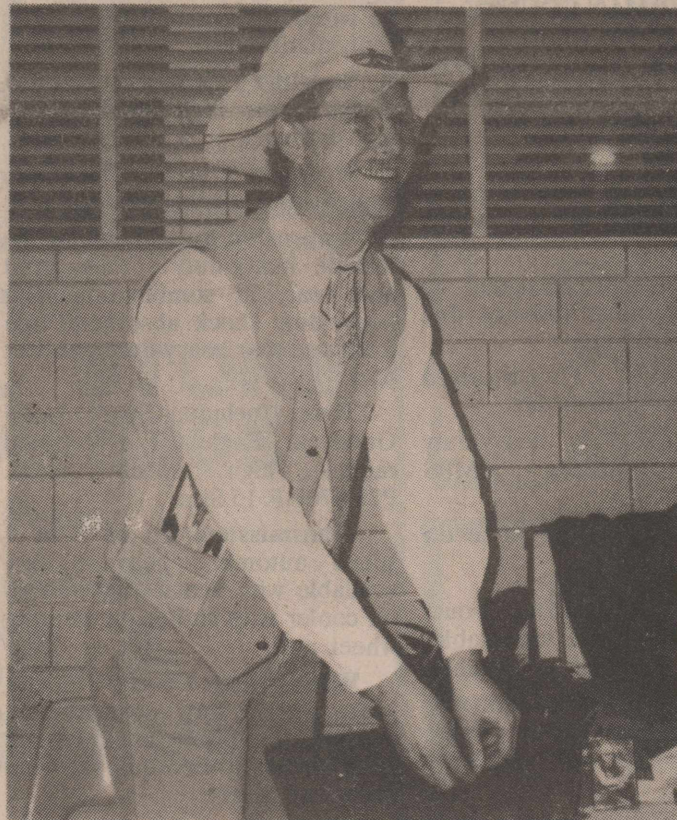

### Happy 100th "Bob"



**Bob Pendleton**

John Robert Pendleton (Bob) the son of Edmund G. Pendleton and Kittie Elliott Pendleton, was born March 1, 1892 in Randall County, Texas. The Randall County Homestead or Pendleton Dairy was located close to 45th and Harrison in South Amarillo. In 1901 the E.G. Pendleton family moved to Sherman County. J.R. (Bob) Pendleton was the sixth child in a family of ten children, four boys and six girls.

E.G. Pendleton filed on four sections of land, about 3 miles

Northwest of the present site of Stratford. This was home until 1906 when the land was sold and the Pendletons moved into Stratford. This house still stands at 501 Poplar.

Bob graduated from high school in 1908, in the second graduating class of Stratford High School. In the fall of 1909 he entered Texas A&M and studied civil engineering for two years.

When World War one started, several Stratford boys enlisted in a Home Company at Dalhart,

Texas, but they failed to become Federalized and most of them gradually enlisted in the Military service. In May, 1918, Peach Smith and J.R. Pendleton enlisted and were sent to Camp Lee, Virginia. The Army doctors rejected both of them but Bob stayed for a hernia operation and worked in the mustering office at Camp Lee until he could take an over seas examination. He then made application and was accepted for Officer's Training School for Field Artillery in Camp Taylor, Kentucky. He was at Camp Taylor when the Armistice was signed and was discharged from Military Service on December 3rd, 1918.

On November 4, 1920, J.R. Pendleton and Bernice Lee of Hutchinson, Kansas, were united in marriage. At one time, Bernice and her parents had lived in Stratford and her father owned and operated a ranch. To this union, two children were born; a boy, William Lee Pendleton was born September 11, 1921, and a girl, Mildred Louise Pendleton was born January 23, 1923. In the summer of 1923, the J.R. Pendleton family moved to Troy, Texas and again worked in the Citizens Exchange Bank. Then, in late fall, he was transferred to the Lubbock National Bank of Lubbock, Texas. Mr. C.E. Maedgen, President of the Lubbock National Bank also had an interest in the Troy Bank. The second year after J.R. Pendleton started with the Lubbock National

Bank, he was made Cashier and held that position until he moved back to Stratford in 1928.

In 1930, J.R. Pendleton was elected County and District Clerk of Sherman County, a position that he held for eight of next twelve years, 1931 to 1943.

Bernice Lee Pendleton passed away on June 28, 1935. She had been in rather poor health for some time, with a heart condition.

On January 20, 1941, J.R. Pendleton and Mildred Jackson were united in marriage. They lived together for thirty one years, helping to raise and perhaps helping to spoil seven grand children. Mildred died March 1972.

On Oct. 13, 1973 J.R. Pendleton married Ruth Maedgen in Troy, Texas. He moved to Troy and made his home until August of 1990, when he moved back to Stratford and became the oldest resident of "Coldwater Manor". Bob loved Troy and the people of the area, he was especially proud of Ruth's great family, and he will never forget those years spent in Troy.

On Saturday February 29, 1992 festivities for Bob's 100 year birthday celebration began with a reception at Coldwater Manor. The Manor was decorated to perfection by that great staff.

On Sunday morning the church services were in honor of Bob and our citizen of the year, David

their business. Marge still uses the same small office she started out with. She laughs and says there is only room for one, so that leaves Ed out in front of at the local coffee shop, talking trade or farming. Moore Implement was chosen as the Business Persons of the Year.

At age 21, Mary Stowers, our Farmer of the Year married an individual from a neighboring farm family and together they set about establishing a home for the four children later born to them. They naturally entered the farming business and soon had a small acreage of their own. They started out with little, times were hard and World War II soon found them struggling with the rest of America to get by. Nevertheless they moved ahead by raising cotton, selling produce from a truck patch, and building a welding shop that turned out a multitude of cotton trailers!

Years passed and they became firmly established, acquiring more land, improving it, trading it for a larger acreage and eventually moved to Stratford where they bought 3 dryland sections of land. They drilled wells, installed underground tile, and began to irrigate, raising wheat and milo.

At the present time Mary resides near Stratford where SHE is still actively involved in farming. After her husband's J.L. Stowers death in 1983, she has continued to oversee the family business. While her son in law farms all of the land today, she has been instrumental in helping convert from all row water irrigation to a system which includes three center pivot sprinklers which provide a much more efficient usage of water.

Mary wears many hats, as bookkeeper, business negotiator, truck driver, occasional tractor driver, parts go for, and welder. She is mother to Dean Houston, Darlene Dickey, Arlene Brodhead and Ineta Chesher, Grandmother to 14 grandchildren, and Grandmary to 12 great grandchildren.

For 76 years she has worked a close relationship with the land, she has worked hard and enjoyed the fruits of her labor. As a steward of the land, she is also a diligent worker in her church, the First Assembly of God, here in Stratford.

David Allen Harker, Citizen of the Year, was born in 1937 in Lebanon, Indiana, the son of David and Thelma Harker. His father graduated from Purdue University as a civil engineer. David's mother had college training in library science and in later years ran the family's Office Supply store. During the Second World War the family lived in Columbus, Ohio where David's father was head of the Water Supply Board for the State of Ohio. After the war, the family returned to Indiana where David's father started his own surveying business. From the age of 11, David worked as a member of his father's surveying crew. Both his parents were active church members and taught Sunday School for many years. At the age of 16, having grown up in the church, David felt called to enter the ministry. After graduating from Martinsville High School, he attended Lynchburg College in Lynchburg, Virginia and graduated from Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana. He began preaching at the age of 19, serving as a student minister of New Winchester Christian Church for three years. He met his future wife, Rita Poe, during his first year in seminary. David was ordained to the Christian Ministry in 1962 at the age of 25. In June 1963, he graduated magna cum laude from Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis. That same month, David and Rita were married in First Congregational Church where David was assistant minister. For the next six years he served churches in Indiana, Southview Christian Church at

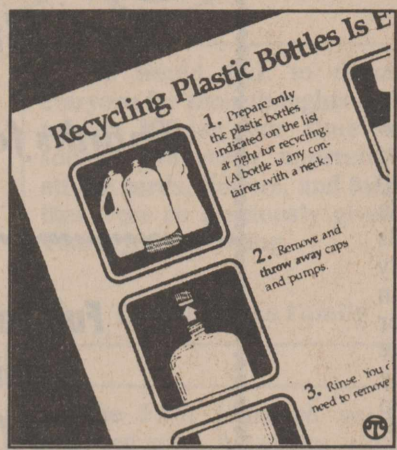
Warsaw, and Pittsboro Christian Church. In 1969 he became associate minister of Park place Christian Church in Hutchinson, Kansas and in 1971, minister of education at Central Christian church in Enid, Oklahoma. On March 1, 1973 David became the minister of First Christian Church in Stratford, where he has served for nearly 19 years.

David and Rita have two grown sons, Daniel, 26 who is married to Sanda and lived in Irving, Texas and Joseph, 25 who lives in Atlanta, Georgia.

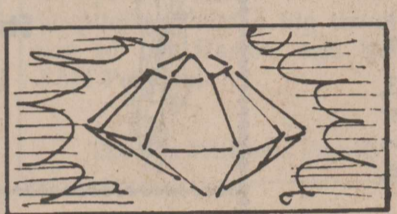

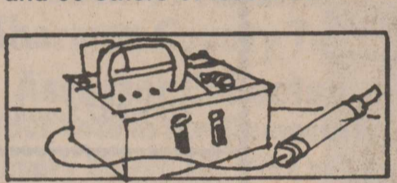
