EPITOME OF THE AIR AGE

We take the air age for granted. We are no longer amazed by the fact that, in a matter of hours, we can fly in perfect comfort who has had his ups and downs and at great speeds, to almost any place in the civilized world.

Yet the air age is very young. As an article in Parade magazine reminds us, only 30 years ago a new era was launched. On November 22, 1935, a flying boat named the China Clipper took off from San Francisco Bay after elaborate ceremonies which included a special message from the President of the United States. . THE DAY OF RECKONING

Probably comparatively few of us realize the extent to which federal spending and debt have risen in a very few years.

The publication Washington Report tells the story briefly. In 1963, appropriations were \$1.2 billion greater than in 1962. In 1964 they were \$3.4 billion greater. And in 1965, they were up \$16.7 billion over the 1962 figure.

The national debt followed this trend, In 1963, it rose \$7.9 billion over the 1962 level. In 1964, it was \$13.9 billion above level. And in 1965, it was higher by a staggering \$19 billion. Just the cost of interest in 1964 on the existing debt was \$11.6 billion.

Moreover, as Washington Report observes, new programs enacted this year will generate calls for even larger appropriations kum. in 1966. And it is the general rule that estimates of the ultimate cost of such programs are commonly too low.

3. Persons reaeching age 65 in 1966 should discuss their situation on Medicare with a social security representative 2 or 3 months before their 65th birthday; later action defers their coverage.

4. Persons in service businesses where tips are a por-tion of their income, need free leaflet No. 6 for full information on how tip income is now creditable (and taxable) for social security purposes.

5. Persons becoming disabled should get in touch with with a social security representative two or three months after such disability begins; benefits are in writing that he does not de-now payable for disability that sire the insurance. > Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said recently in a letter to Texas college and university registrars that this is being considered.

The state Selective Service director, in his letter to the college and university officials, asked them to let Selective Service know "at the earliest possible moment" when draftage male students drop out of school, as "the nation can provide useful occupation for the perennial student who shows no

progress. Col. Schwartz also asked the registrars to report "rapidly" the male students whose academic load drops below full

"This does not mean that each student who drops under full time will be selected automatically for the armed forces," the state draft director wrote. "His local board is going to want to ask him why has dropped some of his

Col. Schwartz doesn't think authorizing boards to go up to the 26-35 age range will produce many men under present circumstances. He estimated there are less than 3,000 in that age
