
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
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Dean Dazzles, Dog Domain

Forage producers in Texas now have several new pasture grasses available to fit a variety of conditions. Kleingrass 75 is a warm-season perennial bunchgrass for southern and western areas. TAM Wintergreen hardinggrass is a perennial cool-season grass for calcareous soils. A new South Texas grass is Higgins buffelgrass. Another warm-season perennial bunchgrass is lovegrass, Renner lovegrass being the newest variety. Midland and Coastal bermudagrass are also popular.

Two varieties of St. Augustinegrass have been found to be resistant to chinch bugs by researchers with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The two varieties are Floratam, a new grass now being propagated by Texas sod growers that is also resistant to St. Augustine Decline (SAD) virus, and an experimental grass that also shows good resistance to

Forage producers in Wichita County are becoming interested in new grasses, several of which can be established from seed. In each case, good seedbed preparations is essential.

For instance the techniques easy establishment of for Coastal Bermudagrass do not work when planting seeded Several factors are grass. critical to enhance rapid stands of seeded grasses.

Start with a good seedbed. This means plowing the area several months before grasses are to be planted to permit the soil to settle and become firm. Many of the new grasses contain 500,000 seeds per pound. If planted in a rough seedbed,

these small seeds frequently fall between clods and too deep to emerge above the soil. Plant grass seed no more than onehalf inch deep. In fact, planting the seed on top of the soil and using a roller or packer is is in order. satisfactory in most cases.

Adjust grass seed planters and drills before planting the pasture. A few minutes devoted to equipment maintenance and adjustment can mean the difference between a uniform stand and un sati stactory planting.



Although some mobile homes are fully furnished, most provide a bare minimum of furniture. Living rooms might contain a sofa and one chair. Diming areas usually have a table and four chairs, while some also include a hutch or China cabinet.

Many people consider rats mice harmless little and creatures and don't realize the need for their control. In fact, some persons say they are cute and wish to keep them around. This is a terrible lack of knowledge which must be reversed. Rats and mice are responsible for many diseases ffecting human and animal Several of the most health. important diseases in the United States are Murine Typhus Fever, Plague, Salmonellosis, Hemorrhagic Trichinosis, Jaundice and Rat Bite Fever. Murine Typhus Fever is transmitted from rat to men by the Oriental Rat Flea. It attacks the body's blood vessels. The disease lasts from 2 to 3 weeks and convalescence lasts much longer. Murine Typhus Fever isfatal tohumans in about 2% of the cases.

Plague (Black Death) is also transmitted from rat to man by the Oriental Rat Flea and at one time killed a fourth of the world's population. It may affect man in 3 ways: (1) bubonic, characterized by swolen lymph glands, (2) pneu-(2) swolen lymph glands, pneumonic, an infection of the lungs and (3) septicemic, an infection of the blood.

Salmonellosis is caused by numerous species of bacteria of the Genera Salmonella. These bacteria are intestinal parasites of man, fowl, and domestic animals, including commensal rodents. Rats infected with Salmonellosis transmit it to man by contamination of food with their urine and feces. Trichinosis is usually transmitted to humans by eating uncooked pork. Rats that eat uncooked garbage which contains the trichinella organism become infected and may transmit it to hogs that eat the infected rats. Trichinosis is spread from rat to rat because of their cannibalistic tendencies. This disease causes a high mortality

among children under 2 years of

Hemorrhagic Jaundice is spread to man by food or water contaminated with urine of infected rats or by handling dead rats. This disease is characterized by conjunctivities and enlargement of the liver and lasts from 1 to 3 weeks. It is not usually fatal but is dangerous to older persons. Rat Bite Fever may be one

of two diseases with the same name. One is characterized by arthritic symptons and blotchy subcutaneous bleeding and the other characterized by a rash. Both diseases start with the sudden on set of rigors and fever. Frequent relapses may occur for weeks or even months. As the name implys, the primary mode of transmission is the bite of infected rats although infection has occurred in persons working or living in rat infested buildings. Outbreaks have been traced to contaminated milk or milk product s.

Besides threats to human health, rats distribute many diseases to livestock, poultry and pets. Examples are Contagious Abortion, Distemper, Equine Influenza, Mange, Mastitis, Leptrospirosis, Pseudorabies, Rabies, Swine, Ery-sipelus, Tracheitis, Trichsipelus, inosis and Tuberculosis.



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


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






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
