Since last year Burkburnett High School is the proud owner of a thirty-booth language laboratory. This enables the teacher to bring native speakers to the sudent. Each day about three hundred German, Latin, French and Spanish students use this facility. The teacher plays tapes and records to the students that have been recorded by native speakers. The students repeat key phrases and sentences into the microphones in the booths, and the teacher monitors them from the main console. This laboratory brings the modern audio-lingual method of teaching foreign languages to Burkburnett High School.
