Homemade Garlic Corn Meal Croutons top tossed summer alads and hearty soups. You might find them just right, too, for stuffings, bread puddings or casserole toppings. — Or use them as a zippy brunch accompaniment to scrambled eggs. However you use them, do try this easy recipe soon. It's an easy trick to spark simple dishes, and a wonderful way to say

something home-hearted to your family.

GARLIC CORN MEAL CROUTONS Makes about 4 cups

1/2 cup enriched corn meal 1/2 teaspoon garlie powder 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons shortening 1/2 cup milk 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1 egg

1/2 teaspoon salt

Heat oven to very hot (450°F.). Sift together corn meal, flour, baking powder, salt and garlic powder into bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk and er; stir until blended. Pour into greased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake in preheated oven (450°F.) 18 to 20 minutes or until golden brown.

While warm, cut into ¹/₂-inch square croutons. Separate crou-tons, then place in a large shallow baking pan. Place in preheated broiler 3 inches from source of heat. Broll about 2 minutes; stir; broil about 2 minutes longer or until browned.
