## Thousands Attend Homecoming

### FEDERAL SCHOOL FUNDS RELEASED

Senator Ralph Yarborough has announced that the Bureau of the Budget has released an additional \$5,162,000 for impacted school districts in Texas.

There are 285 affected school districts in the state. "The release came," said Yarborough, "after Congress made it clear that this was a priority educational program."

Early this year after Congress had appropriated an additional \$91 million for this program, nationally, the EOB refused to release the funds.

Congress then re-appropriated the money with special instructions that it be sent. Yarborough, in response to pleas from Texas school superintendents, including personal correspondence from Burkburnett School Superintendent I. C. Evans, became a leader in the fight to restore the funds.

He said, "Although the BOB still has the power to withhold the funds, it has evidently realized that Congress meant business."

Texas already has received \$20,000,000 under the impacted aid program for fiscal 1968.

Texas school districts are entitled to some \$486 million under PL874.

These are the districts upon which the federal government had placed heavy financial burdens. These are the school districts that educate the children of parents who work or live on federal property, especially military bases and federal agencies.

Yarborough said that Texas is slated to receive \$27,000,000 for the current fiscal year.

Thousands of Burk residents and former residents thronged the city Friday for the annual Burkburnett High School Homecoming festivities.

School was out early, much to the joy of more than 3,500 students of the district, and it seemed that most of them were among the spectators at the Homecoming Parade Friday afternoon.

Winning float in the parade was entered by the junior class. It was a beautiful work of art, depicting an old-time carousel, with two charming

young ladies awaiting their turn.

The young ladies were Dee Rogers and Linda Young.

Theme of the parade was "Movies."

The senior class presented "Gazebo" ridden by the homecoming queen contestants, Pam Fowler, Debbie Smith, Kathy Smith and Lana Carroll.

"Camelot" was the choice of the sophomore class float, on which Bill McBride and Sandy Houghby were in appropriate costume.

"Wizard of Oz" was the title of the freshman float, complete with tin woodman, cowardly lion, scarecrow and Dorothy, portrayed by Linda Johnson, Debbie White, Laura Allison and Diane Miller.

About 30 units were in the long parade, escorted by an honor guard from the Burk American Legion Post, the Burkburnett High School Band, the Burk Junior High School Band, the pep squad, and officers of various high school organizations.

## DISTRICT REPRIMANDS WASHINGTON

By unanimous vote of the District 4-AAA schools, Washington High School of Wichita Falls was reprimanded Monday, for conduct of Washington fans at the Brownwood-Wichita football game played September 26 in Wichita Falls.

Action on the matter was announced this afternoon following a meeting of the District 4-AAA committee in Breckenridge.

Bowie Supt. H. A. Heffner reported representatives of the District 4-AAA schools, Bowie, Breckenridge, Graham, Burkburnett, Mineral Wells, Stephenville, and Weatherford reprimanded Washington High on the following complaints:

1. For the use of vulgar and obscene language and undue advances toward members of Brownwood band and drill team.
2. For hundreds of fans moving along the fence from goal line to goal line allegedly cursing and harassing coaches and players on the bench.

Further, the committee made the following recommendations:

1. All fans be restricted from the area adjacent to visiting team benches.
2. Coaches and other school officials work diligently in a positive manner regarding proper conduct at games.
3. School officials should maintain a constant supervision of visiting seating sections.
4. School officials should work closely with police with control of crowds.
5. All beverages should be sold and served in paper containers.

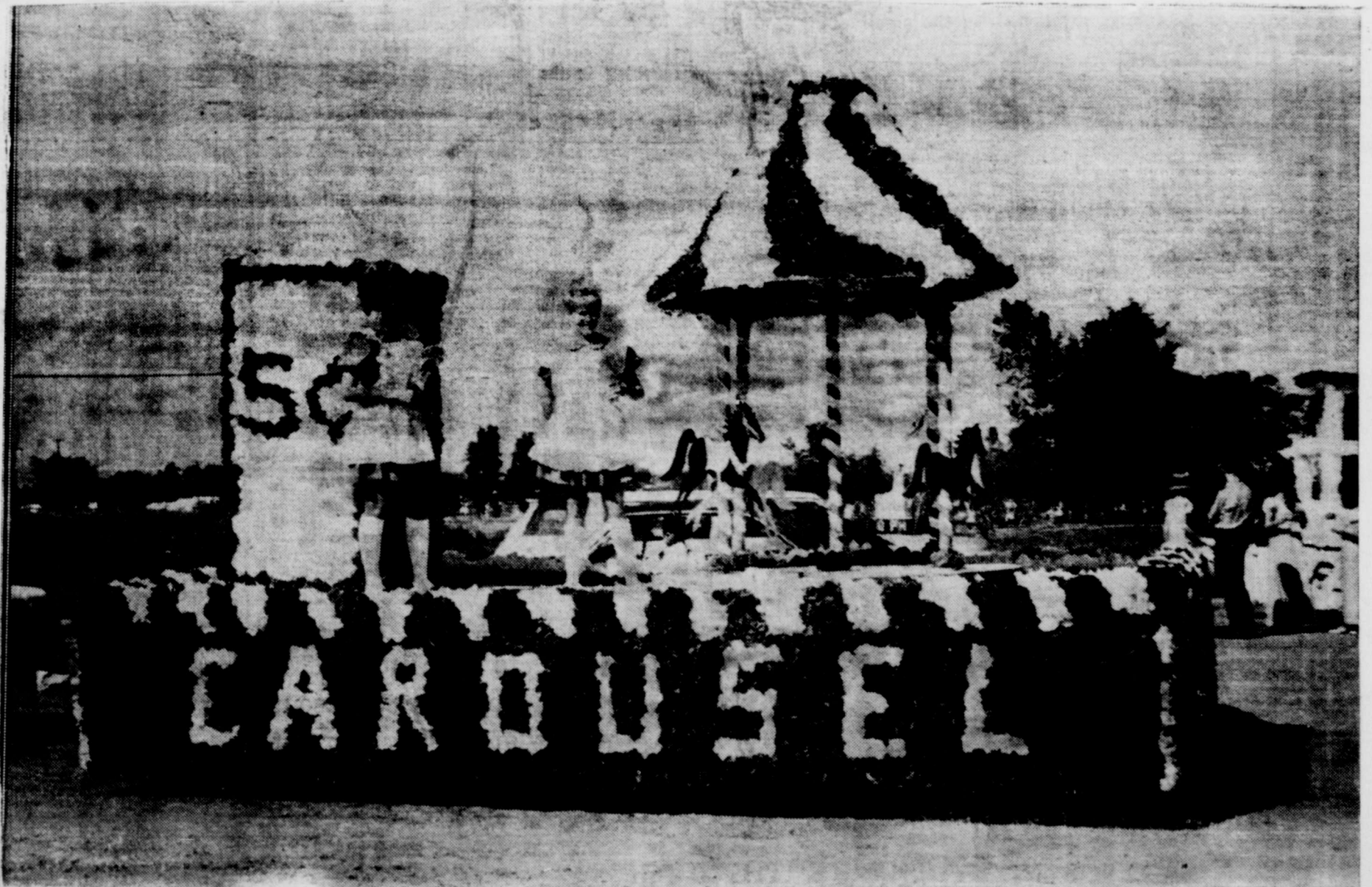

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## PART OF FREE ELECTIONS

Those who question the importance of a free press as a vital safeguard of liberty should have had their doubts dispelled by recent events in Czechoslovakia. Among the reforms in that country was the granting of press freedom. This was one of the straws that broke the camel's back and brought on the invasion by Soviet Russia. The communist hard-line dictators were afraid their system could not withstand the test of a free press.

Here in our own country as an election approaches, every act and utterance of candidates is subjected to the views and comments of thousands of editors, and this stimulates the thoughtful weighing of candidates and issues in the minds of millions of voting citizens. A free press is as much a part of the election process in our U. S. Republic as the actual act of going into a voting booth.

No doubt there are the experts who can come forth with statistics to show that the influence of the press is negligible in deciding the fate of candidates. This may be so, but in nations where there is no free press, elections are a farce. A free press and a free nation are one and the same thing, and no one realizes that better than the Russians.

Parents should teach their children to recognize and obey traffic signals and signs, urges the Portland, Oregon Traffic Safety Commission. Good examples reap good habits.

"Can you trust your impulses?" asks the Greater New York Safety Council, as published by the Long Island Lighting Company. "In an emergency, the experts say 'No!' For instance: A woman, awakened by the smell of smoke, flung her bedroom door open—and was literally roasted alive in the hall. (No firefighter would ever open a door without first testing it for heat. A warm knob or panel indicates flame or heated suffocating smoke on the other side.)"

## Mailing Deadlines For Christmas Delivery Listed

"Mail early and get better service by avoiding the last minute rush," Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman advised today.

The Postmaster issued suggested mailing deadlines for assuring delivery before Christmas Day.

Domestic gift parcels should be mailed before December 2 if they're destined for distant states, and not later than December 14 if destined for local areas.

Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than December 11 and those for local delivery not later than December 16.

Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. Unless tightly filled, boxes may be crushed.

Parcels should be clearly addressed on one side only, and should have the address and return address written again inside the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off.

The Postmaster noted that special attention again will be placed on the delivery of mail to servicemen in Vietnam and the surrounding area, and stressed use of Apo and FPO numbers on all overseas military mail.

The deadlines for gifts to all members of the Armed Forces are:

- Surface Transportation Nov. 9 (Large Packages)
  - Space Available Nov. 23 (Small Packages)
  - Parcel Air Lift No. 30
  - Airmail Dec. 11
- Cards and letter mail will receive approximately the same service as during non peak periods.
- Nearly 27 million pounds of mail were processed by the United State Post Office during the holiday mail rush last year for delivery to members of the armed forces in Vietnam.
- This year, that number is expected to increase.
- Last year all Christmas mail posted before the suggested deadline was delivered prior to the holiday. To be absolutely sure of on-time delivery, these deadlines should be met, Postmaster Zimmerman said.

## News From The County Agent

Larvae of the most important pest of peaches, the peach tree borer, feed on the inner bark of the trunk of the peach tree. Their presence may be detected by the masses of gum mixed with brownish frass or sawdust which exude from around the trunk of the tree. The larvae usually feed in an area from two to three inches below the surface of the soil to 10 inches above.

When the peach tree borer is not controlled, it will kill peach trees within a few seasons. Control of this insect can be obtained from October 20 to November 15 with Parathion-chlorobenzene crystals (PDB). The soil should be dry and the soil temperature is above 55 degrees F. The crystals should be placed on the surface around the trunk of the tree. For two and three year old trees, use 1/2 ounce of crystals; for four to five year old trees, 3/4 ounce; for mature trees, 1 ounce.

The procedure for applying the PDB crystals is fairly simple but to obtain effective control should be closely followed. First, all leaf material and grass should be cleaned out of an area about one foot from the tree trunk. The PDB crystals are then placed in a narrow circular band about two inches from the trunk of the tree. The band is then covered with soil free of leaf or grass and the soil is mounded around the trunk so as to form a cone shaped pile about six inches high around the base of the tree. Care should be taken to see that none of the PDB crystals come in contact with the tree, since crystals in contact with the tree will cause injury. Then compact the soil in the mound. The mound of soil should be removed in the early spring.

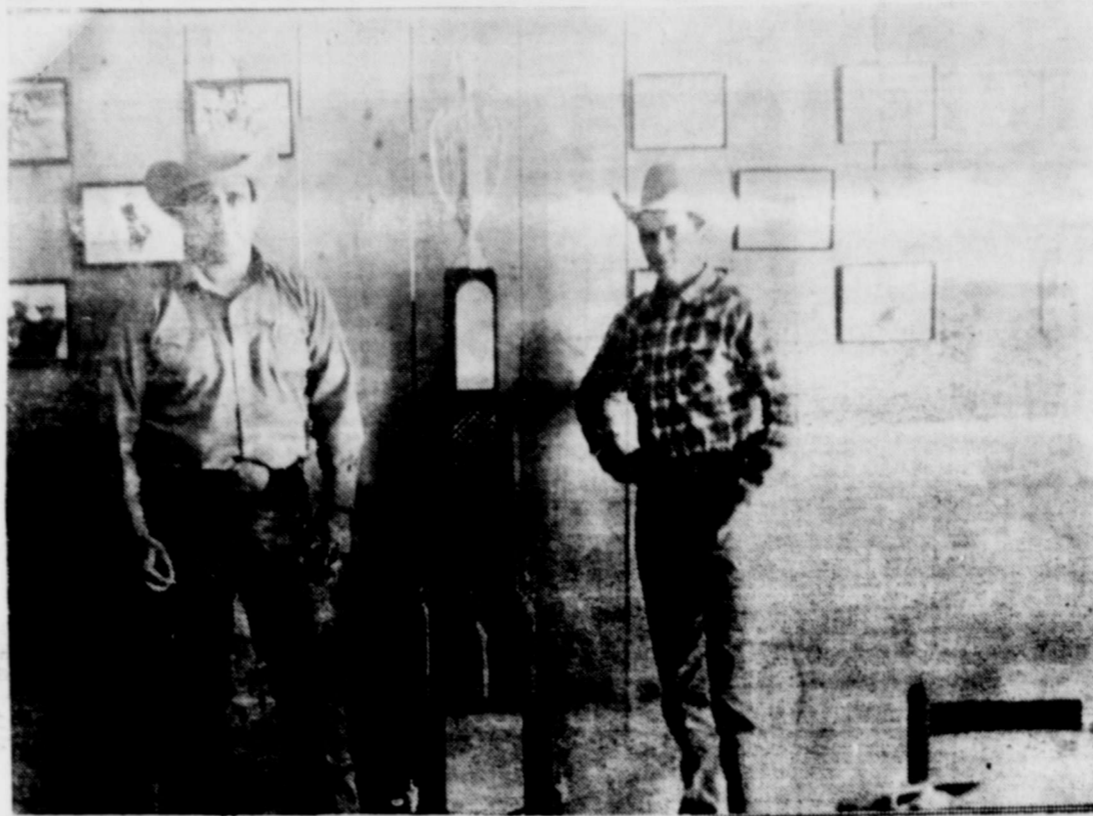

**Special Ship To Carry Yule Gifts**

Tons of St. Nick's gifts will be going to members of the Armed Forces in Vietnam by special ship this year thanks to a joint Pentagon-Fort Office venture.

A fast U.S. cargo ship will be designated the "1968 SANTA CLAUSE SPECIAL," sailing from Oakland, California next month with Christmas parcels.

To meet the sailing deadline and assure pre-holiday delivery of gifts sent with surface postage, items should be mailed during the October 14 - November 9 period. They should be marked "SANTA CLAUSE SPECIAL" just below the stamps.

The "SANTA CLAUSE SPECIAL" will sail during the latter half of November and stop at Da Nang, Qui Nhon, Cam Ranh Bay and Saigon, Vietnam. It takes approximately three weeks for a fast ship to cross the ocean.

All gifts should be packed in strong containers with adequate cushioning and correctly addressed, including APO and FPO numbers.

There are several options available for mailing to the military which can save money. Post offices across the nation have free pamphlets which outline the mailing programs for servicemen and women overseas.

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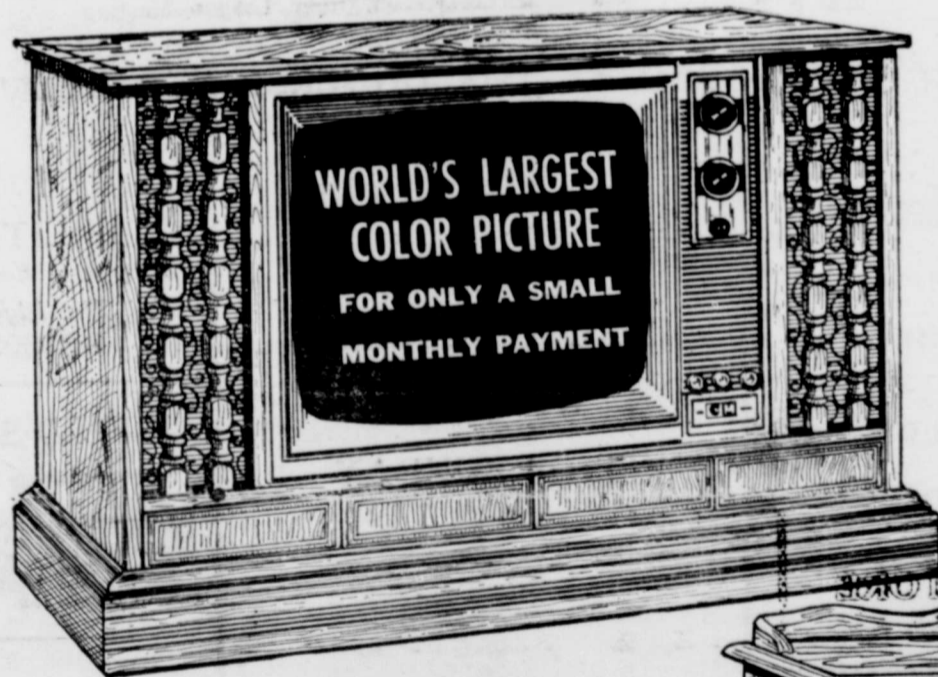
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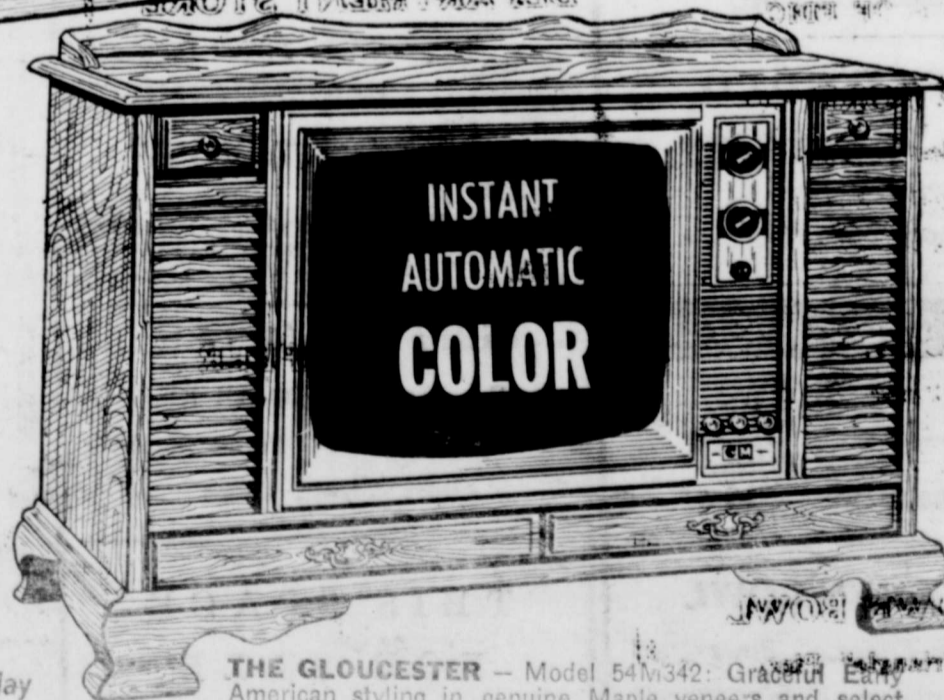

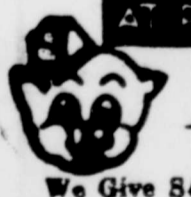

### SOME LONG DISTANCE PHONE RATES ARE REDUCED AGAIN

Some faraway places are getting a little closer—thanks to several recent reductions in Long Distance telephone rates. According to AT&T, rate reductions totaling more than \$10 million have been made on calls between the U.S. mainland and Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, the Dominican Republic and Alaska. Lower rates on calls to Israel will be put into effect later this month.

In addition to rate reductions amounting to \$9.2 million a year on calls to Puerto Rico

and the Virgin Islands, AT&T has introduced Direct Distance Dialing to these islands. They are the first points beyond the continental borders of North America to have DDD. U.S. customers can now dial calls to both locations in exactly the same manner as they dial other calls in this country. The area code for both is 809.

New rates on calls to the Dominican Republic and Israel coincide with the opening of high-capacity undersea cables that will significantly improve telephone service between the U.S. and both countries.

Revised rates to the Dominican Republic are now in effect and will save U. S. callers \$773,000 a year. The revisions include introduction of station-to-station calling.

AT&T also announced lower rates for calls to Israel effective Oct. 20, which will save U.S. customers an estimated \$653,000 annually.

And on Oct. 1, new rates on calls to Alaska went into effect. These will save callers about \$1,150,000 annually.
