

Grazing: All Cereals Are Not Created Equal

Primarily five winter small grain crops wheat, rye, triticale, oats, and barley are available to producers as sources of winter grazing. The choice of crops will depend largely on when the forage is desired and if you want to harvest a grain crop. The nutritional value of each is similar and is more dependent on cultural practices such as planting date, fertilizer application and irrigation than any difference between crops.

Winter hardiness is an

injury and went on to produce a large amount of forage.

Early forage production from early planting is generally highest with barley followed by oats and triticale. However, their forage production will generally decrease during the cold winter months. Rye will produce more forage during the cold winter months. Rye will produce more forage during the cold winter months while wheat (and to some extent rye) tends to spread its forage production more evenly over the entire growing period. Total forage production of the small grain crops is largely dependent on planting date. Early planting dates tend to favor barley, and to some extent, oats while a later planting date favors rye. Insect and disease tolerance is another important consideration in choosing a small grain. Russian wheat aphid and wheat streak mosaic can severely-reduce the amount of forade produced in a given year. In terms of the suitability for serving as a host to the Russian wheat aphid, the order of susceptibility is barley - wheat - rye - triticale - oats. However, all small grains are susceptible to the Russian wheat aphid to some degree. Oats, barley, rye and most triticale's are a poor host to the wheat curl mite which transmits wheat streak mosaic, however, all are susceptible to the disease once infected.

important factor to consider when choosing a small grain crop. Rye, wheat, and triticale are generally more winterhardy than oats or barley. However, a wide range of differences exist among crop varieties in their tolerance to cold temperatures. Maton, Elbon and Bonel rye are extremely winterhardy and have the capability to resume growth on warm days during the winter. Wheat varieties differ considerably in their winterhardiness, but most varieties adapted for grain production in a given area will also be suitable for forage production. Triticale is a cross between wheat and rye, thus, its winterhardiness is largely dependent on the winterhardiness of its parents. For example, a rye crossed with a spring wheat may not be very winterhardy compared to a rye crossed with a winter wheat. This last year in a forage test conducted in Randall County Coucnill triticale completely froze out where TX-TRI triticale sustained very little






