## Domestic Violence Remains Major Problem Families Face Each Year

Domestic Violence remains and Hartley Counties. one of the major problems families face each year.

Domestic violence, also called spouse abuse, family violence, battering, women abuse, wife beating--is the use of abusive and violent behavior among people who are married, living together, or have an ongoing or prior relationship. intimate Approximately 95 percent of the victims of domestic violence are women.

it can involve punching, slapping, stabbing, forcing sexual activity, or using the threat of violence to control another's behavior. It can lead to serious injury or death.

the Amarillo Chapter of the marriage together at all costs. National Organization of Women (NOW), points out that FBI figures show two million incidents of domestic violence reported each year and they estimate 80 percent go unreported.

One fourth of homicides of women in Texas are committed by husbands or partners and the figure goes up to one-third for the nation. Twenty five percent of suicides in Texas are related to previous abuse and 50 to 60 percent of domestic violence incidents nationwide include abuse of children.

"Women and children are at tremendous risk from the very people from whom they would expect support and protection," Gruver says.

Official attitudes are changing to ward such violence and law enforcement is taking a more interventionist stance. Assault is a Crime, regardless of the relationship of the perpetrator and victim and arrest can make the abuser realize the seriousness of his actions.
