skunks have reported rabid animal and the most common source of human
rabies in the United States rabies in the United States. In
Texas, rabies is found throughout the state, and skunks represent 35 to $60 \%$ of all known rabid animals on a yearly basis. Texas has been
the Number 1 in the United States for several years in reported cases of rabies.
Even if skunks are captured
where rabies is most found (such as Nevada, Utah, etc) and quarantined for six months, the risk of rabies is reduced, but they still cannot be regarded as
completely safe. And there are no rabies vaccines licensed for use in there is little evidence that any vaccine is effective in protecting
them from rabies them from rabies.
Skunks are highly susceptible
rabies, and produce large amounts of the rabies virus in their saliva from the time they become infective until they die. In one
study $58 \%$ of pet skunks were responsible for biting one or more persons. In households where pet
