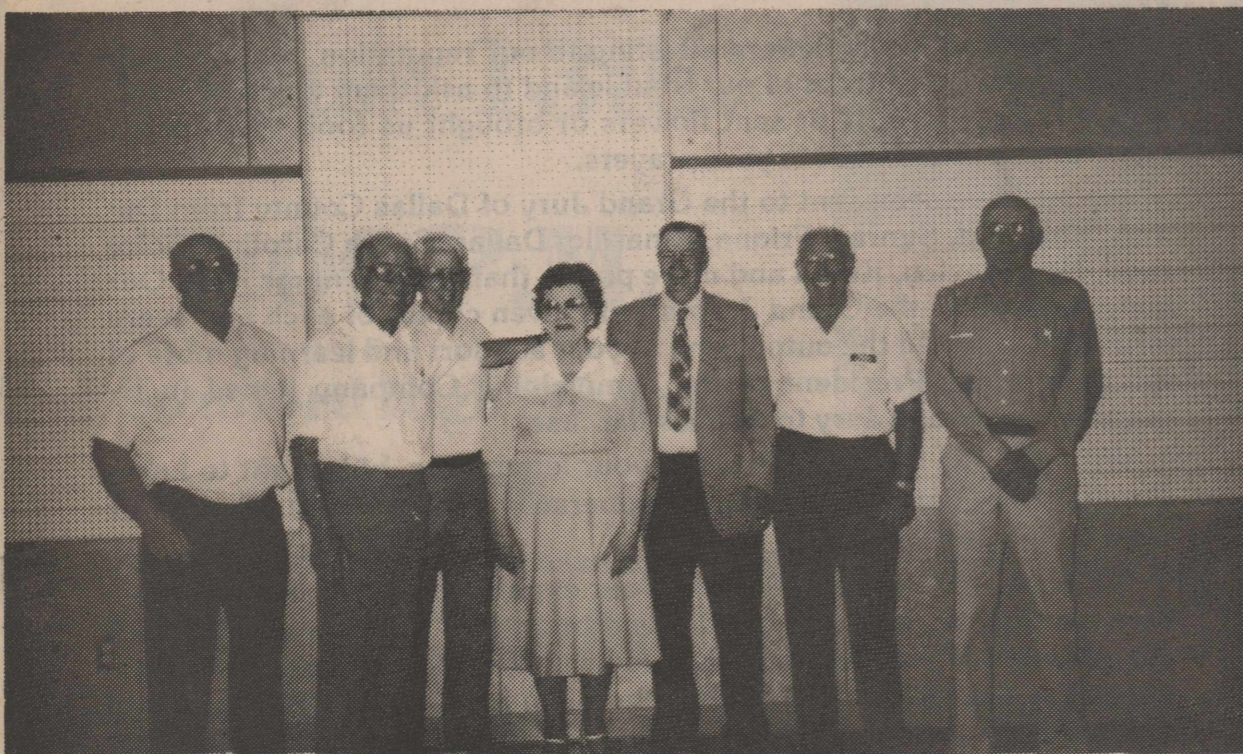

Legal Notice

NOTIFICATION

This notice is being furnished as required of all water systems in the United States by the Environmental Protection Agency in 40 CFR 141.34.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is ~~likely to lower this standard~~ significantly.

Stratford's water is well below acceptable limits for lead and is tested monthly to insure delivery of minimally corrosive water to you. However, tap water may contain higher levels of lead leached from pipes in your home. Some home water treatment devices make water more corrosive and thus can increase the amount of lead leached from your pipes.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short term exposure, is young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest: If your home or water system has lead pipes or if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or if you have soft or acidic water, or if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to 'flush' faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

If the City becomes aware of any source of lead contamination within the City's distribution system, corrective measures will be taken.

ORDINANCE NO. 260

An Ordinance Prohibiting the consumption of alcoholic beverages in, on or immediately adjacent to a motor vehicle in a public place or in a public right of way or parking area; making it unlawful for any person to engage in such action; providing a penalty not exceeding \$200.00 for violation and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, the citizens of the City of Stratford have voiced complaints about the consumption of alcoholic beverages in public areas of the City of Stratford; and WHEREAS, it is readily apparent such behavior creates unnecessary noise and creates a situation that could be dangerous and detrimental to the citizens of the City of Stratford and

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest and welfare to regulate such conduct.

NOW* THEREFORE: Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Stratford:

Section 1. No person shall knowingly or intentionally consume an alcoholic beverage while in, on or in the immediate vicinity of a motor vehicle in a public place, any public right-of-way or public parking area within the city limits of the City of Stratford.

alcoholic beverage, motor vehicle and public place shall have the definitions commonly applied by law.

Section 3. Violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor punishable, upon conviction, by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

Section 4. The provisions of this ordinance are severable. If any portion, phrase or word of it is determined to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any other provision of this ordinance.

Section 5. An emergency in apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government and public safety that requires this ordinance to become effective after its adoption and publication as required by law.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISPOSAL PERMIT AMENDMENT

City of Stratford, P.O. Box 188, Stratford, Texas 79084 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for an amendment to Permit No. 10293-02 to authorize an increase in the volume of treated domestic wastewater effluent authorized for disposal by irrigation at its East Wastewater Treatment Facilities. The disposal volume is to be increased from 21,000 gallons per day average to 200,000 gallons per day average. Effluent storage calculations and design information indicate that existing treatment facilities are capable of treatment and disposal of the increased volume. Approximately 640 acres of farm land are available for irrigation of crops that are not for human consumption. Application rates for the irrigated land are not to exceed 4.2 acre-feet/acre/year. No discharge of pollutants into surface water in the State is authorized by this permit.

The plant site is approximately 1/2 mile southeast of U.S. Highway 54 and 2 1/2 miles northeast of the intersection of U.S. Highways 54 and 287 in the City of Stratford, Sherman County, Texas. The plant site and irrigated land are in the drainage area of Coldwater Creek in the Canadian River Basin.

The Executive director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available.

Our lawyers say that the Grand Jurors were given copies of each and every letter. After seeing the outpouring of your support and learning more of the details, the President of the complaining Company joined in requesting the Grand Jury to dismiss the case.

With the true facts and through your letters, the Jurors got to know General Lee Cranfill -- and have exonerated him and have released us from this nightmare.

We hope that your awareness of our experience will make you be so very careful for yourselves and loved ones. We further hope you will share our story with others so they too will know that, in moments, total control of their lives can be suddenly taken from them and placed into the hands of strangers. Being a citizen of the United States or of our Texas doesn't guard us always.

We know that nowhere on earth is there a place like our home town in West Texas. We are humbled and we are blessed. Each of us is a better person because of your loving response to our call. We thank Our Lord for having each of you. Please know that if any of you ever needs a friend, we are here. We thank you from the depths of our hearts. May God bless each of you.

Johnny Ray Watson, who was suppose to be here with Green, will be unable to come at this time.

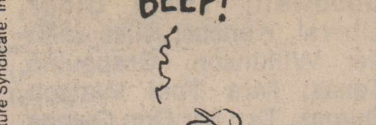

State Funds Cut Back

The Dallam - Hartley - Sherman Foundation, along with Buckner Baptist Children's Home, has been operating the Dalhart Foster Group Home since July 8, 1980. The principle purpose of this home was to provide care for underprivileged children. This has been done successfully for the past eight years, but as a result of state cut backs and redefinitions in the Department of Human Services, the home has been unable to maintain its population.

Buckner Baptist Children's Home has decided to terminate their involvement with this home. The Dallam-Hartley-Sherman Foundation has unanimously voted to start the new program, OPIONS, which is to be operated by our foundations.

This stands for "Offering Parenting Teen and Infants Opportunities to Nurture Successfully."

The Foundation will deal with the problem of lack of housing and of education for these young women by operating a teaching home for them. There is only one other similar home in the

State of Texas. As of now, the Foundation is working on getting grant monies for this. We hope to have the home re-opened in the very near future.

"THE SON OF MAN"

It is a very significant thing that Jesus had one favorite title for Himself, 'the Son of Man.' It is used over 80 times in the New Testament and yet the Evangelists themselves never use it if Jesus, nor does anyone ever address Him by that name. The title emphasized His humanity; the Gospel writers wanted to stress his divinity. The Son of Man was and is the most radiant, vivid, powerful, humble personality, so gloriously alive, so perfectly happy for every man. In Him all the possibilities of manhood were gathered together.

We must guard ourselves from any mistaken idea that this constitutes a denial of divinity. For too long we have set the ideas of divinity and humanity over against one another in separate categories, and felt that what we allowed to the one we must subtract from the other.

Man was made in the image of God, Man is the tabernacle of God. We are sons of God by adoption, the children of God; man has a divine nature. All this sounds too good to be true. Why? Because we know man in his fallen nature and he seems to be more the son of satan than the son of God. A Born-Again Christian has the nature of the Divine. Jesus did not say this is "What God can do, but man cannot". He says, "This is what God meant man to be and to do." "He that believeth in Me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do." And "ye therefore shall be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect."

Jesus, by His insistence on His own perfect humanity, is saying to us, 'This is what I made of human life. This is what you can make of it. I fought the battle and won, with no other weapons than those which are still available for you.'

FUNDS AVAILABILITY:

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT ENDORSEMENTS AND CHECK PRINTING.

Recently, the Federal Reserve Board adopted Regulation CC which implements the Funds Availability Act as adopted by the U.S. Congress in 1987. In order to reduce the risks to financial institutions and to you for bad checks and other returned items, the Regulation includes rules to speed collection and return of checks. The Regulation, effective September 1, 1988, will also set new standards for endorsement.

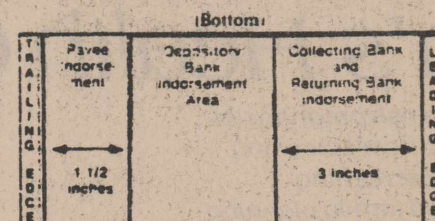
HOW DO THESE RULES AFFECT YOU?

When a check is accepted for deposit, the financial institution requires the payee on the check to endorse it. This endorsement should always be found in an area 1 1/2 inches from the trailing edge of the check. (see example)

Other areas on the back of the check are designated for endorsements by the depository institution. YOU, AS A PAYEE ON A CHECK, MUST ENDORSE THE SPECIFIED AREA SO AS TO AVOID MAKING THE BANK ENDORSEMENTS UNREADABLE. Under certain circumstances, a financial institution may pass liability on to you if a check is returned late due to the unreadability of the endorsement of another financial institution.

Everyone will benefit from the faster return of checks if everyone protects the identifiability and legibility of endorsements by staying clear of the area reserved for us and collecting banks.
