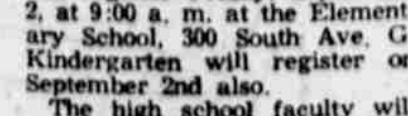

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

"(b) Statutory provisions enacted before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, relating to the terms of office of governing bodies of political subdivisions created to further the

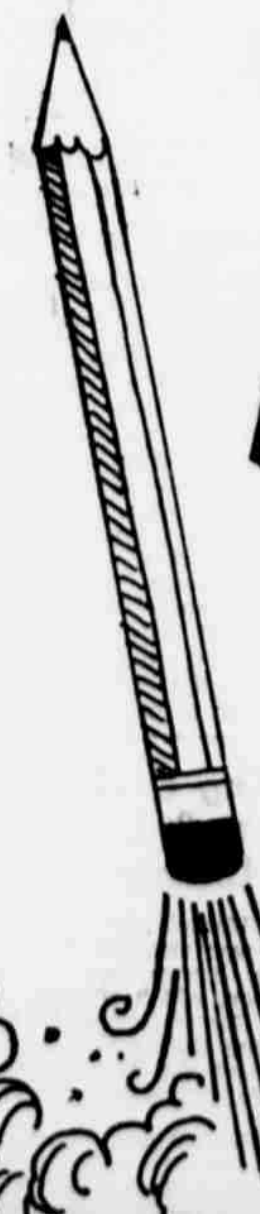

Q. My doctor says I need a certain kind of hospital bed to sleep in at home. I can rent such a bed or I can buy one. Will the medical insurance plan cover the purchase of the bed?
A. No. The medical insurance plan covers only the rental of equipment that your doctor says is needed for your treatment at home.
Q. I am nearing 65 and in poor health. Will I have to pass a physical examination to be covered under medicare?
A. Definitely not. Regardless of your health, you will be eligible for participation in both the hospital insurance plan and the voluntary medical insurance plan.
Q. I will reach 65 in December of this year and I want the doctor bill insurance under medicare as well as the hospital insurance protection, but I don't intend to retire until a year or two from now. What should I do?
A. You have seven months—September 1966 through March 1967—to apply for the medical insurance to supplement your basic hospital insurance with protection for the cost of doctor bills and certain other medical services. But if you want your doctor bill insurance to start as soon as you reach 65, you must apply in one of the three months before the month of your 65th birthday. If you wait until the month of your birthday or the following 3 months, there will be a delay of from 1 to 3 months in the start of your protection. When you go to your social security office, you should apply for your monthly cash social security benefits, too—even if you don't plan to retire for a while. That way, the benefit checks can start as soon as you notify the social security office that you have stopped working. And if you should get laid up at home or in the hospital for a period of time, you will have your social security benefit checks coming in, in addition to medicare's help with your hospital and doctor bills.

Hunt Bonanza Readied For Texas Sports

The most comprehensive wildlife harvest plans in Texas history have been mapped almost in their entirety by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. From now on its strictly up to the weather to maintain the number of birds and animals calculated as available for the fall hunts.

The 1966 big game season has expanded opportunities for the sportsmen, and scatter gunners may look ahead to normally generous or expanded quail and dove hunting.

Waterfowl enthusiasts will have a second straight warmup through an experimental late September teal hunt. Final decision on the duck and goose season cannot be made until late August to climax conferences on the regional and national level.

The "luxury bracket" seasons—white-winged doves in the Rio Grande Valley and antelope in the Trans-Pecos, Panhandle, Permian Basin and limited other areas—are set, with extra trimmings for the whitewings.

Even the trophy hunting elite will have their day through the special conducted harvest of surplus Aoudad sheep in the Palo Duro Canyon country.

The usual provisions are made for the patient nimrod who likes his wild meat in small quantities. That would be the squirrel hunter, particularly in areas of East Texas where the hunting pressure on the bushy tails requires harvest regulations. Some areas, minus herds of the sophisticated small game hunter, still have an open season on squirrels the year around.

The fall seasons have been itemized on the basis of field studies and counsel with landowners and sportsmen, in the 184 counties over which the Commission has regulatory responsibility. The other counties function under Legislative determination of seasons, bag limits and other provisions.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural

use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.

(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as to agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.

(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

(e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.

(f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section. If designated land is subsequently diverted to a purpose other than that of agricultural use, or is sold, the land shall be subject to an additional

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATIONS

... to finance industrial growth

Competition between states and cities to improve their competitive abilities to attract new payrolls has increased the forming of Industrial Foundations in Texas. Many industries want and need someone else to own the land, brick and mortar, keeping the money available for plant operations. Industrial Foundations indicate the interest and desire of a community for new industry. Local citizens who participate usually figure that they get a return on their money in a Foundation by having an additional page circulating in their community.

— PURPOSE — is to give a community a corporate entity to assist industry to create jobs within the community — can be an existing industry as well as a new one. Foundations usually assist industry that cannot or will not use normal commercial financial institutions.

— EXTENT OF ACTIVITIES — usually are to acquire and develop industrial property . . . construct buildings for lease . . . provide funds for training workers . . . purchase machinery and equipment . . . prepare promotional material and prospecting expenses and any other function that would give the community a competitive advantage for a new payroll.

— ORGANIZATION — is usually by a group of businessmen who are interested in the economic growth and development of their community. A local attorney should prepare the application for the charter and by-laws in order to conform to state laws and internal revenue service regulations. The local bankers' support is very helpful in forming an Industrial Foundation.

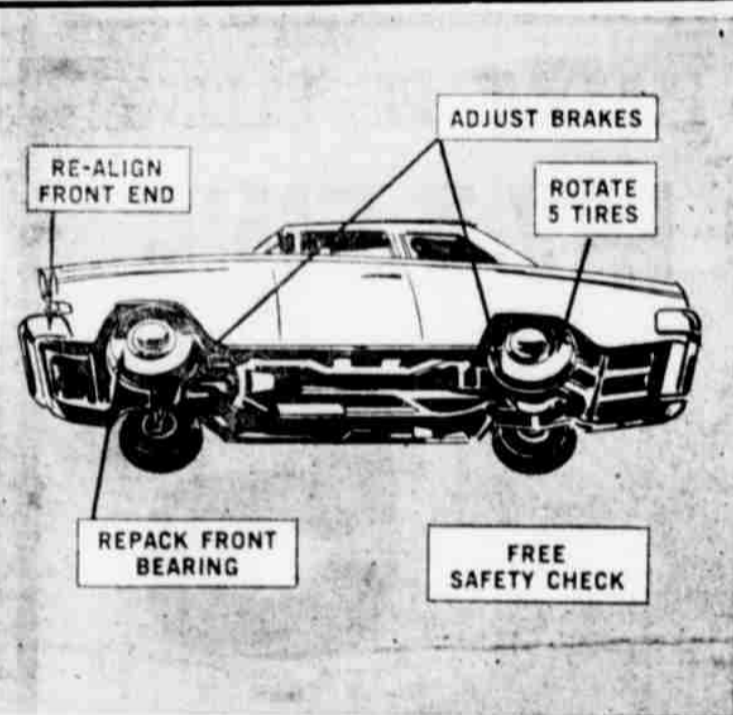
— TYPE — of Industrial Foundations vary — profit or non-profit — stock or contributions — the type a town needs depends upon the attitude and characteristics of the local people and its competitive position with other towns to attract new manufacturing payrolls. In most cases, Industrial Foundations are only used to assist industries where labor cost is a big factor in the operation, as the payroll provided is the important thing to the economy of the community.

These crashes resulted in ten persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$7,050.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1966 shows a total of 45 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 27 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$24,062.00.

Questions And Answers-Federal Tax Matters

(This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—How long do you have to check someone's income tax return?

A—The basic statute of limitations for assessment of income tax is three years from the later of the date the return was filed or the date the return was due. In some cases the period is longer. When there is fraud or failure to file a return, there is no limitation.

Q—I lost my refund check. What can I do?

A—Report it to your local IRS office. They will give you the forms to use in certifying the loss and making a claim for another check.
