Summary of Area Crop Situation Given By Martin

Haskell County farmers are now combining milo at a rapid rate, with production ranging from 1,000 to 3,000 pounds per acre on dry land, and the dry land average forecast for about 1500 pounds per acre, Frank W. Martin, Haskell County agricultural agent, reported on Tuesday.

The milo crop in this area has suffered some damage from continuing heat without moisture and false chinch bugs, the county agent said.

April planted cotton on dry land "is suffering badly for the need of rain," Martin declared. May and June planted cotton, however, "has fruited up well and will hold for several days more without rain," the county agent said.

Cotton insects have been scarce in dry land cotton in this territory, but in irrigated cotton, boll worms have appeared, causing farmers to use control measures.

With but 11 of an inch of rain received here in the past 14 days, according to Sam P. Harren, Jr., Haskell weather- (See Summary, Page 10)

Rule Teachers Get Important Info at Workshop

Supt. Connor Horton and five teachers in the Rule Schools have returned from a five-day Texas Small Schools Workshop in Austin, where school teachers learn to apply techniques enabling them to have a broader curriculum through the use of multiple classes.
Rule was one of the original 17 pilot schools in Texas. Five years ago, the workshop drew 59 teachers. This year there were 103 schools registered with some 600 individuals participating.
In addition to Horton, Rule's delegation to the workshop included Mrs. Horton, Mrs. R. O. Henry, Mrs. R. C. Pool, Mrs. F. W. Chambers and Mrs. C. W. Dunnam.
Of special interest this year was the workshop held on

"Words In Color and Cuisenaire Rods," attended by Rule's Mrs. Chambers. This is a new comprehensive, linguistic, phonetic approach to the teaching of reading and writing, and Rule will be one of only three schools in the pilot program trying this method in 1964-65. The others are Detroit and Willis, Texas.
New techniques of visual dictation and flexible uses of several types of materials, in the new method, almost "silently" provide experiences for the learner with dynamic self-teaching images of the sounds of English, first in color, then in black, through which the learner can discover and generate whole written language.
Thus, learners are brought, within eight weeks or less, on the average, to a realistic understanding of the non-phonetic English language with all its ambiguity of spelling and sound, including even its difficult spelling, according to those who have learned these intriguing new teaching techniques.

VERY LOCALIZED NEAR MATTSON CROP-STRIP HAIL COMES WITH FIRST MOISTURE IN 39 DAYS

First measurable moisture in 39 days was recorded in Haskell County last Wednesday afternoon, ranging from .02 inch at the U. S. Weather Bureau Station at the north edge of Haskell to 1.16 inches on the Elbert Mapes place 11 miles northeast of town, just south of the Mattson community.

Mapes reported hail "nearly as big as hen eggs fell for a while" stripping some of the 70 acres of cotton he has planted which now is at a strategic stage.

A neighbor, Perry Force, who has close to 200 acres of cotton, also suffered hail damage to his crop, but the extent was not immediately known. Other landholders in the territory said to have experienced crop damage to some degree were J. W. Aycock, Jess Leonard and Glenn Merchant.

W. L. Holt, another farmer in the area which appeared to have been hit by a cloud "not over two or three miles square," said he received a welcome one-half inch of rain and very little hail, not enough to be injurious to his crops.

Mapes said a "hard, straight wind" right out of the east accompanied the rain and hail at his farm. The turbulence lasted between 20 and 25 minutes and occurred between 4:30 and 5:00 p. m., Mapes reported. Mrs. Holt, who was returning from Throckmorton at the time, told her husband the eastern edge of the rain was near the Swenson Ranch headquarters and seemed to be not more than three miles in diameter.

The 62 of an inch recorded at the north edge of Haskell occurred at 1:40 p. m. Weatherman Sam P. Horner Jr., reported it was the first measurable moisture here since June 13 when 1.01 inches were recorded on the last day of a three-day "spell" during which 3.75 inches were dumped on this general territory.

Brooks Middleton, substitute mail carrier, reported Thursday that 1.50 inches of rain was received (about the same time as that which Mapes reported) in the area from Scott's Crossing to Cobb's Camp. No hail accompanied the rain in that southeastern territory.

The Good Earth

by MRS. B. F. COBB

I misquoted Mr. Walter Childress last week on dusting with Sabadilla dust for squash bugs. I understood him to say every 2 weeks.

Many people this year have complained of plants dying overnight. This could be due to one of two things: the lack of water penetrating completely to the roots, or by bacteria wilt.

Soon (we hope) fall rains will come, and many plants will be infected with powdery mildew. Fasting the foliage with sulphur dust, or spraying with wettable sulphur, will often control this fungus that not only makes unsightly foliage, but often kills zinnias and dahlias, just when they are at the peak of blooming.

Roses and zinnias respond quickly to a dusting of sulphur when mildew strikes the foliage of these plants.

Take time out to go through the garden and remove all old flowers and badly damaged leaves; have the garden in good shape, so the fall rains can produce a bountiful crop of flowers and vegetables; to enrich the "Good Earth" this fall.
