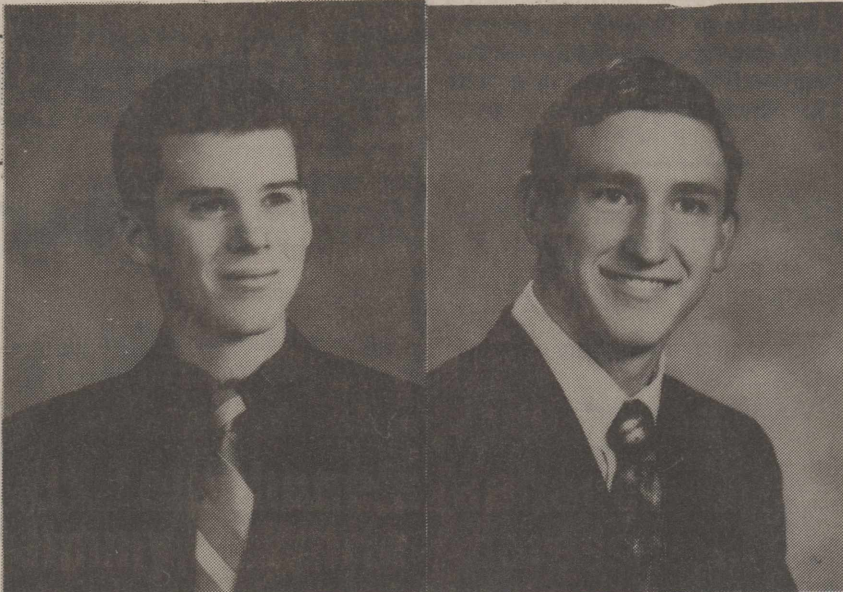

It was comprised of employees from telephone companies across the state, medical professionals, educators and those involved in economic development. Also attending the rally was former Dalhartan, Bill Wilcoxson. Wilcoxson, who is employed by Southwestern Bell Telephone in Dallas, is the son of Dalhart's Bob Wilcoxson.

White, who is serving as the chairman of the Texas Telephone Association, welcomed the group to Austin and expressed the association's appreciation for their attendance. White reported that this was one of the largest rallies to be held in Austin for quite sometime.

a two day period to show support for the proposed legislative

amendment to the Sunset legislation of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PRRA) that the Texas Telephone Association (TTA) is supporting. Speakers at the rally included Tim Raven, President of TTA, who was master of ceremonies; Joe Guin from the AFL-CIO; Paula Arnold, an educator from Houston; Bill Dreyer from Southwestern Bell; Dr. Damasco Olica from the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce; Dr. Jack Moncrief from the Austin Diagnostic Clinic; Steve Mays from the Irving Economic Development Foundation, and State Representatives, David Cain, Jim Tallas, Debra Danburg, and Ken Yarbrough.

Manager White explained that the Texas Telephone Association's proposed legislation would provide flexibility in the regulation of small telephone companies like XIT Rural Telephone Cooperative. It would assist small telephone companies in being responsive to its customers' needs in a more timely-less costly manner.

Under current legislation, XIT is regulated essentially the same as Southwestern Bell Telephone

Department of Public Safety Trooper, Wayne Beigle of Amarillo, will be presenting tips on how to protect children from being abducted, to all interested

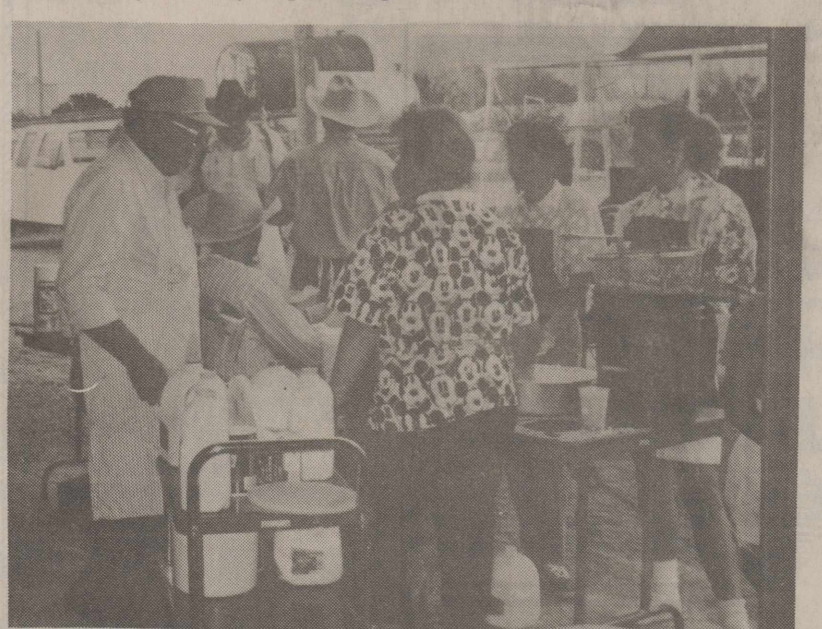

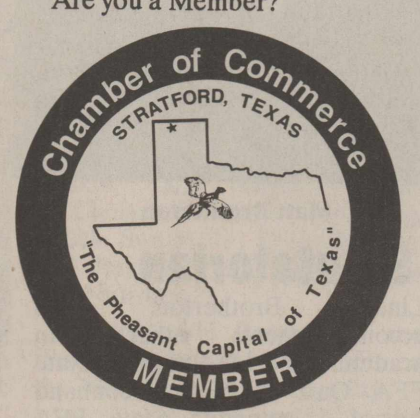

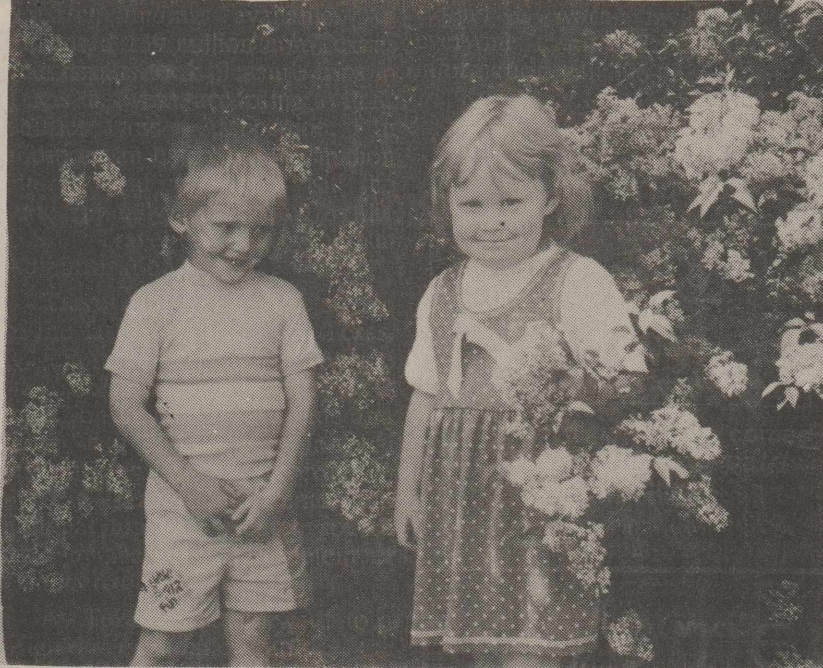
We look forward to the opportunity to see the children lead our congregation in worship.

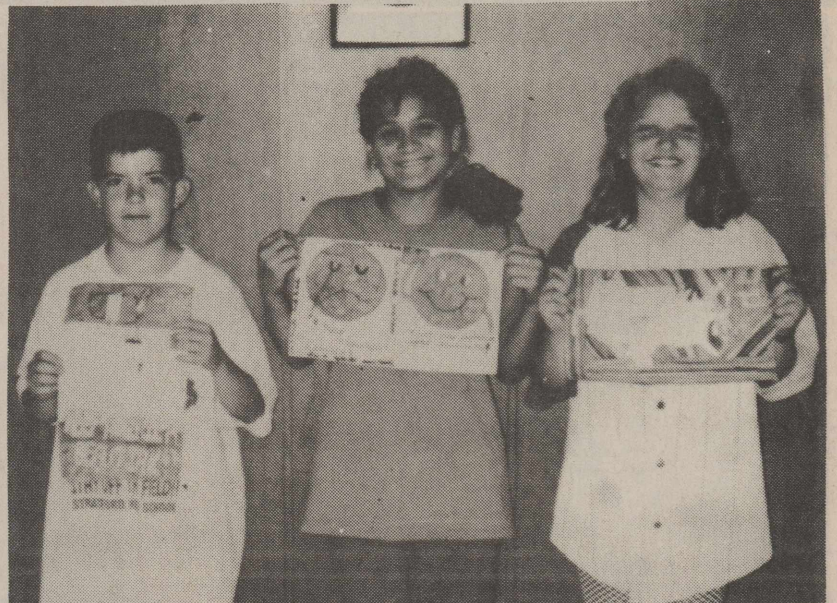
Sunday, May 23, is Graduate Sunday. We will recognize our graduating seniors and 8th graders and celebrate their entry into a new stage of life.

Company and General Telephone Corporation. This process places an undue burden on small companies. The larger companies have entire departments devoted to such matters while XIT Telephone's smaller staff is shared in all job responsibilities. In addition, most people do not realize that XIT's headquarters in Dalhart is closer to five other state capitals than it is to Austin. One of those is Cheyenne, Wyoming. From these viewpoints alone, you can easily see that a single proceeding with the public Utility Commission can cost our small cooperative thousands of dollars. And, such costs "eats up" revenues to be received from new services.

White also said that under the new legislation, Southwestern Bell, GTE and other large companies would commit 1.4 billion dollars towards developing a fiber optic infrastructure or network in the state. This commitment would include extending fiber optic facilities to every accredited high school, college and university within the certified area of these companies throughout the state--if a bonafide request were made. White further stated that under the proposed legislation, the telephone company would not charge any construction charges for his service. The service would be extended at a statewide uniform rate to the school or university. This effort could be a tremendous advantage to many of our rural schools in the state that are currently experiencing great difficulty in meeting state requirements on a limited budget.

White reported that XIT Rural Telephone Cooperative and General Telephone company have been working with area schools to develop a Distance Learning Program in the Panhandle. This legislation could go a long way toward making this a reality.

Fiber optic facilities would also be extended to every medical center and rural hospital under the same terms that have been proposed for the schools. This would allow rural hospitals and major medical centers to link together in a Telemedicine arrangement. White said that this could also prove to be a tremendous advantage to rural hospitals that have difficulty in attracting doctors to the area because of limited resources. With this technology, doctors in rural hospitals could have a specialist in a major medical center observe a procedure in progress and advise the local doctor by interactive two-way video. This would provide the same patient care locally that the patient would receive if he were

actually at the major medical center.

White also reported that Texas Tech Medical Center in Lubbock, Texas, has split programs in the South Plains and has expressed an interest in extending this technology into the Panhandle.

Manager White explained that in exchange for this 1.4 billion dollars, the large companies would receive alternative regulation to the current rate-of-return regulation being applied today. As a consumer protection, these companies would freeze basic local services for a five year period and agree to not increase rates for intra LATA long distance services the same period. Should there be an increase in income tax rates or other external costs, during this time, the companies would be allowed to adjust their rates with a preset cap with approval from the Public Utility Commission.

White said that Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock's office attempted to negotiate opposition by the state's publishers and consumer advocates. But, the negotiations came to an impasse on some issues although the telephone companies agreed to a freeze that would prevent them from entering into electronic publishing--which had been the main concern voiced by the publishers in this issue.

White went on to say that the legislation approved by the Senate Economic Development committee calls for a two-year study of telecommunications issues with the entire process being readdressed by the legislative in two years. In testimony before this committee, Manager White stated that the telephone industry proposed similar legislation for small company flexibility in 1987; however, the legislation that passed was so restricted that it was useless to the industry. He also said that legislation was discussed in 1991 and the telephone companies were told to wait two years for a study of the issues. We are again being told to wait another two years.

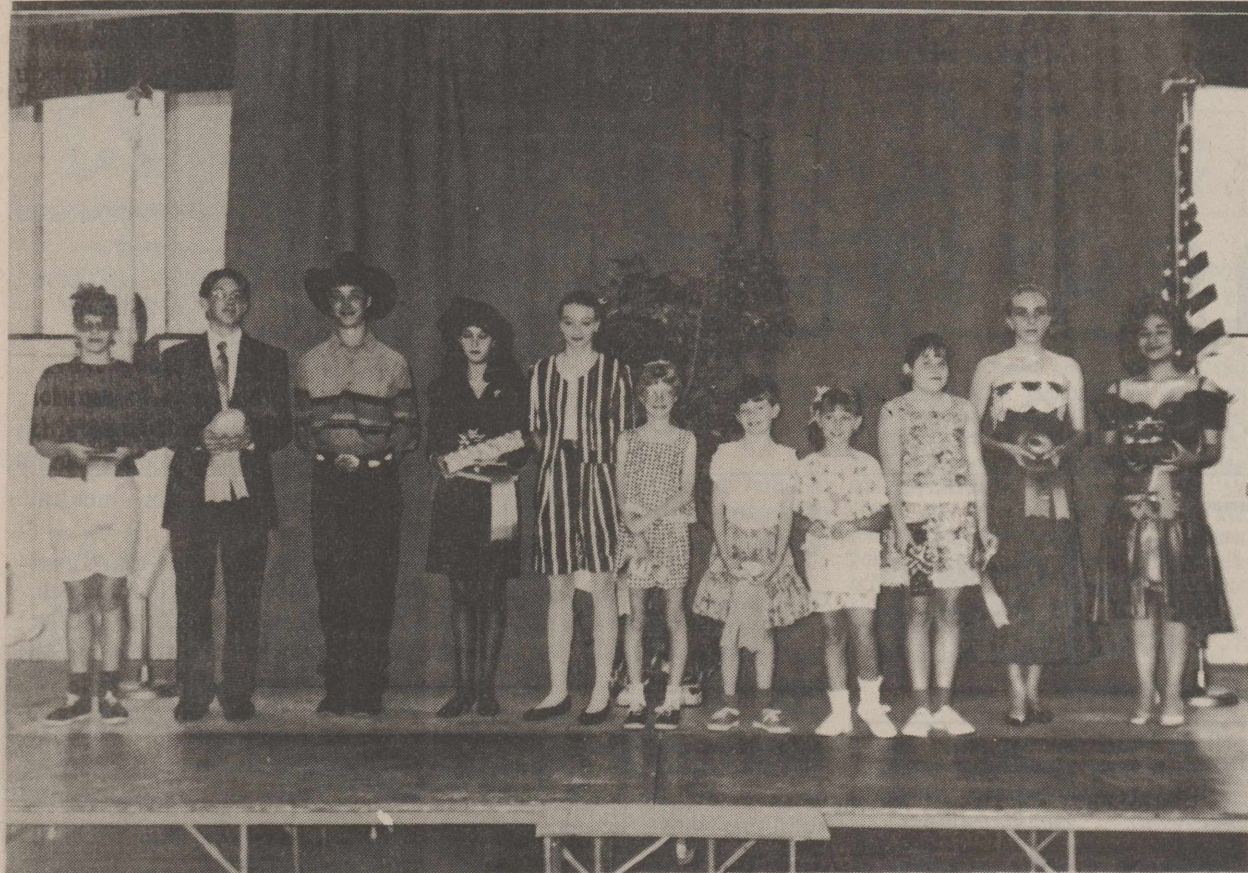
White said that approximately 15 other states have approved legislation similar to this and now have an improved telecommunication infrastructure. This gives those states an advantage over Texas in economic development to attract business to the state. The telephone industry has estimated that an advanced infrastructure would mean 65,000 jobs to our state. Another two years will place Texas that further behind other states and even other nations and will hamper Texas' ability to compete in a global economy.

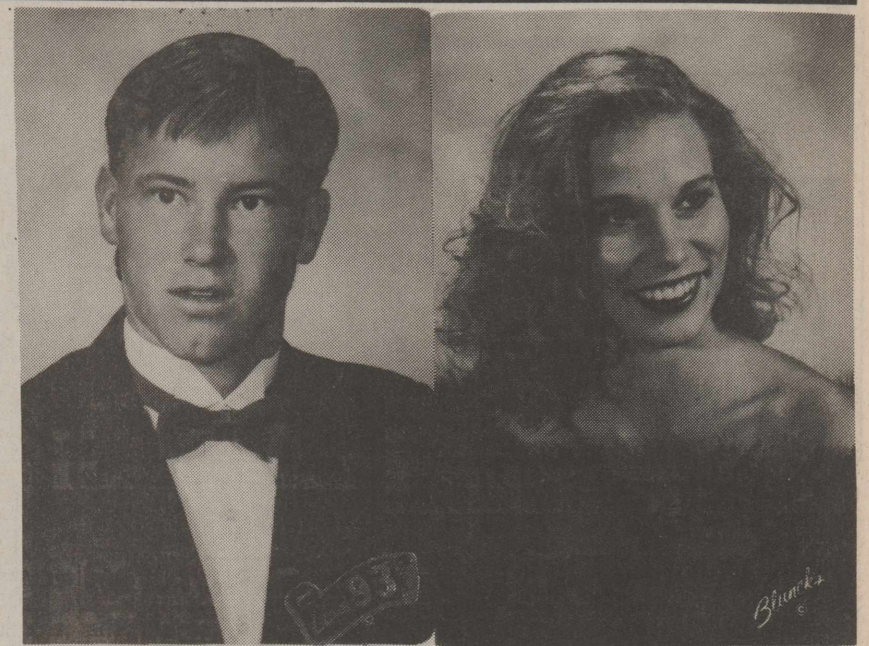

Tips & Topics

Sports are very important to children and can help them develop physically and personally. But simply placing children in a sports situation does not guarantee that they will benefit. How can parents help their children have a positive experience in organized sports?

The kind of support parents give their children can make sports fun and rewarding or the source of varying degrees of stress. Here are some ways parents can help their children whether six or sixteen-enjoy their sports experience and benefit from it. By following these principles, parents can both motivate their young athletes and help them develop a healthy, positive self-image:

*Keep in mind the two major reasons kids play sports-to have fun and to feel worthy, competent and successful.

*Teach your son or daughter that success in sports is more than just winning. Help them feel successful when they are improving or mastering skills, giving maximum effort and striving to win. In this way, parents can help their athlete accept disappointment, and not see losses as personal failures or blows to self worth.

*Help your athletes set realistic, achievable, yet challenging goals. Offer to work with them to meet these goals. When a child's skill level improves, she/he will feel a sense of accomplishment.

*Reward and encourage skill improvement, good plays and good behavior. Remember to praise often, not just performance-to motivate a child to try hard. The best way to reward is verbally or with a physical response like a smile or thumbs-up sign. Try to avoid money or other material rewards.

*Mistakes are part of learning a sport, and young athletes will make plenty of them. When your child makes a mistake, give encouragement and, if needed, ideas on how to correct the error. Be sure to do it in a positive way. Avoid criticizing and punishing for mistakes. Criticism teaches athletes to fear failure, causing them to worry that they will not perform well and to dread the possible disapproval of their parents, their coach and team mates. Being negative or punitive hurts rather than improves performance.

*Show your children that you love and accept them, regardless of the game's outcome or how they performed. This is the basis for a positive self-concept.

Some words of caution....

*Though it is perfectly natural to identify with your children, and want them to be successful, be careful not to live out your own dreams through them. Seeing a child's performance in sports as a reflection of one's self-worth and success, can cause parents to set unrealistically high goals for their children and place pressure on

them to perform, a major cause of stress in sports for kids.

*Watch your behavior at games and practices. Remember, parents are role models for their children. If you want your son or daughter to show good sportsmanship and self control, you need to exhibit it yourself, no matter how frustrating it may be to see a poor call or bad play.

*During games and practices, leave the coaching to the coach. It confuses players when they get instructions from more than one source.

The positive attributes that can be developed through sports can be strengthened by a parent's wise management and support of their child's sports experience. Years from now, it won't matter whether an athlete could field a line drive or make a left-handed lay up at age 12. But, the self-esteem, attitudes toward achievement and understanding of success as maximum effort and improving skills that parents can help instill in children through sports, can make them winners today and tomorrow.
