"Stiff competition" is by no means an exaggeration of the entries in the Burk Burnett Junior Livestock Show held last Saturday. Enthusiasm bubbled from each contestant as their animals were shown in hopes of bringing home that first place ribbon and possibly the Grand Champion Trophy.

The show was sponsored by the Burk Burnett Junior Livestock and Project Show Association and was held in the Burk Burnett High School vocational agriculture building.

Bob Jacobs, vocational agriculture teacher at Harrold, was judge for the entries in all divisions. As each winner and placers were chosen, Jacobs gave explanations of what qualities he had been looking for in the animals being judged. The main point of judging in

all divisions being judged was that of the amount of red meat the animal would eventually put on the table.

In the swine division, a Duroc, shown by Don Guinn, brought home the Grand Champion barrow trophy. Guinn, 16, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Guinn.

Charles Lindenborn, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chuck Lindenborn, won the Reserve Champion Barrow with a Hampshire.

Miss Felcia Masters, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N.A. Masters was the proud owner of the Grand Champion lamb. The lamb was also the winner in the heavyweight medium wool class. Miss Masters was the recipient of the showmanship award in the sheep division.

Reserve Champion lamb was shown by Anita Plumley, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H.L. Plumley.

A Hereford steer shown by Miss Lyn Morton, 12, was named Grand Champion in the beef division. Lyn is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Morton. Miss Morton was named the winner of the showmanship award in the beef division.

Charles Morton, Lyn's cousin, was named Reserve Champion with his Hereford steer. Charles is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Morton.

## BULLDOGS WIN DISTRICT

Varsity Basketball Coach Jim Phillips and the Bulldogs of Burk Burnett defeated the Weatherford Kangaroos Tuesday night 74-67 to take the undisputed District 4-AAA Basketball Championship.

According to Phillips, the Bulldogs traveled to Weatherford to play winning ball and that game plan controlled from the onset. The dogs jumped into the lead in a hurry and never let up on the Kangaroos. A full court press, beginning in the first quarter held the 'Roos to a total of 19 points in the first period as the 'Dogs cut the threads with 20.

Weatherford picked up speed and accuracy in the 2nd quarter, scoring 20 points. But the

'Dogs never eased the pressure and placed 25 points on the scoreboard before the sound of the half-time buzzer.

The first half of play caught the Bulldogs in foul trouble and Coach Phillips had to call on his very capable bench to start second half play. The Roos, now desperate for points, started the 3rd quarter hot. They outscored the 'Dogs 22-18 in that quarter but still couldn't overcome as the 'Dogs led by 11 points at the end of the 3rd quarter.

Quarter number 4 was a coaches dream as the 'Dogs were settled and played heads up ball to the games end. Phillips said, "We didn't lose our composure, and scored from

the beginning to the end of the game." "When you lose your composure, and your scoring, your opponent will catch up with you and then pass you. You have to play a balanced game and that's what we did. The final score was 74-67."

Danny Nix and Mike Millar were apparently the main hosses in Tuesday's game. Nix hit 22 points and Millar 21. Greg Mayes hit for 15, Skip Dean 10, Terry Thomson 2, and Larry McMahlil 4.

Asked how he felt about being District Champs, Coach Jim Phillips said, "I'm real glad we won the District Race. The boys worked very hard and gave 100% all year and I think that they deserve it. I also think

it kind of tops the year since we won District in football too."

Tuesday night's win brings the Bulldog record to 20-4 for the season and 12-2 in District play.

The Bulldogs will probably play next this Friday night against Petrolia. The location has not been decided yet. And then next week the 'Dogs will probably see action in a regional tournament. The location for this tourney also has not been decided. The decision will be made today.

The four teams playing in the Regional Tourney will be 1-AAA Lemessa, 2-AAA Andrews, 3-AAA Leveland, and 4-AAA Burk Burnett. On Dogs!

## Burk Chamber Directors Announce '73 Committees

Directors of the Burk Chamber of Commerce held their regular monthly meeting last Thursday at noon in the Burk Burnett Bank. A fine meal, catered by Gill's Grocery and Market, was enjoyed by all.

Following the meal the meeting was called to order by President Lester Yates. Yates called on Chamber Manager, Raymond Greenwood to read the minutes of the last meeting. The minutes were read and approved as was the financial report.

Chamber directors were informed by Raymond Greenwood of the monetary results of the Chamber of Commerce Banquet. Greenwood told the group that the total amount taken in was \$1,274.50. Expenses were said to be very near \$1,160.00, which gave the Chamber a net profit of approximately \$100.00 from the event.

Bill Darland and C.J. Lippard both praised the Vo. Ag. boys for helping to set up and take down the 60 tables which were necessary to seat banquet guests. John Gill, who catered the banquet meal, also told the group of the fantastic job of serving which was handled by the Home Economics girls of Burk High School.

A question was raised concerning the Rodeo Equipment around the football field at the high school. The feasibility of moving the shoots, etc. from the immediate area was discussed by board members. It was stated that in removing this equipment, more room would be available for portable bleachers and would also make the area look much neater. A definite decision was not made and the problem will be further

studied and again discussed at the next meeting of the Chamber directors.

Director Loretta Hunt suggested an improvement for next years banquet. Mrs. Hunt told the group that the specific awards to be given, such as Man of the Year, and Woman of the Year, etc. should be publicized more than in the past. Her reasoning was that during the last banquet, many were not positively sure which awards would be presented.

President Lester Yates announced the deletion of three committees from the Chamber of Commerce and the addition of two new ones. Those deleted were the Boomtown Rodeo Committee, Community Development Committee, and the Governmental Affairs Committee. Those added were the Boomtown Relay Committee and the Projects Committee. Other committees for 1973, as in the past are the Agri. Committee, Boomtown U.S.A. Oil Park Committee, Highway Progress Committee, Industrial Development Committee, Military Affairs Committee, Planning Committee, Special Affairs Committee, Tourist Promotion Committee, and the Trade Promotion Committee.

Chamber Director Dale Lewis, announced plans for the Boomtown Relay Track Meet to be held March 16-17 in Burk. Twenty-eight area teams will be competing during the meet and Dale stated that the Chamber of Commerce would be responsible for feeding the athletes.

Chamber Manager Raymond Greenwood then reported that

## Outstanding Teenagers Selected At Burk HS

Three Burk Burnett High School students have been selected as Outstanding Teenagers of America for 1973, according to Mr. Billy Darland, principal.

Selection for the Outstanding Teenagers awards program automatically qualifies these students for further state, regional and national honors and scholarships totaling \$7,000. Local nominees are Susan Barad, Teri Garland, and Paula Jameson.

Nominated by their principals, the Outstanding Teenagers of America are chosen from individual schools across the country for excellence in academic achievement and community service. The local students will now vie for the Outstanding Teenager of the Year Trophy to be presented by the state's governor. Similar trophies will be presented to the winners in other states. The state winners are selected by the Outstanding Teenager Awards Selection Committee, in cooperation with the Board of Advisors.

The 51 state winners will be

eligible for awards totaling \$7,000. One boy and one girl will be chosen for national scholarships of \$1,000 each to be used at the college or university of their choice. Ten regional winners will also be selected from the remaining state winners to receive \$500 regional scholarships.

In recognizing the special talents of these Outstanding Teenagers, author and entertainer, Arthur Godfrey, said "You are an inspiration to your elders as well as your peers;... I hope you will eventually be as proud of us as we are of you."

These Outstanding Teenagers also have the opportunity to become great national leaders and doers," President Nixon said in a congratulatory message to the nominees.

Under the guidance of the Board of Advisors, the Outstanding Teenagers of America program was created to encourage young people to take full advantage of the opportunities in our country. The

**Guidelines of Life**

by John B. White, Minister, First Christian Church

Last week we talked about Key '73 in this column loosely tracing evangelism in the early church through today. We are at Phase II in Key 73 which is given an overall title of Calling Our Continent to the Word of God. Over one hundred fifty denominations across the USA and Canada are participating. Presently Key '73 scriptures to be studied are from January to Mid February '73 based on Acts of the Apostles as found in the Bible. The theme is titled "Mission Principles of the New Testament Church".

For a pre-Easter emphasis, Key '73 will have a six weeks emphasis of the theme "Meet Christ! A Study of the nature and work of Christ", and this will run from Mid February to Easter 1973. In the first phase repentance was stressed. Recently there came to my desk a Key '73 pamphlet titled "The Meaning of Repentance." "There is no question that repentance is a key to the process by which a person becomes Christian. Therefore, it is altogether appropriate that a great evangelism thrust like Key '73 should begin with honest reflection on the meaning and issues of repentance. But the subject of repentance is confusing to many of us -- and it is often swept under the rug because of our confusion."

"Much of our apathy about repentance today focuses on a misunderstanding of the term -- a belief that repentance somehow means to feel badly about something we have done or ways in which we have lived." "In reality, "to repent" is "to change." We are daily called to begin again as reborn persons, committed to a life of obedience to Christ and his mission in the world. We share a hope for the future and a zest for life that shouts "Jesus Christ is Lord" to every person we meet."

"When Christ calls us to "repent" and be saved, he isn't interested in our feeling badly about all of the hate and greed and apathy in our lives. Instead he wants us to change the hate into love, the greed into compassion, and the apathy into an enthusiastic faith that can move mountains." "Key '73 offers opportunity for us to channel that faith into significant outreach. 150 denominations and Christian groups--nearly all of North American Christendom-- are cooperating together in Key '73 to bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ to every person in North America."

You can share in these goals by winning one person to Christ and faithfully respond to the Great Commission. This is our task as God's people. If we aren't God's people we can shuck that responsibility; otherwise it's right there on your shoulders.

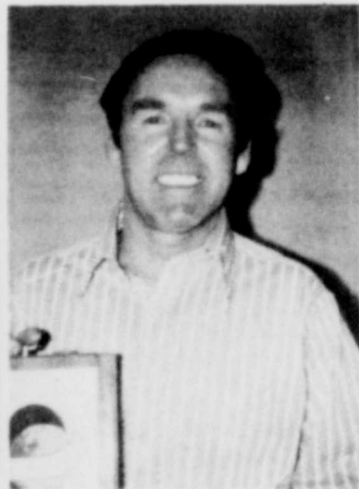

Another warm-season perennial bunchgrass is lovegrass, Renner lovegrass being the newest variety. Midland and Coastal bermudagrass are also popular.

\*\*\*\*\*

Two varieties of St. Augustinegrass have been found to be resistant to chinch bugs by researchers with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The two varieties are Floratam, a new grass now being propagated by Texas sod growers that is also resistant to St. Augustine Decline (SAD) virus, and an experimental grass that also shows good resistance to

SAD. Chinch bugs are one of the most serious pests to St. Augustine grass and populations have grown alarmingly in recent years.

\*\*\*\*\*


Forage producers in Wichita County are becoming interested in new grasses, several of which can be established from seed. In each case, good seedbed preparations is essential.

For instance the techniques for easy establishment of Coastal Bermudagrass do not work when planting seeded grass. Several factors are critical to enhance rapid stands of seeded grasses.

Start with a good seedbed. This means plowing the area several months before grasses are to be planted to permit the soil to settle and become firm. Many of the new grasses contain 500,000 seeds per pound. If planted in a rough seedbed, these small seeds frequently fall between clods and too deep to emerge above the soil. Plant grass seed no more than one-half inch deep. In fact, planting the seed on top of the soil and using a roller or packer is satisfactory in most cases.

Adjust grass seed planters and drills before planting the pasture. A few minutes devoted to equipment maintenance and adjustment can mean the difference between a uniform stand and unsatisfactory planting.
