





Many Texans have contacted their legislators asking that a stalking bill be introduced until the Legislature convenes in January 1993, but several Texas legislators have already expressed interest in sponsoring such legislation and some have drafted proposed bills.

TCFV has also received numerous calls and letters from victims of this type of harassment, who want us to work toward the adoption of a strong stalking bill. TCFV's Public Policy Committee has formed a subcommittee to study how we might best assist prospective legislative sponsors and members recently participated in a roundtable discussion.

NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TA RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statue on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statute (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$6,418 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB351) that same rate now provides \$6,405 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a mininmum tax rate of .82 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school disitrict to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the recept of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Texhoma **Independent School District** hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of .12 that will provide \$6,277 per student in state and local revenues.




