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Council, KBYG approve new tenancy agreement at Tuesday meeting By ROGER CLINE

Following Tuesday evening's Big Spring City Council meeting, KBYG-FM radio station will remain in its current location inside the north entrance of Comanche Trail Park.

Although the station's landlord - the City of Big Spring - asserted John Weeks, general manager of the station, was more than \$20,000 in arrears on the station's rent, had been ordered to vacate the premises, and was in the act of "holding over" in occupying the premises; Weeks and the city had negotiated a new contract prior to Tuesday's meeting.

According to the agreement between Weeks and the city, the radio station will receive credit against its \$22,812.30 in back rent for the purchase and installation of a new HVAC system (\$16,242.67) and "Based on negotiations and past performance" (\$6369.63). The remaining \$200 owed by Weeks is covered by the \$200 deposit he paid upon finalizing the old contract.

According to the new contract, which goes into effect May 1 and has a term of 60 months, ending April 30, 2027, Weeks Broadcasting Inc. will tender a deposit of \$1,100 and pay \$550 monthly in rent over the course of the lease.

Mayor Shannon Thomason said the rent amount was based on "usual" rent-per-square-foot rates for industrial buildings. "The price per square foot for that building was \$5,"

Two of Texas' 10 most wanted arrested recently

back in custody following their recent arrests. Braulio Davila, of Fort Stockton, was arrested on April 3 in Boquillas del Carmen, Mexico. Joaquin Salgado IV of Carrizo Springs turned himself in to authorities on April 6. A Crime Stoppers reward will be paid in Davila's cap-

Braulio Davila, 49, was arrested and then brought to the Del Rio-Acuna Port of Entry by Mexican authorities on April 4. He was subsequently taken into custody by U.S. authorities,

including Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Special Agents and members of Homeland Security Investigations, U.S. Customs and Border Protection and the Val Verde County Sheriff's Office. Davila had been wanted since April 2021 after the U.S. Mar-

shals issued a warrant for his arrest for failure to register as a sex offender. In June 2021, the Pecos County Sheriff's Office also issued two warrants for failure to register. In 1993, Davila was convicted of sexual assault for an in-

cident involving a 35-year-old woman and was sentenced to four years in a Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) prison. In 2002, he was convicted of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and sentenced to five years in a TDCJ prison. That same year, Davila was convicted of possession of marijuana with intent to deliver and was sentenced to 102 months in federal prison, followed by five years of supervised release. In March 2020, Davila was arrested for a probation violation, and in March 2021, he was released from federal custody. Davila was added to the Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders

Joaquin Salgado IV, 38, turned himself in to the Dimmit County Sheriff's Office on April 6. He had been wanted since August 2021, when the Ennis Police Department issued a warrant for Salgado's arrest for assault causing serious bodily injury. The following month, the U.S. Marshals issued a warrant for his arrest for a probation violation. In December 2021, the Dimmit County Sheriff's Office issued war-

rants for Salgado's arrest for assault causing

bodily injury, terroristic threat and unlawful restraint. Warrants were also issued for Salgado's arrest in March 2022 by the DPS Criminal Investigations Division for failure to comply with sex offender registration requirements.

In 2010, Salgado was convicted of aggravated sexual assault of a child and sexual assault for incidents involving a 13-yearold girl and a 22-year-old woman. He was sentenced to eight years in a TDCJ prison. In 2019, Salgado was arrested by the U.S. Border Patrol for smuggling migrants and was sentenced to federal prison. Salgado was added to the Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders List on March 29, 2022. For more information on his arrest, view his captured bulletin. Thomason said. "Even industrial property that we lease usually goes at a maximum of about \$3.25. ... The number I came up with was \$541. We rounded it up to \$550."

Thomason confirmed that both Weeks and City Manager Todd Darden were satisfied with the new contract they negotiated.

"Mr. Weeks, were you satisfied with those negotiations?" Thomason asked.

"Absolutely," Weeks replied.

"Mr. Darden?"

"I'm satisfied with those agrements," answered the City Manager.

Former City Councilman Terry McDaniel addressed the council on behalf of Weeks during the discussion. Homer Wilkerson and Scott Emerson both addressed the council during the Public Comments portion of the meeting, speaking on behalf of the radio station.

The Public Comments came at the start of the meeting, following the Call to Order, invocation and Pledges of Allegiance. Wilkerson and Emerson were the only speakers. Wilkerson spoke solely in regards to the radio station issue, while Emerson also praised the council for a proposal to allow owners subject to illegal dumping on their property to take the dumped refuse to the City Landfill for a token fee of one cent. He also suggested an ordinance to create a new firefighter position was unnecessary, and that city staff should simply hire the firefighter, if needed; and argued against the proliferation of "emergency" readings of ordinances and resolutions on City Council agendas. Emergency readings allow an item to be passed at a single meeting with a unanimous vote by the council, as opposed to two meetings as usual.

"For something as minute as abandoning an easement to be an emergency reading seems like poor planning," he said.

Following Public Comments, Thomason presented a proclamation declaring April "Distracted Driving Awareness Month."

Darden next presented his City Manager's Report. In the report, he reminded Big Spring citizens about the Large Item Pickup for District 4, scheduled April 20; spoke about the annual E-Waste Collection Day April 23 – the city will collect e-waste at the new City Landfill; announced the recent American Council of Engineering Companies "Engineering Excellence Award" presented to the city for the engineering of the new landfill; gave an update on the progress of the city's Parks Master Plan – a survey regarding park use to help the city develop the plan has garnered 900 responses, he said; apprised the council on openings on city Boards and Committees; reminded the council about the city's upcoming Good Friday holiday April 15; and announced a special council meeting on Code Enforcement administrative proceedings Tuesday, April 19 at 5:30 p.m.

The council approved three items on the meeting's consent agenda: City Council minutes of the March 22 regular meeting; final reading of a resolution amending those authorized to transmit and withdraw funds from the city's TexPool fund; and final reading of an ordinance authorizing indoor shooting ranges in Heavy Commercial, Heavy Industrial and Light Industrial zones.

The council unanimously approved vouchers for March 24 in the amount of \$918,175.65, for March 31 in the amount of \$182,625.62, and for April 7 in the amount of \$1,303,300.96.

The Council approved 5-2 (members Nick Orne-

The dissenting votes mean that, while the item did pass on first reading, it did not achieve the unanimous vote needed for an "emergency" reading, so will need to be voted on again at the Council's next meeting.

The council unanimously authorized on first reading City Manager Darden to apply for a Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant; they also passed 6-1 (Councilman Troy Tompkins dissenting) an ordinance authorizing increasing the number of firefighters on each Fire Department work shift from 18 to 20.

The council unanimously passed on first reading an ordinance authorizing victims of illegal dumping to pay a reduced Landfill fee of one cent per load to dispose of the illegally dumped refuse. The council passed on first reading an ordinance

increasing the Airpark Fund Budget by \$240,000 for seal coating of roads and streets at the airpark. The council unanimously approved the city's annual agreement with the YMCA of Big Spring

to supply lifeguards for the city's Russ McEwen Aquatic Center in Comanche Trail Park. The council approved a subscription agreement with BSI Online Backflow Solutions Inc. for \$495 per year for backflow prevention notifications and

requirements for irrigation systems. The city unanimously approved a contract with Parkhill Construction to erect fence netting at the Landfill to curtail blowing trash. According to information provided with the meeting's agenda, the

cost of the services will be \$15,215. The council unanimously approved two agreements with Jacob Martin LLC; the first for re-routing the a sewer line due to track adjustments by Union Pacific Railroad; and the second for re-routing the Johnson Street 12-inch water line in preparation for construction of the Downtown Park.

The discussion and action on KBYG came at the end of the meeting.

Brantley's clutch hit in 9th lifts Astros over D-backs 2-1

PHOENIX (AP) — Jose Siri could have been content with a single in the ninth inning. For better or worse, that's just not the way he plays the game. Siri sparked the Astros with a hustle double that started a two-out rally, Michael Brantley drove him home two batters later and Houston edged the Arizona Diamondbacks 2-1 on Tuesday night.

"I knew it was a risk," Siri said of his dash to second. "But sometimes, you've got to take risks to win games."

The game was tied at 1 in the ninth when the Astros pieced together their rally against Mark Melancon (0-1), which was started by Siri's double into right-center. It looked as though it would only be a single but the 26-year-old never stopped as he rounded first base, sprinting into second as Pavin Smith's throw was late.

Jose Altuve followed with a walk and then Brantley pounced on the first pitch, slicing a single into left field for his third hit of the game to score Siri.

Ryan Pressly handled the bottom of the ninth for his third save, working around a leadoff single by

Seth Beer. Pressly struck out Carson Kelly on a high fastball to end it.

"We won another close one," Houston manager Dusty Baker said. "That's one of the secrets to winning this thing — you've got to win the close ones."

Siri, batting ninth, gave the Astros a 1-0 lead in the fifth with a 456-foot homer that landed on the concourse in left-center.

Brantley said Siri is a guy who "pushes the envelope" and no one was surprised when he took the extra bag in the ninth, even after getting thrown out stealing in the seventh.

"That's the way he plays," Brantley said. "He's been playing that way since he got here, day one."

The Diamondbacks evened the score in the sixth when Christian Walker hit his own no-doubt drive into the left-field seats. But that was the only big hit for Arizona's struggling offense, which is batting just .130 through five games.

Diamondbacks starter Madison Bumgarner gave up one run and five hits over five innings, walking two and striking out two.

Luis Garcia threw four scoreless innings for Houston. Hector Neris (1-0) worked a scoreless eighth.

SEEING STROM

Diamondbacks pitching coach Brent Strom faced his former team for the first time since leaving Houston during the offseason.

Strom had a successful run as the Astros' pitching coach from 2014-21. Over the past four seasons, Houston led the majors with 5,339 strikeouts and 277 quality starts. The Astros were second during that span with a 3.60 ERA.

MAKING MOVES

The Diamondbacks called up INF Yonny Hernandez and sent 1B/3B Drew Ellis to Triple-A Reno. Ellis had one hit in eight at-bats and struck out four times in the season-opening series against the Padres.

TRAINER'S ROOM

Astros: RHP Lance McCullers Jr. was on the field before the game and threw 25 times from 60 feet. He's trying to come back from a flexor strain sustained during the playoffs last season

Diamondbacks: RHP Zac Gallen was originally scheduled to make his first start of the season Tuesday, but was scratched on Monday because of a small cut on his right thumb.

Opening lead — seven of hearts. In a vacuum, South would almost surely go down in three notrump on this deal. He would win the first or second heart, run his clubs and end up trying a diamond finesse for his ninth trick. West, who would have discarded a diamond, a heart and two spades on the clubs, would take the queen of diamonds with the king and cash his remaining hearts and the ace of spades for

down one. But when the deal occurred in a 2001 team contest, declarer was not operating in a vacuum. He had heard West open the bidding and

proceeded to take full advantage of what he knew about West's hand.

After East produced the queen of hearts at trick one, it was easy to place West with the ace of spades, K-J of hearts and king of diamonds for his opening bid. And since West's seven of hearts was presumably his fourth-best heart, East's queen was known to be his

only heart higher than the seven. What all this added up to was that if declarer ducked the first heart, won the second and then ran his clubs, discarding a spade and a diamond, West would almost certainly be holding the ace of spades, K-x of diamonds and two hearts as his last five cards. South would then concede a spade to West, who could cash his two remaining hearts but would then have to lead a diamond from the king to give South his ninth trick.

West's only hope of escaping this ending would be to keep all three of his hearts and reduce himself to the singleton king of diamonds and ace of spades as his last five cards. Then, if declarer led a spade at trick nine, West would collect four tricks for down one.

This scheme could not succeed against an alert declarer, however. If West kept all of his hearts, South would know West had bared his king of diamonds and would cash the ace to make the contract.

14, Abraham Lincoln is shot

Today in History

Today is Thursday, April 14, the 104th day of 2022. There are 261 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 14, 1865, President Abraham Lincoln was shot and mortally wounded by John Wilkes Booth during a performance of "Our American Cousin" at Ford's Theatre in Washington.

On this date:

In 1828, the first edition of Noah Webster's "American Dictionary of the English Language" was published.

In 1902, James Cash Penney opened his first store, The Golden Rule, in Kemmerer, Wyoming.

In 1912, the British liner RMS Titanic collided with an iceberg in the North Atlantic at 11:40 p.m. ship's time and began sinking. (The ship went under two hours and 40 minutes later with the loss of 1,514 lives.)

In 1910, President William Howard Taft became the first U.S. chief executive to throw the ceremonial first pitch at a baseball game as the Washington Senators beat the Philadelphia Athletics

descended upon the central Plains, turning a sunny afternoon into total darkness.

In 1949, the "Wilhelmstrasse Trial" in Nuremberg ended with 19 former Nazi Foreign Office officials sentenced by an American tribunal to prison terms ranging from four to 25 years.

In 1960, Tamla Records and Motown Records, founded by Berry Gordy Jr., were incorporated as Motown Record Corp.

In 1981, the first test flight of America's first operational space shuttle, the Columbia, ended successfully with a landing at Edwards Air Force Base in California.

In 1994, two U.S. Air Force F-15 warplanes mistakenly shot down two U.S. Army Black Hawk helicopters over northern Iraq, killing 26 people, including 15 Americans.

In 1999, NATO mistakenly bombed a convoy of ethnic Albanian refugees: Yugoslav officials said 75 people were killed.

In 2007, riot police beat and detained protesters as thousands defied an official ban and attempted to stage a rally in Moscow against Russian President Vladimir Putin's government.

In 2020, President Donald Trump announced that he was cutting off U.S. payments to the U.N. health agency, the World Health Organization; Trump said it had not done enough to stop the coronavirus from spreading.

Ten years ago: In Belfast, Northern Ireland, where the RMS Titanic was built, thousands attended a choral requiem at the Anglican St. Anne's Cathedral or a nationally televised concert at the city's Waterfront Hall to mark the 100th anniversary of the ship's sinking. Eleven Secret Service agents were placed on administrative leave as a deepening scandal involving prostitutes overshadowed President Barack Obama's diplomatic mission to Latin America.

Five years ago: Former NFL star Aaron Hernandez, already serving a life sentence for a 2013 murder, was acquitted in Boston in a 2012 double slaying prosecutors said was fueled by his anger over a drink spilled at a nightclub. (Five days later, Hernandez hanged himself in his prison cell.)

One year ago: A white former suburban Minneapolis police officer, Kim Potter, was charged with second-degree manslaughter for killing 20-year-old Black motorist Daunte Wright in a shooting that ignited days of unrest. (Potter, who said she confused her handgun for her Taser, was convicted of first- and second-degree manslaughter and sentenced to two years in prison.) President Joe Biden said he would withdraw the 2,500 remaining U.S. troops from Afghanistan, with the drawdown to begin by May 1; that date had been the deadline for full withdrawal under a

peace agreement that the Trump administration reached with the Taliban in 2020. Bernard Madoff, the infamous architect of an epic securities swindle, died at a federal prison in North Carolina; he was 82. Carlos Rodón threw the second no-hitter of the young baseball season, losing his bid for a perfect game on a hit batter with one out in the ninth inning, and the Chicago White Sox cruised to an 8-0 victory over the Cleveland Indians.
