

## Happy 100th "Bob"



**Bob Pendleton** 

John Robert Pendleton (Bob) born March 1, 1892 in Randall Stratford. This house still stands at Pendleton family moved to Troy, County, Texas. The Randall 501 Poplar. County Homestead or Pendleton Dairy was located close to 45th and Harrison in South Amarillo. In 1901 the E.G. Pendleton family moved to Sherman County. J.R. (Bob) Pendleton was the sixth child in a family of ten children, four boys and six girls.

E.G. Pendleton filed on four sections of land, about 3 miles

Bob graduated from high school in 1908, in the second graduating class of Stratford High School. In the fall of 1909 he entered Texas A&M and studied civil engineering for two years.

When World War one started, several Stratford boys enlisted in a Home Company at Dalhart,

Federalized and most of them gradually enlisted in the Military service. In May, 1918, Peach Smith and J.R. Pendleton enlisted and were sent to Camp Lee, Virginia. The Army doctors rejected both of them but Bob stayed for a hernia operation and worked in the mustering office at Camp Lee until he could take an over seas examination. He then made application and was accepted for Officer's Training School for Field Artillery in Camp Taylor, Kentucky. He was at Camp Taylor when the Armistice was signed and was discharged from Military Service on December 3rd, 1918.

On November 4, 1920, J.R. Pendleton and Bernice Lee of Hutchinson, Kansas, were united in marriage. #### Tips & Topics

Nutritionists have suggested a varied diet for decades but it is not clear that people know what variety means. "Eat a variety of foods" is the first of the seven "Dietary Guidelines Americans" published by the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Health and Human Services. The guideline explains that more than 40 nutrients are needed for good health. A variety of foods, not a few highly fortified foods or supplements is the recommended way to get these nutrients. No single food can supply all of these nutrients in amounts needed. For example, milk supplies calcium but very little iron, meat supplies iron but little calcium.

The Guideline addressing variety summarizes what's needed daily from the 5 major food groups:

- \* Vegetables, 3-5 servings
- \* Fruits-2 to 4 servings





Makes about 2 dozen 1 cup Blue Bonnet Margarine, softened

1 cup sugar 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 cup pecans, finely

chopped 2 teaspoons finely grated

lemon peel 1/2 cup strawberry preserves Confectioners' sugar

In large bowl, beat margarine and sugar until creamy. Mix flour, pecans and lemon peel; stir into margarine mixture until blended. Cover; chill 2 hours.

Divide dough in half. On floured surface, roll half the dough to 1/8inch thickness. With a floured 2 1/2 inch heart-shaped cookie cutter, cut out centers from half the hearts. Repeat with remaining dough, rerolling scraps as necessary. Place hearts on ungreased baking sheets. Bake at 325°F for 10 to 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove from sheets; cool on wire rack.

Spread about 1 teaspoon preserves on top of whole heart cookie; top with heart cookie with hole in it. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar if desired.
