Mary Lowe became his bride in 1928 before Howard finished high school. He worked for Joe Brown in the grocery store in 1928, then E.W. Butler's store in 1929. He began with Lowe and Billington and Magnolia Wholesale in 1930 and continued there until he started farming in 1943. Mary died in 1978.
