Texhoma Voters To Be Asked To Vote On Method To Reduce District's Wealth

Texhoma, Texas school district will be asked to vote on a method to reduce the district's wealth. In the last legislative session, "wealthy" school districts were given 5 options to reduce their wealth to a level determined by the State of Texas.

For Texhoma, that means giving up to the state about 2/3 of any money we generate through taxes... or about 68 cents for every dollar collected.

Let me quickly recap the 5 options to let you know why the board of trustees chose the plan it did.

1. One plan was to consolidate with a "poor" district. The new district must not be "wealthy". This option is permanent and does not require voter approval.

2. Another plan is to de-annex (give to a "poor" district) property to one or more "poor" school districts until we are at an approved wealth level. This plan is permanent and does not require voter approval.

3. A third method would be to educate students in another school district. Instead of sending our money to the state, we would send it to a "poor" district. There is very little chance that this option would be any benefit to either us or the receiving district. This plan would require voter approval in both districts.

4. Another option would be to consolidate tax bases in a manner similar to the current County Education District (C. E. D.). Texhoma would have to find an exact match with a "poor" district. This plan would require voter approval in all the districts involved. The board could see no benefit to Texhoma in this plan.

5. The last plan... the one we chose is simply to pay the money directly to the state who will then redistribute it to "poor" districts throughout the state. This plan will require voter approval in our district only. Of all of the "choices" it appears to be the best method for Texhoma.

6. There is perhaps a 6th option. If the voters reject the

plan the board is submitting or we chose to do nothing, by October 15, 1993, the commissioner of education will be required by law to either consolidate us with one or more districts or de-annex property to other districts or both. That could mean the end of the Texhoma, Texas school.

Many legislators were very proud that this legislative session did not generate any new taxes. However, the same gloating senators and representatives will force at least 80% of the school districts in the state to raise taxes just to maintain their current levels of spending. They forced the tough decisions onto the local boards of education rather than shoulder their responsibility.

There are no winners. No "poor" school district will receive any more money from the state. What Texhoma and the other "wealthy" districts send is that much less that the state will have to spend on education in property poor school districts. What we give with one hand, the state takes with the other. There are no winners!

Both poor and wealthy districts have filed suit against this plan. I personally that the plan will be thrown out and something else will take its place. We may have to go through all of this again next summer and the next until a fair and equitable solution is found. I don't envy the work before the next legislative body. Texas is a vast state with many regional differences. One plan that satisfies all districts in the state will be difficult to achieve.

In the meantime, senate bill 7 is the law of the land and we will have to live with it until something other comes along. I urge Texhoma, Texas voters to accept the plan endorsed by the local board of education on August 14, 1993. I also encourage all interested citizens to an open forum on August 10, 1993, at 7:00 in the Texhoma, Texas school cafeteria.

Ganel Penick

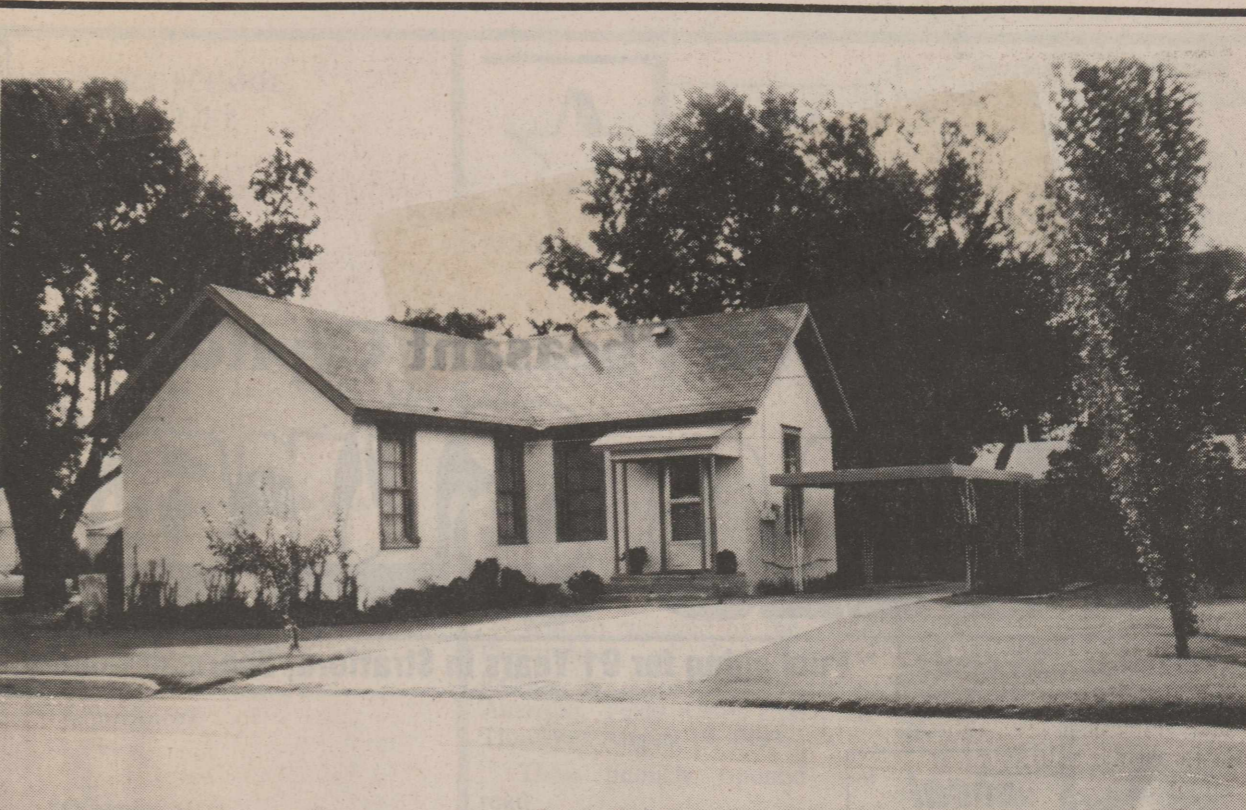
Texhoma-Ganel Penick, 95, died Saturday, August 7, 1993.
