The pioneers who settled Stratford and the surrounding area were a special breed. They were tough, determined people of character and integrity. Their work, accomplishments and cooperative spirit are part of our history and our heritage. On Monday and Tuesday nights, the 20th and 21st of February, the citizens of our community showed that they still believe in our heritage and that the spirit of the pioneers, which made this such a great place to live, is still alive.

The occasion was a pair of very successful town meetings which resulted in definite goals being set for the improvement of the economic condition of our community. The meetings were sponsored by the Community Development

Fifty-one people attended the Monday night meeting to voice their opinions and give suggestions for ways to improve our community. On Tuesday evening, forty two citizens showed up to volunteer a year of their time towards making Stratford a better and more rewarding place to live.

RECREATION & ENTERTAINMENT TASK FORCE: Ann Wells, Chairman. Goals: To conduct summer Drama Workshops for children, to investigate the possibility of promoting the golf course.

Kadoos to the Elk Basketball team and their coach, Roger Whiteside.

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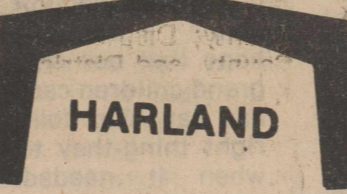

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

Date of the first of three weekly publications of this Notice: _____

- Notice is hereby given that Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas, 754 Vella Road, Palm Springs, California 92264 has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to charge or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period and by the method summarized hereinbelow. Similar weather modification operations have been conducted during portions of each year since 1972 in the area specified below under Texas permits.
- Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas has a valid Texas weather modification license that was issued in May 1972 and which has been renewed each year to the present (current license Number 89-3).
- The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect and benefit rangeland and agricultural interests of the client. The period of the permit is for one year from around April 15, 1989, with options for continuation of the program during similar periods beginning March 1, of 1990, 1991, and 1992.
- The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of Hitch Agri-Business, Inc., P.O. Box 1308, Guymon, Oklahoma 73942, for the Hitch Ranch area in Texas County, Oklahoma.
- The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area, which is confined to the Oklahoma Panhandle. The operational area is that area described by the Texas counties of Dallam, Hansford, Moore, Ochiltree and Sherman, and the Oklahoma counties of Cimarron and Texas.
- The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is the area described as that portion of Texas County, Oklahoma that is within the rectangular area bounded on the east by a 12 mile north-south line which extends from the State line through Hitchland, Oklahoma to State Highway No. 3, then to a point 7 miles west along the highway, then 12 miles due south to the State line, then 7 miles east along the State line to the point of origin.
- The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: a licensed cloud seeding technologist will use standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and plume dispersion models to initiate the release of the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, from a network of ground based generators at a time calculated to affect the formation of cumulusiform clouds.
- Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather and Climate Specialist of the Commission.
- A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. The petition must contain (1) the signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice. More information on calling a hearing can be obtained through the Legal Division of the Commission (512/463-8069) or through the Commission's Office of Hearing Examiners (512/463-7875).

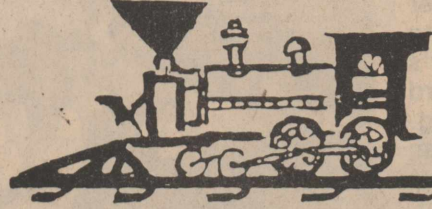

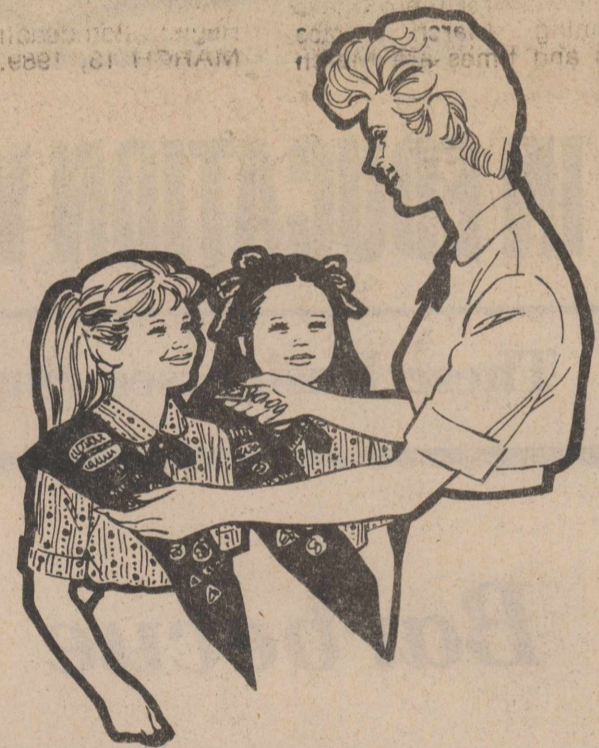

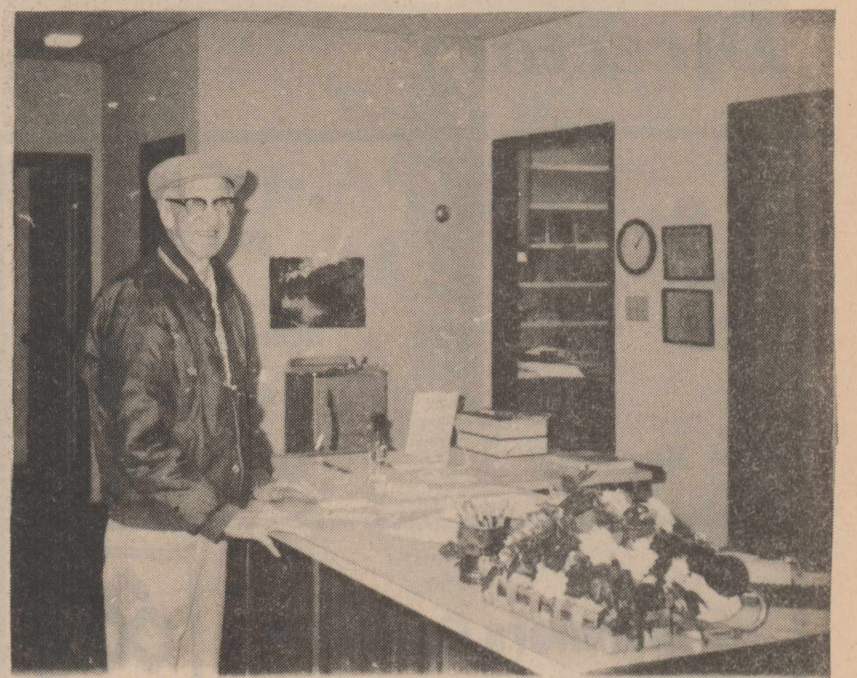

Diesel Fuel Tax Refund Procedure

Farmers who purchased diesel fuel between April 1 and December 31, 1988, for off-highway use have two options to recoup the 15.1 cent per gallon excise tax paid during that period. You can use Form 4136 and apply the refund as a credit against self-employment or federal income taxes owed for 1988. Or you can receive a refund plus interest by using Form 843. However, all diesel fuel on which you claim an excise tax refund must be used by the filing deadline of June 30, 1989. You must provide

proof of purchase on a month-by-month basis. Interest will be calculated beginning with the first day of the month following the fuel purchase. Large volume users who paid more than \$1,000 in fuel taxes in the second or third quarter of 1988 were permitted to file for a refund at the end of the quarter. If they didn't file, then they now are eligible for a credit with no interest, not a refund. However, excise taxes paid by larger users during the fourth quarter will be repaid with interest.

floor also offer protection from tornadic winds. Avoid windows and outside walls. Take along blankets of sleeping bags to protect yourself from falling debris and shattering glass, which are frequently the cause of death and injury during a tornado.

Make certain you have a portable radio and several flashlights (and fresh batteries for both) as well as bottled water, extra prescription medications and a first aid kit in your shelter area. Remember, if a tornado strikes, electricity, gas, water and sewer service may be disrupted for several days.

Mobile homes and automobiles are dangerous places to be during a tornado. If you live in a mobile home, make sure all

family members know where the nearest substantial shelter is. If you are in your mobile home or car and can't get to a better shelter: go outside, lie down in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the possibility of flooding in low-lying areas. Do not hide under your mobile home or car because both can easily be picked up and carried away by a tornado.

Your local (city or county) emergency management office can provide you with additional information on severe weather precautions. The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association and the Federal Emergency Management Agency are sources of information and publications on various weather phenomena for local governments.
