The winners from an earlier announced contest, for trips to the National Association of Wheat Growers Annual Convention in Reno, Nevada, January, 1992 are Dan Looten, Panhandle, Carson County; Bill Watson, Leonard, Fannin County; and David White, Stratford, Sherman County.

These young farmers in a 20-35 age group, will receive awards which total more than \$1000 each from the Monsanto Agricultural Products Company and the Production Credit Associations of Texas to help acquaint them with the organizational aspects of the Texas Wheat Producers Association and the National Association of Wheat Growers, according to Cagle Kendrick, Stratford, President of the Texas Wheat Association.

**Public Notice**

On October 4, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) that proposes a new optional service called DigiLine™ Service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10655.

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

Austin	Fireside
San Antonio	Capitol, Medical Center
Houston	Clay, Medical Center

DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

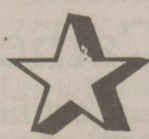
## Lamb Named To Lt. Governor's Oil Spill Council



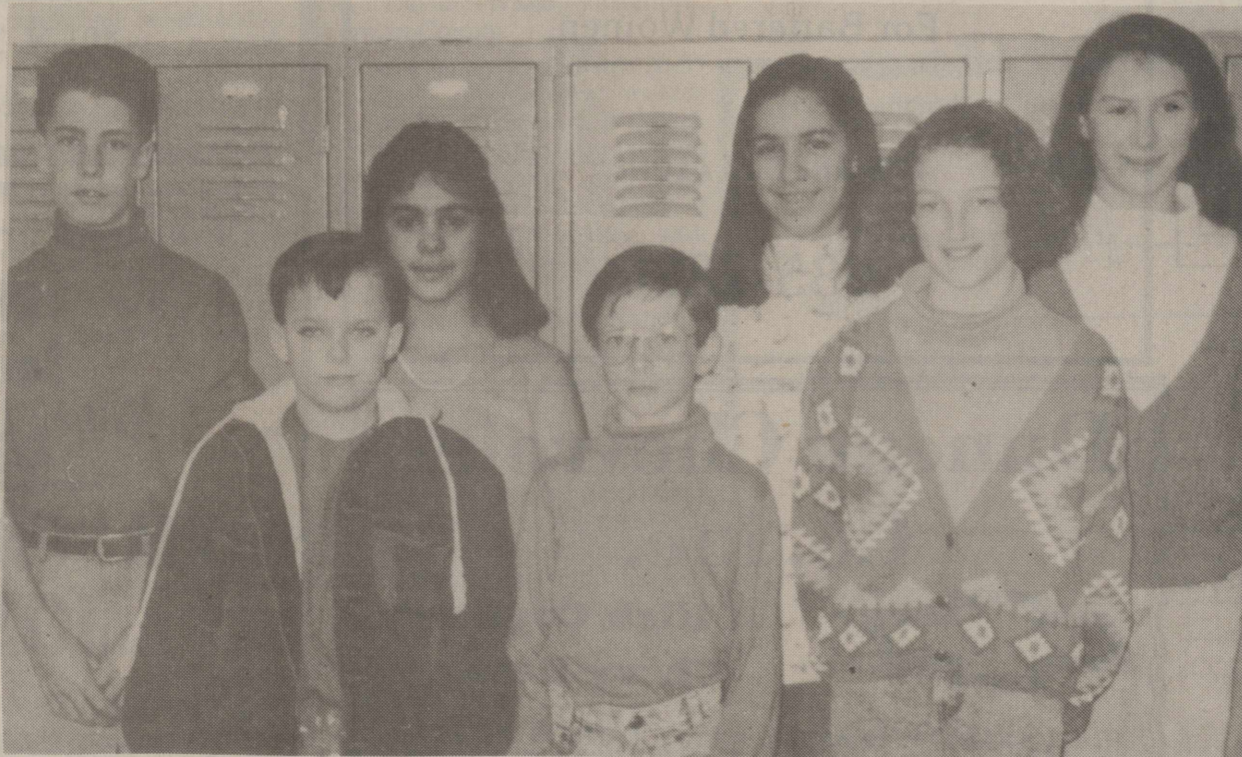

Mark Lamb of Houston has been appointed by the Lieutenant Governor of Texas, Bob Bullock, to serve on the Oil Spill Oversight Council. The Council is chaired by the Lt. Governor and was formed to assist the Governor's office in implementing the Texas Oil Spill Prevention and Response Act, passed into law in March of 1990. The December 31, 1991 appointment letter from the Lt. Governor stated that Lamb's "background in the marine transportation business gives him special skills and insights which will be most useful to the Council to guarantee the protection of our environment from harmful accidental oil spills." Lamb is the current president of the Texas Waterway Operators Association, a director of the American Waterway Operators Association and is the vice president of Barge Transport Company, Inc., a marine based company with petroleum tank barging and shipyard operations in Texas and Louisiana.

During the past two years, Mark has represented the inland petroleum barging industry in

both Austin and Washington during the drafting of the maritime oil spill laws. According to Lamb, "oil spill prevention, response and contingency planning is the most critical responsibility the maritime industry has today. Since the Exxon Valdez spill off the coast of Alaska in 1989, oil spill contingency and response planning has been marine company management's number one charge. Petroleum tank vessel operators and owners now have

substantially unlimited and uninsurable liabilities for damages to the environment and to third parties in the event of a major oil

spill. I sincerely believe that the majority of inland barge companies we have out there today are exceptionally competent and responsible operators. The risk of a major oil spill is inherent in our business, however, marine transportation continues to be statistically the safest and most economical means of surface transportation for oil and petroleum products available. I believe that, in the event of a large spill, our industry is now much better prepared to respond and mitigate damages relative to where we were two years ago. We are forming industry spill cooperatives, companies are training their employees in response techniques and oil spill

removal technology is developing at a rapid pace." Lamb went on to say that the tank barge industry transports an estimated 30% of all the petroleum consumed in the U.S. "Total U.S. consumption is estimated to be 17 million barrels a day. The barging industry performs a significant service to the country, however, the return we are realizing does not adequately reflect the tremendous risks that we are assuming under these new liability laws."

Mark is the son of Charley and Virginia Lamb of Stratford. His wife, Carla and their three children live in Spring, Texas, a suburb of Houston. Carla is the daughter of Dwight and Joy Hester of Stratford.

Commission that the top of the plastic container may blow off in the microwave if the vent stem or safety release becomes plugged. The pressurized plastic container may also explode during or after removal from the microwave, or if the container is hit or dropped. Furthermore, the plastic container may also crack and or develop lines (called crazing) that could increase the risk of explosion. Explosion of a pressurized Micro-Dome containing hot water and food could cause severe injuries such as blindness and

burns from flying fragments and liquids.

Micro-Dome reported 29 incidents involving the cracking and or crazing of the plastic container, eight incidents of the top blowing off, and four incidents of the vent being plugged without the blow plug releasing. One injury was reported involving a user who sustained burns when the top of the container blew off. The CPSC recommends that consumers not use the Micro-Dome Food Preserver. It should be returned to Micro-Dome for the rebate or destroyed and disposed of in such a manner that it cannot be used in the future.

CPSC is also concerned about possible food poisoning in certain foods prepared using the Micro-Dome Microwave Food Preserver. While CPSC is unaware of any incidents of food poisoning, it is concerned that the product and its accompanying recipe and instruction booklet do not adequately ensure the safety of certain canned foods. In addition

to possibly failing to kill bacteria while the food in the Micro-Dome is cooked in a microwave oven, food also can be contaminated after cooking. Eating improperly preserved food can cause serious illness such as botulism. The toxin which causes botulism is the most potent natural poison in the world. Even one taste could be fatal.

The Food Safety and Inspection Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has warned that the Micro-Dome needs more extensive testing. There are some problems. According to University of California researchers the Micro-Dome canning process was not successful. Bacteria survived. Micro-Dome denies there is a food poisoning problem.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission is announcing this warning as part of its mission to protect the public from unreasonable risks of injury and death associated with consumer products. The Commission's objective is to reduce the estimated 28.5 million injuries and 21,600 deaths associated each year with the 15,000 different types of consumer product under CPSC's jurisdiction.

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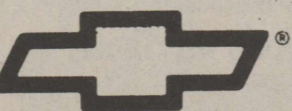


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
