Nichols of Freese, Nichols and Endress, Fort Worth, might explain some of the things required by these area towns in order to get a \$1,600,000 grant from the Community Facilities Administration to provide an approved municipal water supply to the four-member towns for the construction of pipe facilities and filtration plant. "Justification for the project," Mr. Patterson said, "is due to extensive irrigation in the area and a sharp rise in pollution. If the reservoir can be built it will serve the whole area and assure a water supply for future generations. Oil well pollution has caused a number of water wells to be abandoned and our water table is being rapidly depleted. The underground water supply that now serves the towns of this area is not approved by the State De-partment of Health, and there is no chance to expand or develop this area unless there is assurance of good water. One of our county health doctors advised that our water is such that will produce 'blue babies' and does not recommend the use of it for expectant mothers

"The project has unlimited potential and would start development of the area and enhance industry." Mr. Patterson
