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Tuesday accident claims two in Coleman County

Three people were killed in two traffic accidents, and a fourth injured, Tuesday morning in West Texas.

The first accident occurred on U.S. Highway 67 near Talpa, Texas, at 4:14 a.m.

According to a report issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety, Alexander Leroy Hill, 31, of Copperas Cove was driving a 2020 International truck towing a 2020 Hyundai semi-trailer east on U.S. Highway 67, while Andrew Sosa Jr., 44, of Sweetwater was driving a 2013 GMC Sierra pickup truck west on the same roadway. The report states that Sosa drove onto the wrong side of the road, causing his truck to strike Hill's truck head-on. Sosa's vehicle re-

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ported caught on fire following the collision.

Both Sosa and his passenger – Ethan Mark Harris, 19, of Rising Star, Texas – were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Vicki Kemp. Hill was reportedly uninjured in the accident.

According to the report, Hill was wearing his safety belt at the time of the accident. It is unclear whether Sosa or Harris were restrained by safety belts.

Weather conditions at the time of the wreck were clear and dry. The accident was investigated by DPS Trooper Tyler C. Moses of Coleman, Texas.

Another accident claimed one life and left a second individual hospitalized in Midland County.




In addition to his parents, George was preceded in death by 1 brother: Daniel Luna.

Southwest Airlines brings back dividend as travel rebounds

DALLAS (AP) — Southwest Airlines said Wednesday that it is bringing back dividends for shareholders, which it suspended when the pandemic devastated the airline business in early 2020.

Dallas-based Southwest said in a regulatory filing that it will pay a quarterly dividend of 18 cents per share on Jan. 31.

The move comes as air travel rebounds and U.S. airlines return to profitability due to full planes and sharply higher fares than a year ago.

Southwest has posted the highest net income among U.S. airlines in the first nine months of this year, reporting a \$759 million profit in that span.

The airline said the decision to restore the dividend reflected a strong return in demand for travel and the company's financial results since March. Executives said the trend of strong bookings is likely to spill into 2023 despite consumers facing high inflation and uncertainty about the economy.

"So far we are seeing no signs of a slowdown in travel demand," Chief Financial Officer Tammy Romo said during a Southwest meeting with analysts in New York. Her comment echoed a similar remark this week by United Airlines CEO Scott Kirby.

U.S. airlines were barred from paying dividends or buying back their own stock until October, as a condition of taking \$54 billion in federal pandemic

aid. None of the largest airlines have resumed share buybacks, which have drawn criticism from unions and congressional Democrats.

"At some point it will be appropriate to talk about share repurchases, and that's not today," CEO Robert Jordan told analysts.

Southwest repeated its previous forecast that fourth-quarter revenue will rise by up to 17% over the same period in 2019.

Jordan said last week that Southwest is unable to use 40 to 45 of its 700-plus airplanes because it doesn't have enough pilots to fly them. The airline has been hiring, but is in the process of training more pilots. Southwest said in Wednesday's filing that it expects to increase passenger-carrying capacity next year by up to 15%.

Southwest — along with rivals Delta, American and United — is negotiating new contracts with many labor groups, most notably pilots, the highest-paid work group. A pilot shortage at smaller airlines is giving unions leverage to seek big raises. Last week Delta reached an "agreement in principle" to raise pilot pay by a cumulative 34% over four years — a deal that could become the model for the other large airlines.

Southwest pilots picketed outside the investor event to call for higher pay. Their union said in a statement that the pilots were highlighting Southwest's "deviation from its core values of taking care of its employees."

Shares of Southwest Airlines Co. fell 4% in afternoon trading, and other U.S. airlines also dropped.

For the Forsan Buffaloes it was a well-rounded game. On the other side, the Coahoma Bulldogs would just as soon forget about it. When it was all said and done the Buffaloes stampeded the Bulldogs 54-31 Tuesday in the 3rd Annual Military Recognition Night at the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum.

It was a sweet victory for the Buffaloes who return only one player from last year's squad. They played like a veteran team, shredding the Bulldogs press for easy buckets and creating Coahoma turnovers with a trapping press of their own.

"Yeah we only return one player from last year. But what a lot of people don't know is that these guys went 29-1 as a JV team last year. They are only going to get better," said Forsan coach Corey Richardson. "This is a credit to our junior high coaches. They work hard with these kids every day. By the time I get them they are pretty skilled in the fundamentals." Richardson added.

Forsan showed its skills from the start by not turning the ball over and controlling the boards. Then they got some timely three-point shooting from Jake Meyers and it simply overwhelmed the struggling Bulldogs. To show what kind of night it was, the Bulldogs made 2 of 14 shots from the field in the first quarter as Forsan jumped out to a 16-5 first quarter lead.

The Bulldogs went scoreless in the fourth quarter. Coahoma cut the deficit in the second quarter thanks to Ryan Shifflett making seven points. However, Forsan's lead was 29-20 at halftime. Meyers jump started Forsan in the third quarter, making

two three-pointers at the start and soon the Forsan lead had ballooned to 41-24 with four minutes left in the third quarter.

By the time Forsan's Weston Layman had scored inside off a feed from Meyers, the game was over for all practical purposes with Forsan leading 51-31 with five minutes left in the game.

"We were in a funk. Not a single thing we did tonight resembled what we practiced," said Coahoma coach Lonnie Burnam. "I don't know what was going on with us. We were trying to do too much. We just have to get over it and keep moving on." Coahoma, 2-3 for the season, will be in the Borden County tournament Thursday. Its first round opponent will be Tahoka. The Buffaloes, 3-4 for the season, will host Midland Classical Friday night at 7:30 p.m.

No. 24 TCU eases by Jackson State 78-51 for 5th straight win

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — JaKobe Coles scored a career-high 21 points, Darnion Baugh had 15 points, six rebounds and five assists, and No. 24 TCU beat Jackson State 78-51 on Tuesday night for its fifth straight victory.

The Horned Frogs were without starters Mike Miles Jr. (18.2 points pre game) and Eman Miller (12.6).

Coach Jamie Dixon said Miles was dealing with an illness, and Miller had a back issue that started as an illness. Dixon said Miller was feeling better Tuesday.

"I think the Iowa game is the only game I've gone into where I knew who was starting the night before," Dixon said. "This game I had no idea who was playing, or even starting. I've never had anything like it."

Coltie Young made four 3-pointers and scored 14 points for Jackson State (1-7). Romelle Mansel had eight points, 11 rebounds and two blocks. The Tigers turned it over 29 times, leading to 22 points.

Coles scored 12 points in the opening 10 minutes as TCU led 25-11 and he matched his previous career high with 15 points by halftime. Coles also had the final six points of an 8-0 run early in the second half for a 54-34 lead.

"I had a lot of confidence going into the summer," Coles said. "With all the work that I put in, and all of us put in, with my teammates encouraging me and being there for me and always making sure I'm ready, I think that's the most important thing I can do."

TCU made six straight shots late in the second half — highlighted by back-to-back dunks by Baugh and Eddie Lampkin Jr. — for a 72-46 lead.

Shahada Wells added 14 points and Chuck O'Hanna Jr. scored 11 for TCU (7-1), which returned to the AP Top 25 after a two-week absence.

The Horned Frogs led by 16 with 7:46 left in the first half before Jackson State made three

3-pointers during a 12-2 run to get within 31-25. But TCU scored eight of the next 10 points for a 39-27 lead at the break.

BIG PICTURE

Jackson State: The Tigers figured to be more competitive coming off a 69-68 victory over SMU, the crosstown rival of TCU. Jackson State was down 10 six minutes into the game.

Although the Tigers rallied to get within six late in the first half, they were never closer than their halftime deficit of 12 in the second half while shooting 30% for the game.

TCU: Dixon has said he's been looking for better rebounding from his team, even though the Horned Frogs had the rebounding edge in every game coming in.

Sure enough, TCU was finally out-rebounded, 45-39. But Dixon thought part of the reason was his team forcing 29 turnovers, limiting the opportunities for defensive boards.

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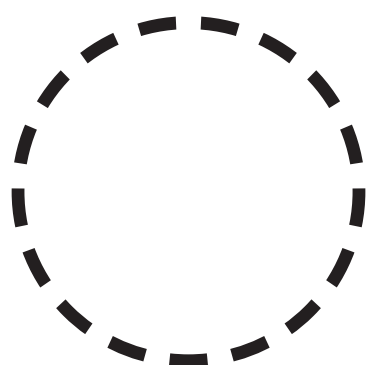

However, if you have a large enough toaster oven, you can cook it in there to free up oven space; otherwise, prepare the casserole as directed in a slow cooker and cook on low for around 3 to 4 hours, until tender. Then add the remaining onions and transfer the casserole to the oven to crisp up for 5 minutes. (Check that the slow cooker crock is oven-safe; otherwise, spoon the mixture into an oven-safe dish for the final baking and serving.)

Proper technique pays off

This deal occurred in the 1986 Cavendish Club Invitational, at the time regarded by many as the most prestigious pairs contest in the world. The declarer was Michael Rosenberg, who together with his partner, Matt Granovetter, finished first in the 36-pair field.

They were one of five pairs to reach a grand slam on the North-South cards, but were the only pair to make it without any assistance from the defense. By agreement, North's five-spade response to four notrump showed two aces plus the queen of spades, after which South

had no compunctions about bidding seven spades.

Rosenberg won the opening heart lead with dummy's ace, crossed to the ace of clubs and led a spade to the ace. He now had several options open to him, but unerringly chose the winning line.

At trick four, he cashed the queen of spades and then played the king of clubs, discarding his heart loser. When the queen of clubs did not appear, he next played two high diamonds, leaving the missing ten of trump outstanding for the moment.

The advantage of playing diamonds while a trump was still missing can be seen in the actual deal. Had the third trump been drawn, declarer would have gone down due to the unlucky 5-1 division of the opposing diamonds.

But Rosenberg decided it could cost nothing to take out insurance against a bad diamond break — unlikely as it was — by testing diamonds first. Had both opponents followed to the A-K of diamonds, he would have drawn the missing trump and claimed the rest.

As it was, though, East showed out on the second diamond but was unable to ruff. Rosenberg then ruffed the nine of diamonds with dummy's nine of trump, returned to his hand with a heart ruff and drew West's last trump to bring in the grand slam.

On Dec. 8, 1941, the United States entered World War II as Congress declared war against Imperial Japan, a day after the attack on Pearl Harbor.

In 1765, Eli Whitney, inventor of the cotton gin, was born in Westborough, Massachusetts.

In 1886, the American Federation of Labor was founded in Columbus, Ohio.

In 1949, the Chinese Nationalist government moved from the Chinese mainland to Formosa as the Communists pressed their attacks.

In 1980, rock star and former Beatle John Lennon was shot to death outside his New York City apartment building by Mark David Chapman.

In 1987, President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev signed a treaty at the White House calling for destruction of intermediate-range nuclear missiles.

In 1991, AIDS patient Kimberly Bergalis, who had contracted the disease from her dentist, died in Fort Pierce, Florida, at age 23.

In 2001, the U.S. Capitol was reopened to tourists after a two-month security shut-down.

In 2008, in a startling about-face, Khalid Sheikh Mohammed told the Guantanamo war crimes tribunal he would confess to masterminding the Sept. 11 attacks; four other men also abandoned their defenses.

In 2011, the 161-day NBA lockout ended when owners and players ratified the new collective bargaining agreement.

In 2014, the U.S. and NATO ceremonially ended their combat mission in Afghanistan, 13 years after the Sept. 11 terror attacks sparked their invasion of the country to topple the Taliban-led government.

In 2016, John Glenn, whose 1962 flight as the first U.S. astronaut to orbit the Earth made him an all-American hero and propelled him to a long career in the U.S. Senate, died in Columbus, Ohio, at age 95.

In 2020, the Supreme Court rejected Republicans' last-gasp bid to reverse Pennsylvania's certification of President-elect Joe Biden's victory in the electoral battleground; the court refused to call into question the certification process in the state.

Ten years ago: Police charged Dallas Cowboys defensive lineman Josh Brent with intoxication manslaughter after he flipped his car in a pre-dawn accident that killed teammate Jerry Brown. (Brent was convicted in Jan. 2014 and sentenced to 180 days in jail; he was reinstated by the NFL in Sept. 2014.) Texas A&M quarterback Johnny Manziel became the first freshman to win the Heisman Trophy.

Five years ago: Japanese pitching and hitting star Shohei Ohtani announced that he would sign with the Los Angeles Angels.

One year ago: With more than two dozen states poised to ban abortion if the U.S. Supreme Court were to give them the OK, California clinics and their allies in the state Legislature revealed a plan to make the state a "sanctuary" for those seeking reproductive care. President Joe Biden signed an executive order to make the federal government carbon-neutral by 2050, aiming for a 65% reduction in planet-warming greenhouse gas emissions by 2030 and an all-electric fleet of car and trucks five years later. The number of Americans fully vaccinated against COVID-19 reached 200 million. Nearly 17 years after being sentenced to die, Scott Peterson was resented in California to life without parole for the Christmas Eve killing of his pregnant wife, Laci, in 2002. (The state Supreme Court found that Peterson's jury was improperly screened for bias against the death penalty.) Center-left leader Olaf Scholz became Germany's ninth post-World War II chancellor.

Today's Birthdays: Flutist James Galway is 83. Singer Jerry Butler is 83. Pop musician Bobby Elliott (The Hollies) is 81. Actor Mary Woronov is 79. Actor John Rubinstein is 76. 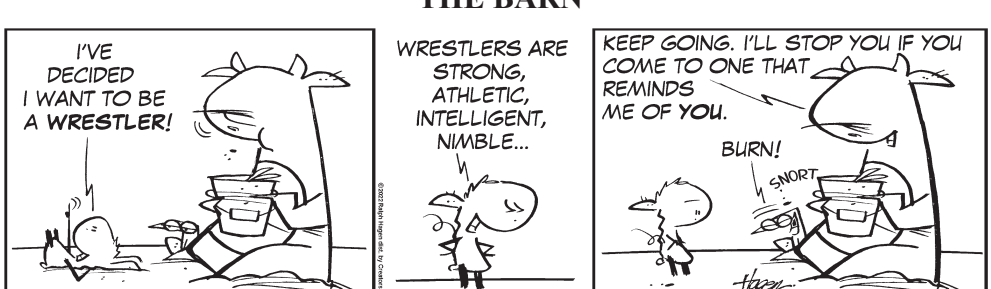
