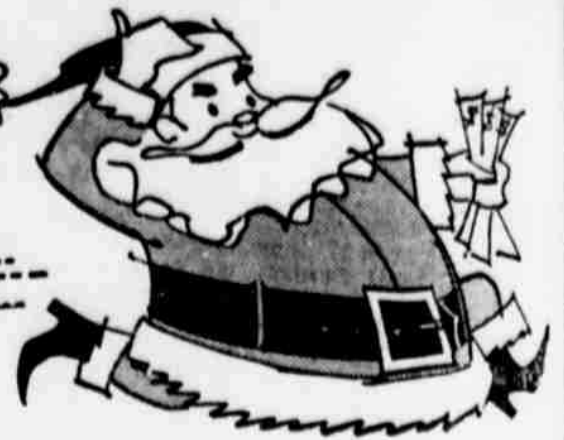

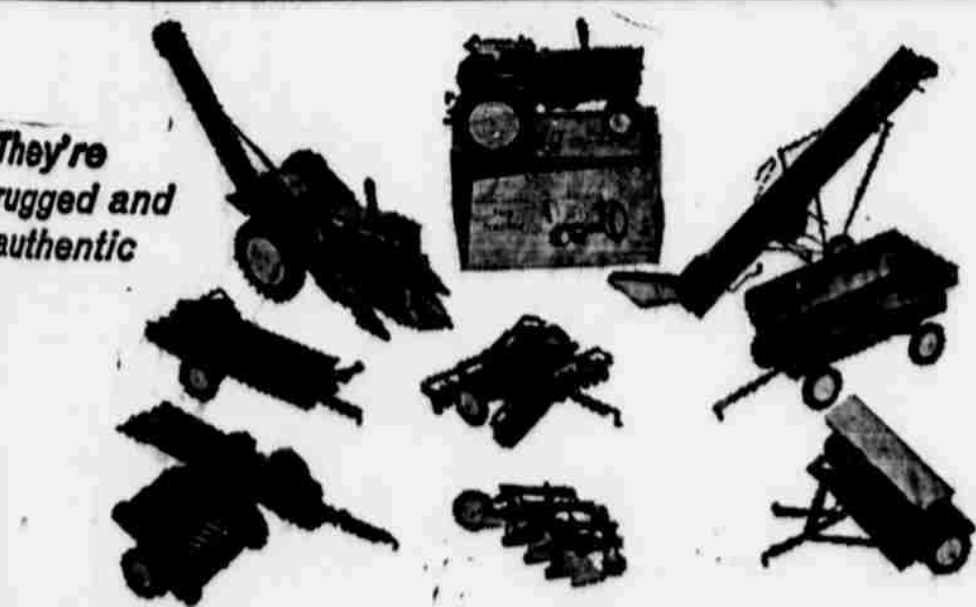

Dan and Canaan are two places with the same names as in Bible times. This 2 1/2 miles square—the Holy City—where Solomon's Temple was built—231,000 people living there today—The war is still there—you can still be shot in this "No Man's Land"—"The Holy City."

Judean era are as they used to be—80 different type who preside here and roam the streets here. Her American arrangement was for the time the American Marines were stationed there. They were there for 40 years, until World War II. President Roosevelt ordered them out then. He was the only President of the United States to ever visit Haiti.

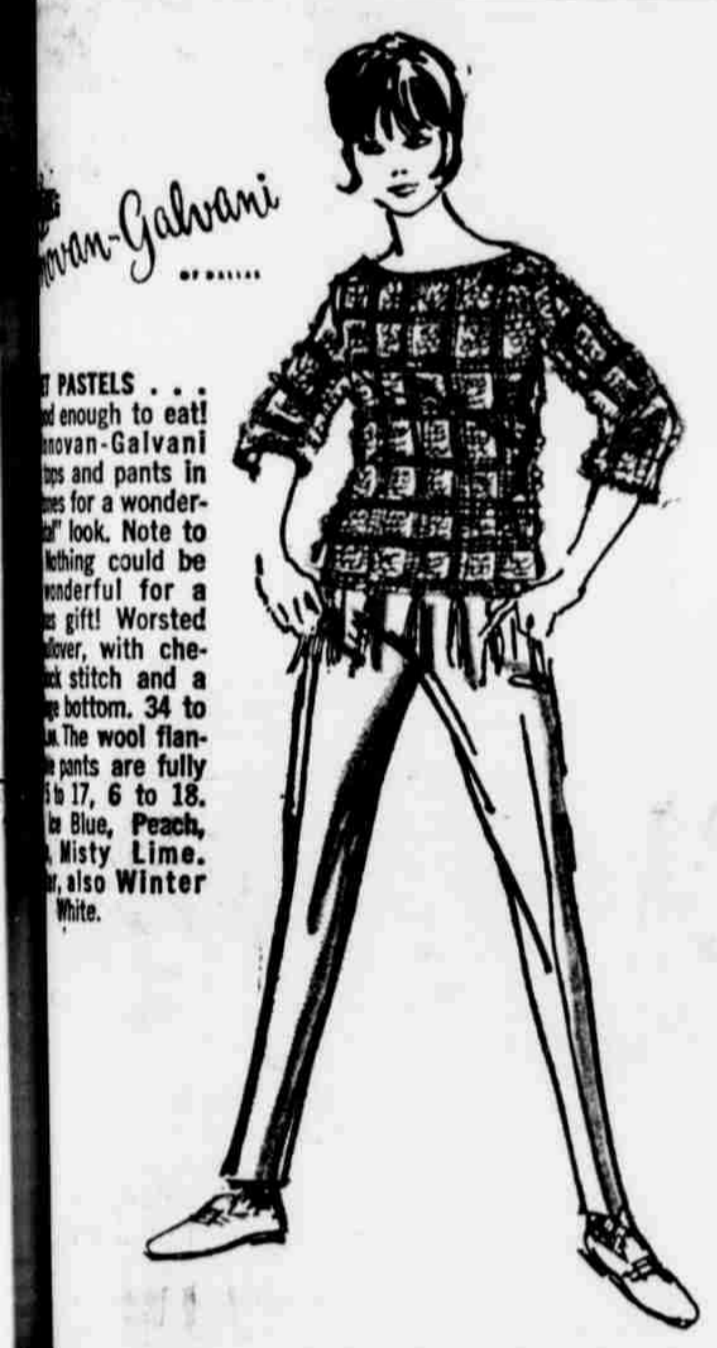

**The Good Earth**

by MRS. B. F. COBB

December will be a very busy month for the gardener. Usually garden clean-up is over by now. Late frost delayed garden activity. It isn't often we have such a long growing season.

Dahlia tubers should be dug and stored as soon as possible now. Be sure each tuber is inspected for disease before putting away for the winter. If soft spots are present, scrape them out with an old spoon or knife. Dust the scar with sulphur and let the tuber dry for a couple of days before storing in peat moss or dry grass clippings.

Do not forget the compost heap. Most every thing goes on a compost pile except plants damaged by fungus, such as black spot or mildew. The spores of this fungi will live on all winter. Burn infected plants.

Turn compost often to hasten decomposition of materials, especially those with large stems. We composted cotton burs last winter and added them to our garden soil this spring. The burs now look like rich black soil and we have raised two beautiful garden crops this year on this rich soil.

At this writing, most everything is killed by frost. It is sad to see lovely vegetable and flower plants go down. But the bright spot to such a picture is that plants left seed so a new

crop may come next year. We gathered 4 bushels of green tomatoes off our garden this fall and canned 30 or 40 quarts of ripe ones. I finally lost track. We have also eaten tomatoes and given away many gallons during the summer months.

One advantage of growing Italian paste tomatoes is their slow ripening process. Unlike other tomatoes that must be gathered at least every other day, Italian paste tomatoes need only be gathered about once a week. They also have good shipping and keeping qualities.

This variety is also less acid and many who are allergic to the more tart variety can eat Italian paste tomatoes without bad results.

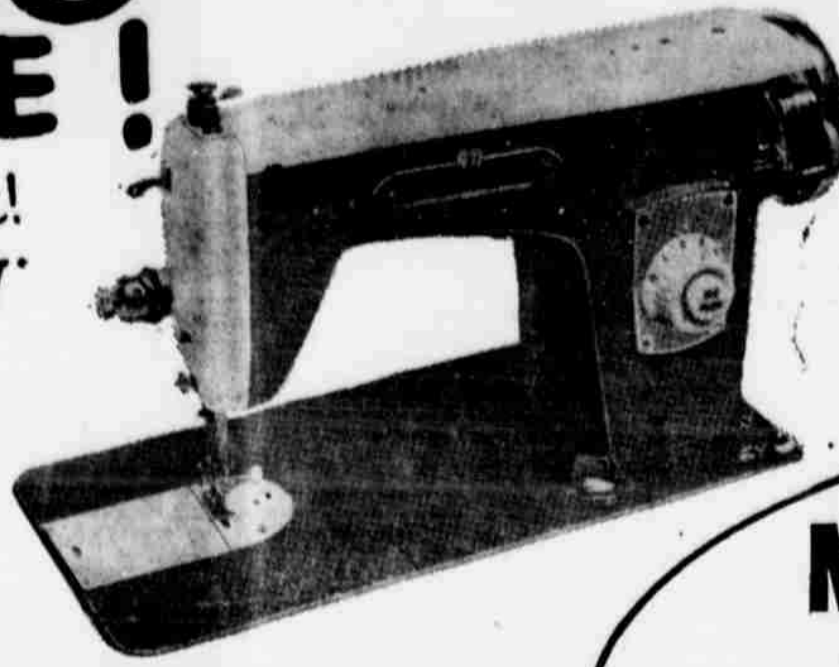
