Haskell County Allotted 24 Pounds Cotton To The Established Yield

The following information was received by the Free Press via telegram Friday morning from Congressman Omar Burlison. "Pleased to announce State ASC Committee has allotted to Haskell County 24 additional pounds of cotton to established yield."

Lloyd Feemster, local ASC office manager said the increase will mean over \$300,000 to Haskell County.

Mr. Feemster said that the actual method of determining as to how it will be distributed to individual farms has not been made and would probably be at least 10 days or two weeks as to how distribution would be made to individual farms.

"Producers are encouraged to come in and sign-up," as the deadline date is fast approaching," Feemster said.

"Try to control high blood pressure, watch diet, keep your weight normal, keep physically fit and have regular check-ups," are things we can do to control heart disease," Mrs. Paul Cargill of Wichita Falls, Regional Director of the Heart Association, told members of the Haskell Lions Club at the Tuesday noon-day luncheon meeting.

Rev. J. V. Patterson, pastor of the First Methodist Church, was in charge of the program.

"Although we have made great advances, heart disease is still the number one killer," Mrs. Cargill said. She also showed a film explaining the causes of heart disease, and told of the progress made through the Heart Association, which is a volunteer program.

Better Than Quarter-Inch Rain, Saturday

A strong north wind whipped into Haskell Saturday morning, met head-on with a warm front and opened up overcast skies which dumped .27 of an inch of rain here, according to Sam Herren, "The Weatherman."

This was a "pretty fair" starter as this was the most moisture Haskell had received since October of 1966. Only .20 of an inch fell in November; .08 in December and .02 in January.

Americans Spent More For Food During Past Year
About \$26 more per person was spent in this country last year than in 1965, the U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates.

Food expenses in 1966 averaged around \$465 for each American, with higher retail food prices (up 4 1/2% to 5%) accounting for most of the increase. More people and bigger appetites accounted for the rest.

But the percentage of income that Americans paid for food last year (18.2%) remained unchanged from 1965. The department predicts it will decline slightly in 1967, in keeping with a recent trend. In 1968, for example, 21% of income was spent for food.

The Good Earth By Mrs. B. F. Cobb

We went to Fort Worth last Wednesday. It has been years since we have made a trip at this time of year and not seen fields of green wheat. Until we came close to Fort Worth all the fields of grain looked brown as though they were dead. There has been some moisture in and around the vicinity and the grain is pretty and green.

We came back through Weatherford and visited the Farmers Market there. It is very interesting to see the rows of fresh vegetables, peanuts and citrus fruit. If it had not been for the temperature we could well have thought it spring. There were huge baskets of fresh peanuts and lots of fresh, green beans, cabbage, collards, lettuce, mustard and tomatoes. The tomatoes came from local hot houses.

One thing I noticed in particular was the way they prune peach trees around Weatherford. They were cut off perfectly flat until they looked like pound tables. Anyone, even children, could pick fruit from the trees. They are trimmed to about the height of an ordinary man.

We came back by Hordis creek and on to the roadside park near Woodson, located on the Brazos river. We walked down to the river's edge and watched minnows and perch swimming around in the water, a red-headed woodpecker kept up his constant drilling for worms, without any thought of us disturbing him. Then I discovered late winds had thrashed lots of pecans. I could not help but gather a few although we have plenty at home from our trees. I've always been a child when it comes to picking up pecans, there is something about this pastime that fascinates me.

I enjoyed communing with nature and marveling that such huge trees as oak, elm, back-berry and pecan could spring from such small seed. If one has any doubt about God they should study the miracle of the seed and their faith would be restored, for this is one thing that man cannot do, even tho' he has tried for years.

Nurseries are still full of fruit trees and shrubs of every kind. Easter lilies and hydrangea are in pots growing for Easter, bedding plants are already up in the nurseries and will be ready to set in the ground by planting time. Do not let weather keep you from planting a favorite tree or shrub. It will surely rain, if it does not there will surely be a long dry spell.

Haskell Garden Club members are going ahead with their planting schedule in spite of the drought. Remember every cloud has a silver lining.

Colorful 1967 State Highway Map Pictures Texas As Land of Fun-Tier

Six new public lakes, 819 miles of new highways and 18 new safety rest areas make their appearance for the first time on the Texas Highway Department's colorful State Highway Map.

Before the year is out, about one million copies of the map will be distributed throughout the world, inviting Texan and out-of-state visitor alike to "Discover Texas, America's Fun-Tier."

All the new lakes are accessible to the public via the 67,000-mile Texas highway system. Largest of the new reservoirs is Lake Meredith on the Canadian River in the Panhandle. Others are Lake Arrowhead, Fin Creek Reservoir, White River Lake, Bardwell and Sommerville Reservoirs.

The new map shows 115 additional miles of Interstate highways, added since last year. More than 1,700 miles of these superb new highways are in

area of the State. For the convenience of the traveler, the face of the map contains a handy mileage table, inset maps showing principal streets in larger cities, and listings of State parks, Texas Highway Department Tourist Bureaus and highway patrol offices.

Texas motorists may order the 1967 Official State Highway Map when registering motor vehicles during February and March. County tax officers have been provided with supplies of special order cards.

Copies of the map also may be ordered direct from the name, address and phone number of the Texas Highway Department, Post Office Box 78703, Dallas, Texas 75270.

Further emphasizing the water resources of Texas, a scenic photograph of the Sam Rayburn Reservoir in East Texas graces the cover of the map.

Padre Island centers a pictorial display, along with 12 other vivid color photographs of the scenes and sights from every

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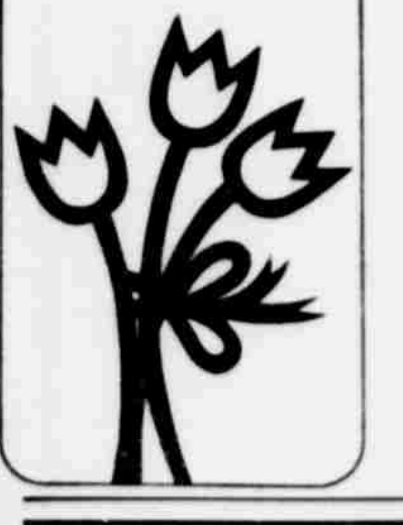
