Sherman County Receives Safety Award

Sherman County has received the Texas Association of Counties Occupational Safety Award. The county award was announced in October at the Annual County Judges' and Commissioners' Association of Texas Conference held in San Antonio by Mr. Bill Melton, President of the Texas Association of Counties.

Sherman County was recognized for its achievement in reducing the number of employee's on-the-job injuries during 1986. In announcing the award, President Melton stated that "Judge W.S. Frizzell, Jr. and Commissioners Wayne Cummings, Boyd Spurlock, Dale Hamilton and Darrell Cotney are especially commended for this record, because it appropriately reflects these county leaders' concern for the safety and well-being of their employees." Less than 50% of the counties participating

in the Self-Insurance Fund received this recognition.

Besides the savings in human resources, Mr. Melton also stressed that "A reduction in employee injuries reduces the cost that a county must pay for workers' compensation insurance, thereby saving the county and its taxpayers money."

According to the most recent complete cost figures available, Texas public and private employers paid over \$2 billion for employee injuries in 1985. That amount is expected to be even higher for 1986.

The Texas Association of Counties aggressively promotes occupational safety and assists counties in developing programs promoting safety consciousness among their employees. This award is also the association's recognition of the contribution from the individual county employee who performed his or her job safely during 1986.

Attention Voters

The following statement is provided through the courtesy of the Stratford Star, from the Sherman County Attorney's Office. Its purpose is to clarify questions concerning the March primary petitions for either republican or democratic candidates.

"I have been asked several times lately whether a person who signed a petition-in-lieu of filing fee for a candidate in one primary can vote in the other primary election.

In other words, if John

Doe signs a petition to place a name on the republican primary ballot, can John Doe vote in the democratic primary that same year? The law states that it is an offense, punishable as a Class C Misdemeanor, being a fine up to \$200.00.

Of course, John Doe can vote in the republican primary, and in the general election."

Absentee Voting Application For Ballot To Be Voted By Mail

To be entitled to vote absentee by mail an application must be in writing. The applicant's name and residence address, the address to which the ballot is to be mailed and an indication of each election for which the voter is applying for a ballot. A qualified voter is eligible to vote absentee by mail if the voter has a sickness or physical conditions that prevents the voter from

appearing at the polling place on election day.

A qualified voter is eligible to vote absentee by mail if the voter is 65 years of age or older on election day.

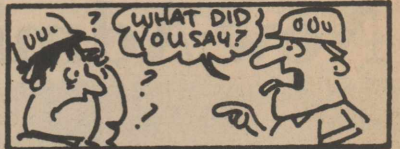

Dear Parent

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) is a killer disease for which there is currently no known cure. The only defense against AIDS we now have is education, and that is the challenge facing our schools.

It is a sensitive and controversial topic for the school curriculum; nevertheless schools have a responsibility to respond to this public health problem.

In keeping with this philosophy, the Stratford Independent School will schedule instruction pertaining to the Aids disease which will be taught to all students from the 7th through the 12 grades. Instruction will include a 15 minute film presentation, a booklet for each student, and a discussion led by the Stratford EMT Association.

Instruction, beginning on February 26th, will be divided into 4 groups:
 Group I - 3rd period - 7th and 8th grade girls only
 Group II - 3rd period - 7th and 8th grade boys only
 Group III - 4th period - 9th through 12th girls only
 Group IV - 4th period - 9th through 12th boys only.

Male faculty members will attend instruction with the boys and female faculty members will attend with the girls. A discussion of the instruction, plus the film to be shown, will be presented February 23 at 7:00 p.m. in the High School auditorium. All parents and interested community patrons are encouraged to attend.

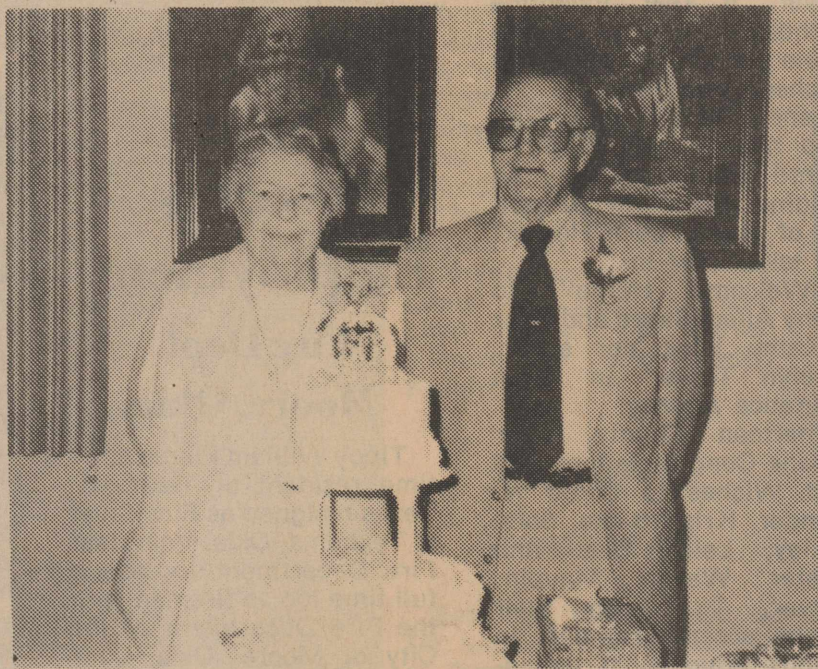

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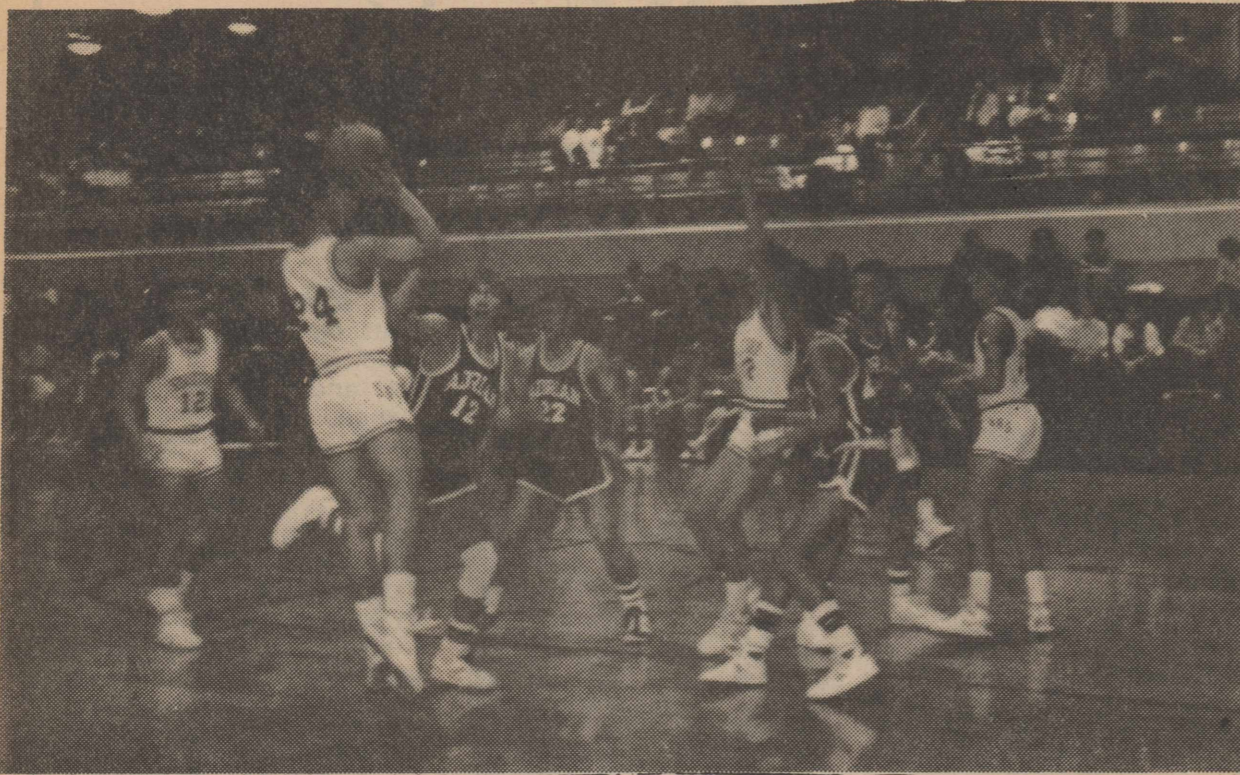

In an ancient little red schoolhouse perched amidst rolling hills and buffalo grass, young and old, alike, dip their brushes and dabble in the arts.

It's an unusual setting, at best, for the polished work that results from the endeavors hers. But then, the person directing these talents is an unusual man.

At 73, Dord Fitz has displayed his work and exchanged his ideas with the best-known artists the world over, joining their ranks through his own extensive accomplishments.

A renowned portrait artist who has studied all over the world, Fitz was a university professor in Kentucky for 14 years.

Then, he came to the little red schoolhouse at Podunk Corner, six miles west of Arnett in sparsely populated Ellis County. This area was his home for a time during his youth and a place to which he felt compelled to return.

"We've been meeting in this little schoolhouse here since 1952," he said, glancing affectionately at the wood plank floors, the pot-bellied stove at one end and the rough wooden walls where he has literally introduced his students to some of the great artists of the age.

"This little schoolhouse is known all over the world." Except, perhaps, in its own backyard.

"People still don't know I'm even here" Fitz said. "People in Shattuck don't know who I am."

To the art world colonized on both coasts, however, Fitz is a familiar name. From his

own work, to his gallery in Amarillo, Texas, to New York showings he has arranged for his little group of students from secluded Western Oklahoma.

I came out here and dared to do something that nobody else had done," Fitz said. "I was determined I would find a way of teaching people at the grassroots how to paint and how to look at a work of art."

Those teaching methods are materializing into a future book that will outline the steps through which Fitz leads his pupils - from communication of colors to size relationship.

Though many of his students have gone on to build their own famous names in the art world, many of Fitz' pupils are part-time dabblers who drive in weekly from Woodward, Shattuck and Arnett as well as area Texas towns to learn the

basics and absorb what knowledge they can from a man of Fitz' immense talent.

He also teaches regularly in nearby Texas communities, meanwhile maintaining the ranch where he lives with Agnes Fitz, his wife of 48 years, south of the practically non-existent rural community of Podunk.

Many of those attending classes at the little red schoolhouse started with Fitz years ago. They have formed an Area Arts Foundation and collected a fortune's worth of artworks Fitz said will be given to a gallery that promises to match their value with additional works.

And, the first Sunday in May of each year, Fitz' schoolhouse students bring in their works for an annual exhibit.

And here, in this quiet frame building where windows open to breezes that

In the last eight years, a Dauer entry from Panhandle has placed either grand or reserve grand champion. This year proved to be no exception as John Paul Dauer's pen of March and April, 1986 heifers captured the judges' approval as

reserve grand champion. Jerry Caley, Bridgeport, showed his approval and paid \$785 per head for the bred heifers scheduled to spring calve.

The first-place yearling pen came from Richard Windham, Baird, with a group of Fall, 1986 heifers. Ranna Creek Ranch stepped forward to claim the open heifers during the sale, paying the event's second top price at \$1,200 per head.

The highest selling pen was consigned by Dennis Cattle Co., Aledo. September and October, 1985 two-year olds were acquired for \$1,210 each by Robert Noyce, San Jose, Ca. The pen sold open having calves at side.

Additional pens were exhibited by Pronger Bros., Stratford; Swen R. Swenson Cattle Co., Stamford; Paul and Steve Dauer, Panhandle; Double U Hereford Ranch, Post; J.A. Matthews Ranch Co., Albany; Patterson Ranch & Cattle Co., Aspermont; Pitchfork Ranch Guthrie; Scharbauer Cattle Co., Midland; and Summerour Bros., Dalhart.

A total 334-head grossed \$296,695, averaging \$888 per head. Open heifers were three dollars short of doubling their average over last year. With open entries averaging \$967, the bred heifers averaged \$190 above last year and recorded \$80 in 1988.

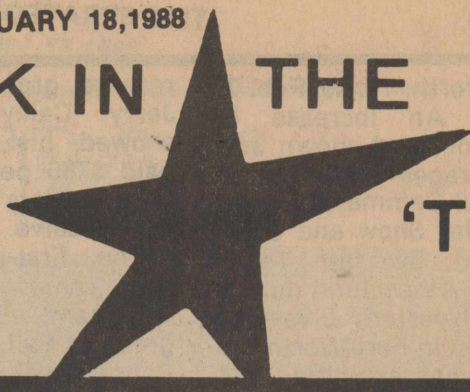

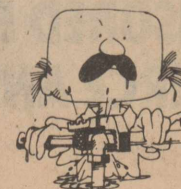

Some Volunteer Expenses Are Deductible

Volunteers are valuable community resource persons who give of their time and talents freely. But that doesn't mean volunteers should have to give out of their own funds.

For that reason, added expenses you may have as a direct result of volunteer work are tax deductible. For example, if you travel to and from a center where you do volunteer work and you're not reimbursed for it, then your expenses are deductible.

Travel, meals and lodging expenses from an authorized trip away from home for the organization are also deductible. This includes convention expenses if you're an official delegate from your organization.

There are some limitations on deducting automobile travel costs. You can deduct only the actual operating costs of your car in volunteer work, or a flat mileage rate of 12 cents per mile, whichever is greater. If your expenses for gasoline, oil, tolls and parking fees are

greater than the standard rate, you may deduct actual expenses. But you can't deduct any part of repair or maintenance expenses, insurance or depreciation.

If you make calls from your home phone to conduct volunteer work, you can deduct that expense. The cost of materials and supplies, such as stationery and postage is also deductible, as in the cost of a required uniform.

Although you may have to hire a babysitter in order to do volunteer work, child care expenses are nondeductible.

Remember to keep good records of your unreimbursed expenses for volunteer work. You can deduct them on the "Contributions" section of Schedule A if you itemize expenses. Under the new tax law, deductions for contributions remain fully deductible.

A complete description of federal tax deductions for volunteers is contained in Publication n526, Income Tax Deduction for Contributions, which is available from the IRS.
