Future Farmers of America Week

Future Farmers of America Week is to be observed during the February 19-26 period. And the theme that has been chosen for it... "Agriculture Is More Than Farming," admirably points up the week's purpose and significance.

There is a term, "Agri-Business," which often is used in reference to all the occupations that are related to farming. The chain of agriculture starts with the suppliers to farmers... those who provide goods and services ranging from machinery and chemicals to insurance and technical services. Farmers, the producers of raw materials, are the center link. Then come marketing, processing, transportation and distribution. All in all, this agricultural complex employs many millions of people and is America's largest industry.

Vocational agricultural education in the high schools provides a start for boys to obtain the training needed to enter these occupations. Some will go on to college or technical schools. About a third will return directly to the farm, and they will have the knowledge that additional education is available to them in young farmer and adult farmer classes conducted by teachers of vocational agriculture.

The Future Farmers' organization supplements the regular school instruction by providing opportunities for leadership development. Its goal is to help train young men for a wide horizon of agricultural occupations. And this is a needed and invaluable work.

NEW WORD NEEDED?

We read a lot about inflation. Figures and arguments are presented by economists on both sides of the issue to prove inflation is or is not on its way.

Government debt and continuous government spending beyond its income are admittedly a basic cause of inflation. As inflation progresses, the declining value of money leads to increased cost of production which includes all the elements that go into a product, from a spool of thread or a rivet, to wages.

It does not take a college economist to know that the old 5c cup of coffee is now 10c or more than the two-bit piece of pie is disappearing in favor of 30 or 35 cents, depending on where you eat. Most of the necessities of life have followed the same pattern. And if you really want a sample of inflation, check on the increase in college tuitions.

It is true that increased wages for millions have offset this rise for them, but it is also true that other millions who have fixed incomes from pensions or savings are hard hit.

Even the economists have to admit that the dollar is now worth less than 50c in purchasing power compared with a few short years ago.

As the big tax eaters and those on the gravy train get more, millions living on fixed incomes, with deflated dollars, will get less and less.

Maybe a new word can be coined for inflation that will make it less palatable until it can no longer be digested.

OIL NOTES

Two wildcat re-entry projects are slated for Haskell County and a regular field location was filed for Jones County.

Burk Royalty Co., of Wichita Falls, filed the two re-entry applications, both 7 miles southwest of Haskell and each to go to 5,000 feet with rotary tools.

No. 1 Douthit was drilled originally as Hack Drilling Co. No. 1 C. A. Douthit and was plugged and abandoned March 22, 1952, at a total depth of 5,570 feet. Burk plans to re-enter and clean out to 5,000 ft. to test Burson sand.

No. 1 Douthit spots 3,762 ft.

from south and 5,500 feet from west lines of M. Dunn survey 64. A-120 (3,762 ft. from south and 467 ft. from west lines of 640-acre lease.)

No. 1-H Tipton is the other Burk project and is 467 feet from south and 9,300 ft. from west lines of the same survey and abstract. It is 467 ft. from the south and west lines of 180-acre lease.

It was drilled originally as the Wayne Petroleum Co. No. 1 M. L. Tipton and was plugged and abandoned July 21, 1955, at a total depth of 5,306 ft.

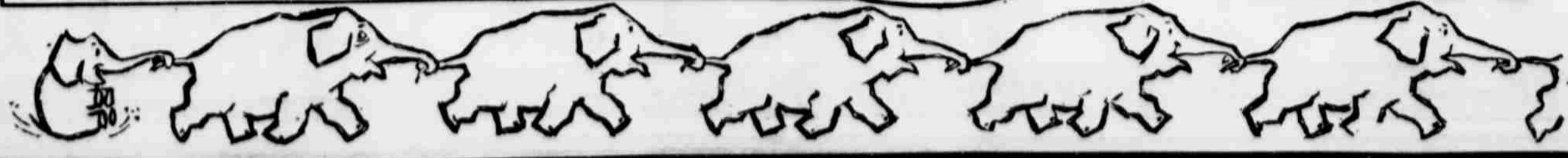

The Good Earth

When trees are bought and weather will not permit planting them, rap the roots in burlap and keep it damp. Never allow roots to dry out. One can also bank trees in damp soil until they can be put into the ground.

If trees are no larger than an inch and a half to two inches in diameter, they can be pruned most any time. But larger trees should always be pruned in the winter when the sap is down.

Prune grapes in late February. All old wood should be cut away. Train the vines on trellises or wires.

Prune roses just before spring arrives. It is wise to never prune less than 12 inches from the ground in West Texas. Then

should a hard freeze come after the roses have put out, nature always provides a few reserve buds near the base of the plant. If roses are pruned too close, all buds come out at once and a hard freeze will often kill the whole bush.

When the hedge becomes unsightly, cut it back to within a few inches of the ground. Soon a strong healthy hedge will be your reward.

Be sure to have lots of plants ready for the spring garden. A good rule to go by is to plant one for the worms, one for the insects and one for the row. And in this country it is good to double the seed bed because of hail.

Maybe after a wet winter, we will not have hail as bad this year. Let's hope.

Haskell Garden Club plans on planting as many trees, shrubs and flowers this year as we can find space for.

I wish that every one in Haskell who has the space would plant at least one tree or shrub this year. If we all try, Haskell can be one of the most attractive towns in West Texas.

We hope to plant four fruitless mulberries this year. Although mulberry trees are shallow feeders, their good points outweigh their bad points. They are about the fastest growing tree I can think of. No shade is denser than that of the fruitless mulberry.

Do not forget to visit the nurseries and drink in the beauty of their flowers. One gets a great lift of spirit from such a visit. Soon the "Good Earth" will blossom once more.

Haskell High School Will Administer National Scholarship Qualifying Tests

W. P. McCollum, principal, announced today that Haskell High School will administer the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) to about 35 students at 9:00 a. m. Tuesday, March 1.

The NMSQT, a two and one-half hour test of educational development, is the first step in the twelfth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships. Students who wish to be considered for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1967 must take the NMSQT on this date.

All students' scores will be reported to their schools before May 15 together with interpretive and guidance materials for schools and students. About 14,000 semi-finalists, the highest scores in each state, will be announced publicly on September 22, 1966. The names of semi-finalists will be sent to colleges and organizations offering financial aid to undergraduates. In October approximately 38,000 students who score just below

the level required of semi-finalists will receive letters of commendation for their high performance, although they will not be eligible to compete for Merit Scholarships.

Each semi-finalist will be required to substantiate his NMSQT performance on a second examination and submit certain biographical information in order to become a finalist in the competition. Only finalists are eligible to be considered for the Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC and sponsors. Every finalist will be awarded a Certificate of Merit for his outstanding performance in the 1966-67 Merit Program.

Finalists who win Merit Scholarships will be selected on the basis of school records and recommendations, test scores, extracurricular activities, leadership ability and accomplishments outside the classroom. The awards range from \$100 to \$1500 per year according to the student's needs. 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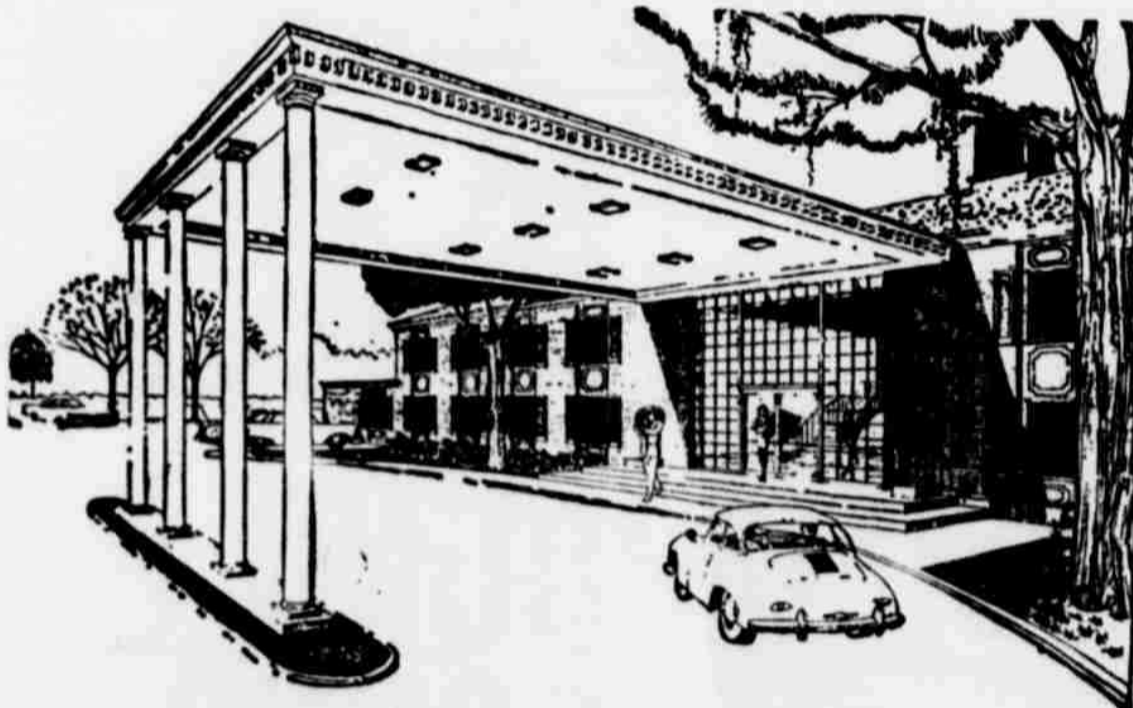

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FEB. 19-26 PROCLAIMED FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA WEEK

Since the Future Farmers of America organization is playing an outstanding role in assuring the future progress and prosperity of Texas and the Nation, Governor John Connally has

proclaimed February 19-26 as Future Farmers of America Week in Texas.

The Future Farmers of America organization is in its 37th year in Texas. There are 48,382 members studying vocational agriculture in 864 high schools in Texas. In these vocational agriculture classes, students are provided an opportunity to secure technical and scientific training in agriculture as well as to receive training in leadership, citizenship and cooperation.

Texas membership has grown from 28,643 in 1950 to 48,382 in 1965. The largest growth came this year, partly as a result of total school integration. In a recent study conducted by Mr. George Hurt, State Director of Vocational Agriculture, it was found that over 60 per cent of the vocational agriculture students who graduated from high school last year and were available for employment are now in full-time farming or in agricultural related occupations. Over 40 per cent of this number are in full-time farming.

The theme this year for the FFA is: "Agriculture is more than Farming," and it certainly is. It involves those who process and distribute many agricultural goods. Many people are employed in agricultural occupations such as engineers, scientists, management personnel, sales and service personnel and educators. Also there are over 60,000 desirable openings each year for farm operators, farm engineers and full-time hired farm labor.

Vocational agriculture and the FFA are striving to provide a sound and a continuing education to help produce the leaders and work force so direly needed in our nation's agriculture industry.
