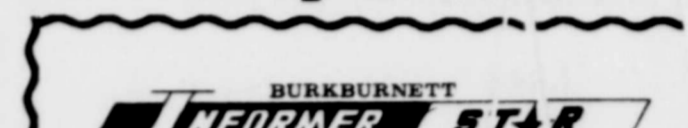
## Youths Sweeping Area In Informer Sweepstakes

## Public Views Police Facility

Open house was held Sunday afternoon by the Burk Burnett Police Department for public inspection of the department's new headquarters.

Located in the building that served as Burk's only community center for years, the new station consists of 11 offices and a large communications center which is manned around the clock. The center is equipped with a national police teletype and Texas Highway Patrol and Civil Defense radios.

Corporation Court Judge Jess Whatley has been assigned one of the offices in the new station that is large enough for informal hearings, with jury trials being taken into the training room, which also serves as a staff meeting room.

All rooms are paneled and have new ceilings and tile floors.

The south end of the building has been left for future development as a jail.

The complete remodeling, with most of the labor done by the city employees, cost the city about \$6,000.

On hand to welcome the approximately 150 guests from around the area Sunday were city manager, Gary Bean, Mayor Billy J. Smith, the city councilmen, and Judge Whatley.

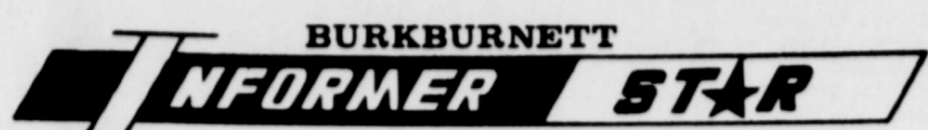

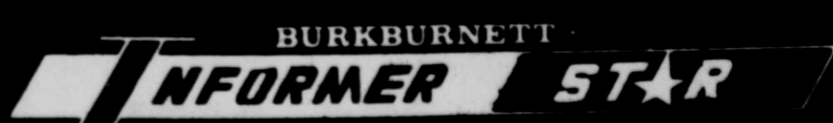

## Folk Musical Set For Central Baptist Church

Natural High, a folk-musical about God's Son, will be presented Sunday at 6:30 p.m. in the Central Baptist Church of Burk Burnett.

The cast is made up of 35-40 young people from First Baptist Church of Electra and other denominations. To the adult it will point out that the community is blessed with many fine young people. To the youth, it will reveal that there is another side of growing up besides indulging in drugs.

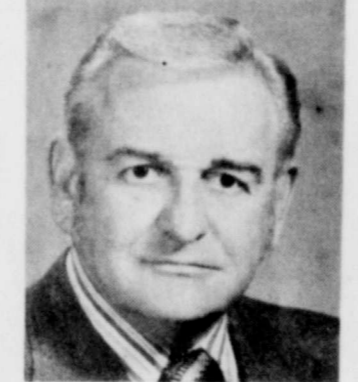

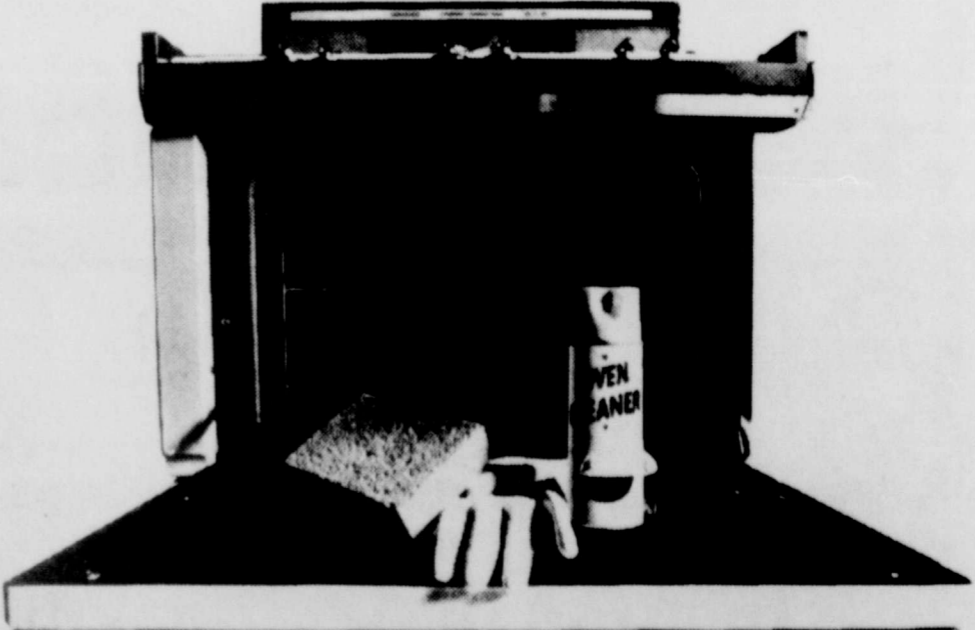
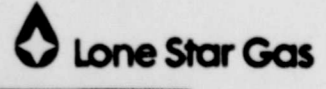

## Man And Machine United After 20 Years Apart

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS-- A reunion recently between man and machine brought back pleasant memories for TSgt. John J. Rushford, a helicopter technician with Detachment 15, 43rd Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Squadron at Sheppard AFB.

"In 1952, said Sergeant Rushford, "I was assigned as a crew chief with the 3567th Maintenance Squadron at James Connally AFB, Tex. (since Deactivated), which accepted some brand new T-29 aircraft from the Convair factory at Lindberg Field, Calif."

The aircraft, numbers 52-1100 through 52-1172 (except 52-1136, which went to Randolph AFB, Tex.) were the first "C" model T-29s accepted for active duty with the Air Force.

Now, T-29 number 52-1100, along with a sister plane, is parked on the flight line at Sheppard, where Sergeant Rushford can look and remember.

"Sometimes I feel the urge to check out the equipment or do some maintenance work on it," said the sergeant, "I get nostalgic just looking at it."

Sergeant Rushford, a 21-year Air Force veteran is from Modesto, Calif. Prior to joining the Air Force, he attended Modesto High School, where he became interested in flying. Taking aeronautics in school, he earned his private and commercial pilots license.

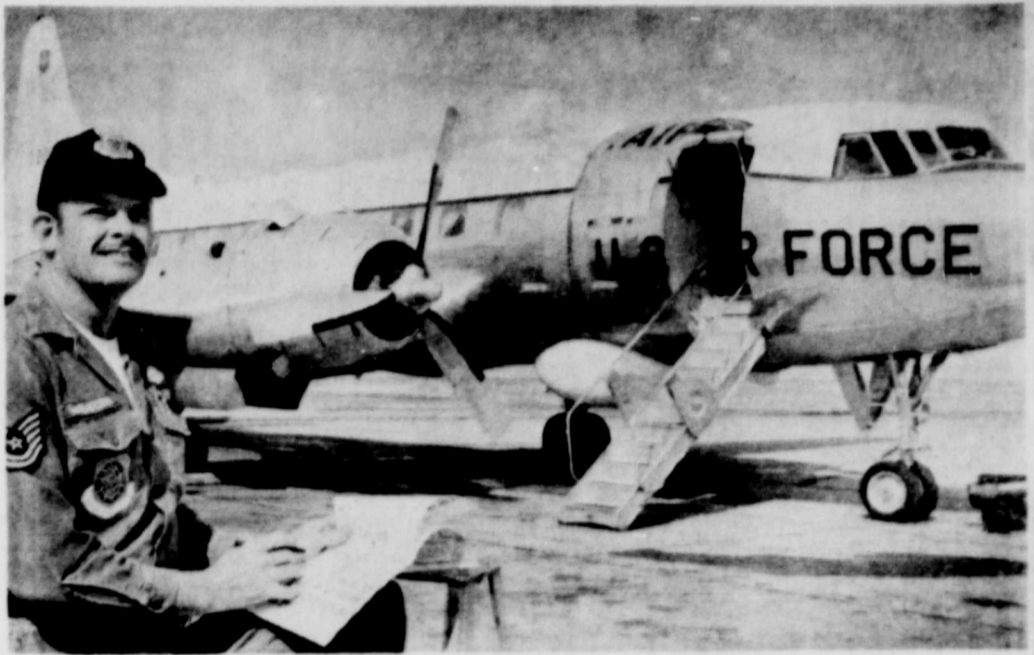
Following graduation, he worked as a mechanic and pilot for a crop dusting company in California. This experience he described as "interesting, but dangerous."

Since joining the Air Force, he has served as a mechanic, flight engineer, and crew chief on standard aircraft and helicopters, and has been on flying status since February 1952.

Graduating from the aircraft mechanics course at Sheppard in 1951, his assignments have included Webb AFB, Texas; Bolling AFB, Washington, D. C.; Naha, Okinawa; Vance AFB, Okla.; and Utapao, Thailand. He returned to Sheppard to assume his present duties as a quality control noncommissioned officer in March 1971.

The T-29 has also been moved around quite a lot. It left Conally for Harlingen AFB, Tex.; back to Conally; then to Chamute AFB, Ill.; to New York for an overhaul; to Randolph; and finally it came to rest at Sheppard.

"The T-29 was a good aircraft so work with," recalled Sergeant Rushford, "but I enjoy working on helicopters. They are a little more complex."

For example, when used in a protective helmet, when an impact occurs, the pellets would rush for the point of force to protect the wearer from concussions.

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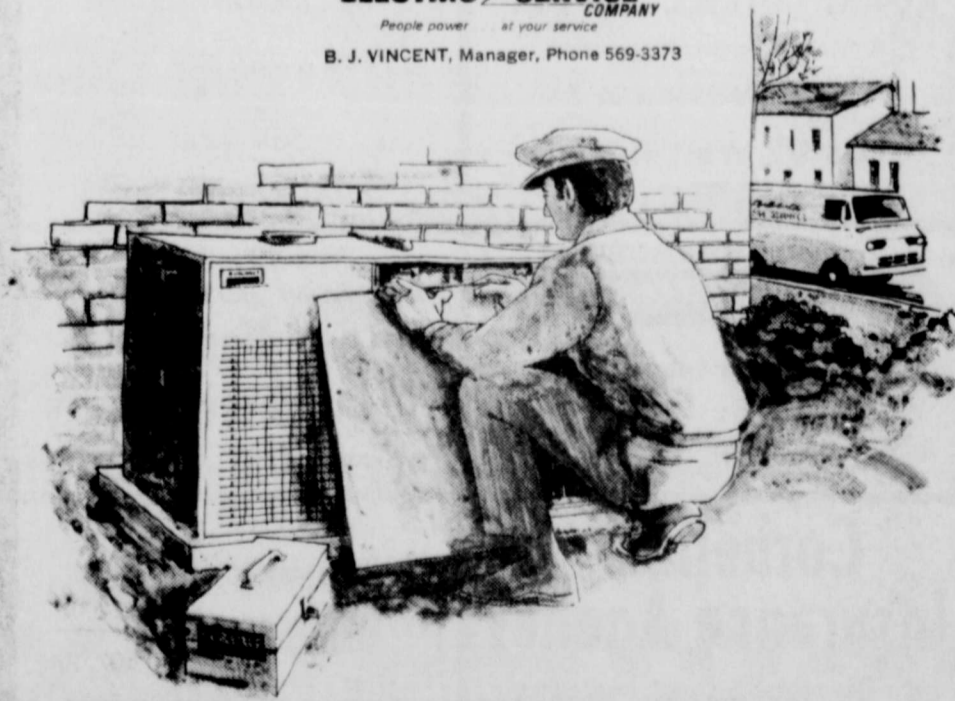

### 'Litter-Gitter' Bugs Litterbugs

For physical fitness, nutrition is as important in the middle and later years as it was when you were under 40, said Joyce Smith, Wichita County Home Demonstration Agent. Even though cooking for just one or two, you'll feel better if well nourished.

A person needs fewer calories after age 40, but the need for vitamins, minerals and protein stays high throughout life. Adequate amounts of these nutrients should be chosen from the four food groups each day. The four food groups include milk, meat, fruits and vegetables and breads and cereals.

Citrus fruits provide vitamin C. Select butter or margarine, eggs and vegetables for vitamin A. Include eggs, enriched breads and cereals as sources of iron. Make every dish you prepare as tasty and attractive as possible. Use fruit and vegetable garnishes even though they take time to prepare. Make a meal plan that's easy to follow. Such a plan helps the homemaker include all the necessary foods in daily meals.

With fewer to cook for, you may find it more economical to buy foods in smaller units than you once did. If half a giant size box of cereal goes to waste, it's food money lost. Consult cook books to know what ingredients to buy for making smaller amounts of food than before.

For best nutrition, use leftovers in creative ways. Toss strips of ham or chicken with greens to make an attractive chef's salad. Or combine meats with sauces, canned soups or vegetables to make new one-dish meals.

Remember to reheat leftover vegetables in the oven to have a delicious addition to your meal with less watching than when you reheat leftovers on the range top. Freeze leftovers and later they'll seem like new dishes.

Nutritional health is just as important when you get older as it was when you

were younger. Make the most effort and take the time to eat nutritious meals.

Color counts when choosing grapefruit.

You'll be a winner when you buy Texas grapefruit, whether the white or the Texas Ruby Red or Texas Star Ruby variety. Color makes a slight difference in the taste and in the nutrient content of the fruit. Both red or white grapefruit furnish 80 per cent of an adult's daily vitamin C needs. But it's a different story when vitamin A content is compared.

There isn't a great deal of vitamin A value in grapefruit. But red grapefruit does have more than 50 times the amount found in white. And vitamin A is the vitamin that helps eyes adjust to dim light.

For adults the recommended daily allowance for vitamin A is 5,000 USP units a day. A red grapefruit furnishes about 10 per cent of this daily requirement. Vitamin A is stored in the body and a grapefruit a day adds to this reserve of the nutrient. A few other foods containing vitamin A or dark green or dark yellow vegetables, liver and eggs. A russet or bronze color on the outer skin of grapefruit usually doesn't affect its quality. But the Texas-grown varieties are especially tasty and attractive in appearance.

Livestock and household pet owners are reminded that screwworms have returned to Texas with a vengeance. They should take all precautions to reduce case numbers. An unusually mild winter in many portions of Mexico and in overwintering areas of South Texas has resulted in large fertile fly populations that are now triggering case outbreaks in many areas of Texas. Although all known cases are receiving hot-spotted treatments of sterile flies produced at the Mission Screwworm Eradication Center, nevertheless the cooperation of all producers is needed now.

A screwworm epidemic is in prospect. Screwworm cases in Mexico have mushroomed during the winter and early spring, and Texas cases have spread from the Rio Grande Valley and South Texas through the Hill Country and into the Big Bend area. Hamilton County in Central Texas recorded its first case of the year this week and 28 different counties have reported cases since the first of April.

Before the screwworm eradication program began in 1962, southwestern livestock owners suffered hundreds of millions of dollars in livestock losses annually. Since the program has been underway, losses have been kept to a minimum and ranch workers have concentrated on other activities besides checking for screwworms.

The time has come, however, when cooperation is again needed from all livestock owners and household pet enthusiasts. Ideal weather conditions and migrating fertile flies are posing a threat to all counties of the state. Thus far in 1972, 188 cases have been confirmed in a wide area of Texas. Through the end of April last year, only 21 cases were diagnosed as positive. No screwworm cases were confirmed through the end of March in 1970.

Livestock and pet owners are urged to check their animals regularly and to treat all wounds found with a product recommended for that purpose. If worms are found in wounds, producers should collect 10 or more of the larvae from deep within the center of the wound and place them in a collection kit. Vials for mailing the samples may be obtained from the County Agents office. Samples should be sent to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory, Box 969, Mission, Texas, for identification.

Many millions of acres in Texas are infested with undesirable woody plants that reduce forage production and make it difficult to handle livestock. Brush control can be a means of improving forage production, improving wildlife

habitat and conserving natural resources if brush control is coupled with good resource management practices.

A first step is to inventory your ranch resources and define the problems that need attention. Then decide what your management goals are over a period of time. Chances are brush control will be considered on most Texas ranches. Eradication of troublesome woody plants may be desirable in some instances, but it is not possible without a tremendous expenditure of time and money.

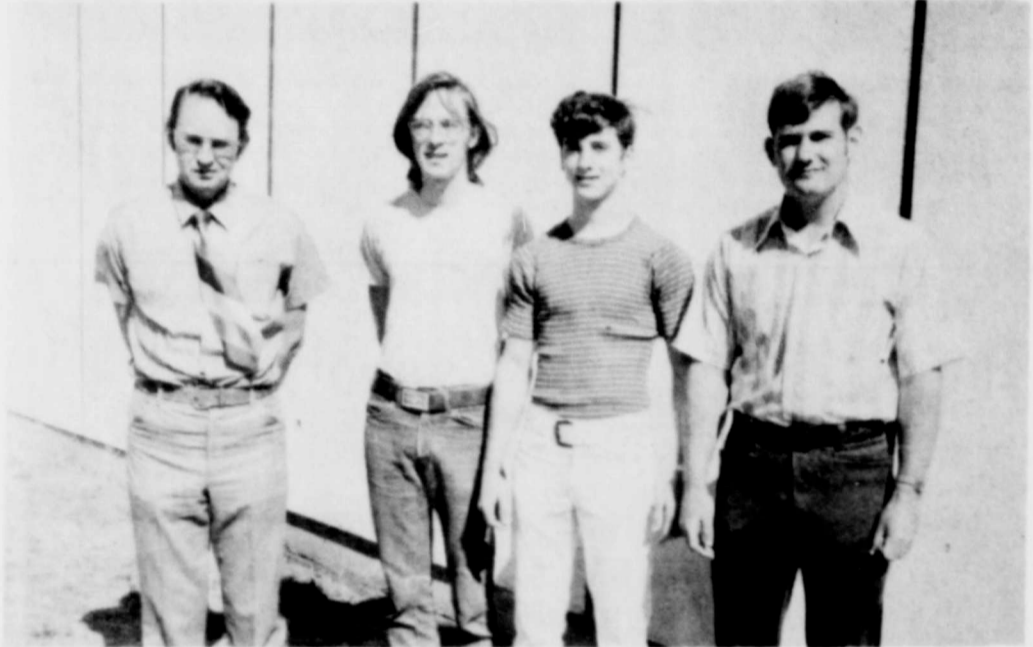
