Decision Will Be Handed Down Later On Rail Agency Closing

A fair size delegation of Rochester citizens and Haskell residents gathered in the District Courtroom here last Thursday to hear testimony at a hearing on Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad Company's application to discontinue its Rochester agency.

The hearing was held by Cecil F. Boulden of Austin, examiner for the Texas Railroad Commission, with John Eckel of Galveston, representing the Santa Fe and District Attorney Royce Adkins of Haskell, representing the city of Rochester and its citizens.

Boulden said that all of the testimony will have to be transcribed and studied before a decision is handed down and could not say just when that would be.

Figures presented by the railroad attorney through testimony of Santa Fe Railroad officials depicted that the agency at Rochester had operated at a loss for the last ten months of 1964, all of 1965, and the first two months of 1966.

J. P. Spears of Slaton, superintendent for the Slaton district of the railroad, explained its operations between Hamlin and Altus, Okla.

Two Wrecks Occur In Lapse Of Only One Hour's Time

A 1966 Ford pick-up, driven by Paul Cornelius, 16, of Old Glory and a 1961 Ford driven by Tony Rosas, 42, of Sagerton, were involved in a crash at 12:15 a. m., Sunday two miles northwest of Stamford on Highway 380.

In the pick-up with Cornelius were Monty Martin, 16, and Jimmy Kittley of Rule. Martin was treated at Stamford Hospital and released. Both vehicles were traveling northwest toward Sagerton when Cornelius' pick-up rammed into the rear end of the Rosas vehicle during a hard rain. Jesse Priest, highway patrolman, who investigated the mishap, said.

At 11:15 p. m., Saturday, in Rule, on State Highway 24, Tommy Manske, 16, of Sagerton, driving a 1961 Chevrolet, traveling east, lost control of the vehicle, ran off the right side of the road and hit a culvert. In the car with Manske was Tony Bishop, 17. Both men were taken to the Stamford Hospital in a Pinkard ambulance. Manske received cuts about the head and bruises and Bishop was checked and released. Alabama Man Being Held In Haskell Jail

Roland Dee Thompson, 25, from Alabama, is being held in the Haskell County jail on \$5,000 bond, on charges of felony check swindling, pending the September term of Grand Jury. Haskell County Sheriff Garth Garrett said.

Using a rented car out of Abilene, Garrett said Thompson passed three checks totalling \$582.82, and is wanted in Oklahoma and various parts of Texas for check swindling.

Haskell Gets Better Than Inch of Rain

After three long months of drought, Haskell received more than an inch of rain Saturday night and Sunday morning, as Sam Herren's official government gauge revealed 1.05 inches.

Only .51 of an inch fell here in July; .46 in June and .27 of an inch in May so the rain Saturday night was the first measurable amount to speak of to fall here in more than a three-month period.

The last good rains fell here in April when almost 10 inches was gauged during that month, Herren's records show.

MUSTANGS GAIN BERTH IN STATE TOURNAMENT PLAYOFF

Behind the brilliant pitching of John Martinez and sparked by the consistent hitting which characterized the Mustangs performance in the District Tournament held at Lockney, Haskell earned the distinction of competing for State honors as they defeated Stamford 10-1 in the final game of District Seven, Texas Junior Teenage Baseball League. The game, played Sunday afternoon, in Abilene was originally scheduled for Saturday night at Lockney, but was called after three and a half innings of play with the two teams tied 3-3, due to inclement weather.

The Mustang's right to contest Stamford for a championship honors came as a result of their two previous wins in the District 7 tourney held at Lockney where teams from Jayton, Silvertown, Lockney, Floydada, Stamford and Haskell were represented.

Haskell beat Lockney 15-1 in their initial game and met Floydada on Friday night, downing them 6-1. Haskell's win over Floydada came as a result of six runs scored the second in-

ning. Scoring for Haskell were Pippin, Chapman, Stone, Acosta, Lowrey and Rodriguez.

Stamford Game Stamford's only score was an unearned run by Weeks in the first inning, as Miller's infield hit dropped into the glove Weeks to score. Stamford threatened again in the 6th and 7th innings, but was never able to increase their score.

Martinez took the lead in the fourth inning after Justo Rodriguez tied the score in the third inning on a hit by Terry Chapman. The decisive fourth inning saw Haskell push the lead to 8-1 as scores were chalked up by Sam Stone, Ray Acosta, Terry Lowrey, Justo Rodriguez, Hal Spain, Lee Pippin and Terry Chapman.

Haskell put two more runs on the scoreboard in the final innings on runs scored by Lanny Ivy and Ray Acosta. Martinez was the winning pitcher and Wilhite for Stamford absorbed the loss. The District 7 Championship Trophy was awarded to the Mustangs, who are now seeing action in the State playoffs underway in Mt. Pleasant.

Victoria toppled the Mustangs 9-1 in the first game of the double elimination state play-offs at Mt. Pleasant on Tuesday night.

The Good Earth

There are many of our plants in our garden, both vegetable and flower, that are highly toxic. Rhubarb leaves, when eaten in large quantities, are very poisonous. They can cause convulsions that end in coma and death. Yet the stems of this plant are edible.

Tomato and potato leaves contain an alkaloid poison that can cause digestive and nervous disorders. Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known to man.

The leaves and twigs of both wild and tame cherries contain a substance that releases cyanide when eaten. Gasping for breath, excitement and prostration come very quickly after the leaves have been chewed or the twigs bitten.

Children have been poisoned

by making whistles and blowing them from the twigs of an Elderberry bush. The sap from the plant causes nausea and other disorders of the digestive tract. Chewing of Wisteria seed and pods can cause a severe digestive upset. Many small tots, with a habit of putting things in their mouths, have been poisoned by eating Wisteria seed, or chewing the pods.

One castor oil bean seed eaten can prove fatal. It is not advisable to plant castor beans where there are small children. Hyacinth, daffodils and narcissus should be kept out of children's reach at all times. If these bulbs are eaten, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and often death occurs.

The young plants and seed of the common Larkspur can (if eaten) cause digestive upsets, nervous excitement, depression and often death.

The leaves and branches of the oleander when eaten affects the heart and digestive tract and often causes death.

If you, like myself, like to chew acorns, do not. Both the acorn and foliage of the oak if eaten in large quantities can

THE GRAND HOAX

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: 'Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election. 'The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. 'The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned. 'The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected. 'Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: 'Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law. 'The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. 'The Court of Criminal Appeals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court. 'The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment. 'Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the following words printed on said ballot: 'FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court.' Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the following words printed on said ballot: 'AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court.' If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state. 'Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12; authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; with power to issue general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, either or both of them, for the purchase, acquisition by the exercise of the power of eminent domain or otherwise, reconstruction, repair or renovation of any airport or airports, landing fields and runways, airport buildings, hangars, facilities, equipment, fixtures, and any and all property, real or personal, necessary to operate, equip and maintain an airport; shall provide for the option by the governing body of the city or cities whose airport facilities are served by certificated airlines and whose facilities or some interest therein, is proposed to be or has been acquired by the Authority, to either appoint or elect a Board of Directors of said Authority; if the Directors are appointed such appointment shall be made by the County Commissioners Court after consultation with the governing body of the city or cities of such city or cities, and if the Board of Directors is elected they shall be elected by the qualified taxpayers voters of the county which chooses to elect the Directors to represent that county, such Directors shall serve without compensation for a term fixed by the Legislature not to exceed six (6) years, and shall be selected on the basis of the proportionate population of each county based upon the last preceding Federal Census, and shall be a resident or residents of such county; provide that no county shall have less than one (1) member on the Board of Directors; provide for the holding of an election in each county proposing the creation of an Authority to be called by the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts, as the case may be, upon petition of five (5%) of the qualified taxpayers voters within the county or counties, said elections to be held on the same day if more than one county is included, provided that no more than one (1) such election may be called in a county until after the expiration of one (1) year; in the event such an election has failed, and thereafter only upon a petition of ten per cent (10%) of the qualified taxpayers voters being presented to the Commissioners Courts of the county or counties in which such an election has failed, and in the event that two or more counties vote on the proposition of the creation of an Authority therein, the proposition shall not be deemed to carry unless the majority of the qualified taxpayers voters in each county voting thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority, said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certificated airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxing voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the then existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census. 'Sec. 2. 'AGAINST the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters.' 'Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.

Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of the Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment.

The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of each House may authorize this Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized.

The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or reservoirs and associated facilities; together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. 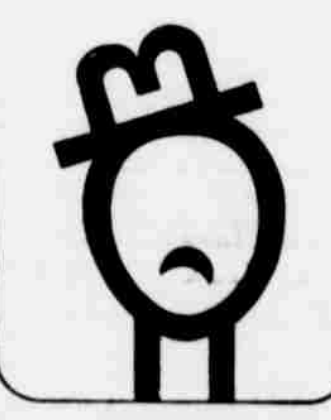

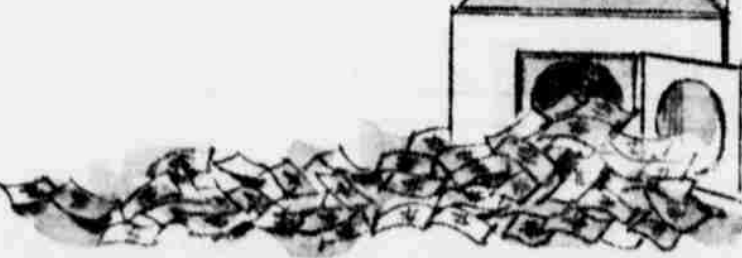

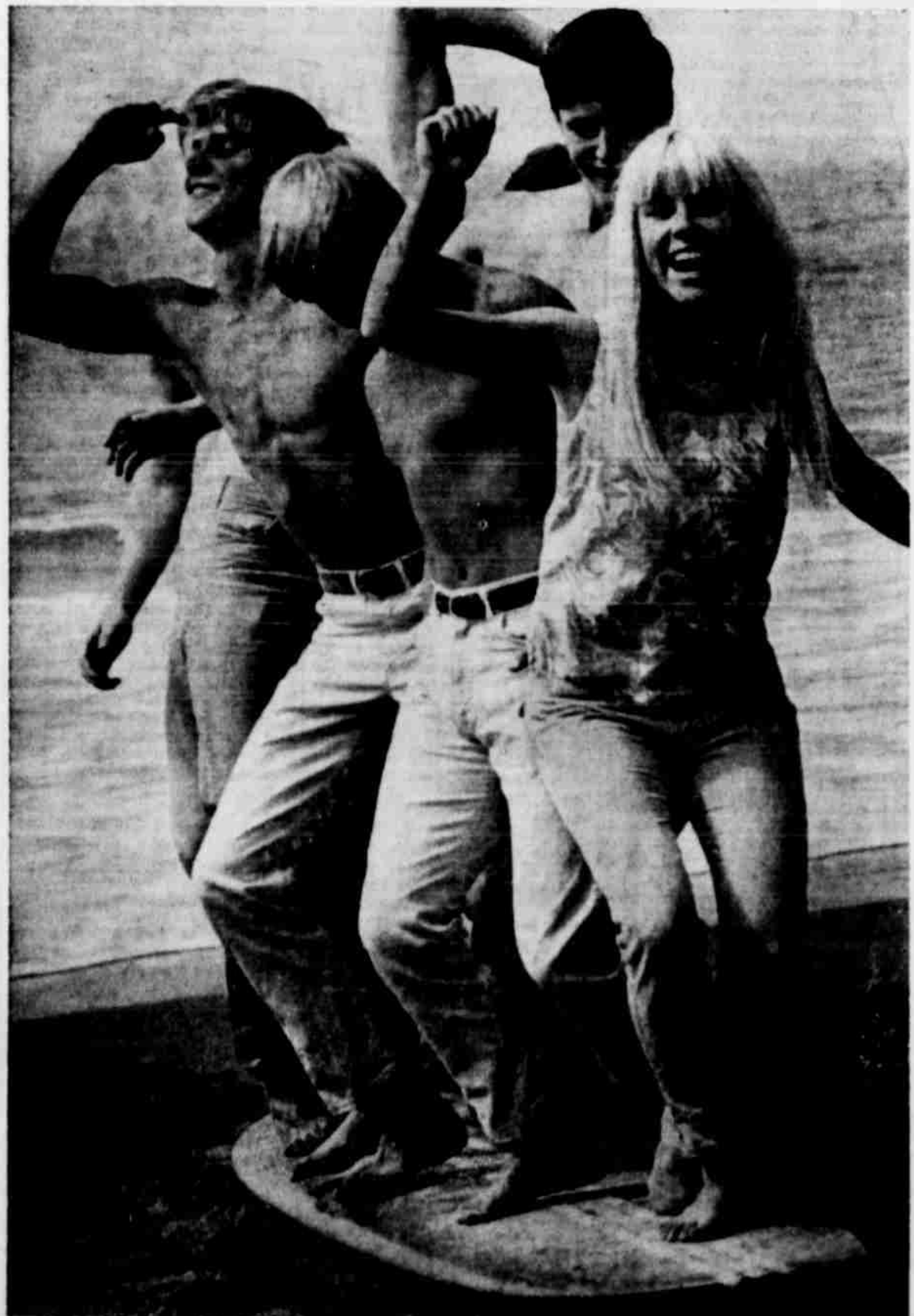

Both families saw the Astros "Pressing" Can Spell Success Or Failure

Pressing can spell success or failure in the general appearance of a new garment, says Mrs. Barbara M. Elliott, County Home Demonstration Agent. She points out that when clothing is manufactured, the person skilled in pressing earns more than the person who actually sews the garment.

Don't confuse pressing with ironing, she cautions. Pressing is a lifting up and down, following the threads or grainline of the fabric. The weight of the iron never rests completely on the garment.

There should be a piece of fabric between the iron and the seam being pressed, even when using a steam iron. Chesebroth, canvas or wool can be used.

The home demonstration agent suggests that you keep the ironing board set up so that you are not tempted to skip this step even once when sewing. Press any curved seam over a tailor's mitt or ham.

Some fabrics will respond to a steam iron, while others may need a dampened press cloth to assure enough moisture to help in molding and shaping. In fabrics that seem to shrink, you may want to use only the dampened press cloth, so you can control the amount of moisture. Do not overpress or use too much heat on wool, she cautions.

County Agent Says Ticks Can Be Controlled

The County Agent's office has had numerous reports of ticks in home lawns. This pest can be controlled, especially if several home owners in an area will work together. The term "wood tick" is applied to several species of ticks so similar that the average person cannot tell one from the other. The most common species in Texas which is a problem to the home owner is called the "brown dog tick." Ticks feed upon the blood of animals and are often brought into the home on dogs.

To control ticks inside the home you should use a household spray containing 0.5% Diazinon. Apply the insecticide thoroughly to baseboards, around doors and window moldings, behind pictures, under furniture, around edges of rugs and in all cracks. You can control ticks on dogs by dusting with 5% Seven. Rub the dust into the skin and apply to the dog's sleeping quarters.

Ticks may be controlled outside the home on the lawn and in other vegetation with sprays or dust of Diazinon or Sevin.

Further information can be obtained from the County Agricultural Agent's office. Ask for Bulletin L-311 "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects."

Cotton Insect Situation

Bollworm activity continues to increase over the area with reports coming from several Rolling Plains counties. Heaviest infestations were observed in Jones, Wilbarger, Cottle, King, Rannels, Haskell, Knox, Hardeman, Stonewall, Fisher, Schleicher, Concho and Tom Green counties. One or more fields in these counties sustained from 4% to 6% damage, while damage in several of these fields was over 6%.

Populations of boll weevils ranging from 1,000 to 6,600 per acre were observed in Collingsworth, Wilbarger, Knox, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan and Stonewall counties. Populations ranging from 200 to 850 boll weevils per acre were observed in Cottle, King, Clay, Taylor, Haskell, Rannels and Tom Green counties.

Medium infestations of plant bugs (lygus, stinkbugs and rapid plant bugs) have been observed in fields in Haskell, Concho and Tom Green counties.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:
"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.
(b) Statutory provisions enacted before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, relating to the terms of office of governing bodies of political subdivisions created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, are validated, so long as the provisions do not provide for a term of office which exceeds six years."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

"(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

"(c) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Spears said the people of Rochester could obtain service from either Knox City or Rule if the railroad commission approves the application to close the Rochester station.
He said that a passenger busline, a truck line, and wholesale companies serve Rochester, and other rail points are located at Haskell and Stamford.
Spears said the Santa Fe will accept telephone calls from customers who might want to get service from the Rule or Knox City stations if the Rochester station is closed.
Adkins called witnesses to show the customers of the railroad as well as the people of Rochester would be greatly inconvenienced should the agency be closed. Some said they would

Some witnesses said the city would lose both the Western Union and the express service if the station closes. Others testified there would be a lapse in time in getting bills of lading approved.

Don't Relax Your Guard When Using Agricultural Chemicals

Don't relax your guard when using agricultural chemicals. They can enter the body by ingestion, through the respiratory system and in many cases through the skin, explains County Agent R. W. Schumann.

A person would not knowingly eat a chemical such as a pesticide; however, failure to remove contaminated clothing and to wash thoroughly prior to eating can result in the ingestion of the chemical on food handled by the individual.

Absorption of the chemical through the respiratory tract can occur by smoking cigarettes that have contacted the chemical on the hands of the individual, says Schumann. Absorption through the respiratory tract can also occur when one is exposed to chemicals in the form of dusts, sprays or vapors, explains the county agent. Adequate ventilation will serve to reduce the degree of exposure and the use of a respiratory protection device is a must in many cases if use hazards are to be minimized, emphasizes the county agent.

He suggests that protective clothing be worn at all times when chemicals are being used. Their use will help prevent contact of the chemical with the

skin, either directly or indirectly, or as a result of spillage, exposure to sprays or dusts or ingestion through contacts with surfaces, equipment and utensils exposed to chemicals.

To prevent accidental poisoning, Schumann offers these suggestions: Read, understand and follow the container instructions; use protective clothing and respirators as directed on the labels; keep soap and water available at all times; they are valuable protective devices; if chemicals are spilled on the skin or clothing, remove the clothing and wash the affected area thoroughly with soap and water; remove contaminated clothing upon completion of the chemical use and scrub with soap and water; place contaminated clothing, equipment and unused chemicals and "empty" chemical containers immediately and in the prescribed manner.

And always remember, emphasizes the county agent, the safe use of agricultural chemicals is largely in the hands of the person who uses them.

County Agent Says Many Derived From Deferred Grazing

Deferred grazing is one of the best means of utilizing the maximum forage production of a ranch, according to County Agent R. W. Schumann.

The stocking of a ranch must be flexible enough so that a deferred program can be set up to allow from a sixth to a fourth of the total ranch acreage to be deferred during each growing season, from four to six months. The other pastures on the ranch should not be overgrazed while trying to improve on pasture.

Deferred grazing refers to the practice of removing livestock from grazing the area for a specified period of time during the growing season to promote plant reproduction, establishment of new plants, or restoration of vigor by old plants.

Deferred rotation grazing is another type of deferred grazing, according to Schumann. This is the practice of removing livestock from grazing various parts of a ranch while other parts are being grazed at various seasons of the year. At least two, three or four pastures are necessary to establish a systematic plan. Only one herd of livestock is moved at any one time from a grazed to a deferred pasture.

Checker-board deferred graz-

ing is the removal from grazing a certain area of the ranch to allow the stock from the area to mature and to be effective in the area.

Some of the benefits of deferred grazing include: reduction of site infestations, reduction of plant varieties, increasing stock
