## Shelter Plan Survey Is Completed; Pamphlets To Be Distributed Soon

E. S. Holliday, Regional Field Officer, Department of Army, office of Civil Defense, Denton, announced Tuesday that the survey of structures and storm cellars in Haskell County which would offer protection from fallout, has been completed and has been approved by the Commissioners' Court, all mayors in Haskell county and by the National Office.

Holliday said that application has been filed for federal funds for printing and distribution of pamphlets of the community shelter plan which will include instructions and advice for residents of the county on how to improve the protection existing in homes, and action which can be taken to do this in a crisis period.

Purpose of the Community Shelter Plan is to develop a plan to tell the residents of Haskell County "where to go" and "what to do" in the event this country is attacked with nuclear weapons.

The middle of January and was approved by the commissioners court and mayors of the county.

As soon as the compiled report is printed, the pamphlets will be distributed over the county by mail and by personal delivery.

Cost of the survey, the printing and distribution of the pamphlets will be provided by the Federal government.

## Firemen Shift Into High Gear Friday Afternoon

Haskell Volunteer Firemen were busy as cranberry merchants at Thanksgiving time, Friday afternoon, when they answered three calls, two coming at the same time.

At 2:20 p. m., one truck headed to the north part of town to 1101 Avenue D, when a grass fire whipped out of control and burned a storage house and contents belonging to C. W. McKelvin. Also at the same time another truck went roaring to 307 South Avenue D to extinguish a grass fire at the J. A. Wimberly place.

McKelvin said he lost some truck and plow tires, grease guns, and other items in the storage building.

No damage was reported at Wimberly's. Mrs. Wimberly said the grass fire started in the southeast corner of the yard.

Around 4:00 p. m. firemen made a run to the southeast section of town to the Stella Bartley place. No damage was reported.

## Firemen Fight Stubborn Grass And Brush Fire

Members of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department fought a raging grass and brush fire south of town for three hours on Wednesday of last week before bringing it under control. Firemen answered the call at 5:00 p. m. and it was around 8:00 p. m. when the trucks pulled back into town.

The fire swept a 3-mile strip in length and up to a half mile wide in places, along the Fort Worth and Denver right-of-way, and on land owned by Jim Free, Jim Strain and Fred Gilliam.

"A large number of fence posts, cross ties, and telephone poles were destroyed," Fire Chief Tom Watson said.

"It was a tough fire to fight," a spokesman of the fire department said, "because of the rugged terrain."

Supposedly the blaze originated from sparks from a passing freight train.

## Haskell Firemen Play Return Engagement!

Haskell Volunteer Fire Department members played a "return engagement" last Thursday afternoon at 2:00 p. m. when they answered a call to extinguish the remains of the E. R. Lowe barn just south of the Haskell Auction Company.

The barn and 60 bales of hay went up in smoke on Saturday afternoon, February 25. The hull of the building was left standing, but it was enough to cause another "pretty fair" blaze again Thursday afternoon.

A last minute flurry of political excitement stirred Haskell, Friday, on the eve of the deadline for filing for a place on the ballot in the April 4th city election, as Billy Jack Ray announced his candidacy for mayor, and W. O. (Bill) Holden for councilman.

Previously filed as candidates for councilmen were Eldon Anderson, owner-operator of Anderson Tire Company, and incumbent John Thomas, farmer. Horace V. Woodard, owner-operator of Woodard Farm Sales, was the first candidate to file in the upcoming city election. Mr. Woodard announced a couple of weeks ago that he was making a bid for his first elective term as mayor, having been appointed to that position in July of 1966.

Billy Jack Ray, a newcomer to politics, is a cashier and warehouseman for J. E. Walling Humble Oil Company. Ray has lived in Haskell all of his life except for time spent in the service. He has been active in the Jaycees, having served as president of that organization and past state director of the Jaycees. He is past commander of the American Legion, member of the Church of Christ and member of the fire department.

W. O. Holden, owner-operator of Holden Funeral Home, is seeking a seat on the city's governing body as councilman and has been a resident of Haskell 40 years. He is a member of the Methodist Church, Masonic and IOOF lodges. Lions Club, past president of the Chamber of Commerce, served on the school board for 16 years, served as city and county Cancer Crusade chairman, and has been active in civic affairs.

The following facts on Rubinfoff were written especially for the Free Press by Si Steinhauer, Radio Editor of the Pittsburgh Press for almost twenty years.

Rubinfoff and his violin are synonymous with Pittsburgh. As a newswriter in his hometown, he was literally kicked off the platform of a railroad station by a policeman. That day he vowed he'd make policemen escort him through great cities. His violin has done the trick. Rubinfoff has had police motorcycle escorts through New York and cities from that size down. Frequently he doubled on a theatre stage and had to be rushed to radio stations and back to houses, to keep split-second schedules.

"Through all these years on the road of stardom, I have known Rubinfoff and have marveled at his versatility. He can do any clowning trick that can be done with a violin. He can make a violin talk. In another mood, he can perform dynamic composition, requiring great emotion and deepest feeling. I have seen him turn pale and step into another world as he raised his baton to perform such a number.

"I have watched Rubinfoff rehearse his symphonic orchestra in sections... he was the first to do that... working for days on a single section, then at the end of the week, bringing all sections together for a smooth working dress rehearsal.

"Once I suggested that he listen to the first recording of a certain popular tune. He wasn't in the mood. We retired and the next morning at four o'clock, he came to my room and ordered me out of bed to hear him play a violin obligato to the record. I refused to get up so he slipped the drawer of ice cubes under my covers and got me out of bed. That tune became one of his greatest overtures."

## Lions Hear Facts About Racial Problems

"The Racial problem is linked with poverty and it will be a long, long time before it is settled. Pastor Al Johannes, of the Trinity Lutheran Church, told members of the Lions Club at the Tuesday noon-day luncheon meeting at Felker's Restaurant.

Royce Adkins was in charge of the program and introduced the guest speaker.

Using as the title of his talk, "Racial Problems, Nationally and Locally," Pastor Johannes said: "The Negro has been used so much, he knows no other life. Even in Haskell we have many people as leeches on the Negro, as the colored people are forced to live in poor housing areas and they are given the hardest and dirtiest jobs."

"The Negro may have aspirations, but the conditions in which he is forced to live, takes a lot of the incentive out of him," Johannes said.

"We are not going to be able to solve the racial problem until we learn to love people despite their race, color, creed or station in life," the guest speaker said.

Boy Scout Troop 35 held their regular weekly meeting Wednesday night with about 25 members present and five visitors from Troop 36. After the business session three contests were held, in boxing, wall scaling and string burning. In the boxing elimination contest the following Scouts were winners in the various divisions: Heavyweight champion, Lawrence Carr; middleweight Roy Frier; flyweight, Roy McClintock.

Dr. T. W. Williams was re-elected president and Ralph E. Duncan, secretary of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce for the ensuing year. The incorporators of the company are J. L. Jones, Geo. S. Link, J. W. Kelley, S. M. Davis and W. A. Earnest, and the authorized capital stock of \$50,000. The charter includes in its purposes the erection and operation of a cotton seed oil mill, a cotton gin, manufacture of ice, electric heat, heat and motor power and a water works system.

being one of the old settlers, he was surprised and pleased to see the magnitude of the change and improvement that had taken place in the town in that short time.

travelers left San Antonio and stopped in Johnson City where

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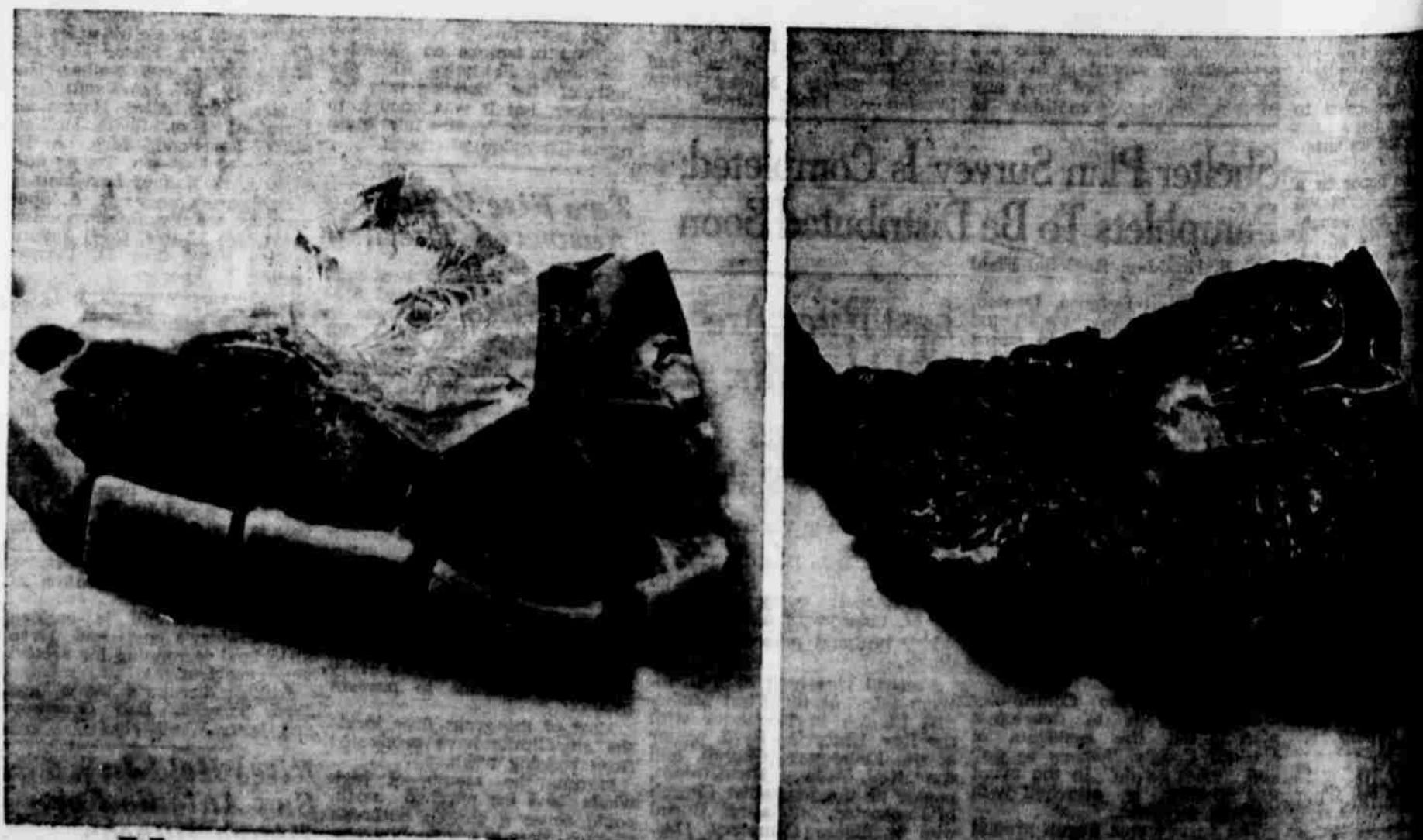
