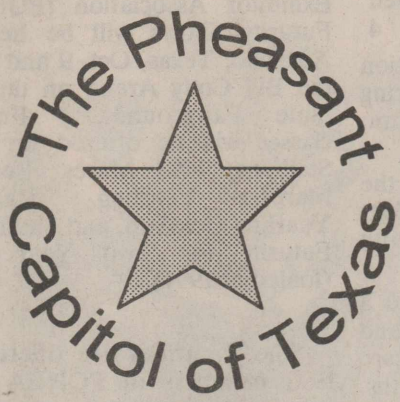

US HWY 287 Coalition

Kay Aston, Transportation & Tourism Chairman of the Stratford Chamber of Commerce, Gaynelle Riffe, Ken Forthman, and J.A. Lasley traveled Thursday evening to Boise City, Oklahoma where they met with Citizens of both Oklahoma and Colorado. The purpose was to pursue a coalition with the state of Colorado and Oklahoma for highway 287.

A fruitful meeting of the three states. Colorado is getting some portion of their highway reconstructed out of Springfield with more work being done in the Campo area, by '95. True this seems along way off, but in reality two years will pass very quickly, and it was the conclusion of the group at least the department of transportation had gotten the message from the folks of that area plus the letters and calls from the truckers that use this highway extensively.

There has been some improvement south of Boise City with more to come in segments of 7 miles a stretch.

Having known that at one time there had been a 287 association this group decided to send letters from Port Arthur north to Wyoming, each state working in different areas to check out whether an association is still in existence.

In order to have continuity this group will have the heading of "US 287 Coalition". It was

determined that we needed a mission statement and purpose. Our mission statement is: "The purpose is to promote US Highway 287 for industry and commerce to transport the nations goods." Tourism is a big thing in all three states. We concluded with economic growth the travelers, with a good highway, would follow.

There will be at least three individuals, from each state, to serve on this coalition. The next meeting, November 11, will, again be in Boise City, Ok. at that time a chairman will be selected. In due time there will be, as progress develops, a meeting in Springfield, Colorado, and in Stratford whereby folks can come and hear what is being done in regard to a four lane highway from Stratford to the Oklahoma line and beyond.

In visiting with folks, in regard to US Highway 287, the General conception has been interstate. Folks that is not going to happen without a great deal more usage and without big bucks from the federal government. We, as a 287 coalition are not asking for an interstate. We just want four lanes to Limon, Colo. where they can meet up with Interstate 70.

Economically, a good highway system going through Stratford, Texas, North through Boise City, Ok., and on through Springfield Colorado will be a real boost to our economy. Every citizen here, and there, should jump on the band wagon and wage war with the Departments of Transportation to upgrade and make highway 287 a four lane. As the old expression goes "Get in their face". Time, patience, and commitment will prevail.

Definitions Of Physician Assistant And Nurse Practioner

During the summer and fall, the "doctor search committee" and Stratford Hospital Board of Directors has talked about Physicians assistants and Nurse Practioners in connection with health care in Stratford. In answer to the many questions concerning the qualifications of these professionals, some explanations and definitions are necessary.

Both a Physician Assistant and a Nurse Practioner are under the direction of a physician, who must sign the orders that these professionals write. That does not mean a physician must be present at all times but available for consultation.

According to Appendix A in the Rural Health Clinic Guidelines, a Nurse Practioner is a registered nurse with additional training of at least one year that:

- (1) prepares registered nurses to perform an expanded role in the delivery of primary care.
- (2) includes at least 4 months of classroom instruction and a component of supervised clinical practice.
- (3) awards a degree, diploma or certificate to persons who successfully complete the program.

In the same information, a "physicians assistant" means a person who meets the applicable state requirements. Has satisfactorily completed a program

Andy made a motion and Claude second to table signing the audit agreement with Keeney, Hembree & Co. for more information. Motion carried.

Mayor Forthman announced that Council was going into Executive Session under Article 6252-17 sec. 2g to discuss administrative personnel and policy. No action was taken, Mayor Forthman reopened the meeting to the public.

for preparing physicians assistants that:

(1) was at least 1 academic year in length.

(2) consisted of supervised clinical practice and at least 4 months of classroom instruction directed toward preparing students to deliver health care; and

(3) was accredited by the American Medical Associations Committee on Allied Health Education and Accrediting; or

Has satisfactorily completed a formal educational program and has been assisting primary care physicians for a total of 12 months.

Health professionals, like advanced Nurse Practitioners and Physician assistants have shown that they can provide high quality primary care services. In medically underserved areas, advanced nurse practitioners and physician assistants have greater latitude to act autonomously, and depending upon the circumstances, may do all or some of the following, take medical histories, give physical examinations, deliver babies, do lab tests, take electrocardiograms, offer family planning information, observe patient symptoms and follow standing orders from the physician for treatment, monitor the course of chronic illness, treat acute illness and accidents, and provide emergency treatment in life threatening situations until a physician can be seen.

During our recent trip to Rural Health Find in Dallas, each Doctor that was interviewed was asked about working with one of these professionals. Without exception the doctors interviewed had confidence in a physicians assistant or nurse practitioner and in most cases were doing work in a hospital with them in their training programs. The doctors felt this was a good way to give medical coverage and allow the some hours of freedom from calls.

PQHEA Show To be Held In Amarillo

The Panhandle Quarter Horse Exhibitor Association (PQHEA) Futurity Shows will be held in Amarillo, Texas, Oct. 9 and 10 at the Bill Cody Arena on the Tri-State Fairgrounds. Futurity classes will be offered for 1993 Stallions, 1993 Mares, Yearling Mares, Yearling Stallions, Yearling Geldings, and Snaffle Bit Futurity for Two Year Olds (foaled in 1991).

The Futurities are offered to 1993 members of PQHEA with any member owned horse eligible for classes offered. Owners and exhibitors must be current PQHEA members. There will be added money according to the number of entries--\$100 will be added for five paid entries, \$200 for six to eight paid entries, and \$300 for nine to eleven entries.

In conjunction with the Futurities, AQHA approved Open, Amateur, Youth, and Novice classes will be available, including working cow horse, roping and fence classes.

Judging the show on Oct. 9 will be Gene Harvey, and Danly Sayles on Oct. 10.

Entry fees for Open and Amateur are \$10 per class or \$40 all day; for Youth and Novice, fees are \$8 per class or \$30 all day. All day fees are for the same horse, rider and division.

Nominations for the Futurities after September 15 will be accepted with double payments if paid by cash, cashiers check or money order.

Four-Day Meeting At Church of Christ

Robert K. Oglesby of Richardson, Texas, will be the guest speaker at a four-day meeting Sunday through Wednesday, October 10-13, at the Stratford Church of Christ.

Sunday services are scheduled for 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. There will be early morning services from 7 a.m. to 7:4 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. Night services for these three days will be at 7:30 p.m.

Basically, the topics for the meeting are centered on Christians being God's family in worship, love and sharing.

Oglesby is well qualified having a B.A. and M.A. in Bible from Abilene Christian University. He has given over three thousand teaching seminars throughout the United States and Canada, including six university campuses. He has written twenty-three books and has narrated a video panorama of the Bible which has been shown in fifty states and ten foreign countries. The video, called One Story, has also been translated into two foreign language versions: Russian and Czechoslovakian. 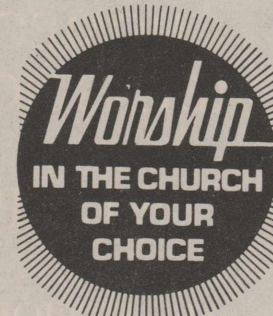

dress uniform, and the groomsmen were Tino Garza also dressed in navy blue, both from Stratford.

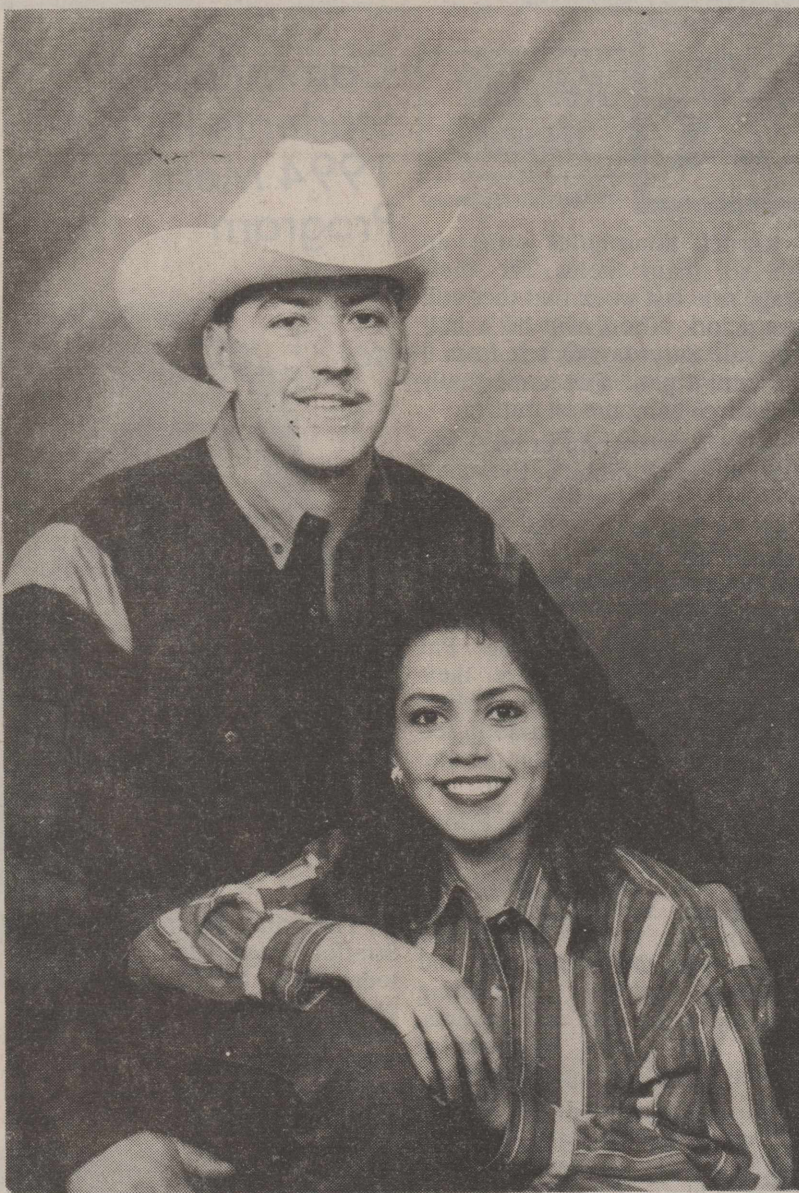

'High Risk' Persons Need Influenza Vaccine

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has warned that anyone who may be at increased risk of complications of influenza should be immunized before the 1993-94 flu season.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) each year predicts which strains of influenza pose the greatest public health danger. The vaccine CDC has recommended for the 1993-94 season is designed to combat the A/Beijing, B/Panama and A/Texas (first isolated in Houston in 1991) strains of the disease.

Since flu vaccines are subject to yearly change, and effectiveness of the shots declines with time, annual doses of the recommended vaccines are necessary for people most at risk.

People most at risk of severe or fatal complications of the disease are those 65 or older, anyone with chronic respiratory or heart problems and children weakened by disease.

"Occurring most often from December through April, influenza kills about 20,000 in the

U.S. every year--most of them in high-risk categories," Robert D. Crider Jr., director of TDH's Immunization Division, said. Crider said that the elderly are among the hardest-hit by influenza and its complications.

"Fewer than 30 percent of Americans in high-risk groups heed our annual warnings to seek influenza vaccinations," he added. "We know that one reason some older people fail to be vaccinated is because of an unfounded fear that the vaccine can actually cause influenza. The truth is that a vaccinated person may still contract some strain of influenza, but not from the vaccine. If they do become ill, the vaccine usually helps lessen the severity of the case."

The categories of people who are most likely to develop complications from influenza are:

*Persons 65 years old and older.

*Adults children with chronic heart or lung disorders, including children with asthma.

*People under medical care for chronic metabolic diseases, kidney or blood problems or weakened immune systems.

*Children (18 and younger) who already are receiving long-term aspirin therapy, which can place them at risk of developing Reye syndrome after influenza.

"We strongly recommend influenza vaccinations for all people in high-risk groups, especially if they are international travelers or if they are pregnant," Crider advised. "People infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (the virus which causes AIDS) also may be at increased risk for flu complications."

In addition, physicians, nurses and other health professionals should be immunized against influenza to avoid spreading the disease to their patients, according to recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"TDH and the American Lung Association already have reminded health professionals and others in close contact with high-risk people to be immunized, both for their own protection as well as for others," Crider said.

"We advise physicians to offer vaccine to their patients during

routine clinic visits, beginning in September and throughout the influenza season-typically December through April," he said.

In addition, residents and employees of nursing homes and other facilities treating chronically ill patients should be immunized.

Crider explained that all unimmunized residents of chronic-care facilities, such as nursing

homes, should be immunized during October and November. Since immunity by the vaccine may not be complete for a few weeks following vaccination, waiting until flu cases occur in the community can be a tragic mistake. He added that high-risk persons who are hospitalized any time from now through March and members of their households are encouraged to be vaccinated.
