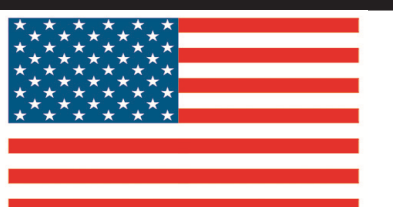

Kirkland named to state Teacher Vacancy Task Force

The TEA has announced an additional 24 teachers have been added to the Teacher Vacancy Task Force. According to the announcement Suzanne Kirkland, teacher at Forsan JR/SR High School, was one of the new additions and will be one of the two representatives in Region 18. The Task Force is now composed of 26 teachers and 26 school system administrators and is set to convene for the first time on June 2 via Zoom.

"I am very excited to be chosen as a representative for teachers in our area of the state... I realize it is a huge responsibility to represent teachers in our area in order to provide perspectives from various school districts in West Texas,"

Suzanne Kirkland, Task Form Member and Forsan ISD Teacher, said. The Task Force is charged with identifying solutions to address ongoing school staffing challenges. According to the press release issued by TEA, the selection process lasted nearly two months and was focused on selecting a group that would include a true representation of Texas and the rich exper-

tise, unique perspectives, and classroom experiences. TEA received more than 1,500 nominations for task force membership during the submission period.

"Once I researched the purpose of the task force, I wanted to give my personal experiences throughout my teaching career to offer insight into possible solutions to attract and retain teachers," Kirkland said. "Overall, I hope to bring a positive perspective and ideas from my 26 years in the classroom and what keeps me coming back year after year. I want to be part of the solution."

Emphasizing a key point which he has made throughout his years leading public education in the Lone Star State, Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath said, "Teachers are the single most important school-based factor affecting student outcomes. And the Teacher Vacancy Task Force will further ensure our ability to provide the best guidance, support, and resources to help schools find and retain the teachers they need for all their students. Having

A Moment in History The Judge's Home

Judge Littler's home (center) was at 606 Scurry Street, north of the Ebberley home and south of the Dublin Home.

In 1909, color tinted postcards were made of the beautiful homes in the neighborhood.

Judge Littler's home was built in 1900 and located at 606 Scurry Street, north of the Ebberley home.

When entering the Queen Anne home, a large wide hall opened to the decorative archway near the back. The ornate wooden doorway had a draped velvet curtain. This was a common Victorian decorating touch during the turn of the century.

A beautiful balustrade was featured

on the front porch which encircled to the south side of the home. A turret porch was on the north front side of the porch. A perfect place to sit and watch the traffic go by or wave to friendly neighbors.

The entry of the imposing two-story house had 10-foot double doors with heavy beveled glass windows. Ornate fireplaces in the bedrooms had engraved columns with beveled mirrors and tile facings. Even the door hinges were decorative brass with designs engraved into the metal.

John B. Littler and his wife, Laura Ervilla, first arrived in Big Spring in 1894. They began designing and dreaming about their new home long before it became a reality.

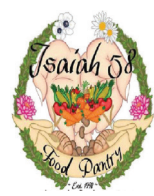

these two-dozen additional perspectives from a diverse and talented pool of Texas classroom teachers is going to immensely benefit the important considerations before the Task Force.”

According to Kirkland, there are several areas of discussion that deserve attention including: salary, support, mental health, student discipline, and parent/community involvement. According to input that has already been received from teachers, salaries are one of the top issues for veteran teachers.

“The reality is we see teacher shortages all over the state. In the end, students are the ones that are impacted the most by no fault of their own. Students deserve the best possible educational opportunities that are available to them and one area is by having certified teachers in the classrooms,” Kirkland said. “We have to come up with solutions to certify college graduates that decide to enter the classroom later in their career, how attract new teachers to the career and keep them, but also realize what is keeping teachers from staying in the profession.”

Kirkland is looking forward to bringing a positive perspective from a teacher who has been doing this a long time and still loves teaching teenagers. Her plan is to be a vocal representative of West Texas for new teachers, but for those who have chosen teaching for many years because of a calling.

The Task Force is a voluntary position and will require a huge time commitment. The responsibility

ties will include research, listening to other teacher’s comments, taking part in focus groups over the next year. The end goal is to see some change in a positive direction.

“I want teachers all over the state to see real change from this task force. It won’t happen overnight, but I do hope it can open conversations with districts across the state,” Kirkland said.

This week’s review are mystery and large print western titles.

Former FBI Special Agent Jack Tanner is working as a detective in Montana when he comes across a body in the national forest during a search and rescue mission in *Present Danger-Rocky Mountain Courage Bk 1 (M GOD E)* by Elizabeth Goddard. He's committed to finding the killer, even if it means working alongside his old flame, US Forest Service Special Agent Terra Connors. When Terra discovers that the murder victim had ties to a powerful and dangerous trafficker of archaeological artifacts, the investigation takes a deadly turn, one that hits too close to home. As Terra fears she lacks the courage to face what comes next, Jack is more determined than ever to protect her. But he's failed her before. And if he fails this time, it will cost them far more than just their hearts.

When the daughter of a high-profile businessman disappears from an exclusive girls' boarding school, police detective Cate Reilly is tapped for an undercover assignment in *Labyrinth of Lies-Triple Threat Series Bk 2 (M HAN I)* by Irene Hannon. It doesn't take her long to realize that beneath the veneer of polish and wealth, things are not as they seem at Ivy Hill Academy. But the biggest surprise of all? The only man she ever loved is also working at the school. Zeke Sloan has never forgotten Cate, but now isn't the best time for their paths to cross again. When their two seemingly disparate agendas begin to intertwine and startling connections emerge among the players the danger escalates significantly. But who is the mastermind behind the elaborate ruse?

And how far will they go to protect their house of cards?

It is 1875 in *The Trainwreckers-The Guns of Samuel Pritchard series Bk 4 (LP W LYN S)* by Sean Lynch. The escalating rivalry between the two major railroad companies takes a dangerous and deadly turn when a train is deliberately derailed. Many are killed. More are injured. And Marshal Samuel Pritchard’s longtime friend is crippled for life. Either way, he’ll have to ride the rails with some pretty deranged characters, crooked railroad tycoons, ruthless bounty hunters, and trigger-happy gunfighters before he reaches the end of the line. There’s just one way to stop a mass transit murderer and that’s dead in his tracks.

Mulvane rode out of the mountains and up the main street of hell in *Bullets for Mulvane (LP W HEU W)* by William Heuman. He was a tall man, riding easy, but there was the proud, watchful look of a hawk in his eyes and a steel-spring force in the way he moved. The hard case toughs and killers of Grand Junction watched him carefully, and even before the head his name the sensed he was a man born to violence, a blood-brother to sudden death. They knew, and they warned their boss, Boyd Maddock, to beware of the stranger in town. To Maddock, nursing a ruthless dream of power, the stranger was just another gun to be hired or else kicked out of the valley. But then he met Mulvane, and he suddenly realized that whichever way it went the price would be paid in blood.

connection to her after reading what she had submitted,” Dickie Wrightsil said. “There's no question now, after talking to her and listening to her story, she's the right person. She'll represent us well.”

Kocak said the scholarship will be a big help in her college dreams.

“We’ve been working so hard to just try and do what we can so I can get to college and make a difference. This is definitely gonna help,” she said. “I’m just overjoyed.”

Kocak plans to enroll in the honors program at Texas Tech University.

The Wrightsils endowed the scholarship as a response to a kindness shown to them in their time of crisis.

“When I was 17 – Chandra would've been maybe 12 or 13 – we lost our house. Our house burned...I mean, to the ground,” said Mr. Wrightsil, adding

that the full impact of the loss didn't hit him until the next morning, after spending the night at a neighbor's home. “That next morning – I'll never forget this – I got up and went to the bathroom, and I wanted to brush my teeth and I realized I didn't have a toothbrush. I've never forgotten that. That really, for me, put it into perspective.”

The pair were taken in by local resident Mary Neil Mansfield and her rodeo celebrity husband, none other than Coy Herman “Toots” Mansfield.

“She picked us up and she bought everything from toothbrushes to tennis shoes. If you hadn't known that had happened to us on that Friday...if you didn't see it in the newspaper, or you weren't in our circle...on Monday at school you would've never known,” Wrightsil said. “The thing about it was, it wasn't like they bragged about it, and it wasn't like, 'You owe us something.' or anything. Mind you, we were homeless. Technically, we lost our home. They put us up at the Ramada Inn for about six weeks. We never saw a bill. Food, everything, was taken care of. That's just one. I can give you many, many stories of what they meant to us.

So this, what we're doing now, is just kind of paying it forward. It's something that I had, for a long time, I knew this was going to happen.”

Wrightsil explained that the scholarship exists to encourage good, well-rounded students.

“What we wanted to do was get a student or students that wanted to apply for this to make sure that they are well-rounded,” he said. “As hard as it is to go to school and be a student... a student athlete, or if you're in the choir, or the band, or you're doing something in the community in addition to that... I can remember as a senior, I was a student first. I played basketball and baseball there at BSHS – I was okay. I wasn't bad – but I also worked at Bonanza and I worked at the Big Spring Country Club. The thing about it was, Mr. and Mrs. Mansfield, they encouraged that. They wanted us to make those grades.”

John had arrived in Big Spring to practice law. Within a year, he had been elected County Attorney and then County Judge. In 1907, Judge Littler became one of the first justices of the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland.

It was said that John Littler was an excellent trial attorney who was a merciless questioner and an eloquent pleader. Judge Littler became the Dean of the Howard County Bar Association, filling that position left open by H.S. Morrison’s death.

As the Littlers grew older, they decided to move to a smaller more manageable home. They turned the Scurry home into apartments and moved to a single-story house. They rented out the small apartments for a few years before their passing.

Ervilla Littler died in 1951 and the Judge died in 1953 at the age of 87. Horace Garrett, a neighbor boy, and the grandson of Dora

Roberts, bought the house in the 1950s. Horace’s daughter Sue Partee remembered running through the large rooms as a little girl. She never lived there but would go with her father when he had to attend to business.

In the early 1980s, Dr. Charles Hays purchased the home and had it moved to the Silver Hills addition. Movers jacked up the old two-story home and successfully made their way 10 miles south of Big Spring. The home was sold and beautifully renovated once more by Mr. and Mrs. Russ Rutledge before Jordan and Kristen Partee purchased it. The Partees have continued to make improvements along the way and the old Littler home is now a beautiful showplace. The lot at 606 Scurry is the parking area for Attorney Robert Miller.

Jordan’s mother Sue had played in the home as a little girl, and now Jordan’s children run and play within the very walls that held promises and dreams for the Littlers.

Rick Bowness won't return as coach of Dallas Stars

Rick Bowness will not return as head coach of the Dallas Stars after nearly three seasons in which he led them to the 2020 Stanley Cup Final and the playoffs again this year.

While Bowness was not under contract past this season, the 67-year-old coach said in a statement released by the team Friday that he was stepping away to "allow the organization the opportunity to pursue a different direction at the head coaching position." The move doesn't necessarily mean Bowness is done coaching.

General manager Jim Nill said assistant coaches John Stevens, Derek Laxdal and Todd Nelson also would not return.

Bowness has been on an NHL bench for a record 2,562 regular-season games as a head coach or an assistant over nearly four decades. He was 89-62-25 as head coach in Dallas, where he was a second-year assistant before being named interim head coach in December 2019 after Jim Montgomery was fired for off-ice issues.

After the Stars made the Stanley Cup Final in that pandemic-altered 2019-20 season, the interim tag was removed and Bowness got a two-year contract.

"Rick is one of the most respected and beloved individuals to have ever coached in the NHL," Nill said. "His dedication and commitment to the game, and the impact that he's made on countless players, coaches and support staff throughout his five decades in the league is unmatched. He has dedicated his life to our game, and we are honored to say that the Dallas Stars are

part of his legacy."

A hockey lifer, Bowness said after the season ended with an overtime loss in Game 7 of the first-round series at favored Calgary that he still has the passion to keep coaching. He said he would have opportunities to coach if he wanted them.

"I'll have options, let's put it that way. If I want them, the options will be there. I'm confident in that," Bowness said during a season-ending media availability Tuesday. "You guys, you don't know yet, you're going to miss me when I'm gone."

Bowness' stint as the Stars interim head coach included the 4 1/2-month pause in the season because of the pandemic and two months in a postseason bubble in Canada. There was then a shortened, 56-game season last year when the Stars had an NHL-high 14 losses after regulation and missed the playoffs.

"When he was called upon to lead our team a few seasons ago, he stepped into the role seamlessly and helped guide our team through unprecedented global events that affected our players and staff both on and off the ice," said Nill, who has one year left on his contract.

Dallas went into this year's playoffs as a wildcard team, but its 98 points were a total the team had reached only once the previous 14 seasons.

Scotty Bowman and Pat Quinn, both members of the Hockey Hall of Fame, and Bowness are the only other head coaches with games in five different decades. Bowness did so with Winnipeg (1989), Boston (1991-92), Ottawa (1992-96), the New York Islanders (1996-98), Phoenix (2004) and Dallas (2019-22). He also was an assistant for Vancouver and Tampa Bay.

SEC spat: Fisher, Saban exchange accusations over NIL deals

The Southeastern Conference spring meetings will be held in person for the first time since 2019 in a little less than two weeks.

It is unlikely two of the league's superstar coaches will be chumming around Destin, Florida, together.

Texas A&M coach Jimbo Fisher called Nick Saban a "narcissist" on Thursday after the Alabama coach accused the rival Aggies of using name, image and likeness deals to land their top-ranked recruiting classes. Saban apologized a few hours later but generally stuck to his stance and SEC Commissioner Greg Sankey followed soon after with a public reprimand for both.

So much for a quiet offseason.

The public spat is perhaps the ugliest display of the growing angst among college coaches who are wrestling with two big changes: the NIL compensation era that launched last July and its impact on recruiting, and the ease with which players can now transfer. Both have upset the landscape veteran coaches are used to, leading to complaints and now scathing accusations.

Less than 24 hours after Saban said Texas A&M was essentially "buying" players, Fisher called an impromptu news conference to blast college football's most accomplished coach and his former boss at LSU.

"It's despicable that a reputable head coach can come out and say this when he doesn't get his way or things don't go his way," Fisher said in College Station, Texas. "The narcissist in him doesn't allow those things to happen — it's ridiculous — when he's not on top. And the parity in college football he's been talking about? Go talk to coaches who have coached for him. You'll find out all the parity. Go dig into wherever he's been."

Texas A&M had the consensus No. 1 recruiting class in the country for 2022 after beating Alabama during the regular season. The Tide's class was No. 2. In his session with reporters, which lasted about 10 minutes, Fisher declared: "We never bought anybody, no rules are broken. Nothing was done wrong."

Saban said he has reached out to Fisher but "never got a response." He apologized for singling anybody out but stood by the gist of his message about booster-backed collectives helping to recruit players.

"I feel bad about it. But I'm not changing my philosophy," Saban said on SiriusXM radio. "I look at the betterment of college football. What is good for the game?"

When asked if he wanted to address the conflict with Fisher at the upcoming SEC

meetings, Saban said he's hoping to work on big-picture issues.

"I really wasn't saying that anybody did anything illegal in using name, image and likeness," Saban said. "I didn't say that. That was something that was assumed by what I said, which was not really what I meant. Nor was it what I said. There's nothing illegal about doing this. It's the system that allows you to do it. And that's the issue that I have."

Sankey issued a "public reprimand" for both coaches, but acknowledged there's "tremendous frustration" about the lack of consistency in NIL rules in different states.

"The membership of the Southeastern Conference has established expectations for conduct and sportsmanship that were not met last night nor today," Sankey said.

The Crimson Tide lost to the Aggies in 2021, but went on to win the SEC championship and play for the national title. The Aggies finished 8-4 in their fourth season under Fisher, who, like Saban, is among the highest-paid coaches in the game at more than \$9 million per season.

Saban, who has won six national championships at Alabama, another at LSU and is widely regarded as one of the greatest coaches in the history of the game, has called the current state of affairs unsustainable. At an event in Birmingham, Alabama, earlier this week he said some schools were spending "tons of money to get players."

"We were second in recruiting last year. A&M was first. A&M bought every player on their team. Made a deal for name, image and likeness. We didn't buy one player," Saban said Wednesday night.

Fisher was an assistant under Saban in the early 2000s at LSU, working as offensive coordinator on the Tigers' 2003 national title team. That relationship appears to be badly damaged now.

"We're done," Fisher said. "He showed you who he is. He's the greatest ever, huh? When you got all the advantages, it's easy."

He said Saban's comments were insulting to Texas A&M and the families of the players who signed with the Aggies.

Texas A&M plays at Alabama on Oct. 8, but Fisher and Saban won't have to wait that long to cross paths with the SEC meetings just around the corner.

"I don't cheat. I don't lie. If you did my old man slapped me across the face. Maybe someone should have slapped him (Saban)," Fisher said.

The 56-year-old Fisher won a national championship in 2013 as head coach at Florida State before receiving a 10-year

contract for \$75 million to leave Tallahassee for Texas A&M in 2017. Fisher was hired to deliver a title to a program that has not won a national championship since 1939 despite its deep-pocketed boosters, resources and access to talent.

Aggies athletic director Ross Bjork echoed Fisher's defense of the program and said he believes some rivals might feel threatened that A&M is finally starting to put the pieces in place to reach its potential.

"So, why we're the target, is that a threat to the power system of college football? SEC? State of Texas?" he asked. "I don't know. You'd have to ask all the other people why they're talking about A&M so much."

The NCAA lifted most of its rules barring athletes from earning money from sponsorship and endorsement deals last July, but there are concerns among many in college sports that NIL deals are being used as recruiting inducements and de facto pay-for-play. Last week, the NCAA issued guidance to Division I members to clarify rules against boosters being involved in recruiting.

This was the second time this year Fisher issued a fiery public defense of his program. In February, he went off on competitors who were pushing rumors that Texas A&M had spent \$30 million on NIL deals to secure one of the highest-rated recruiting classes in history.

The 70-year-old Saban didn't stop at just Texas A&M during his speaking engagement Wednesday night. He also mentioned Jackson State and Miami in his critique of NIL.

Jackson State coach Deion Sanders, a Pro Football Hall of Famer, landed one of the top recruits in the country in cornerback Travis Hunter, who had been committed to Florida State until a signing-day flip in December.

Sanders has denied Hunter received any impermissible deals before signing and told Andscape.com that he would like to have a public conversation with Saban about the accusations.

"I still love him. I admire him. I respect him. He's the magna cum laude of college football and that's what it's going to be because he's earned that," Sanders said. "But he took a left when he should've stayed right. I'm sure he'll get back on course. I ain't tripping."

As for Fisher, he said he's looking forward to the Destin meetings.

"I don't mind confrontation. Lived with it my whole life," Fisher said. "Kind of like it myself. Backing away from it isn't the way I was raised."

Opening lead—three of diamonds.
This deal occurred in the 1990 world team championship final between Germany and the United States. It arose early in the match and put the Germans, who ultimately won the title, ahead for the first time.
When a German pair held the North-South cards, they stopped at a quiet three notrump, making seven with the aid of no opening spade lead and a couple of dia-

mond finesnes.
At the other table, where Charles Coon and Mike Moss of the U.S. sat North-South, the bidding went as shown. West's two spade overcall was pre-emptive, leaving Moss awkwardly placed after Coon bid three hearts. He tried three notrump, which Coon raised to six. Had West led a spade, South would have been down two before he could blink. However, West (Roland Rohowsky) did not lead a spade, seemingly handing declarer the slam. But Rohowsky's choice of a low diamond lead instead proved to have diabolical consequences.
From Moss' perspective, after dummy was tabled, he could count 12 virtually ironclad tricks — six hearts, five clubs and the ace of diamonds. It would therefore have been the height of folly to risk a diamond finesse, which, if it lost, would give the opponents a chance to cash their top spades.
So Moss put up dummy's ace and tried to run the hearts. But when West showed out on the first heart, Moss' six heart tricks quickly shrunk to five, and he finished down one for a team loss of 820 points and 13 IMPs to the Germans.

Today's Highlight in History:

- On May 23, 1984, Surgeon General C. Everett Koop issued a report saying there was "very solid" evidence linking cigarette smoke to lung disease in non-smokers.
- On this date:
- In 1430, Joan of Arc was captured by the Burgundians, who sold her to the English.
- In 1533, the marriage of England's King Henry VIII to Catherine of Aragon was declared null and void by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Thomas Cranmer.
- In 1915, Italy declared war on Austria-Hungary during World War I.
- In 1934, bank robbers Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker were shot to death in a police ambush in Bienville Parish, Louisiana.
- In 1937, industrialist and philanthropist John D. Rockefeller, founder of the Standard Oil Co. and the Rockefeller Foundation, died in Ormond Beach, Florida, at age 97.
- In 1939, the Navy submarine USS Squalus sank during a test dive off

enemy. Prosecutors failed for the second time in their bid to hold Baltimore police accountable for the arrest and death of Freddie Gray, as an officer was acquitted in the racially charged case that triggered riots a year earlier.

Ten years ago: Egypt held the Arab world's first competitive presidential vote. (Islamist Mohamed Morsi was ultimately named the winner following a runoff.)

Five years ago: President Donald Trump made a personal appeal for peace between Israel and the Palestinians as he closed a four-day swing through the Middle East. Roger Moore, the star of seven James Bond films, died in Switzerland at age 89.

One year ago: A cable car taking visitors to a mountaintop view of northern Italy's most picturesque lakes plummeted to the ground and tumbled down a slope, killing 14 people. (The lone survivor, a 6-year-old boy, became the subject of a custody battle between family members in Italy and Israel; the Israeli Supreme Court ruled that he should be returned to his relatives in Italy.) A Ryanair jetliner flying from Greece to Lithuania was forced to land in Belarus so authorities there could arrest a passenger, journalist Raman Pratasevich, a key foe of authoritarian Belarusian President Alexander Lukashenko. At age 50, Phil Mickelson won the PGA Championship in South Carolina to become the oldest major champion in golf history. Children's author and illustrator Eric Carle, known for the classic "The Very Hungry Caterpillar," died at 91 in Massachusetts.
