North Plains Groundwater Conservation District To Hold Public Hearing

The North Plains Groundwater Conservation District is holding a Public Hearing on March 2, 1992 at 7:00 p.m. on the top floor of the Hansford County Courthouse in the District Courtroom.

The Board received a Petition from the Landowners in Dallam County requesting to be annexed into the District. Chapter 52 of the Texas Water Code requires the District to hold two hearings on the petition. One of the hearings must be held within the District and the other hearing must be held within the area to be annexed.

The Board accepted the Dallam County Petition during the Board Meeting held on Feb. 3, 1992. It was decided to hold the hearing within the District first. The purpose of the hearing is for the Board to receive testimony, from the people within the District, in support of or opposition to the annexation of a portion of Dallam County. Anyone wishing to present testimony for or against the annexation is certainly welcome to attend. In addition the Board will answer any questions concerning the petition. After the hearing on March 2, the Directors will then decide which direction to take in regard to continuation of the annexation process.

The petition at this time, excludes an area in the north west portion of Dallam County. Part of this area is served by the Dallam County Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 (Texline Water District). Under the annexation process of Chapter 52, the Board may adjust the boundaries of the area to be annexed. There may be some additional land in Dallam County which may be excluded from the petition. This decision will be made at a later date.

In presenting the petition to the Board the representatives from Dallam County stated they hoped to hold the election concerning the annexation during the November election. The District is not required to hold an election within the District.

The area of Dallam County not included in the Texline District was identified as a "Critical Area" in 1987 under Subchapter C of the Texas Water Code Chapter 52. A study of the area was conducted and a report was published in Feb. of 1990. "DALLAM COUNTY A CRITICAL AREA GROUND WATER STUDY". The recommendations from this study were annexation in to an existing groundwater conservation district or creation of a new groundwater conservation district. If the annexation process is successful, the area annexed into a district or districts would then have complied with the recommendations and the "Critical Area" process would not further effect the area.

Differential: Heavy-duty, limited slip required.

Engine: 350 cubic inch minimum fuel injected with heavy duty outside oil cooler.

Exhaust: Must be true dual system off manifolds.

Floor Mat: Full carpet front and rear.

Gauges: Vehicle shall have AMP meter, and oil and temperature gages.

Glass: All windows shall be heat-absorbing (tinted) type.

Headlights: Quartz Halogen with WIG-WAG.

Hood Latch Release: Inside Release.

Interior: Shall be wine or dark red in color.

Lights Auxiliary: Halogen red and blue front grille or bracket mounted-Red and blue rear deck shelf-Red on drivers side blue on other side.

Lights Interior: Dome light must be able to control independent of other lights and must have two separately switched map lights to direct a restricted beam of light to the driver or the front seat passenger. All door jamb switches to interior lights and buzzers to be made inoperative. Lights should also be in the engine and trunk compartments.

Lights Brake: Must have capability of brake light cut off switch.

Locks: Power door locks rear locks to be operable from drivers position only.

Mirrors: Inside-Day/Night type, Outside-remote control type on left hand and right hand doors. Controls to be within convenient reach of driver.

Paint Color: Dark gun metal gray.

Rapid Noise Suppression: Vehicle shall be equipped with police noise suppression package.

The 4th of July Celebration keeps getting better! Your continued support is needed and appreciated.

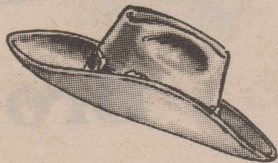

He rents some of the land farmed & owns a large portion of which they farm. He started on his own by custom farming & renting a small portion of what he farms today.

The dedication of the farmer is shown in the crops harvested & the condition of the land which he farms. When something needs to be done it is done. Proof of his toil can be seen in the growing crops on the land he farms & the harvest he reaps.

Our 1991 Farmer of the Year has lived in Stratford or Sherman County all of his life and has farmed since he was old enough to stand and see over the steering wheel of a tractor or pickup, with the exception of time spent in college, Baylor and Tech and for a tour of duty during the Korean War. At the present time he and his two sons are farming and ranching approximately 18,000 acres in the Stratford area. Also, they run cattle in Baca, Bent and



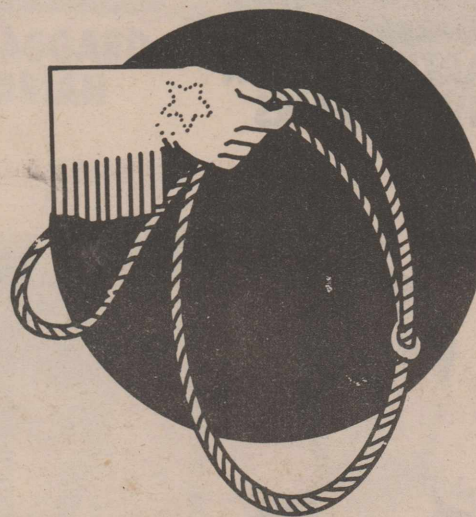
