All Day Kindergarten To Start This School Year In Mary Allen

The summer of 1993 is fast passing us by and the new school year will soon be upon us. Administrators and teachers are busy getting ready for students to arrive in the classroom on August 18, at 8:30 a.m.

New for the Mary Allen Elementary school will be an all-day kindergarten. These students will attend class from 8:30 a.m. until 2:40 p.m. Kindergarten bus students will be attended at the Mary Allen campus until 3:45 p.m. when the other students are dismissed.

Meals will be served in the High School cafeteria for Kindergarten through High School. Price for meals will stay the same as last year: \$1.00 for all breakfasts; \$1.35 for high school lunch and \$1.25 for Jr. High/Elementary lunch. Free and reduced rates will be available.

Once again, Superintendent Brite has spent an interesting summer in trying to determine how the new senate bills will effect the Stratford Schools. The administration is eager to begin a new year and is looking forward to seeing the students.

Registration Hours For Stratford High School Listed

Registration for the 1993-94 school year will be as follows: Wednesday, August 11, Seniors from 10:00 to 12:00; Juniors from 1:00 to 3:00. Thursday, August 12, Sophomores from 10:00 to 12:00; Freshman from 1:00 to 3:00.

Principals from Mary Allen Elementary and Stratford Middle School, Jim Bob Brown and Jim Taliaferro, have announced that any student entering Stratford Schools for the first time can register any weekday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, and from 1:00 to 3:00 beginning on August 9.

All new students should have an immunization record with them at the time of enrollment. Students are required to have three DPT or TD immunizations with the last being after their 4th birthday. One immunization is required for rubella, measles and mumps.

Kindergarten and first grade students are required to show a Birth Certificate and Kindergarten students must be 5 years old prior to September 1, 1993.

The idea of men being beaten or abused by their wives or girlfriends runs contrary to many of societies' deeply ingrained stereotypical male and female roles. Aren't all men supposed to be tough, strong, and able to take care of themselves? Males have been trained from childhood NOT to ask for help, and any man who can't solve his own problems is called weak, spineless, henpecked and many other "not so nice" names. It should come as no surprise then, to learn that men are unwilling to report they have been the victims of ANY assault, much less that they have been beaten by a woman.

In fact, men report ALL types of violent victimization 32 percent less frequently than women, according to a 1990 Department of Justice survey of criminal victimization.

So, why don't men, who are so much bigger and stronger than women, protect themselves? Because some little boys are actually taught that boys, "Never hit a girl". And when these same little boys grow up, they are told that any man who hits a woman is a bully, and should "pick on someone their own size". But if a woman hits him, he's supposed to "take it like a man".

Not fighting back is one thing, but why would any sane man stay in an abusive relationship? Surprisingly enough, for the same reasons women stay in abusive relationships: love, hope, (that their abuser will change) economics, and the children. Although the average male victim of domestic abuse has more financial resources available than his average female counterpart, this is changing fast. As more women enter the work force, families are fast becoming dependent on two incomes.

Dumas-The new 18-hole Pheasant Trails Golf Course will officially open on Saturday, August 7, 1993. The course will kick off with a Grand Opening Tournament. 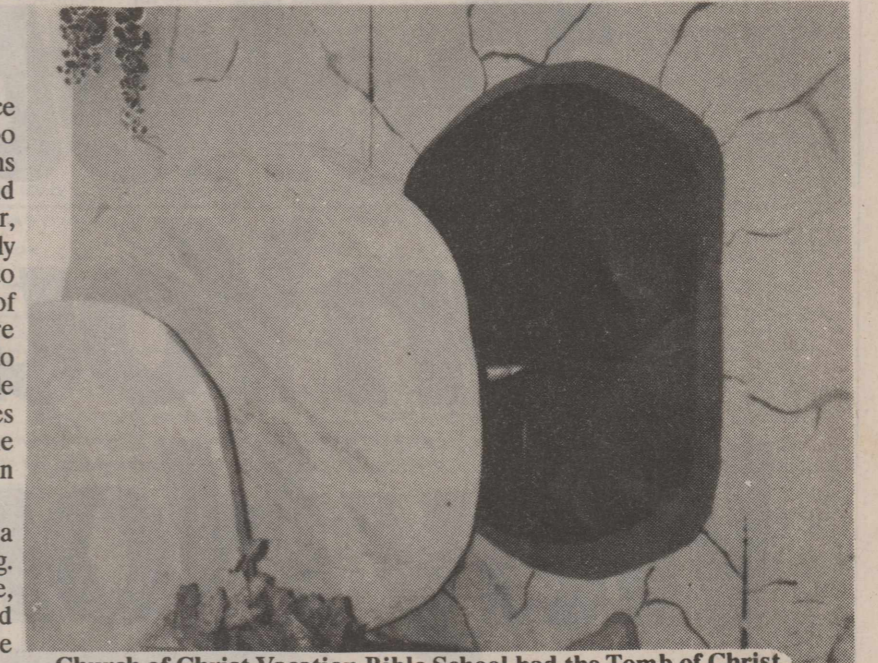

born. John was now afraid to leave during an argument because he feared for his baby's safety. If he left the house, would his wife turn her unleashed fury on the baby?

His wives temper tantrums has escalated since the baby's birth. She resented being tied down and stuck at home with the baby when John was at work. The baby got on her nerves by constantly needing attention. By the time John got home from work, she was ready to unload all her anxiety on him.

John repeatedly ask his wife to seek professional help but she denied needing any help. She didn't believe she had a problem, so she didn't need counseling. (Which is typical behavior for any abuser, male or female.)

John called Safe Place where he immediately received safe shelter, we referred him to legal aid and he applied for a protective order. He already had a job but Safe Place provided him with legal referral, transportation to and from work, and to look for an apartment. We assisted him in finding child care for the baby, helped him apply for social services, and he received

individual and group counseling. He now has custody of his little girl.

It hasn't been easy for John. His abusive relationship left him with both emotional and physical scars which will probably affect the rest of his life. He still receives counseling, which will help him choose a partner for his next relationship with more care. John will be able to recognize the warning signs, of an abusive partner in the future which will give his daughter a greater change to live an abuse-free domestic life and break the cycle of violence.

One of the most frequent questions I am asked when I tell a man that I work for Safe Place, is "What about abused husbands?" Always, I tell them to call us. We are here to provide services to ANYONE who's a victim of domestic violence or sexual assault, male or female. In Moore county, our hotline number is 935-2828. For Dallam, Sherman and Hartley counties, you may call 1-800-753-7553 for assistance 24 hours a day.

Parent/Guardian: The Stratford Independent School serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for (Elem./Jr. High) \$1.25 (High School) \$1.35 and all breakfasts for \$1.00. Children also may get meals free or at a reduced price.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY and INCOME CHART table showing household size and monthly income levels for eligibility.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Check the Imagination Station. It will bear watching from now on, as big plans are in the making for this tourist attraction; as well as for we who live here.

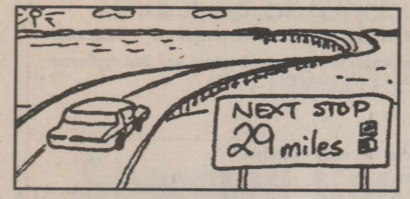
