 Today my wife Darlene and I are announcing the filing of a libel suit against the individuals responsible for the anonymous publication known as "The Rest of the Prairie" and the anonymous ad recently published in the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe entitled "S.A.F.E. at W.T.S.U." Darlene and I believe the time has come to stop what has been a well-organized, malicious, and deliberate attempt to destroy me professionally. 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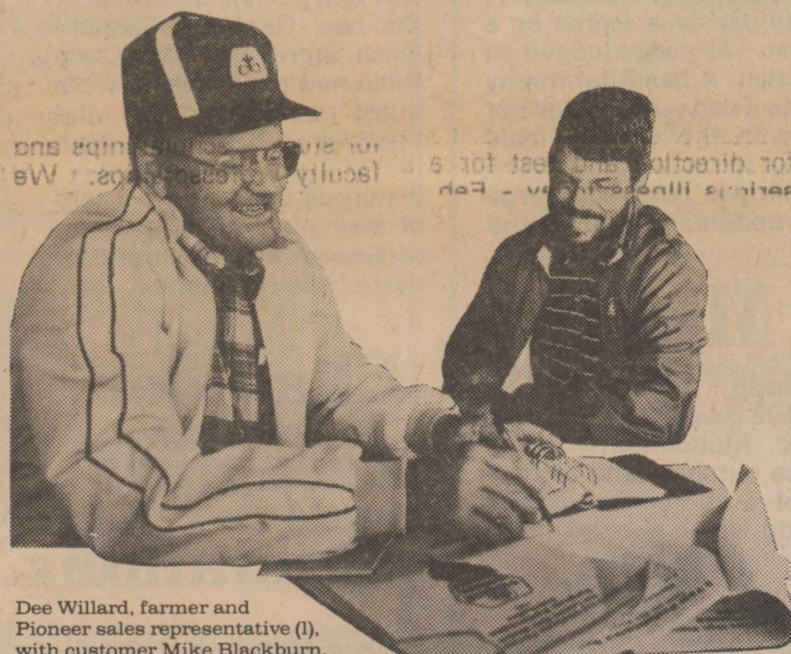

outrageous conduct for the intentional infliction of pain. Darlene and I have rights too, and we are entitled to be treated with honesty and fairness. Our guaranteed freedoms necessarily impose responsibilities. Those exercising freedom of speech and freedom of the press must be willing to step forward to defend their positions, identify themselves and their personal interests, and back up their allegations with facts. By filing this suit, we are giving these anonymous individuals the opportunity to do so.

Let me emphasize one point. We personally will not profit financially from this action. We will give any recovery of damages that may come as a result of this lawsuit to the capital campaign of West Texas State University to be used for student scholarships and faculty professorships. We care about West Texas State University and intend to protect its image.

### Stratford To Go To World

The 1988 "World Games" for gymnasts will be held at the Civic Center in Lubbock, Tex. May 17-22. The games are open to all qualifying competitors of their national federations. Events will be judged in age group divisions; 10 and under, 11-12, 13-14, 15-17, 18 and over (as ages as of Dec. 31, 1988), and in male and female divisions. Events include trampolines, double-minitrampoline, synchro trampoline and power tumbling. Competitors must meet qualifying scores or "passes", in each event, though at least one of three regional qualifiers before the World Games.

It is quite an honor to compete in the World Games and there will be three representatives from Stratford this year! Clint Vincent will be competing in the 11-12 age division, Jenny Carter, in the 13-14, and Heather Carter, in the 15-17 division. They have attended two qualifying meets this year, at Brownfield and at Hobbs, and will compete at the State Meet, in Lubbock, March 13. They train under Tim Hall, at All American Gymnastics, in Amarillo.

Tim will have approximately 43 gymnasts competing in the World Meet, representing the Panhandle Area, Amarillo, Texas and the United States. The competition will be tough! All of Tim's athletes are really working to be ready. It takes dedication to keep up the schedule and a lot of hard work to acquire the ability to advance in gymnastics. Our Stratford kids also have to contend with 3 1/2 hours of travel time added to 2 hours of training, 3-4 afternoons a week, every week. And now they are adding several Saturday sessions to their schedule, to prepare for World. They give up a lot of time with friends and have to manage homework "on the way" to Amarillo each day, because it's late and dark when they come back home. Still, grades have to be kept up and there are other activities to be involved in also.

All athletes from the USA will be competing also for their National Titles, at the World Games. This will actually be two competitions in one.

The Games open with training days and various ceremonies. Training days

are especially important to our USA competitors. All equipment to be used at the World Meet will be European, which translates as faster and "Hotter". It will take some getting used to! There will be 4-5 days of competition and then closing ceremonies and a banquet and dance. New friends will be made from all over the world. There is much to be gained from attending this meet.

All American Gymnastics is supported emotionally by Parents who have formed a non-profit Parent Association. This group will be sponsoring several different ideas for donations to help defray some of the expenses for the competitors. Entry fees will range from \$55-\$70 for each child. Each gymnast must have a USA uniform to participate in the Games-average costs Girls, \$135.00 Boys, \$115.00 Hotel expenses range from \$250-\$325 or more, and food, probably \$15 a day per person, upward, and there are travel expenses. The Association hopes to reimburse all participants for entry fees, (approximately \$2795 total) and to help with uniform costs, (possibly \$5,650 or more.)

If you would care to help in their endeavor, and support our local athletes, please look over these projects: Until March 30, donations of \$1.00, for 1 ticket, \$5.00 for 6, or \$10.00 for 12, will bring a thank you to a happy person, of a \$575 Sidlinger trampoline.
