

Leland gave many exhausting hours to teach a paramedic class which included 3 paramedics from Dumas.

Leland Lewis was presented with the Kay Caster,

Educator of the year Award. Leland has been extremely busy in the fisical year of 1985 and 1986 teaching and helping teach EMT's EMT-Special Skills, and EMT Paramedics in this year. Leland also has taught numerous Life Support Class, A Pharmacology Class, An EKG Recognition class, and helped teach 2 Pre-hospital Trauma Life Support Classes in Amarillo. In addition Leland has helped test skills for classes in Spearman, Dalhart, and Dumas. Leland has also chaired a committee that restructered the EMT-Special Skills curriculum, and that curriculum is now being taught in 3 EMT-SS classes throughout the panhandle.

Leland states that this award has a very special meaning to him. The man, Kay Caster, in whose name it is presented was in the paramedic class in 1980 with Leland. Kay Caster was a very meticulous man and a man who continually tried to upgrade the volunteer ambulance service in Claude, Texas. Kay died in 1985 with a massive heart attack at the age of 42.
