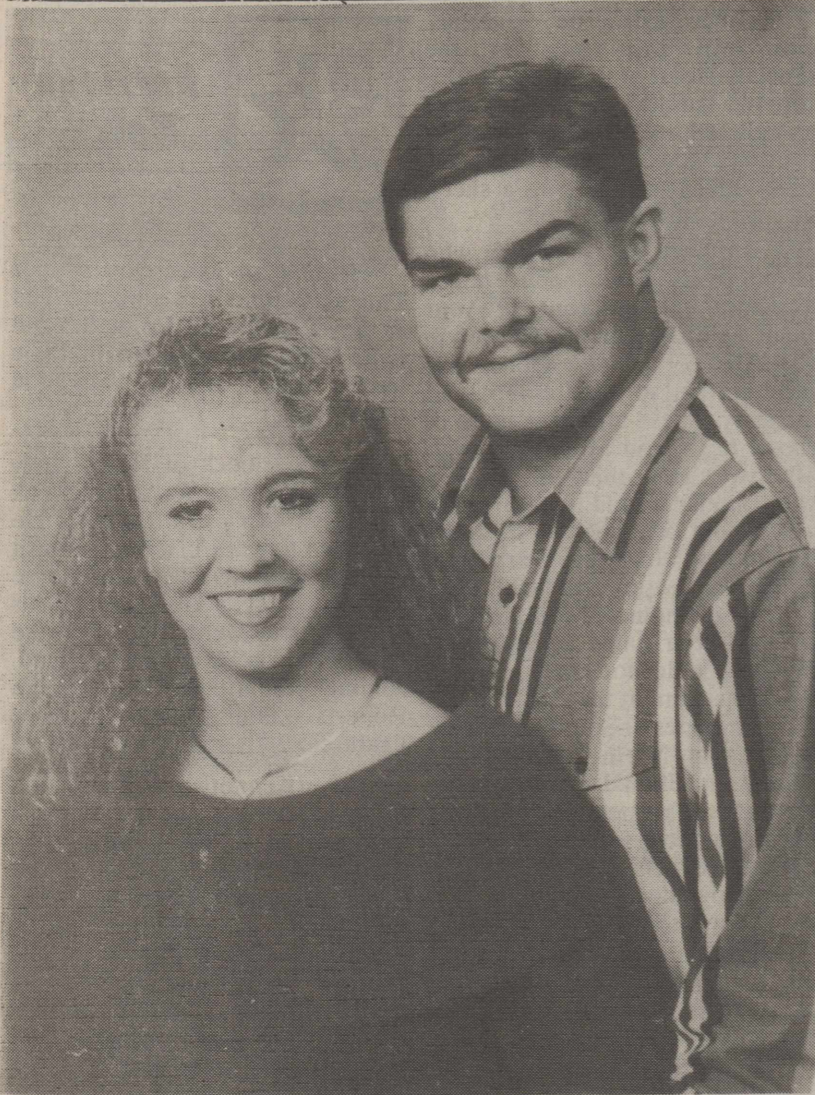

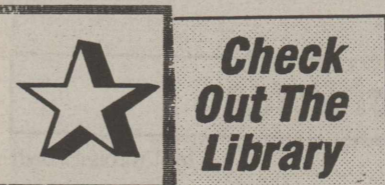

### Managing Center Pivot Irrigation Systems

By Bill Mires

Successful operation of a center-pivot irrigation system is dependent on the operator and the dealer. A properly managed and engineered center-pivot system has the lowest labor requirements of any other irrigation method. Two problems of center-pivot systems are: insufficient water supply for the number of acres being irrigated, and irrigation of soils having too slow of a water intake rate.

A center-pivot sprinkler system should have a water supply adequate to meet the needs of the crop and allow for distribution losses. Also, there should be sufficient system capacity to allow time for servicing the practices on the land. Stage of crop growth, temperature, wind velocity, and humidity affects the rate at which the crop uses the water and the rate at which evaporation occurs.

Trying to irrigate with an inadequate system means the crop is more dependent upon "Mother Nature". We all know how unpredictable she is. For a check on your current irrigation system call your local SCS office for assistance.

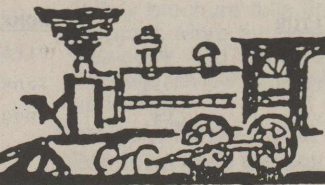

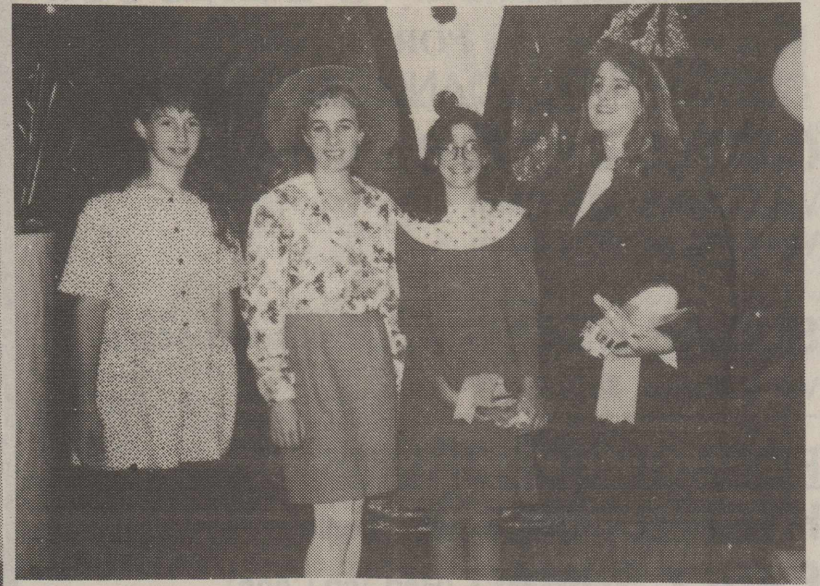

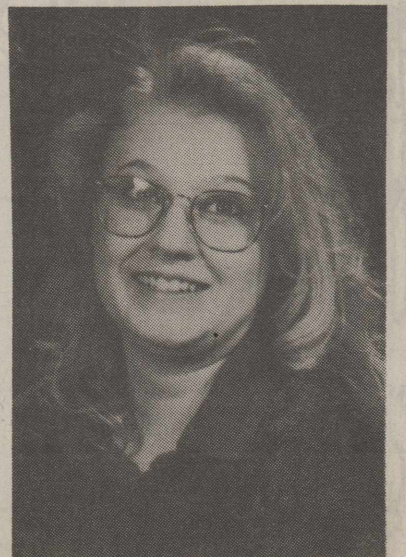

The United States Achievement Academy announced today that Tiffany Reinart has been named a United States National Award winner in Foreign Language.

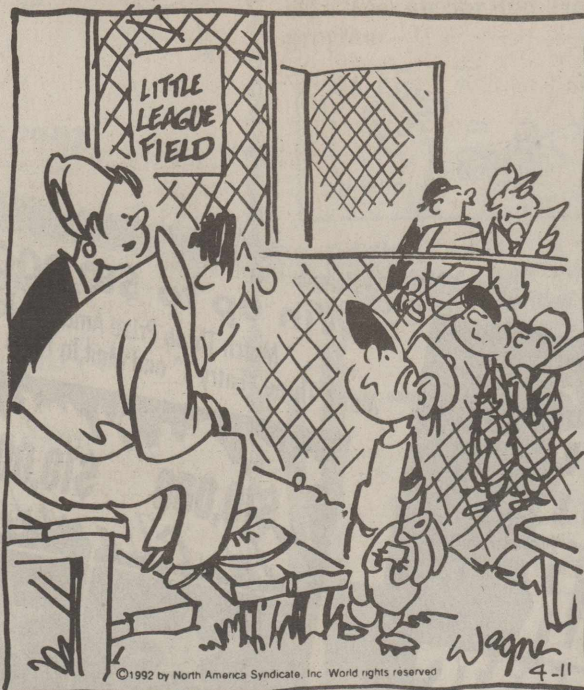
This award is a prestigious honor very few students can ever hope to attain. In fact, the Academy recognizes less than 10% of all American high school students.

**SAFE PLACE Provides Shelter**

SAFE PLACE exists to provide safe shelter, crisis counseling, assistance in obtaining housing and/or employment, court accompaniment, legal referral, parenting education, transportation, and social service information and referral to victims of family violence. A 24-hour hotline is staffed by trained volunteers and staff. Our goal is to provide a 24-hour intervention, emotional support, information and referral, and criminal justice support to victims of domestic violence.

SAFE PLACE has completed three and one-half years of service as the only organization of this type in Moore, Dallam, Hartley and Sherman Counties. This is approximately 4,200 square miles with a population of over 33,000. The shelter is located in Dumas with a part time outreach office in Dalhart. The shelter and advocacy services were started by concerned citizens of Dumas in 1989. In the first year a total of 34 victims were given direct services. In 1990 the direct services increased to 91. In

1991, 108 victims were served. As of May 15, 1992, 78 victims have been served. This is in addition to those persons calling for information and referral on the hotline, which this year alone, has reached 148.

SAFE PLACE serves many victims not aware of options they have or resources available to them. In the case of family violence there is often a great sense of isolation and shame in their situation. The availability of shelter and related services has made a difference in the lives of many victims and they have expressed gratitude that a volunteer or staff member from SAFE PLACE was there to help them through the aftermath of

their victimization, particularly the confusing legal process and availability of social services. The need for program services provided by SAFE PLACE has been strongly established by the number of requests received for assistance.

SAFE PLACE employs two full time and six part time employees. All staff provide direct services to victims on a regular basis and are trained to assist anyone needing help at any time. We also provide speakers or programs for any club or organization wanting to learn more about what is being done or what types of services they can do to help eliminate domestic violence in our community.

Last year 28 volunteers donated over 8,000 hours of assistance to victims. These volunteers perform a variety of duties including answering the 24-hour hotline, maintenance or helping at the shelter, transporting victims and or their children, picking up donations, and organizing fund-raising events. Without the volunteers and all the hours contributed, we could not offer the services as we do. We are always in need of additional volunteers that are willing to commit at least 12 hours a month in a variety of ways.

At least 1.8 million women are battered each year. One out of every two women entering an intimate relationship is systematically, physically abused in that relationship. Battering is the single major cause of death to women, exceeding rapes, muggings, and auto accidents. Between 2,000 and 4,000 women are beaten to death each year in the United States. Suicides of 20% of white women and 50% of black women are preceded by incidents of domestic violence. 60% of battered women are also raped by their husbands. 90% of battered women report that their children have witnessed the battering. In 60% of cases of abuse against women, children are also abused. 68% of boys between 11 and 20 who commit murder kill the man who has been beating their mother. More than 50% of homeless women on the streets left home to escape beatings. 50-80% of Women treated at emergency rooms are there for injuries inflicted by their domestic partners. 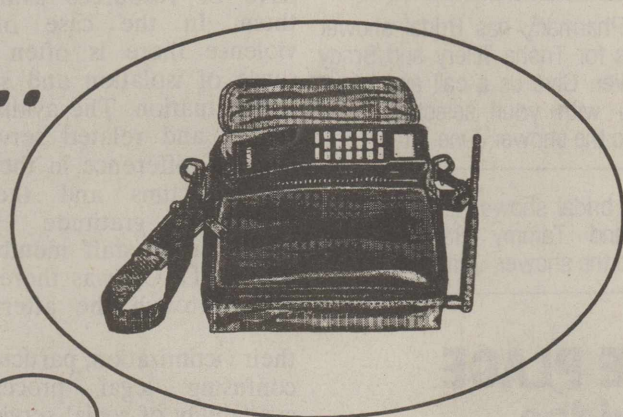
