Indian Kade Colley was able to pass for 63 yards, but the Indians were punished in the rushing department by

being held to a negative 46 yards for the game.

In the rushing department, Keifer McNelly was 8 for 10.

Colley was 5-17-63-1 in the passing game.

Indian Warren Flye was 2-36 in the receiving department.

Head Coach Grady Benton remarked, "After reviewing the video on Saturday and taking some time to reflect on this past week I walked away with more positives than I expected to leaving the stadium Friday night. I walked out of the stadium

shocked, because I believe my football team is better than they showed. I understand that sounds crazy if you are only focused on the final score."

"My team fought and scratched through a very difficult first half giving us

a chance to win a ballgame against a very talented City View team. Unfortunately, we didn't adjust our sails as well in the second half, allowing City View to pull away. When you play talented teams you have got to be able to weather some storms, because they are going to make plays. Hopefully this experience will prove valuable down the road for my guys."

The JV Indians lost 22-26. The eighth grade team lost 14-20. The seventh grade team defeated City View 22-0.

Benton said, "I'm very excited about the improvement that our sub-varsity teams made this week. Got some young ones coming up that are learning rapidly what it takes to one day represent this community on Friday night!"

The sub varsity will make the trip to Forsan on Thursday starting with the 7th grade at 4 p.m.

Friday night the Indians will host Forsan to begin the district season. Benton said, "We are in this together, come out and support the young men of this community."

Early voting to begin Oct. 22

In a few short weeks, registered voters will be going to the polls to cast their votes in the general election scheduled for Tuesday, November 6.

Early voting will begin Monday, October 22 and continue through Friday, November 2. A request for a ballot by mail must be received, not postmarked, by October 30.

Topping the ballot is the presidential race. Republican Mitt Romney and his vice presidential nominee Paul Ryan are going head to head against democratic opponents President Barack Obama and Joe Biden. Candidates for the Libertarian Party and Green Party are also on the ballot.

Texans will elect a U.S. Senator and all 36 United States Representatives. Vying for the senate seat of retiring Senator Kay Bailey Hutchinson is democrat Paul Sadler and republican Ted Cruz. They are joined by John Myers of the Libertarian Party and Green Party candidate David Collins.

Current representative for district 19, Randy Neugebauer will represent the republican party, with no challenger on the democratic side.

Several Justice, Supreme Court places, Court of Criminal Appeals judges, Railroad Commissioners and State Board of Education positions will be decided.

For district 28, State Senator Robert Duncan is the republican representative, with no democratic candidate challenging. The state representative for district 68 seat is being sought by republican Drew Springer. Rick Hardcastle chose not to run for reelection.

On a more local level, there are several unopposed county positions on the ballot.

The contested races in Haskell County include Precinct 1 Commissioner. Democratic incumbent Johnny Scoggins is being challenged by former commissioner and republican Billy Wayne Hester.

Hoping to serve as Haskell County Sheriff is Sheriff's Deputy Winston Stephens and write-in candidate Gregg Hearn.

Early voting will be at the Haskell County Courthouse.

Not only is voting an opportunity to have your voice heard, but it is also the duty of all Americans. Be informed and go vote.

Donna Rae White Sasseen



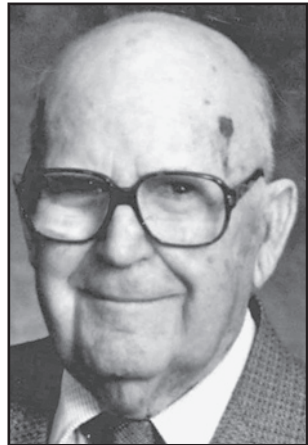

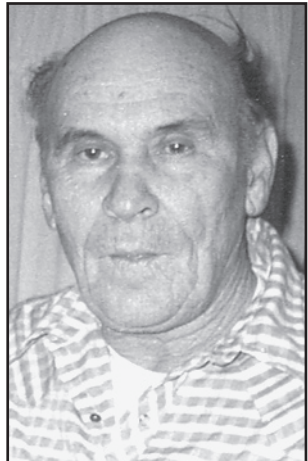

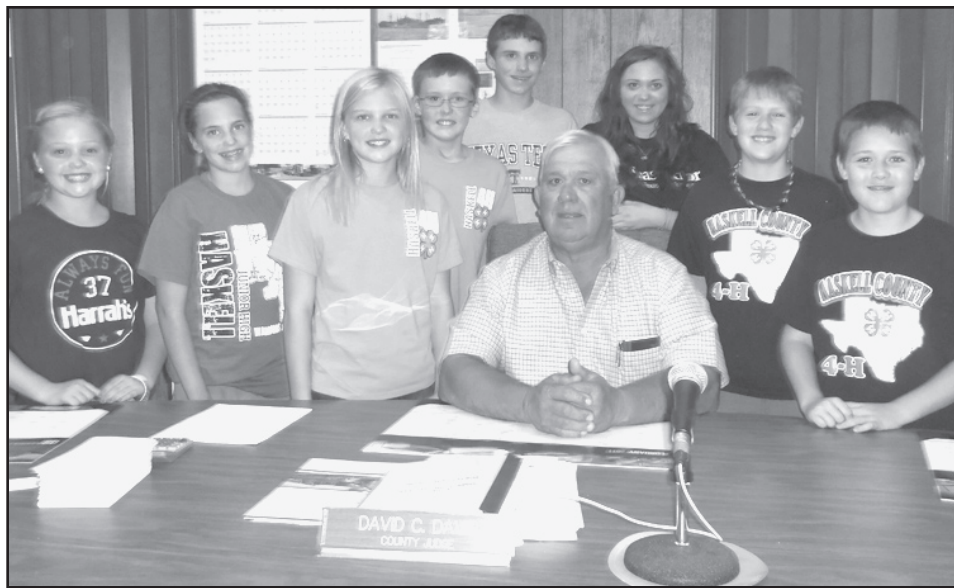

State revises method of purging voter rolls

AUSTIN—The State of Texas last week agreed to drop its recently adopted practice of using “weak matches” of Social Security Administration data in purging names from voter rolls as required by a 2011 state law.

What precipitated the agreement was a lawsuit filed Sept. 20 in a Travis County district court by Austin attorneys Buck Wood and David Richards on behalf of four plaintiffs who were among some 70,000 Texans who were mailed a letter from the state’s chief elections officer, Secretary of State Hope Andrade, instructing recipients to fill out a form and send it to their local voter registrar within 30 days—or be presumed dead—and consequently stricken from the list of registered voters.

Pursuant to the agreement, Andrade stopped using weak matches, or part of a name and part of a social security number, to identify deceased or possibly deceased voters.

Names on voter rolls that have been “strong matched” through Social Security Administration death index data will get a letter and have 30 days to respond.

Meanwhile, Oct. 9 was the last day to register to vote. Looking forward, on Monday, Oct. 22, early voting begins.

And, on the subject of voting, Texans last week saw the campaign season move to the front burner with the first of three scheduled debates between incumbent President Barack Obama and Republican challenger Mitt Romney taking place on Oct. 3 and the first of two debates between U.S. Senate nominees, Democrat Paul Sadler and Republican Ted Cruz on Oct. 2.

Broadcast from Denver, the presidential debate featured segments on the economy, health care, the role of government and the act of governing. Online, nonpartisan fact-checking organizations such as factcheck.org have posted information to help viewers sort out what they heard.

School fund finishes strong

Texas Education Agency on Oct. 2 announced “an outstanding return on the investments” of the Permanent School Fund for fiscal year 2011-2012, closing with a value of \$25.5 billion and a return of 9.44 percent on its investments.

According to the agency, the fund, which helps pay for textbooks and other educational expenses of school districts, provided \$1.2 billion in revenue for public schools over the two years.

School offers \$10,000 degree

Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 2 praised Angelo State University’s new \$10,000 degree

program and called on more Texas universities to follow suit, the governor’s office announced Oct. 2 in San Angelo.

Joined by Texas Tech University System Chancellor Kent Hance, Angelo State University President Joseph C. Rallo and state Rep. Drew Darby, R-San Angelo, the governor applauded Angelo State “for joining the growing list of universities that are thinking hard about how to educate more Texans at a reasonable cost.”

Under the program, Perry said, any qualifying student could enter Angelo State as a freshman and in four years leave with a bachelor’s degree in interdisciplinary studies for less than \$10,000 in tuition and fees, starting in the fall of 2013. A list of other institutions have responded to Perry’s call to create \$10,000 degree programs.

Enforcement numbers come in

Texas Department of Public Safety on Oct. 2 reported troopers made 1,859 arrests of motorists for driving while intoxicated during an Aug. 19 to Sept. 5 enforcement period that included the Labor Day holiday.

Increased patrols in high-risk locations also netted an estimated 25,000 speeding citations, more than 3,800 seat belt and child safety seat citations, 1,190 fugitive arrests and 877 felony arrests, the DPS reported.

Keep praying for more rain and do all that you can to conserve water.

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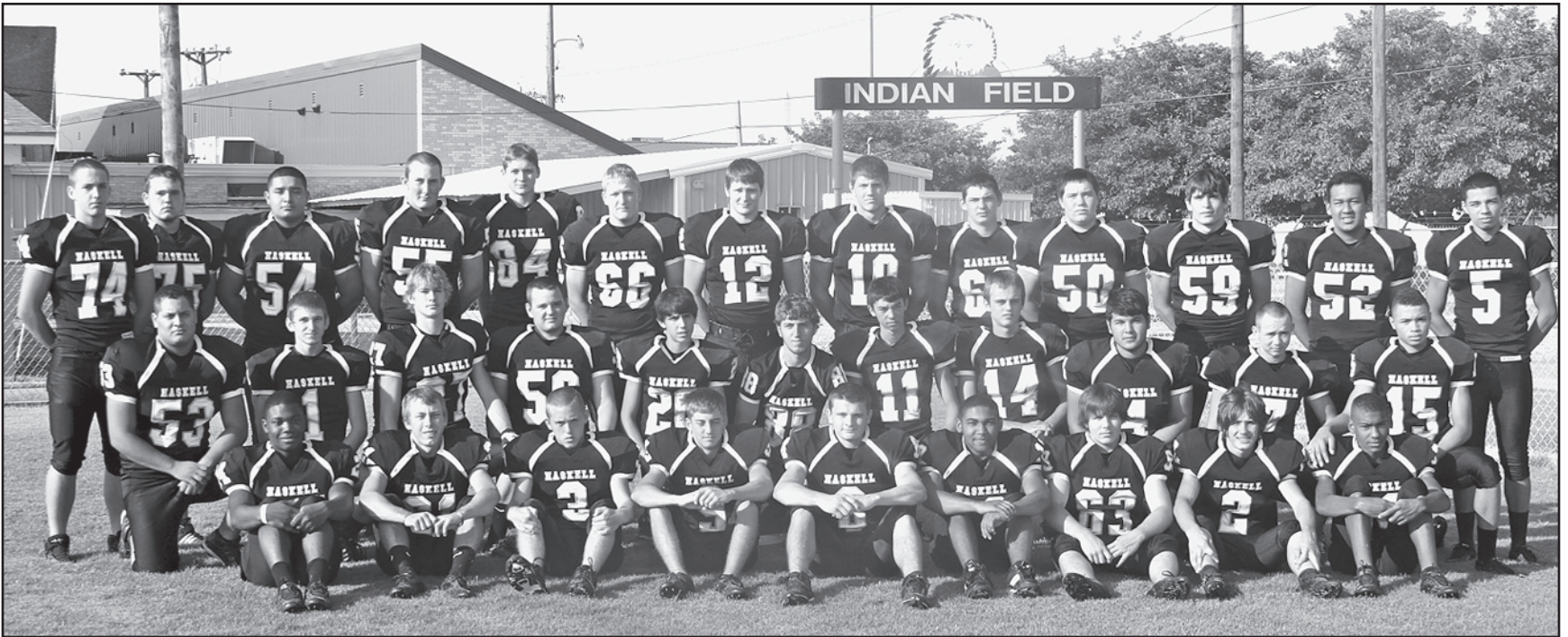

Passport Fair set in Seymour

Are you planning a trip out of the country? The Seymour Post Office located at 210 N. Washington is holding a special passport fair from 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Sat., Oct. 27. International travel regulations require a valid passport book for U.S. citizens traveling by air between the United States and other countries. A passport card is required to travel via land or sea between the U.S. and Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean and Bermuda.

"Customers need to prepare in advance," said Postmaster, Sid Winn. "Routine passport processing takes 3-6 weeks. The Postal Service wants to help customers receive their passport in plenty of time for their trip."

To obtain a passport customers need to:

- Bring in proper proof of American citizenship. This must be either a certified birth certificate issued by the city, county or state; a previous U.S. passport; a certificate of citizenship; or a naturalization certificate. (Please note: a hospital-issued birth certificate alone is not acceptable.)

- Bring in proof of identity. This must be a photo ID such as a U.S. passport; a

naturalization certificate; a certificate of citizenship; or a current valid driver's license, government ID or military photo ID.

- The passport application requires one recent photograph (2" x 2" in size), which the Seymour Post Office can provide for \$15.

- To save time, customers may download a passport application at www.usps.com/passport to complete beforehand.

- All applicants must appear in person (including minors).

- Minors under the age of 16 must appear with both parents. If one parent is not available, a notarized authorization from the absent parent is required.

Each passport book (good for air and land travel) for an adult must be accompanied by a check or money order for \$110 made payable to the U.S. Department of State and a \$25 execution fee made payable to Postmaster. Fees for children under 16 are \$80 and \$25. Fees for passport cards (land travel only) are \$30 for adults and \$15 for children under 16.

"It is important for customers to complete this process well before their trip," said Winn. Customers

traveling in less than 3 weeks can request Expedite Service and receive their passport in 1-2 weeks. Expedite Service costs an additional \$60 plus mail charges to the passport processing center and for return of the new passport.

Customers can also call 800-ASK-USPS to get the location of other nearby passport Post Offices and their passport customer service hours, or visit the State Department's web site at www.travel.state.gov.

It began as a tribute and celebration of what would have been Casen Riley's first birthday. Three years later, it has evolved into a major fund-raiser and a means to spread awareness for Pediatric Cardiomyopathy.

The six month old son of Casey and Heather Steele Riley, both graduates of Haskell High School, passed away in March 2010 after being diagnosed with hypertrophic cardiomyopathy.

While there are variations of cardiomyopathy, it generally causes an enlarged

heart. It is estimated that 30,000 children have this disease. This "silent disease" is the leading cause of sudden deaths and heart transplants in children under the age of 18. Because the disease may present itself without obvious symptoms, cardiomyopathy often goes undiagnosed.

Searching for a way to honor and remember their precious son, the Rileys, in 2010 organized a 3-on-3 basketball tournament. With eight teams and many spectators, it was a huge success, raising \$3000 for the Children's Cardiomyopathy

Foundation.

The event has continued to grow. \$5000 was raised for the cause at the 2nd Annual Casen Riley fundraiser. In addition to the 3-on-3 tournament, Haskell National Bank held a chicken spaghetti luncheon.

On August 25, the third annual Casen's Crew for Children's Cardiomyopathy was held at Will Hair Park in Abilene. New to the fund-raising effort was a 5K run/walk. Hoping for at least forty entries, they were overwhelmed when more than seventy runners participated. Prizes were awarded for seven age groups.

Many spectators and supporters enjoyed the day of friendly competition as teams played in the basketball tournament. T-shirts, designed by Heather, were sold and United Supermarkets cooked hamburgers. The successful spaghetti luncheon was again held at Haskell National Bank. At the end of the day \$7000 had been raised to support research and treatment for this devastating disease.

Casen's Crew wants to thank everyone who helped. To those who participated in the run or basketball tournament, bought hamburgers, t-shirts,

spaghetti tickets, donated money or time, you are greatly appreciated.

Heather says, "The past couple of years have taught us so much about love, kindness, faith, forgiveness and the power of God's plan. It warms my heart to think that a child that was alive for only 6

months can do so much and make a difference in the lives of so many people."

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK
 October 7-13



Almost all fires can be prevented by taking certain precautions to make your home safe. Here are some fire prevention tips:

Cooking

- Stay close by and pay attention when cooking. Unattended cooking is one of the most common causes of fires.
- Keep combustibles—such as curtains or drapes, clothing, packaged foods and trash—away from stoves.
- Clean grease from the stove and flue.



Heating

- Have your furnace or heating system checked by a competent service company at least once a year.
- Take special care with fireplaces. Use a screen to prevent sparks from flying and be sure the chimney is unblocked and free of excessive creosote accumulation.

- Keep combustible items away from all heating units.

Appliances

- Don't overload dryers and be sure to remove lint regularly.
- Check your appliances at least once a year to see that they are clean and functioning properly and that insulation has not broken or cracked.
- Buy appliances having Underwriters Laboratories or other nationally recognized testing laboratory approval.

Electrical Distribution

- If there is any sign of electrical trouble, shut off power to the circuit and have it checked by an electrician.
- Check cords and plugs frequently for signs of broken insulation or frayed wires.

Safety

- Keep matches and cigarette lighters away from children.

Wildfire control

- Control vegetation within 30 feet of your home.
- Keep trees and brush away from power lines.
- Space trees at least 25-30 feet apart.
- Install spark arrester on chimney.
- Keep roof and gutters clean.
- In rural areas, know where existing water sources can be found, such as ponds, that can be used as a source of water for fire trucks.
- Stack firewood away from home.

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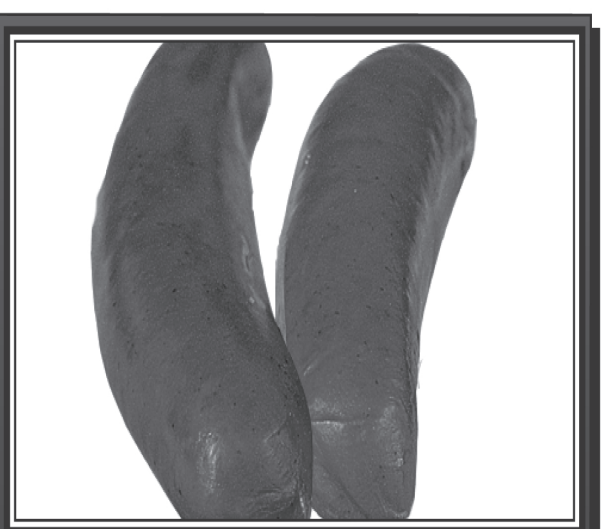
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
