This notice is being furnished as required of all water systems in the United States by the Environmental Protection Agency in 40 CFR 141.34.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is "fikely to now er this standard significantly.

Stratford's water is well below acceptable limits for lead and is tested monthly to insure delivery of minimally corrosive water to you. However, tap water may contain higher levels of lead leached from pipes in your home. Some home water treatment devices make water more corrosive and thus can increase the amount of lead leached from your pipes.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the

potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short term exposure, is young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest: If your home or water system has lead pipes or if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or if you have soft or acidic water, or if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to 'flush' faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to



Section 3. Violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor punishable, upon conviction, by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

Section 4. The provisions of this ordinance are severable. If any portion, phrase or word of it is determined to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any other provision of this ordinance.

NOTICE OF **PUBLIC HEARING ON APPLICATION FOR** WASTE DISPOSAL PERMIT AMENDMENT

City of Stratford, P.O. Box 188, Stratford, Texas 79084 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for an amendment to Permit No. 10293-02 to authorize an increase in the volume of treated domestic wastewater effluent authorized for disposal by irrigation at its East Wastewater Treatment Facilities. The disposal volume is to be increased from 21,000 gallons per day average to 200,000 gallons per day average. Effluent storage calculations and design information indicate that existing treatment facilities are capable of treatment and disposal of the increased volume. Approximately 640 acres of farm land are available for irrigation of crops that are not for human consumption. Application rates for the irrigated land are not to exceed 4.2 acre-feet/acre/ year. No discharge of pollutants into surface water in the State is authorized by this permit.

The plant site is approximately 1/2 mile southeast of U.S. Highway 54 and 21/2 miles northeast of the intersection of U.S. Highways 54 and 287 in the City of Stratford, Sherman County, Texas. The plant site and irrigated land are in the drainage area of Coldwater Creek in the Canadian River Basin.

The Executive director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available,

Our lawyers say that the Grand Jurors were given copies of each and every letter. After seeing the outpouring of your support and learning more of the details, the President of the complaining Company joined in requesting the Grand Jury to dismiss the case.

With the true facts and through your letters, the Jurors got to know General Lee Cranfill --- and have exonerated him and have released us from this nightmare.

We hope that your awareness of our experience will make you be so very careful for yourselves and loved ones. We further hope you will share our story with others so they too will know that, in moments, total control of their lives can be suddenly taken from them and placed into the hands of strangers. Being a citizen of the United States or of our Texas doesn't guard us always.

We know that nowhere on earth is there a place like our home town in West Texas. We are humbled and we are blessed. Each of us is a better person because of your loving response to our call. We thank Our Lord for having each of you. Please know that if any of you ever needs a friend, we are here. We thank you from the depths of our hearts. May God bless each of vou.







Recently, the Federal Reserve Board adopted Regulation CC which implements the Funds Availability Act as adopted by the U.S. Congress in 1987. In order to reduce the risks to financial institutions and to you for bad checks and other returned items, the Regulation includes rules to speed collection and return of checks. The Regulation, effective September 1, 1988, will also set new standards for endorsement.

HOW DO THESE RULES AFFECT YOU?


When a check is accepted for deposit, the financial instituion requires the payee on the check to endorse it. This endorsement should always be found in an area 1 1/2 inches from the trailing edge of the check. (see example)

Other areas on the back of the check are designated for endorsements by the depository institution. YOU, AS A PAYEE ON A CHECK, MUST ENDORSE THE SPECIFIED AREA SO AS TO AVOID MAKING THE BANK ENDORSEMENTS UNREADABLE. Under certain circumstances, a financial institution may pass liability on to you if a check is returned late due to the unreadability of the endorsement of another financial institution.

Everyone will benefit from the faster return of checks if everyone protects the identifiability and legibility of endorsements by staying clear of the area reserved for us and collecting banks.






