Six Candidates File For Offices In City And School Elections

Interest in the spring elections in Burkburnett showed a decided increase during the past week, with six candidates filing for city and school elections.

In the city commission race, where three vacancies are to be filled, three candidates have filed.

These are Reid McCandless and A. H. Loehefener, both of whom have filed for re-election, and Marvin Henderson. John Brookman, outgoing city commissioner, is not expected to be a candidate.

Six candidates are seeking three posts on the board of trustees of the Burkburnett Independent School District.

Veiling for seat No. 4 are Arlis Key and John B. Gill. Lone candidate for seat 5 is F. A. Martin.

Three men are seeking seat 6. They are Charles R. Grebb, Thomas B. Atkinson, Jr., and Ed W. Watson.

Martin is seeking re-election. Seat No. 6 has been vacant for seven months.

The city election will be held on April 1, with deadline for filing on Feb. 28, at the city hall.

Deadline for filing in the school election is March 6, in the tax office at the school administration building on Glendale Street. The school election has been set for Saturday, April 5.

Any candidate wishing to enter the school election may secure an application from Mr. Gene Bankhead or from Mrs. Betty Loveless at the school tax office.

Mrs. Loveless will be clerk of absentee voting with Dow Estes as deputy.

For the election, to be held at the Junior High School building, F. T. Felty will serve as judge. Clerks will be Evelyn Felty, Sylvia Loehefener and Johnnie Hageman.

At Oil Park

OLD SODA FOUNTAIN BEGINS NEW CAREER

One of the highlights in Boomtown USA Oil Park will be one which has long been a familiar sight in Burkburnett.

It is the antique soda fountain which had graced Adams Drug Store from 1920 to 1968.

The soda fountain has been purchased by a group of Burkburnett clubs for the park.

It consists of two parts, each of different origin and make.

Purchased new in 1920, the marble soda fountain was purchased at the time Adams Drug moved from 215 E. Third Street to 213 E. Third. It was built to Adams' specifications.

The back bar used with the fountain once included a large mirror and stained glass doors, came from Clark's Pharmacy.

Predecessor of Adams Drug. Originally, the back bar had been part of a saloon operating west of Burkburnett.

Over the years, the machinery of the fountain was replaced by later models, and the back bar was covered by modern paneling.

J. C. Adams, Sr., who operated Adams Drug Store from 1920 until his passing in 1968, first came to Burkburnett as a pharmacist with the M. C. Anderson Drug Store in 1919.

In 1921, Adams and Dr. W. B. Adams, (no relation) became partners in the business bearing their home. Mr. J. C. Adams became sole owner in 1924.

When the drug store was dispersed at the passing of Mr. Adams, the fountain and the back bar were purchased as historic items.

The fountain and back bar were dismantled and moved to the Oil Park through the efforts of the Future Farmers of America of Burkburnett High School, James Easter, sponsor, and the Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the park.

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Work Or Starve

An editorial in The Christian Science Monitor comments on a contemporary form of oppression that has no place in the United States. It states, "The Supreme Court has agreed to decide whether a labor union has the power to fine members for (what the union considers) overproduction on the job. What an amazing—and saddening—commentary on affairs today! In a land which, perhaps more than any other on the face of the earth, has always prided itself upon hard work, and upon what hard work can accomplish, how chilling it is to find that there are those who believe they have the right to require laziness and time-wasting."

Anyone who feels a deliberate slowdown on the job is irrelevant to today's soaring prices should be interested in a brief item from the publication Steel Facts which reports: "Hourly employment costs for production and maintenance employees in this country's steel industry during the past two decades have been rising more than three times as rapidly as output per man-hour of all employees."

Machines have done much to offset the growing laziness of people. But there is a limit beyond which a fundamental law of nature must take over—work or starve.

FACT AND OPINION

A representative of the Jewel Company, as noted by the Public Service Company of Colorado, points out in an article in Associated Grocers News, that groceries and meat outrank nonfood items with Chicago shoplifters. Of the shoplifters stopped, 23 per cent had chosen groceries, 20 per cent meat, 14 per cent tobacco, and the rest cosmetics, candy and liquor. It was pointed out that shoplifters are not limited to any one socioeconomic group, but instead are from a cross mix of society including the affluent. To some of the teen-agers, shoplifting is a game, with the benefit of feeling triumphal when successful in stealing goods.



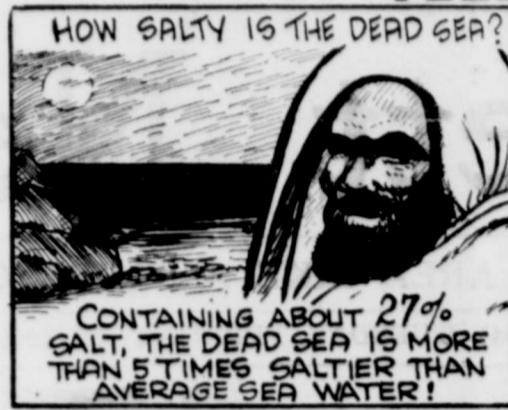

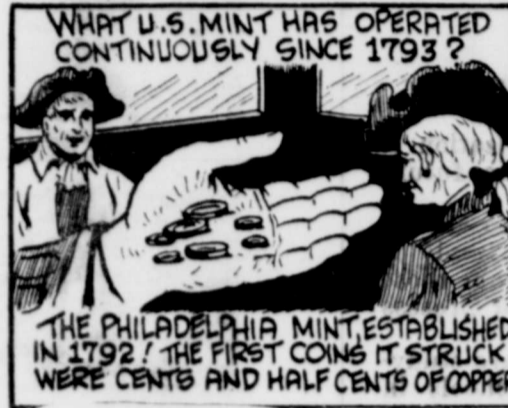

The girls' gymnasium was also broken into, and an unknown amount of cash taken.


The thefts were discovered when the school was opened for classes the following morning.

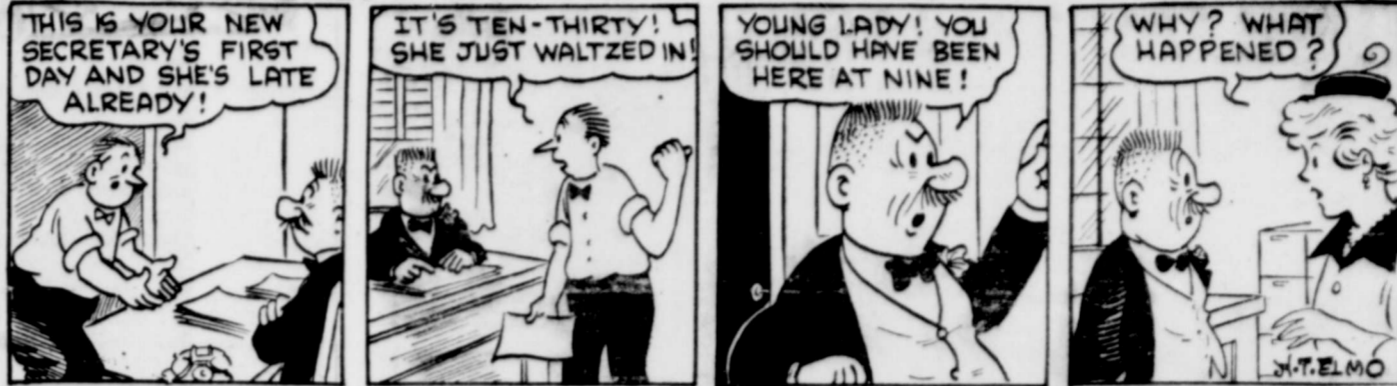

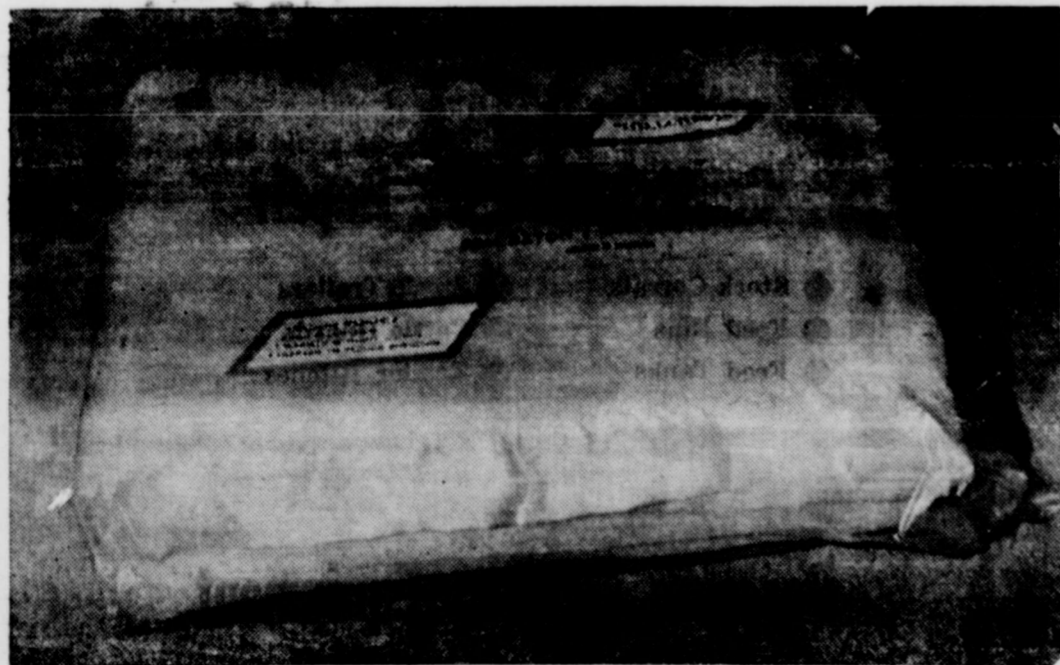

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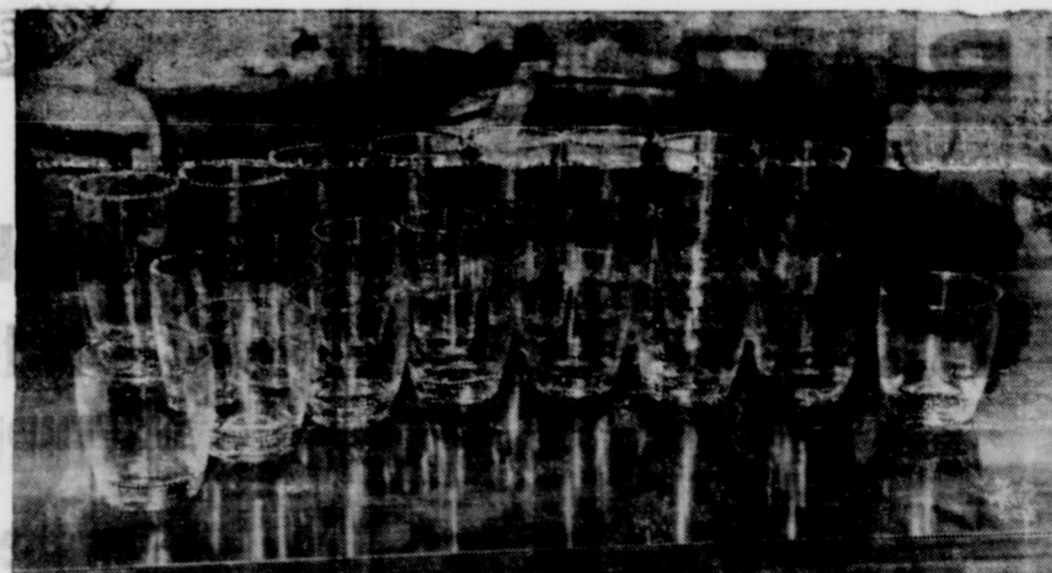

Hubby didn't like it and sought to punish his spouse. Spouse did not take kindly to the attempted punishment, and proceeded to slash her lord and master with a knife.

Sixty-one stitches. Meanwhile, a visitor in the home, hearing the commotion, attempted to get into the bedroom to protect her baby.

She was caught between the loving couple.

Nine stitches.

Hubby, following a repair job, decided two could play the slashing game, and returned home to prove his theory to wifely.

One hundred and seven stitches.

Sometime during the outing, the better half grew tired of the game and called, or rather went after the gardemars, whom she found after considerable search.

Jailed, one man, charged with intent to do bodily harm with a sharp instrument. Hubby is free under \$1,000 appearance bond.

The 177 stitches were dispensed at a Waurika hospital, with the 107-stitch case being kept overnight.

April 15 Deadline For Inspection Of Motor Vehicles

"With the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 39 per cent of the registered vehicles in Wichita County have been inspected," stated Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Unless there is a rapid increase of inspections, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. The authorized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles if owners will not wait until a few days before the deadline," Johnson added.

"Any driver operating a vehicle on public roads after April 15 that is required to be inspected will be operating in violation of the law," Johnson said.

Captain Johnson called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program in 1951, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13% to 3%.

Johnson said, "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident."

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 egg

Heat oven to very hot (450°F.). Sift together corn meal, flour, baking powder, salt and garlic powder into bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk and egg; stir until blended. Pour into greased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake in preheated oven (450°F.) 18 to 20 minutes or until golden brown.

While warm, cut into 1/2-inch square croutons. Separate croutons, then place in a large shallow baking pan. Place in preheated broiler 3 inches from source of heat. Broil about 2 minutes; stir; broil about 2 minutes longer or until browned.

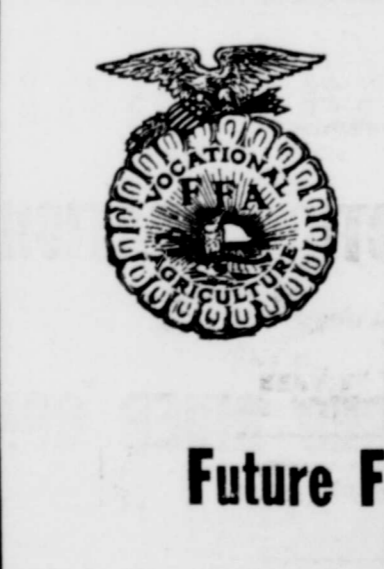
