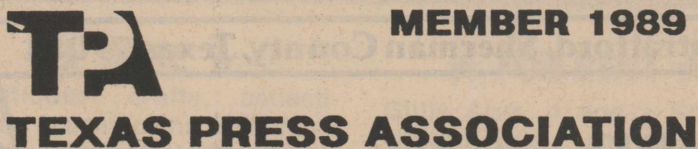
Kindergarten and first grade students are required to show a Birth Certificate and kindergarten students must be 5 years old prior to September 1, 1989.

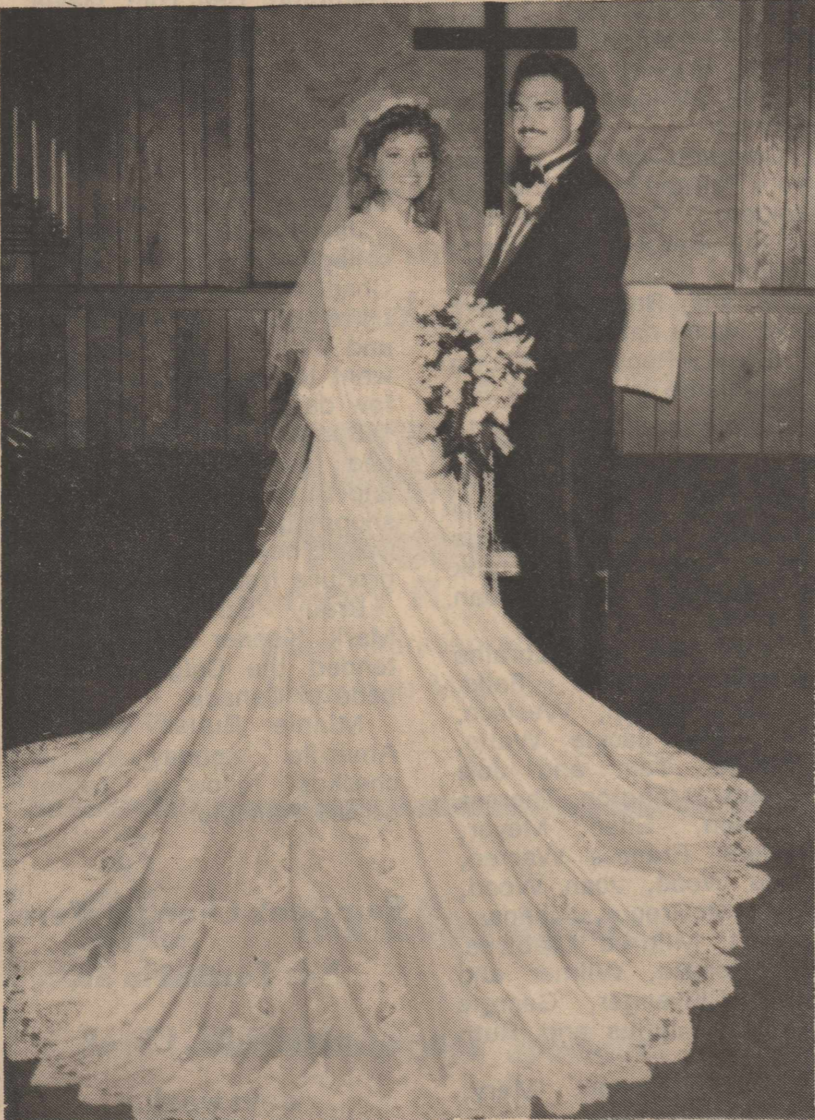

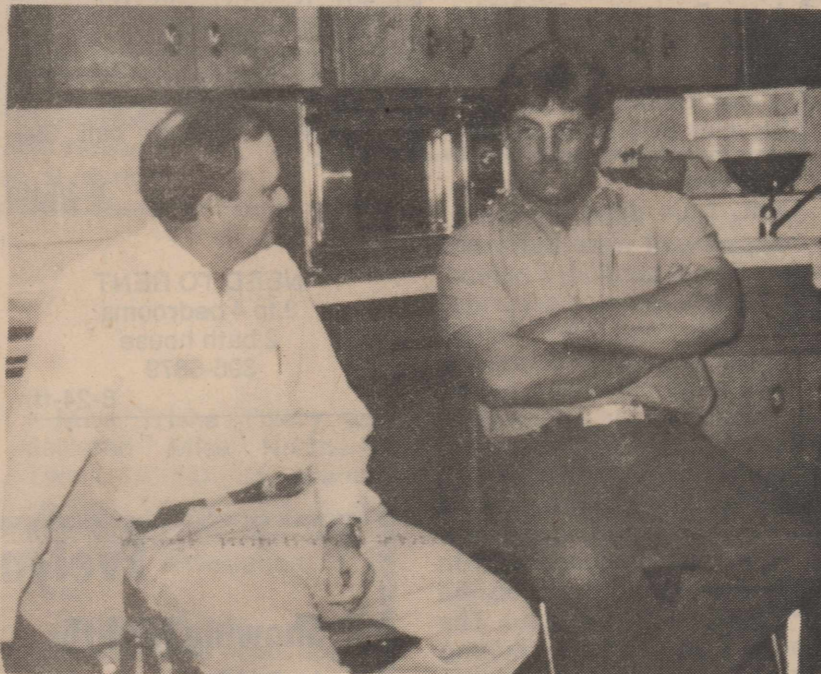
