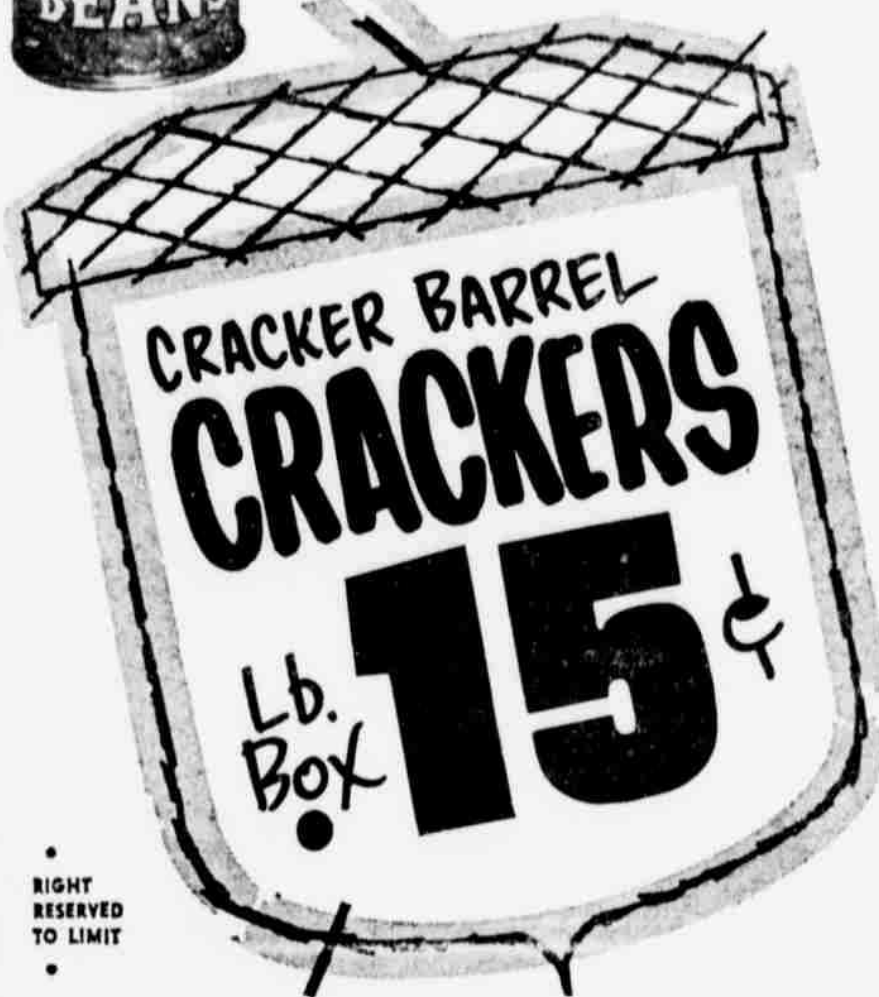

# Approximately 75 Farmers Will Be Assisted By SCS To Up-Date Plans

Soil Conservation Service Technicians are working with an increasing number of farmers who are revising plans for soil conservation work to keep up with changing agricultural trends. Many have combined plans on several farms they are operating into an overall conservation plan, according to Hinds A. McGowen, Jr., SCS Technician, Haskell.

Some farmers assisted in revising and combining soil conservation plans for their farms in the last three months are: Elbert Mapes and Perry Force of the Mattson community; L. W. Norman, T. K. Kevil, Jr., and Sam Turner, of Rule; Glen Caddell and L. E. Newton, of Weinert; and Norman Nanny, Raymond Brewer, Burnell Gilliland and Buford Cox, of Haskell.

McGowen said there is an advantage in having soil conservation plans for several farms combined. Usually the farms are all part of a single operating unit, managed together and farmed by the same equipment. Crops and livestock are often moved between two or more places to carry out effective land-use management and to do soil conservation and soil improvement work. A single conservation plan folder contains a map of the unit, with the needed soils information and interpretations, the conservation plan of operations, and the grazing management and forage resources plan. All these items are part of the farm or ranch plan and are developed by the producer with the assistance of the SCS Technician.

SCS Technicians can also give more timely and effective assistance to a farmer on his conservation work if he has a single conservation plan, says McGowen. The operating unit must be entirely in either the California Creek Soil Conserva-

tion District, or the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District, if the plan is to be combined. With this start, it is estimated that approximately 75 farmers will be assisted by the Soil Conservation Service to revise, up-date, and combine their conservation plans during this fiscal year, McGowen concluded.

## Rainfall For 1965 Totals 20.58 To Date

Although rainfall for Haskell was below normal during the month of September, with 1.89 gauged by Sam Herren, "The Weatherman," the overall precipitation to date for the year is still above normal, according to figures released by Mr. Herren. Normal rainfall for September is 2.04.

Up to October 1 of this year, Haskell had received a total of 20.58 inches, with normal precipitation for the year to this date, 18.27.

A look at these figures reveals that Haskell is still 2.31 inches above normal for the year to October 1, 1965. Lowest temperature reading for September was a cool 49 degrees on the 25th. The thermometer climbed to 104 on September 13, for the highest recording of the month.

Here is how the "rains came." September 18, 19 and 20, a total of 1.89 was registered.

This off-color is called "freezer-burn," says Mrs. Elliott, Haskell County Home Demonstration Agent.

Food specialists at the U.S. Department of Agriculture says it is caused by a loss of moisture from the surface of the meat. It is an indication that the wrapping has been torn or that the frozen meat was not moisture-vapor proof.

A good wrap is one of the best means of protecting the meat quality in your freezer, says Mrs. Elliott.

When you prepare meats for your freezer, be sure the wrap you select is both moisture and vapor resistant. Then seal the package tightly to insure meat quality.

## Haskell Wildcats 2 Oilers Completed

Reef Oil Corp. of Stamford has scheduled two oilers in Haskell County.

The firm's No. 1 H. J. Thane planned 3600-foot rotary well in Haskell County.

The well is 4506 feet from the east and 2784 feet from the west lines of Coryell CSL Survey.

The lease is composed of 40 acres.

Reef Oil Corp. will drill to 5802 feet, the original total depth, at a wildcat three miles southwest of Rule.

It is No. 1 W. O. Kittley, located on a 200 acre lease. Site is 1784 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of Section 78, Blk 1, H&TC Survey. Operator will test the Strawn Sand.

The venture was originally drilled as Fletcher Oil & Gas Corp. No. 1 Kittley and plugged Nov. 29, 1955.

A regular field well was completed five miles northwest of Stamford. It is Megargel Drilling Co. of Megargel (formerly Ernest Guffey of Wichita Falls) No. 1 J. V. Frizzell.

Site is 330 feet from the south and 8500 feet from the east lines of G. Harris Survey 50, A-157.

No. 1 Frizzell had a daily potential of 84.29 barrels of 41 gravity oil. Flow was through a 12-64 inch choke with 750 pounds casing and 250 pounds tubing pressures.

It is producing from four perforations per foot at 4540-48 feet where the pay was fractured with 430 barrels of oil and 100 sacks of sand. It was also treated with 250 gallons of acid.

The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 4817 feet and the hole bottomed at 4831 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 200-1.

Daily potential was 31 barrels of 40.2 gravity oil. It is pumping from 24 perforations at 4853-59 feet. The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 4917 feet, one foot off bottom.

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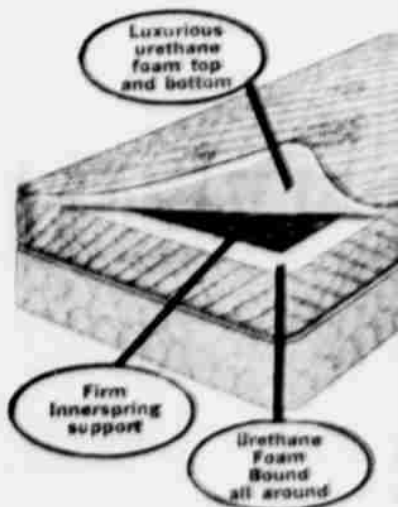

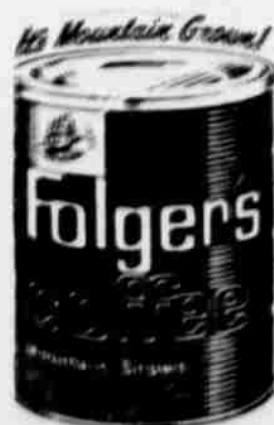
