Don & Sybil Harrington Cancer Center Mammography Unit To Be In Stratford

On Tuesday, November 23, 1993, from 10:00 a.m. - 2:30 p.m., The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Stratford at the First United Methodist Church, 520 North Main. Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule an appointment call 1-800-377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screening for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered

Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram. Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self-examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to recommendations by age:
 - Age 40 One baseline mammogram
 - 40-49 A mammogram every 1 to 2 years
 - 50 and over Yearly mammograms

Chrysler Recalls New 4wd Rams

Detroit-Chrysler Corp. notified 2,000 early buyers of its new four wheel-drive Ram pickups that a bolt on the front suspension track of their trucks may not have been tightened sufficiently.

The company sent out notifications to customers Friday, Nov. 5, advising them to take their vehicles in for dealer inspection.

The company produced about 4,000 of the vehicles with potential problems prior to Sept. 25, and instructed dealers to inspect the remaining 2,000 still in dealer inventory.

The bolt is one of two that attaches the front suspension track bar to the front axle. The company said that if the bolt is not tight enough, allowing the track bar to disengage, it would cause front axle vibration and potentially hamper steering control.

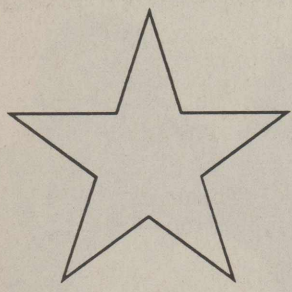

In the past, all departments reported directly to the administrator. "The new organizational structure will give each department more accessible contact with administration," Clark said. "We feel that this structure will make the hospital more patient focused and responsive to necessary changes."

Boyd came to Dumas to accept the position and Director of Nursing in Dumas in March of 1993. Before coming to Dumas he worked as the Director of Nursing at Golden Plains Community Hospital in Borger.

Boyd completed his nursing education at Texas Tech University in Lubbock where he received a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree. He has been in nursing administration since 1979 and was the interim administrator this summer before David Clark arrived in September.

products-while tobacco manufacturers claim to protect rights of smokers, they are lobbying in many states to take away right of smokers, and:

To oppose tobacco advertising restrictions, manufacturers have found lobbying allies in the advertising industry and ACLU. This has occurred primarily at the federal level ever since warning labels were required on cigarette packs, as that law also preempted state and local governments from enacting many tobacco advertising laws. And: It is estimated that tobacco usurps the place of food crops that could feed 10 to 20 million people-and: The U.S. has become the number one exporter of cigarettes, with total exports of 118.5 billion cigarettes in 1988-and astounding 18% increase in volume in just one year-Phillip Morris's advertising budget in Brazil for the first 7 months of 1986 alone was \$15.2 million. And in Brazil, cigarette related disease now leads infectious diseases as the principle cause of death: And that Tobacco accounts for more than one of every five deaths in America-And: Exports to Japan alone, cigarette exports to that country increased 75%; as well as a 10-fold increase in the number of television ads for cigarettes, with predictable sharp increases in smoking among Japanese adolescents and children.
