Froman Contract Extended

In a special meeting of the Burk Burnett School Board Monday night, the contract of Athletic Director Bill Froman, was extended for one year from March 1, 1974 to February 28, 1975.

The meeting opened with discussion of board policy which outlines procedures for contracting school athletic directors and head coaches. The procedure was questioned by board members concerning its interpretation.

Though procedure difficulties were encountered the board verbally gave a unanimous vote of confidence to the athletic program as a whole. However, it was noted that several areas

in the program should be improved upon and these improvements will be strived for during the coming year.

Board members then entered an executive meeting. A board policy discrepancy was discussed, concerning the contracting of school athletic directors and head coaches, and agreed upon to be revised and rewritten to indicate that the athletic director and head coach position be reviewed annually in February at which time the contract be extended or incumbent be informed that employment is terminated at the end of the contract period.

Executive meeting minutes read as follows: Roberts moved

to extend Froman's contract one year from March 1, 1974 to February 28, 1975. Seconded by Bankhead. Carried by all unanimously.

Bankhead moved that the board policy be rewritten in June to indicate that the athletic director and head coach position be reviewed annually in February at which time the contract be extended or incumbent be informed that employment is terminated at the end of the contract period. Seconded by Schroeder. Carried by all.

Board members also voted to reimburse the booster club for the expense of a charter bus used on a trip to Weatherford, Texas.

Burk Bulldogs Play Lamesa Friday In Snyder 7:00 P.M.

The 4-AAA District Championship Bulldogs will travel to Snyder, Texas, Friday, where they are scheduled for the first of two games to be played in the Regional Tournament that night. The Bulldogs will take on a strong Lamesa team, District 3-AAA Champs, in an effort to gain entry into the Regional Finals of the Tournament Saturday night.

The second game on tap for the evening will be Leveland Vs. Andrews, District 1-AAA and District 2-AAA Champs. The winners of these two games will play Saturday night for the Regional Championship and will travel on to the State tournament.

According to Bulldog Coach Jim Phillips, Lamesa has a good team, one that is capable of scoring a lot of points. They have a fine record with 27 wins and 3 losses for the season. Plus, the Lamesa players have height with one player measuring 6'6", and three others measuring 6'5", 6'4", and 6'3". The smallest man on the team is 5'11" and plays the guard position.

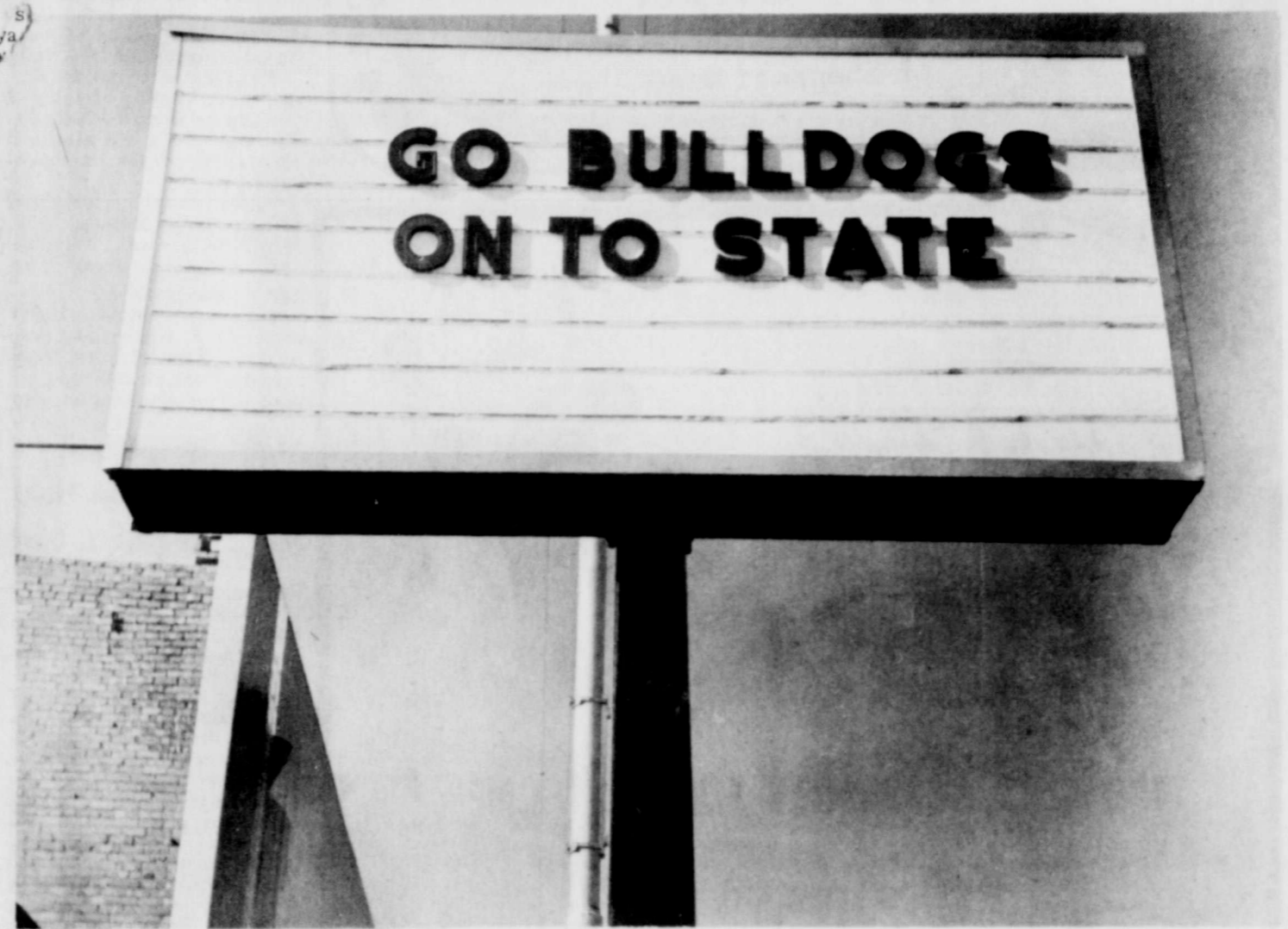
Phillips feels that the Bulldogs will make up for the height disadvantage with quickness. This has proven successful for the medium height bulldogs in games past and it can probably be done again. "We feel like that we can do the job," stated

Phillips. "If we don't, we'll have to accept it."

Asked about Snyder as a tournament location, Coach Phillips said, "I feel that Snyder is a neutral site. Everything should be equal for all teams going into the tournament."

Phillips summed up the Regional Tournament like this, "There are four good teams going into the tournament. After Saturday night, only one team will be left."

EDUCATIONAL TELEVISION PLANNED

The INFORMER/STAR talked with Mrs. Marguerite Peters a short time ago concerning Educational Television for Wichita Falls and surrounding

area, including Burk Burnett. Mrs. Peters and Mr. James Pearson of Burk Burnett both are members of the board of Wichita Falls Educational

Translator, Inc. (WFET), a non-profit corporation formed by local citizens to bring educational television and public broadcasting service (PBS) programs to this area. The organization is governed by the board of directors from all parts of the community and its bylaws specifically provide for persons associated with the public schools, Midwestern University, and Sheppard Air Force Base to be represented in its executive committee.

Mrs. Peters explained the importance of this project to the area and exactly what it consisted of.

WFET has made application to the Federal Communications Commission for use of Channel 24 on the UHF (ultra high frequency) band of the TV set. Channel 13 of Dallas, which is the educational station for the Dallas-Fort Worth area, will be received by microwave and retransmitted in an area of a twenty mile radius of the Channel 6 tower in Wichita Falls. There will be no local broadcasting or programming at this time. Advertising or commercials are prohibited on educational TV. All television sets manufactured since 1963 have UHF tuners and inexpensive adapters are available to sets not having such tuners. Depending upon the location of your home, a small circular antenna or possibly an outdoor antenna may be needed, but the equipment purchased will transmit the complete Channel 13 series of programs in color from approximately 8:00 a.m. to 11:45 p.m. on weekdays, and afternoon and evening programming on weekends.

Many people in Wichita Falls would like to have such programs as Sesame Street, Misterogers Neighborhood, the Electric Company, Playhouse New York, and William F. Buckley on "Firing Line" available to them. Midwestern University has considered establishing an educational station, but the cost of hiring staff, purchasing equipment, and broadcasting make it prohibitive at the present time. Dallas, Fort Worth, Austin, Houston, Lubbock, Denton, Waco, and many other communities in Texas have these programs available. There is no reasonable prospect that Wichita Falls will have this television programming available unless the plan proposed by WFET is carried out.

Under the plan proposed by WFET of simply retransmitting Channel 13 of Dallas, there will be no necessity for paid staff

or the large expenses of originating the programs or broadcasting. There would be no charge to persons receiving the programming and no sale of advertising.

\$40,000.00 must be raised to purchase and install the necessary equipment to receive Channel 13 by microwave from Dallas and transmit it on UHF Channel 24 in Wichita Falls. In addition to the initial cost of equipment, approximately \$10,000.00 per year will be required for operation and maintenance. The required sums for the purchase of the equipment must be raised by contributions and donations from persons in this community interested in having educational TV available in Wichita Falls. A number of citizens and businesses have pledged support for this project. Contributions are tax deductible.

According to Mrs. Peters, \$20,000 has already been appropriated, but \$20,000 more is needed to get the program underway. All contributions would be greatly appreciated. In the event the Federal Communications Commission does not grant the required licenses, any donations made will be returned.

If the necessary funds are raised or pledged to be paid in 1972 or 1973, it is felt that Channel 13 programming can be available in Wichita Falls by May of 1973.

Mrs. Peters stated, "We're shooting for June 1."

Burkburnett Police Officer Receives State Certification

Police Officer Ermil A. Stevens of the Burk Burnett Police Department, received certification this week as a state law enforcement officer. Stevens successfully completed the equivalent of 140 classroom hours of study with the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards of Education, and all other requirements necessary to become a certified law enforcement officer.

Stevens and his family reside in Burk Burnett at 809 Chestnut. He retired from the United States Air Force in March of 1971 and started his duty at the Burk Police Department

in December of that same year. Stevens and his wife Jean have two children, Peggy Ann and Richard.

According to Police Chief Buck Abbott, Stevens is a proven law enforcement officer here in Burk Burnett, as well as his 3 1/2 years in the Military Police. He is also certified in the instruction of First Aid.

All Police officers have one year, after accepting employment, to complete the necessary study for the State of Texas Law Enforcement certification. Currently two other Burk Burnett Policemen are studying for the certificate.

City Council Hears Service Center Benefits

The City Council met in regular session Monday night. The taking-over of funding the Burk Burnett Community Service Center was taken under consideration by the Council members.

Mrs. Carol Blankenship, Center director, outlined some of the activities and benefits of the Service Center. The Center has some 415 families presently qualifying for assistance. Providing supervised study, adult education, vocational courses and job placement are some of the functions of the Center, stated Mrs. Blankenship.

The recommendation of Mrs. Blankenship was that the activities of the Center be consolidated under one worker with an estimated yearly budget of \$5,000.

Contracts for the laying of 2,500 feet of water line were awarded to B&G Utility Construction Inc. of Burk Burnett. The total bid was for \$9,775.25.

Payment of current accounts in the amount of \$14,120 was voted on and approved.

It was also reported that tax collections had amounted to \$31,400 to date and corporation court fines for the month amounted to \$1,014.

Burkburnett Boys Club Boxers Schedule Tourney

Boys Club Boxing in Burk Burnett is one sport that we haven't heard near enough about. For instance, in four tournaments, our boxing team has brought home 21 trophies and 7 boys are overall tournament winners in their respective divisions.

The INFORMER/STAR talked with boys club boxing coach Will Bonham. Bonham said that his boxers are doing a fantastic job. "We have our own boxing philosophy in that we teach boxing as a sport and put extra

stress on skill. Contrary to the thoughts of many, boxing is not a head-bashing, teeth shattering, fight. It's a game of skill that requires balance, poise, proper tactics, and competitive character. All this is what we teach boys who want to learn the art of boxing."

Any boy can be in the boxing program at the Burk Boys Club. However, the boy must be a resident of Burk Burnett. Dues are \$2.00 to join the club. This reporter overheard Coach Bonham telling one youth, "If you

haven't got that kind of money, let me know. I'll make arrangements."

Assisting Bonham is coach Lonnie Padron. When the boys are at the club to box, you will find Lonnie there, instructing, supervising, or whatever is needed by the boys. Coach Bonham praised Lonnie highly for his help in the boys club program.

When a boy joins the club and wants to box, he is trained to box. These beginning boxers are taken good care of, says

Bonham. We make sure that a kid is ready and able to protect himself before he is allowed into the ring during tournament boxing. We don't want any of our boys to get hurt. That's why we train and condition them thoroughly. We practice 3 days a week, Sunday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

We teach sportsmanship and community pride in our program. Naturally, each boxer wants to win his bouts but if he

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

Smiley Plans Good Use For Burk's Track

Coach Pat Smiley talked optimistically about the Track team at BHS this year. This season should prove to be quite productive if for no other reason than the new \$40,000 track to be used by Burk competitors for the first time.

Smiley stated that BHS would be strong in the mile relay, middle distance races, shot put and discus throw because these are the fields that returning lettermen are competing in.

Although some of the track participants are still competing in basketball, Sam Hancock, Mark Bulla, Vernon Smith, Lyle Larson, John Panter, Rusty Barrett, and Jay Lippard are among the top contenders for BHS.

The elements necessary for a good track team are speed, stamina and a desire to win. Coach Smiley stated that he felt that any individual can excel if he applies himself. He further added that relaxing is the key to becoming a successful runner. The runner must practice often and in distances but he must be relaxed to do anything.

A long distance competitor will practice one to two hours daily in eight to ten mile stretches. This not only con-

ditions the runner for contest, but also builds up his breathing and strength.

The track has not only added a new dimension to Burk Burnett's running but also made BHS the site of several important meets this year. The

track is a combination of black top and rubber which allows the runner good footing and less chance of slipping. It is one of a kind in this area and because of it, Burk is able to not only host a Boomtown Invitational March 17, but also to host the District meet April 17.

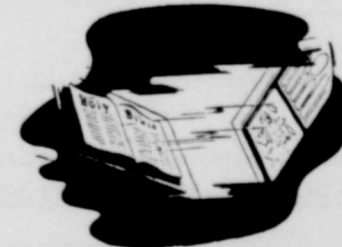

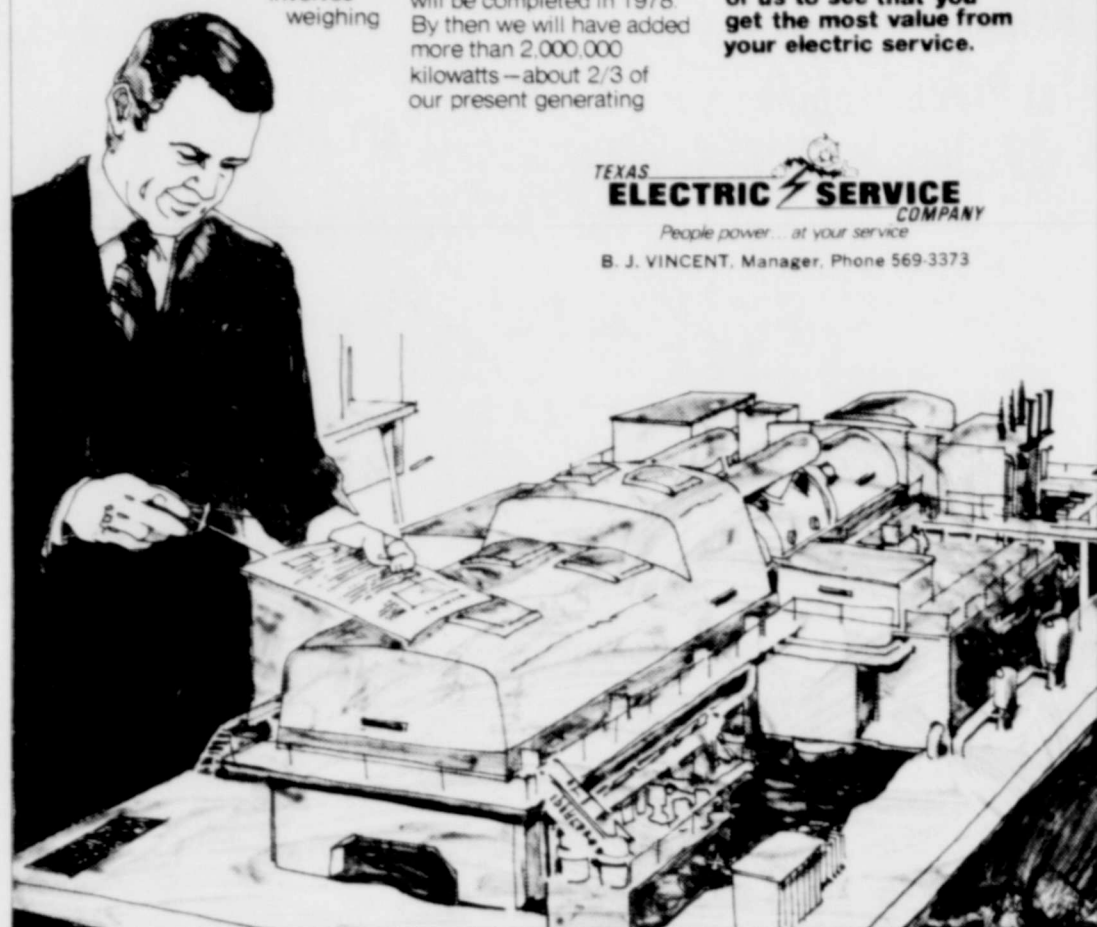

Adding fabric softener to your laundry restores softness and fluffiness to all washable fabrics. But perhaps most important it reduces or eliminates static cling that often makes it necessary to peel away synthetics and permanent press items when folding laundry or wearing garments. Some fabrics no longer need ironing when softener is used and those that do require ironing dry with less deep-set wrinkles.

Though it isn't necessary to add fabric softener in every washload, frequent use is recommended. If softener is used with towels when fluffiness is desirable but moisture absorption is also important, skip the use of the additive occasionally.

It's important not to add other agents; bluing, water conditioner or any other additives, to the water when a rinse cycle fabric softener is used. In

fact, though fabric softener is effective in both hard and soft water, it should not be used in rinse water containing a packaged water conditioner.

A new type of fabric softener is available that can be used in the wash or rinse cycle. Compatible with detergents and other wash cycle compounds, these fabric softeners usually require addition of the fabric softener to wash water before adding detergent and laundry. Then proceed as usual.

Don't pour a wash cycle fabric softener into a fabric softener dispenser unless you want it used in the rinse cycle. Never add any kind of fabric softener to a bleach dispenser or a detergent dispenser. These features are not equipped to handle softeners.

Do not pour fabric softener directly on fabrics or staining may result. If this should accidentally occur, immediately hold the stained area under cool running water and rub with bar soap.

Softeners are helpers worth trying. Next to getting clothes, towels and sheets really clean, a fresh, almost new appearance and soft, cozy comfort are the icing on the laundry basket.

Class Making Up For Interior Design Course

Homemakers interested in taking part in a six-lesson home study course in interior design and furnishings may now pre-enroll for the event since classes will be limited to 100 participants, according to Mrs. Dee James, Wichita County Extension Agent.

The home study series is designed to provide up-to-date information on planning and budgeting for furnishings, and on selecting and using furniture, floor coverings, window treatments and decorative accessories. Working homemakers with pre-school children, and even older teenagers will find the course helpful in solving many personal decorating problems.

Each week for six weeks, those who enroll in the series will receive a packet of information and materials on a different home furnishings topic. Lessons will be completed at home by participants as individual schedules permit.

Wichita Irrigated Valley Plagued With Salted Land

"Salted out land" is a big problem in some parts of Wichita County, especially in the Wichita Irrigated Valley. Bill Fleming, Conservation Technician with the Soil Conservation Service in Iowa Park, said that people need to know what causes this problem.

Fleming said that there are several things which cause high levels of salt in the soil. Sometimes the salt is there naturally. On non-irrigated land when rainfall has been heavy for some time, the salt dissolves and rises to the surface. This is especially true on bare land where there is no grass or other vegetation to use the extra water.

Where "salting out" is a problem, there is usually a heavy clay layer three to five feet below the surface of the ground. Fleming said that this clay "barrier" prevents the water from moving down, taking the salt with it. The water is "bottled up" near the surface and cannot escape except by evaporation. This leaves the salt near the surface.

On irrigated land, in the Wichita Valley, the salt problem is sometimes made worse by the salty irrigation water being used. The salt tends to build up in the soil, causing reduced crop yields and other problems.

SCS recommends lowering the water level in the soil to help correct such problems. This can be done by building drain-ages or ditches or by installing underground tile drain pipes. When the water table is lowered by draining, the salt will then move downward as rainfall soaks into the land.

Fleming explained that SCS soil scientists and engineers are familiar with salt problems in this area and are available to landowners who need help.

U.S. RODENT CONTROL SPECIALIST

The house rat and house mouse are responsible for millions of dollars in physical property damage each year in the United States. Both animals have 4 long incisors (teeth) which grow 5 inches per year. They must gnaw continuously to keep the teeth worn down enough so they may feed. If gnawing did not occur, the teeth would become so long the animal could not feed and it would die of starvation.

Rats and mice normally gnaw to gain access to food or shelter.

Holes are gnawed through walls, floors and ceilings. Lead plumbing fixtures are "cut through" to gain access to the home through the toilet. The insulation on electric wiring is especially attractive to rats and many short circuits and even fires are the result. Mice will cut clothing and furniture to shreds to obtain nesting material.

Stress cracks may be observed where Norway rats are burrowing under foundations or sidewalks. These cracks are ugly and many times expensive to repair.

In the farm situation, it has been estimated that each rat will consume or destroy \$20 worth of property in a year's time. Where grain is stored, rats will not only feed but will contaminate it and make it undesirable to livestock. Rats and mice will nest in hay stacks which will become partially destroyed and contaminated.

Rats and mice will get into food stored in the home and contaminate it, therefore all bulk food should be stored in metal or glass containers with lids.

Don't sell the rat and mouse short because they adapt well to many different and sometimes difficult living conditions. An extra effort should be made to control these filthy and destructive pests.

Miss Kilgore To Present Program On Canning

Miss Hattie Kilgore, Educational Director from the Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corporation, will present a special program Friday, March 2, 1:30 p. m., Texas Electric Auditorium in Wichita Falls. The program is sponsored by the Wichita County Extension Service under the direction of Mrs. Dee James, County Extension Agent.

The program will consist of an actual canning demonstration canning vegetables, tomatoes and fruit, showing the recommended procedure for preparation and processing of the products.

Emphasis will be placed on the proper selection, preparation and processing of vegetables, fruits and tomatoes. Also, the "do's and don'ts" of canning as well as answers to many canning questions and problems that home canners may have.

A vegetable will be canned, using the hot and cold pack methods of preparation and the important steps in processing in the pressure canner. Tomatoes and one or two fruits will be canned using the Boiling Water Bath Method of processing. Emphasis will be given to this method and reasons why it should be used for fruits and tomatoes.

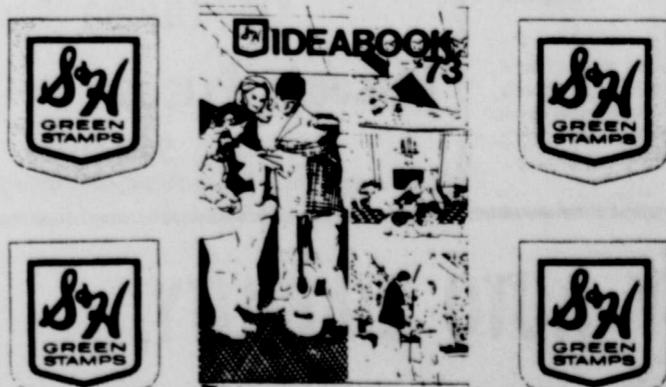
