## Combest To Speak At Soil Stewardship Banquet

U.S. Representative Larry Combest, 19th Congressional District will be the featured speaker at the Sherman County Soil and Water Conservation Soil Stewardship Banquet, April 6, 1993 at 12:00 noon. Congressman Larry Combest, Ranking Republican of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence and ranking subcommittee member of the Small Business and Agriculture committees receives consistently high marks from his constituents. He is known for his willingness to place principal ahead of political expediency, and his long-standing commitment to reducing federal government spending, paperwork and regulation.

His constituents returned Larry to Congress to serve a fifth term with 77% of the vote from three newly-redrawn congressional districts. Combest is only the third congressman to represent the sprawling 19th District, now covering a 400-mile length from the top of the Texas Panhandle through the South Plains and into the Permian Basin.

Responsiveness to the people he represents back home has earned Combest the trust of new constituents in the Panhandle and has kept the respect of those whom he has served for the past eight years. The Amarillo Globe-News wrote that, "Combest, a member of the Agriculture Committee, has gained the reputation of an expert on farm issues."

A fourth generation West Texan, Larry was born in Memphis, Texas on March 20, 1945. He spent the first 25 years of his life on a farm, gaining even further insight into farm programs when in 1971, he worked for Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service. Larry's working knowledge of agricultural issues attracted the attention of U.S. Senator John Tower of Texas who recruited Larry as his agricultural advisor in Washington, D.C. As the Operator of a small business from 1978 until his own election to Congress, Larry retains an appreciation for meeting a payroll amid the costly burden of government overregulation.

A fiscal conservative, Larry's consistent voting record is widely recognized by non-partisan watchdog groups for restraining federal spending, cutting government waste and promoting deficit reduction. His first day in Congress, Combest fulfilled a promise to his constituents to co sponsor a constitutional amendment to require a balanced federal budget. Larry Combest has received a 100% rating recipient of the "Eagle of Freedom Award" and the "Spirit of Enterprise Award."

Larry received his Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree from West Texas State University in Canyon in 1969. He

is married to the former Sharon McCurry. Larry has two grown children.

## Topdressing Wheat

Wheat in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains is rapidly breaking dormancy and beginning to green up as a result of the warm temperatures experienced the last couple of weeks. This cold front that moved through the area March 11 and 12 should not adversely affect the crop other than causing some leaf burn.

Now is a good time to consider topdressing wheat with nitrogen if needed. The dry conditions last fall resulted in many fields not receiving adequate fertilizer prior to planting. On the other hand, much of the wheat was not grazed, or only lightly grazed; and thus, may not need as much nitrogen as in years past.

Research on the pullman soils has suggested little benefit from nitrogen fertilization where expected yields are less than 35 bu/A. The winter months have provided excellent moisture throughout most of the area. As a result the potential for high wheat yields is good. For this reason, many dryland fields could potentially benefit from nitrogen topdressing. Nitrogen deficient fields will often appear yellow green in color once the wheat begins to actively grow. If this color persists after several days of sunshine, you can be reasonable certain the condition is due to inadequate nitrogen.

Dryland fields should be fertilized with 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen. Irrigated wheat fields that are showing deficiency symptoms should receive at least an initial application of 60 pounds of actual nitrogen. The nitrogen can be applied in the dry form as ammonium nitrate, ammonium sulfate, urea, or as nitrogen solutions. There is no strong advantage of one form of fertilizer over another. Urea is probably the least expensive, but it also has a higher risk of loss by volatility if applied to wet soil under warm conditions. Ammonium nitrate and nitrogen solutions are slightly more available to the plant initially. Some leaf burn may occur with the nitrogen solutions, especially under sunny, warm conditions. If applied before the wheat gets too big, the leaf burn should not adversely affect yield.

Topdressing of nitrogen should occur as soon as possible. The longer topdressing is delayed after jointing occurs the less opportunity the crop will have to benefit from the nitrogen. Once wheat reaches the boot stage of development 75% of the total amount of nitrogen it will use has been taken up by the crop. After the boot stage is reached, only protein content will be affected by additional nitrogen application.

There are no restrictions on the college or university to be attended by the recipient or the field of study to be entered by the recipient.

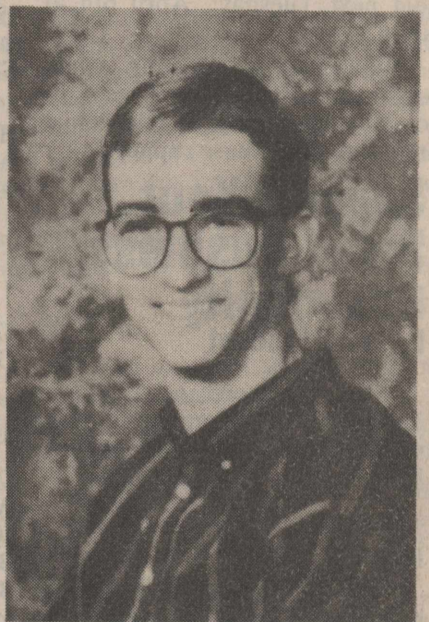
The award is named in honor of Burke Bell who served as manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Dalhart from 1960-1982.

Milk products provide protein, vitamins and minerals. Milk, yogurt and cheese are the best source of calcium. The Food Guide Pyramid suggests 2 to 3 servings of milk, yogurt and cheese a day. Two servings is sufficient for most people. Pregnant or breast-feeding women, teenagers and young adults to age 24 need 3 servings a day. One cup of milk or yogurt counts as a serving as does 1 1/2 ounces of natural cheese or 2 ounces of processed cheese.

To make wise choices from the Milk, Yogurt and Cheese group, follow these selection tips:

\* Choose skim milk and no fat yogurt often. They are lowest in fat.

\* 1 1/2 to 2 ounces of cheese and 8 ounces of yogurt count as a serving from this group because they supply the same amount of calcium as 1 cup of milk.

Meat, poultry and fish supply protean, B vitamins, iron and zinc. The other foods in this group, dry beans, eggs and nuts are similar to meats in providing protein and most vitamins and minerals. The Food Guide Pyramid suggests 2 to 3 servings each day of foods from this group. The total amount of these servings should be equivalent to 5 to 7 ounces of cooked lean meat, poultry or fish per day. Two to three ounces of cooked lean meat, poultry or fish is a serving. A ounce piece of meat is about the size of an average hamburger or the amount of meat on a medium chicken breast half. For the other foods in this group, 1/2 cup of cooked dry beans, 1 egg, or 2 tablespoons or peanut butter are equivalent to 1 ounce of meat.

Here are some selection tips for choosing foods from the meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts grouping:

\*Choose lean meat, poultry without skin, fish and dry beans and peas often. They are the choices lowest in fat.

\*Prepare meats in lowfat ways by trimming away all the fat you can see and broiling, roasting or boiling these foods instead of frying them.

\*Go easy on egg yolks which are high in cholesterol. Use only one yolk per person in egg dishes. Make larger portions by adding egg whites.

\*Nuts and seeds are high in fat, so eat them in moderation. Enjoying a variety on foods from the five major food groups represented in the Food Guide Pyramid is the best way to achieve a balanced diet.
