Inflation? It's the President's fault. Unemployment? That's his fault, too. The war? Everybody knows he's to blame for that.

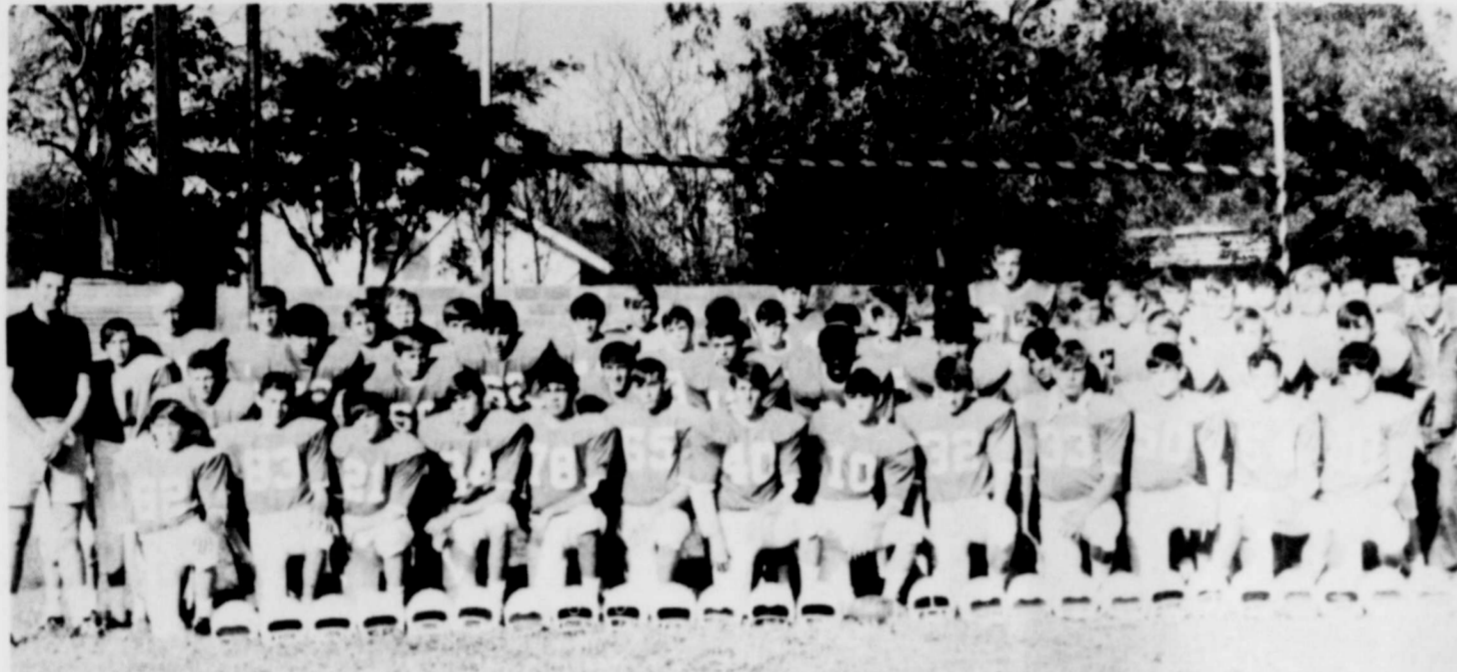

The Bulldogs played a hard game last Friday night when they lost their first district game to Stephenville 14-7. Coach Froman reported that they came out of the game with no injuries except the minor bruises that go with football. Tom Bloodworth, he reported, was out last week and will probably be out the remainder of the season. Bloodworth injured an old injury in the Vernon game week before last.

"We'll use this off week to cover the little things and the fundamentals of the game," stated Froman. It's difficult to find time for these things after the season begins since you are always getting ready for another team for Friday night, stated the Coach.

As far as a shot at the district championship goes, Burk Burnett still has as good a chance as does anyone else. ## Burk City Council Presents Proposal

In regular scheduled meeting of the Burk Burnett City Council Monday night the city council presented the responsibility to be assumed by the city following the placing of the old MKT depot in Burk Royalty Park. The formal presentation of the city's position was made to Mrs. Hugh Preston, representing the Burk Burnett Study Club, trustees of the depot.

After receiving the city proposal, Mrs. Preston indicated that the proposal would be referred to the museum committee for further study.

At present the club estimates the cost of moving the building at \$1200 and renovating at \$10,000. The club received a 90 day extension from the MKT officials which allowed them until February 1, 1971 to move the building from its present location on railroad property.

The proposal offered to the club by the city is as follows:

AFTER THE BURKBURNETT RAILROAD DEPOT IS RESTORED AND RENOVATED AND IN OPERATION AT AN AGREED SITE ON THE BURK ROYALTY PARK AND IS IN OPERATION AS A MUSEUM, THEN THE CITY OF BURK-

BURNETT AGREES TO FURNISH ONLY THE FOLLOWING ITEMS:

1. Furnish the agreed space in the Burk Royalty Park which will not interfere with the present baseball diamond, based on specifications as presented by the club to the City of Burk Burnett, and agreed upon;
2. Liability & Building Insurance on \$12,000;
3. Water & Sewer;
4. Two Guard Lights;
5. Maintenance of Building Grounds;
6. Paint Outside of Building as needed;
7. Assume the first \$20.00 per month on Electric Account.

This proposal of the City of Burk Burnett is conditioned on the following: That if the depot building is not completely renovated and in operation as a museum within eighteen (18) months from November 1, 1970 then the depot building shall move off of the said Park without any expense to the City of Burk Burnett, Texas.

That no renovation or reconstruction of the building be begun on the depot building in the Park until \$10,000 in

## Area Wage Board Employees Due Raise

The Department of Defense announced a new wage schedule which will affect more than 1,200 wage board employees in the Wichita Falls - South-western Oklahoma wage area. Approximately 966 of those

affected live in the Burk Burnett - Wichita Falls area.

The new schedule means an average wage increase of 3% an hour for the employees of Sheppard AFB, Fort Sill, and Altus AFB, and all other federal installations in the wage area.

This new schedule which went into effect November 1, at Sheppard means actual pay increases will range from 13 to 48¢ per hour.

Wage board employees, employees engaged in trade and laboring occupations, are paid in accordance with prevailing rates in their local area.

A wage scale survey was conducted in this area during August and September by 13 teams of data collectors made up of members of the wage board work force. During the survey, they obtained information about salaries paid workers employed in positions similar to the wage board jobs.

The collected information was then sent to the Department of Defense for consideration.

Guidelines Of Life

"As Jesus passed on from there he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax office; and he said to him, 'Follow me'..." --MATTHEW 9:9

This is the story of how Matthew was called into Christian discipleship, and became a Christian.

Source materials tell us a bit more about Matthew than the author tells of himself. As was the custom in those days, Matthew evidently had both a Jewish and a Greek name, and as most scholars know, his other name was Levi. We can surmise many things about him as a tax collector, if he ran true to form. Taxes were farmed out to the highest bidder by the Roman government, and then after the minimum taxes they required, the tax collector was allowed to keep what was left. This was the reason they were despised by the Jews for many times they charged the people many times what was required by the Romans, thus becoming wealthy at the peoples expense.

But one day, Jesus came along. He saw deep into the heart of Matthew and knew that there was something there that was noble and great, and he called him to greater things. We might ask, why would Jesus call a Publican to be one of his disciples. Well, we could ask the same question about any one of the other apostles. The same can be said about his call to each of us. The important thing is not we have been, it is what we can become, if we will only go with him. One of the important things about this story is that Mathew answered Jesus' call. It would have been very easy for him to do as the Rich Young Ruler did, and go away sorrowing, for he too must have been a man of influence and wealth, to ever have become a tax collector. But he did answer the call, to become one of the greatest men in history, for he not only became one of the "twelve", but the author of the beloved Gospel of St. Mark.

Jesus is calling men today. Calling all sorts of men. Men of influence and wealth, men down in the depths of sin. Is He calling you into his service. Stop and listen with your heart, and I am sure you will hear that "still small voice" calling you by name. The call is important, but it is just as important that you answer his call, and give him your life.

Letter To The Editor,

Dear Sir;

Today I read the October 22 issue of your paper and I wish to correct Mr. Robert Sturges on a part of his "School drug program" article.

Mr. Sturges has written: "Finally he gave him the most potent of hallucinatory drugs, LSD. This proved too much as it made the speaker totally dependant on drugs."

LSD is a non-addictive drug. LSD does not turn you on. LSD like DMT, Psilocybin and lhogaine is a catalyst built around serotonin. Serotonin is a substance always present in your brain. LSD and the three other drugs I named cause an excess of serotonin to be produced. An excess of serotonin in your head, such as is the case with the brains of schizophrenics, can cause hallucinations. You can achieve the same state produced by acid by having an injection of the blood plasma of a schizophrenic. That is why some head doctors say that LSD users can be psychotic. But since in nature your body, if it is in proper working order (as a schizophrenic's is not), will correct all imbalances, the state produced by an excess of serotonin cause by acid will in time fade away.

On the story of the same speaker Mr. Sturges made another error. "He asked her to try drugs. The drugs reacted with her system and nearly killed her." Since I was also present at this biased excuse for a drug program, I can correctly give you the score. The two of them shot up (used a needle and a syringe to administer a drug directly into the vein) on something or other, I forgot what. The needle he used on her was dirty, perhaps he was a hepatitis carrier and she got hepatitis, a disease of the liver. This is what nearly killed her, the drugs had nothing to do with it.

In closing may I say that I am surprised that Mr. Sturges could make errors like this and I am shocked that this news paper did not check to make certain that the facts were right.

"The words dependant and addictive are not synonyms and are not to be confused. The speaker stated in his speech that the experience with LSD had left him without mental security and that he became DEPENDENT on drugs to satisfy his need. Second, to girlfriend referred to already had hepatitis. Because of this the drugs reacted with her weakened diseased system."

Burk Incumbent Leads JP Race

Seeking his first elective term, Justice of the Peace Eldon O. Morris, 54, of Burkburnett, Democratic incumbent, held an early 5-1 lead over Republican nominee B. O. Gordon Tuesday for the Precinct 2 post, according to incomplete and unofficial returns.

With two out of four boxes reporting Morris had received 235 votes as compared to 46 for Gordon. Voting precinct 28, at Burkburnett Town Hall, gave Morris 202 votes and Gordon 24. In the absentee box, Morris received 33 votes as compared to 22 for Gordon.

Morris has served as justice of the peace since Oct. 1, 1969 after he was appointed by the county commissioners court to succeed Claude Adams, who resigned. He won nomination over three opponents in the Democratic primary in May without a runoff.

Gordon, 70, a Realtor, was the sole Republican bidding for a county office.

funds is on hand to complete the renovation and reconstruction. Also, the City of Burkburnett is to assume no liability or responsibility for any of the contents in the building belonging to the museum or on loan to the museum, and the City of Burkburnett is to be with a waiver of liability from the owners of every item of contents in the building so that the City will not be responsible for any loss or damage to said contents.

If at any time after completion, the depot ceases to be operated by the museum board as a museum, title will be transferred to the City, and the building may be disposed of or converted to any purpose the City may deem to be the City's best interest.

Other action by the council included leasing reclaimed water from the Burkburnett sewer plant to prospective developers of a nine-hole golf course.

The water will be used for an underground watering system on a 10-acre tract on Texas 240, which is to be developed by Mickey Cornelius and Ben Martin. The scheduled opening date of the three par lighted course is June 1, 1971.

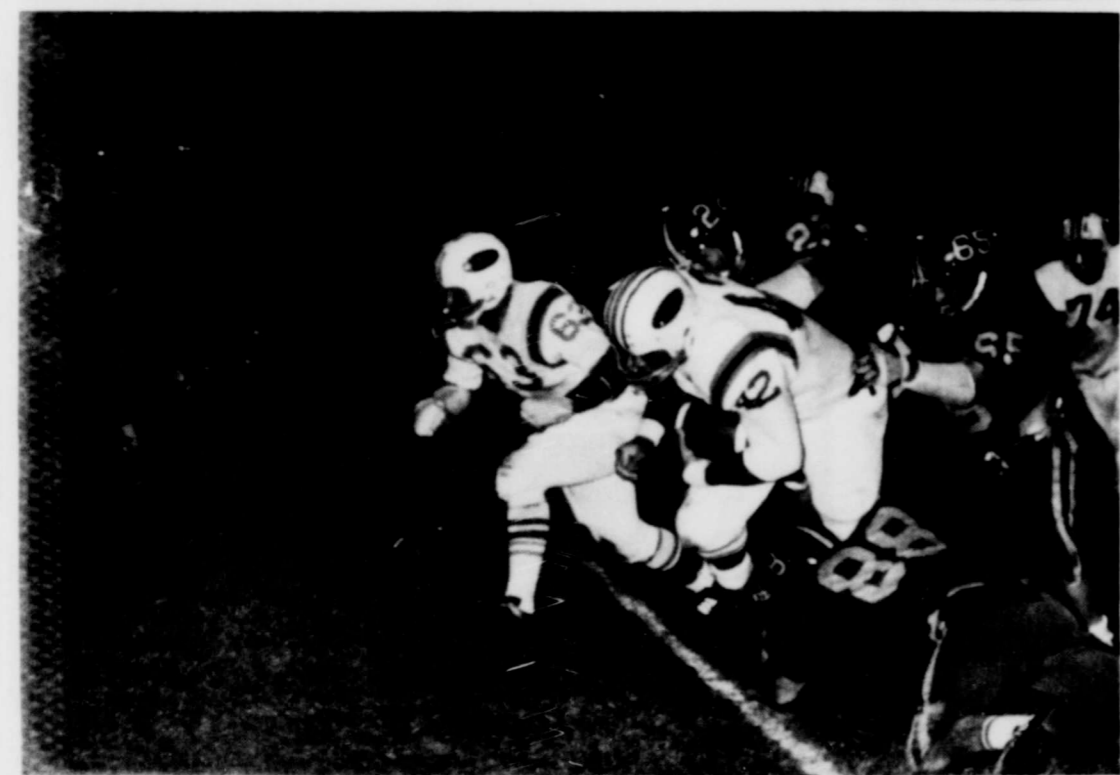
the dash across the goal line. The extra point was kicked by Bill O'Rourke to make the score 7-7 at the half.

## Texas Electric Service Co. Honor Members Of Quarter Century Club

For Texas Electric Service Company to meet successfully the challenges of the 1970's it will require nothing short of excellence on the part of its people, Purl B. Hulsey Jr., company president, told some 500 employees and their guests at the Woman's Forum Monday night in Wichita Falls.

Speaking at the annual meeting of employees to honor members of the company's Quarter Century Club, Hulsey pointed out the growth in size and reliability of the company's power system, noting that the present generating capability is 25 times what it was 25 years ago.

He said that because of the present sufficient fuel supply, adequate electric generating reserves and construction work in progress, the company is not faced with the problem of blackouts or brownouts.

In touching on some of the challenges facing the company both now and in the future, Hulsey emphasized the rising costs of operations and of borrowing money for construction purposes. The company recently

sold \$25 million in first mortgage bonds at an interest rate of 8 7/8%, almost double the interest rate paid just five years ago, he said.

TESCO realizes its environmental responsibility, Hulsey assured employees, and has been working not only to preserve the environment but also to enhance it whenever possible.

He cited two examples, one the catfish growing research project being carried on at the Morgan Creek plant near Colorado City and another, the long term leasing of Lake Colorado City Shoreline to the state for a park.

Hulsey Presented Quarter Century Club award watches to five employees who had completed 25 years of service with the company during the year. The five are E. R. Childs, E. L. Defer, J. A. Fouts, R. V. Ligon, Jr., and Mel Weaver.

Other members of the club attending the meeting were introduced by W. A. Hotchkiss, division manager, who was master of ceremonies.

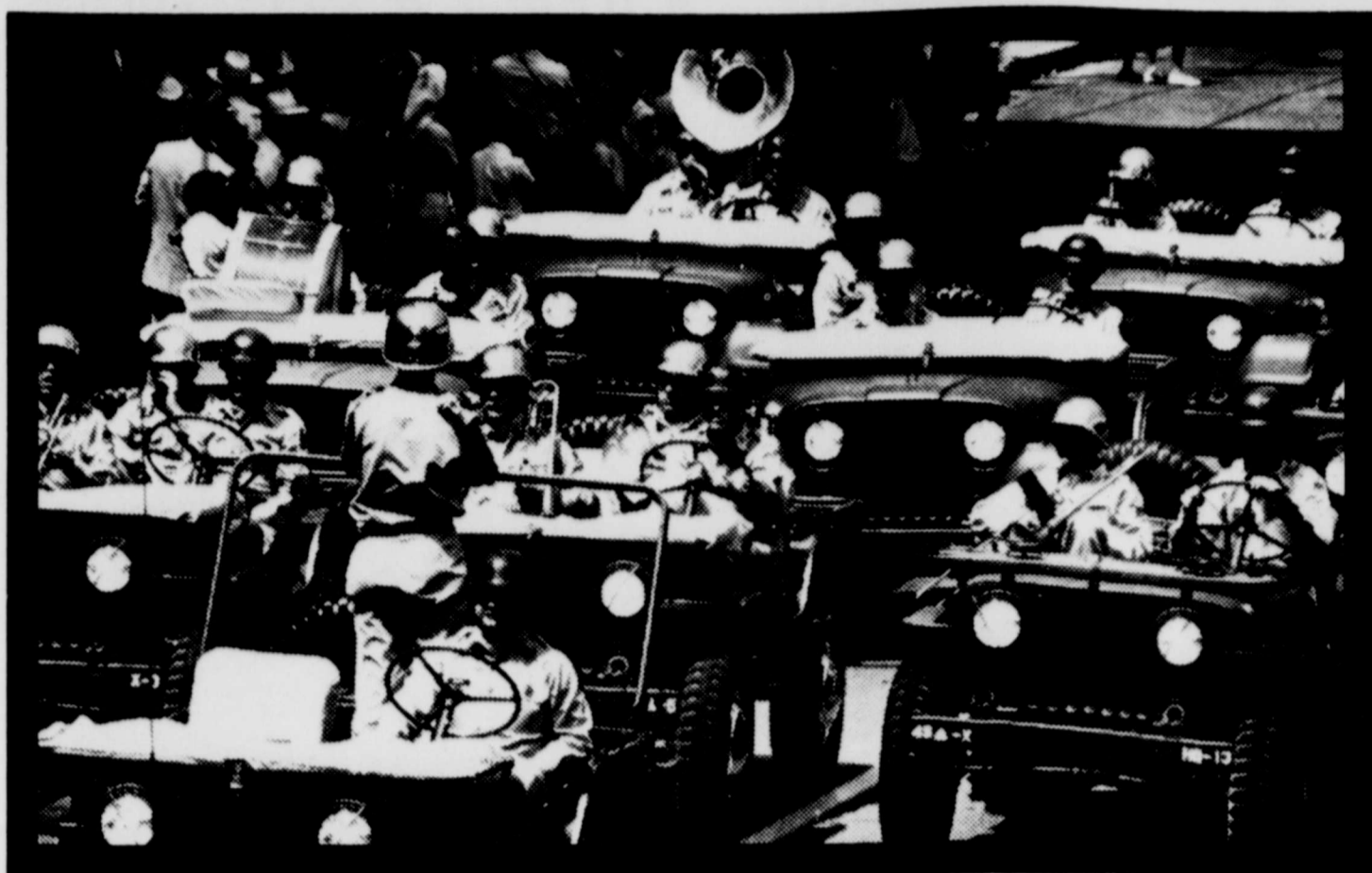

## UP, UP & AWAY



Maybe all airline pilots and pilots who fly company and large private plane on instrument will not agree with me after reading this week's offering. I know some who agree all the way.

The green card in a pilot's hip pocket gives the bearer the right to fly a plane during instrument weather, but it does not guarantee that the bearer is a proficient instrument pilot.

One of my major dreads, back when I was working on military planes, was having to go along with a test pilot who had an instrument rating, but had not flown in a link trainer or plane in bad weather for a year or so. Everything would be OK so long as visibility wasn't below minimum.

Then there are some light plane pilots who believe they could fly a two passenger plane on instruments as well as a pilot who pilots a 747 jet. My feeling (not from actual experience) is that large and small planes will not react the same due to difference in maneuverability, instrument lag etc.

Instrument flying, to be good at it, one must get practice regularly. It can be compared to memory work. If you have just gotten to the point where you can recite it word for word then lay it on the shelf for one week and try to recite it. You know how efficient an inexperienced instrument ticket holder feels if he gets in bad weather.

This all leads up to an experience in 1946 in Clinton, Okla., when the owner of an Aero-coupe had his plane loaded with all the blind flying instrument he could get installed. He made the statement, "Weather never gets so bad in Oklahoma that I could not make a safe landing after getting these instruments working."

As I remember that day's discussion he was positive he could make a successful landing any day of the year even without the newly purchased instruments. How many of you pilot readers have ever been caught in weather that prevents you from seeing either wing tip or even the propeller? I am convinced the man I am writing about had not been under such a strain or he would not have made the absurd statement.

Until he has been in a light plane under such circumstances and had to hang his pocket

watch or necktie on a control extending from the instrument panel to gauge the degree of banks, strain his ears to catch a change in engine rpm sound or glued his eyes on the air-speed indicator to see how the lagging changes compared with the engine sounds, fought with all the willpower one can muster to keep from becoming a panic maniac a pilot is in good position to believe he could make a landing in any Oklahoma weather.

Give the average pilot enough training for an instrument flight rating, and if he doesn't keep up practice, he will, too, be in a mess under such conditions. I know.

## Gates Closed Except During Morning & Afternoon Rush Hour

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS--Motorists attempting to use two of Sheppard's gates beginning last Friday may find themselves in for a detour.

Due to a projected decrease in manning, Gate 3 (Wherry Housing) and Gate 4 (Missile Road) will remain closed to traffic except during morning and afternoon rush hours.

The Wherry Gate will remain open from 7 to 8:30 a.m. and from 6 to 5:30 p.m. duty days only. It formerly was open between 6:30 a.m. and midnight seven days a week.

The Missile Road Gate will be open to traffic between 5 and 8 a.m. and 4 and 6 p.m. duty days only. It formerly was open between 5 a.m. and 7 p.m. duty days.

The change was effective Friday and will be permanent.

Reasons for the change in gate hours were explained in a letter signed by Lt. Col.

Robert H. White, chief, Security Police.

During hours other than rush hour the two gates serve only as a convenience to a small number of people.

The Wherry Gate serves only Wherry residents and commercial delivery trucks to the housing area.

"Gate 1 is quite close to Wherry, and is certainly no greater distance than many residents at other Air Force bases must travel to base exits," the letter stated.

The Missile Road Gate serve only those who work in the area it serves and for off-base visitors to the remarketing and distribution area.

Colonel White anticipates that both Gate 1 and 2 can handle the added traffic.

## Program RECON Recognized By Citations & Plaques

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS--The most successful management improvement program in Sheppard's history was recognized Wednesday morning as Maj. Gen. Jerry D. Page, Sheppard commander, presented citations and plaques to those responsible for operating the Fiscal Year 1970 Resources Conservation Program (RECON) at Sheppard.

RECON replaced the Cost Reduction Program in July when new guidelines were issued streamlining operating procedures.

On hand to receive the awards were Col. Joseph W. Smith, commander 3750th Maintenance and Supply Group; Maj. Edward V. Finuf, base program monitor; and Harold O. Blow, program specialist.

General Page presented the Air Force Management Improvement Award which he had received from Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. John D. Ryan in ceremonies at Bolling AFB, D.C., Oct. 20. He also presented the Air Training Command Outstanding Management Award which he received from Lt. Gen. George B. Simler, ATC commander, while attending the ATC Commanders Conference recently.

Presentation of the awards was made in General Page's office following the Center Staff meeting.

Sheppard was selected to receive the special award as a finalist in competition for the newly created Presidential Management Improvement Award. The award emphasizes President Nixon's Government-wide concern with better management and economy.

Richard J. Borda, assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Manpower and Reserve Affairs was also on hand for presentation of the Presidential Award at Bolling. The ceremony followed a RECON Workshop which was attended by Mr. Blow.

General Ryan lauded the 24 awards recipients and warned that the pressure to reduce Defense Spending will continue. "We have already seen an increased demand for spending in the domestic sector of the economy. Concurrently, we have seen a redirection of budgetary planning toward a greater emphasis on domestic needs," he stated.

It was further pointed out that Sheppard had exceeded goals in each assigned program area and validated savings had been reported in two areas having no assigned goals.

The citation accompanying the ATC award to Sheppard revealed that the base had \$3,853,300 of validated savings against the FY '70 goal of \$1,391,000 for an accomplishment of 277 per cent. Against a three-year goal of \$3,030,800 savings were validated in the amount of \$8,465,300 for a 279 percent accomplishment.
