Promotion woes to end

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—Technical and Master Sergeant selection rates for this promotion cycle are about 10 percent lower than last cycle.

Technical Sergeant selection rates dropped from 20 percent last cycle to 11 percent this cycle. Master Sergeant selection rates fell from 32 percent to 22 percent.

More than 6,700 Master Sergeant selections were announced May 21. Approximately 8,000 Technical Sergeant selections were announced June 4.

The Air Force expects to promote from the new promotion lists to Master Sergeants beginning Nov. 1 and to Technical Sergeants on Dec. 1.

Normally, the Air Force would begin promotion from those new lists Aug. 1 and exhaust them by July 1, 1988. However, there are 2,400 Master Sergeant selectees and 3,900 Technical Sergeant selectees carried over from the last promotion cycle. They must be promoted first.

The Air Force is experiencing fewer retirements than anticipated. Fewer retirements mean fewer promotion vacancies.

Last year, Congress denied funding for an additional 6,500 Air Force non-commissioned officer slots. Instead, Congress directed the military to keep its grades at Fiscal 1986 levels. Anticipating the additional 6,000 NCO slots, the Air Force had already selected NCOs to fill those vacancies.

With more selectees than vacancies, the Air Force must carry over selectees from one promotion cycle to the next.

Those carryovers fill promotion vacancies, helping to lower selection rates for the following cycles.

The enlisted end strength for Fiscal 1988 is programmed to be reduced by 7,775 from the Fiscal 1987 level. That reduction results in 311 fewer funded Master Sergeant slots and 467 fewer funded Technical Sergeant slots.

The Air Force has asked Congress for more NCO slots in Fiscal 1988 and 1989. However, Congress is not expected to approve or fund those increases.

Plan for the future

The Annual Savings Bond Campaign is well underway. The Air Force sponsored campaign is the only campaign that directly benefits each participant according to Louise Thurman, project officer at the Air Force Military Personnel at Randolph Air Force Base.

Savings Bonds can be purchased through allotments. According to Maj. Bill Rice, the Reese Savings Bond project officer, individuals can deduct as little as \$5 every two weeks towards a savings bond of \$50 or more.

"If you don't have a savings plan of some kind, savings bonds are a good way to start," Major Rice said. "You have to pay yourself, just like you pay everyone else," he added.

"I wish someone would have hit me

over the head 23 years ago and made me understand how much money I would have now if I had bought just one \$100 bond each month," said Mrs. Thurman.

If a person buys a \$100 bond each month, at a cost of only \$50, he will have \$8,882 in 10 years, based on the guaranteed minimum interest rate of six percent.

The current market-based rate for series EE bonds is 5.84 percent. However, because interest is based on a variable market-based rate or a minimum rate, whichever is more, bonds bought now through Oct. 31, will earn the minimum rate of six percent if held for at least five years, Mrs. Thurman explained.

54th takes a vector west

Reese pilots received an intelligence briefing which included two targets for damage assessment.

New Dental Program—the facts

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)—Families of active duty service members will be automatically enrolled in the new Uniformed Services Dependents' Dental Insurance Plan in August. Service members who do not want their families enrolled in the insurance plan must notify their CBPO customer service center before June 30. Delta Dental Corp. is the insurer.

The following questions and

answers cover the impact the new program will have on service members and their families.

Q Why is the coverage automatic?

A The sheer size of the program, involving all Department of Defense dependents, calls for a simple, comprehensive enrollment process. DoD officials decided the best way to do this was to use the DEERS data base

and automatically enroll everyone who is eligible.

Q What if I don't want the coverage for my dependents?

A Active duty Air Force members who want to withdraw their families from the program will be able to do so at the CBPO by June 30. Members must complete a disenrollment form and give it to their customer service representative if they don't want coverage.

Q What are my entitlements under the program?

A Dependents will be entitled to routine oral exams and x-rays, teeth cleaning and polishing, fluoride treatment and minor emergency treatment. Space maintainers for prematurely lost baby teeth are also covered at no additional cost.

For services such as having cavities filled with composite or amalgam, repairs to dentures

and stainless steel crowns for children's baby teeth, members will be required to pay 20 percent. Delta Dental Corp. will pay the remaining 80 percent.

Q What isn't covered?

A Having teeth removed, root canals, braces, new dentures or replacing lost or stolen dentures, porcelain or gold crowns and sealants. Also, hos-

Part-time jobs no more

There are some significant changes in the area of unauthorized political activities, which were part of a revision to AFR 110-2.

Military members were able to serve in part-time, non-partisan civil offices—planning commissions, school boards and some city councils—can no longer do so. Those enlisted members and reserve officers who were authorized can still serve the rest of their terms if they started before Sept. 24, 1983.

Military members can no longer serve as civilian law enforcement officers or civilian police reserves, but are able to serve in civilian fire and rescue squads.

Anyone who was authorized to hold a civil office—and isn't covered by the 'grandfather' clause—under AFR 110-2 must decline to serve further or risk adverse action.

Attention all newcomers

In the past few months, several personnel have been signing leases or rental agreements for off-base housing without processing through Housing Referral. Some apartment managers have been extremely slow in returning security deposits. Plus, maintenance has been unsatisfactory. To avoid these problems, abide by AFR 30-15 which requires all military personnel to visit their housing Referral Services before entering into a lease or agreement for off-base housing.

pital charges, experimental treatments, dental service for cosmetic purposes, services covered by workman's compensation or correction of congenital malformations and any services not specifically listed as covered by the plan.

Q What if a situation arises where my dependents need dental care that isn't covered under the program?

A Members must take care of it themselves, either by checking to see if the local military facility can do the work on a space available basis or by going off base and paying for the service.

Q How will I pay for the program?

A Members' premium share is deducted from their base pay in the month before it's paid to the insurer. For example, the premium for benefits beginning in August will be deducted in July.

Q How much will it cost me?

A If you have only one dependent (spouse or child), \$3.93 will be deducted each month from your basic pay. If you have two or more dependents, \$7.86 will be deducted monthly.

Q How long will my automatic enrollment last?

A A minimum of two years unless you change duty station or your status of eligible dependents changes.

Q Why is this program being started?

A DoD officials and Congressional leaders have recognized for quite some time that a dental program was needed for families of armed forces members. This program is an initial step in fulfilling that need.

Q Who will provide my dependents' dental care under this program?

A Dentists across the nation have been asked if they want to belong to this insurance program. Those who do are considered participating dentists. A list of local participating dentists will be made available by the insurer at the nearest health benefits advisor.

Q Can my family members still use the military dental facility if they are enrolled in the program?

A Not for treatment covered by the insurance. They must see civilian dental care providers for those procedures covered under the plan.

Q What if I am transferred overseas?

A You will have the option to disenroll.

Q If I'm not taking my family overseas with me, are they still eligible?

A Yes. Eligibility for participation in this program is determined by the residence of the

eligible family members. For example, if the sponsor is assigned to an overseas location such as Korea and the family resides in the United States, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico or the U.S. Virgin Islands, they may be enrolled in the insurance plan.

Q Who answers any questions I may have?

A The customer service unit at CBPO has been designated as OPR for the dependent dental insurance program and will assist members in enrollment and disenrollment procedures. Specific questions on the dental insurance benefit package are referred to the health benefits advisor at the nearest medical facility.

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
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Air Weather Service celebrates 50 years

The weather around us is taken mostly for granted. Few people realize how great an impact it can and has had on American military operations.

Will the aircrew be able to see their target?

Will the army be stuck in mud or have their equipment frozen in the ground?

Will smoke or chemical weapons persist or even be blown back over our own personnel?

These are ways weather impacts the ability to win wars.

Our military weather service grew to maturity during WWII. It is not commonly known that weathermen were literally involved in that great conflict from the very beginning to its very end. Capt. Robert M. Losey was the first Air Weather Service commander. In a way, WWII for America began with him.

In the spring of 1940, he was killed while observing a Luftwaffe air raid in Norway. This

made him the first American military officer to die during WWII. In 1943 Capt. Leon Johnson, one of the original 22 AWS officers, was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for heroic action during his participation in the famous raid on the oil refineries at Ploesti. Captain Johnson was also the first of the AWS officers to earn the rank of four star general.

The Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki had their fate sealed by a weather observer. The mission commanders were under orders to bomb one of three targets to be picked based on the weather. As fate would have it the weather was judged to be the best over Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Weathermen were directly involved in these bombings which ended the war in the Pacific.

Perhaps the most important weather forecast ever made was given to General Eisenhower prior to D-Day. The weather over the English Channel was terrible and had already forced one delay. The German forecasters did not believe the weather

would lift to allow an attack. A team of American and British forecasters believed the weather would break for a short period of time and just allow the operation to be launched. Based on this forecast General Eisenhower ordered the invasion. The weather did break as forecasted and the allies caught the Nazi forces off guard. Enlisted members of the weather service participated in the operation by parachuting behind the beaches at Normandy just prior to H-Hour on D-Day to relay weather information to the allied forces. Members also jumped into the mountains of Yugoslavia and worked with the resistance against the Nazis. The D-Day invasion heralded the end of the Third Reich and WWII.

Within 48 hours of the North Korean invasion of South Korea, a weather detachment was airlifted from Japan to Taegu to provide support to all of the United Nations forces, including the Fifth Air Force and the Eighth Army. Throughout the war, weathermen fought

side by side with ground forces in such battles as Pork Chop Hill and Heart-Break Ridge. By the time the Armistice was signed in 1953, six weathermen had lost their lives in combat.

In 1961, AWS deployed an initial cadre of 23 weathermen to Southeast Asia. This grew to a group and three squadrons by 1966. In 1965 the first "DMSF" weather satellite was introduced to the war. The commander of the seventh Air Force called it "probably the greatest innovation of the war." From January to June of 1966, AWS issued 29,488 target forecasts. By 1969 there were over 700 weathermen in Asia. Three-man organic weather teams routinely jumped or helocasted into enemy occupied territory to launch weather balloons and take observations.

This information was needed for the planning of ground and air operations and for accurate artillery fire. In 1966 the commanding general of the second Infantry Division personally awarded 18 Bronze Stars to members of the Fifth Weather Squadron for their participation

in Operation Attelboro, the largest ground battle to that date. By the time the last weathermen departed sea in 1976, four enlisted men had been killed in combat.

During World War II and the Korean and Vietnam Wars, individual members of AWS or AWS units have won the following:

1 Congressional Medal of Honor; 18 Bronze Stars; 16 Purple Hearts; 7 Presidential Unit Citations; 10 Air Force Outstanding Unit Awards with Combat "V"; 18 Air Force Outstanding Unit Awards; 3 Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citations; 8 Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Crosses with Palms; 4 Service Streamers; 68 Campaign Streamers.

Besides these three wars, weathermen also participated in all armed conflicts from the Civil War on, including the Iran hostage rescue attempt, and our operation in Grenada to rescue American citizens.

Summer barbeque safety tips

With the onset of warm weather, it's time to get out the grill for backyard barbecues and picnics at the park.

Barbecues are a popular form of outdoor activity, but don't let it make you an accident statistic.

The following safety tips can help make cookouts safe:

- Line the bottom of a clean grill with an inch of ash, gravel or commercial charcoal base to absorb dripping grease and reduce flare-ups.

- Set the grill on a level surface away from low branches, dry brush or charcoal lighter fluid. Follow package directions when using charcoal lighter

fluid. Never substitute gasoline or other combustible liquids, and never add charcoal lighter fluid after coals begin to burn.

- Never use the grill indoors. Burning charcoal produces carbon monoxide which is an odorless, tasteless and lethal gas.

- Keep children and pets away from the grill to eliminate the danger of them touching it or accidentally pushing it over on someone.

- Keep sharp instruments out of reach of small children. When passing knives and forks

to others, keep the point turned away from them.

- Use proper equipment to prevent burns, such as a pair of well insulated pot holders, a long handled spatula or fork and a pair of long tongs.

- Wear safe clothing. Avoid dangling ties and shirttails that could brush against the fire. Keep other combustibles away from the grill.

Remember, you're out to barbecue the hamburgers, not the chef.

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

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
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

What is PBP&E?

What is Professional Books, Papers and Equipment (PBP&E)? The following items are considered PBP&E, when they are needed by a service member in the performance of official duties:

Reference material, instruments, tools and equipment used by technicians, mechanics and other related fields:

Specialized clothing such as diving suits, astronauts' suits, flying suits and helmets and uniforms, chaplains' vestments and other specialized apparel not considered to be normal or

usual uniform or clothing:

Communication equipment used by members in association with the Military Affiliate Radio System (MARS):

Individually owned or specially issued field clothing and equipment and official awards given to an individual by a Service for services performed by the individuals in connections with official duties is also considered PBP&E.

Service members are entitled to the shipment of PBP&E in connections with separation, relief from active duty or retirement.

In connection with PCS orders, when it is not necessary for use in performing official

duties at the next or later duty destination, they will be considered to be part of the individuals weight allowance.

The term "professional books, papers and equipment" does not include sports equipment or office, household, or shop fixtures or furniture, such as bookcases, study desks, file cabinets, and racks even though they are used in connections with the professional books, papers and equipment.

If you are separating, retiring or require your PBP&E to perform your job at your next duty station, you may qualify to declare your professional books, papers and equipment on your next move.

The weight of these items is not charged to your weight allowance. The following procedures apply when declaring PBP&E:

A Traffic Management Office counselor will ask you for an estimated weight of any PBP&E that you have to declare at the time of your appointment.

Professional items must be separate from the rest of your personal property so it may be packed, marked and weighed separately on the day of pick up.

Before signing the inventory prepared by the packers, be sure these items are listed as "Pro-

fessional Books" or "Professional Papers" or "Professional Equipment" and not as "books" or "miscellaneous." If they are not listed on the carrier inventory when picked up, this designation cannot be added later on and the weight cannot be subtracted from the weight of your shipment. Also, make sure the packers list the weight of these items on the inventory. Weights may be obtained using bathroom or platform-type scales.

The proper designation of professional items and their weight is very important and without it the weight will be charged to your weight allowance, so plan ahead, ask questions and read what you sign.
