On Second Reading

## City Approves Electric Rate Hike

The Burk Burnett City Council met Monday night, March 4, to discuss the second reading of a proposed 9 1/2 per cent average rate increase by Texas Electric Service Company.

Bill Vincent, representing Texas Electric, said to the council, "We have never before asked for more than we need nor less. I would like to have put in a motion that our hike would not go into effect until Wichita

Falls' is approved." He urged the councilmen to approve the rate increase on the second reading.

Councilman Spinks then made a motion in favor of the rate increase and Al Lohefener seconded it. The second reading passed with "for" votes coming from Spinks, Lohefener, Cornelius, and McCandless. Councilmen Pate and Musick voted against the motion, and

Lindenborn was not present.

Although the letter sent to TESCO on February 19 had been answered, with councilmen viewing the reply, it was not discussed in detail at the council meeting. Therefore, an Informer/Star representative asked City Manager Gary Bean and TESCO manager Bill Vincent of its contents later.

The letter written to TESCO asked that electric rates in

Burkburnett be the same as those in Wichita Falls, since the two cities are near each other. A situation similar to this is in effect in Fort Worth's surrounding towns. They have the same rate as Fort Worth.

The reply stated that the primary factor governing rates is the cost to serve, which is affected by the load density of the geographic areas. Since Wichita Falls and the Fort

Worth Region are both much larger than Burk, with an electric load concentration and volume of energy sales approximately twice that of Burk Burnett, the larger cities are able to

take advantage of economies of size.

The reply said that the Fort Worth Region does not maintain See CITY COUNCIL page 12

## Crime Prevention Is Chamber Topic

The Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce met Monday at noon for the monthly luncheon, with guests Bob Culver and Jesse Mathis of the Wichita Falls Police Department. The two officers urged citizens to join in crime prevention in Burk Burnett.

Officer Bob Culver said to the group, "Concerned citizens will have to participate to make the program successful." He added that persons should label personal items with an engraving pen by putting their drivers license numbers on them. Where this program has been in effect, there has been a 20 to 30 per cent reduction in burglaries, he said.

Also discussed was the early parole of prisoners. Culver said, "Thieves are getting out of prison on parole—you have to face these people." The police department can control this kind of situation pretty well if it has the support of the concerned citizen.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Many delegates to the Constitutional Convention think it is now virtually impossible to wind up their revision job by April 7.

President Price Daniel Jr.'s 90-day timetable for the historic task went out the window when debate on the education article dragged over 11 half-day sessions.

Even Daniel conceded as the education article debate dragged toward a close that the convention is off schedule. He said he still feels, however, that there is a chance to make up for lost time by speedy action on relatively non-controversial (if any) sections.

More pessimistic delegates are stating now that the whole convention assignment is in jeopardy due to strong feeling on many issues.

At root of the problem, many now acknowledge, is the basic difficulty of getting elected officials to agree on monumental decisions during an election year.

Pressure is mounting for recess until after the May and June primary elections.

Daniel hopes to keep the delegates plugging away at decision making until early April. If it is then obvious that the job is a long way from complete, he probably will go along with motions to take off until after the elections, although he isn't ready to commit himself to that.

Some delegates would like to move up the recess date to March — and head for home as soon as all convention committees have handed in their reports.

**Annie Harris Promotes 'Community Action'**

Mrs. Annie Harris urged citizens to support the Community Action program in Burkburnett recently. She works at the Community Service Center.

Mrs. Harris said, "The people here in Burkburnett should take our town at interest. Maybe you are unaware that every second (day) of the month we have our Community Action Corporation meeting right here in our Community Service Center in Burkburnett."

In describing the program she said, "We discuss problems of the Community, such as better housing, food stamp program, people in need of some type of training skill. We can get that training through our program."

She added, "We are here to help the poor and the elderly poor. There are lots of elderly going without food; therefore, the lack of food intake causes a health problem. Many older people do not go to the doctor or Social Services available to them because they don't have the funds to get there."

She added that Community Action can provide information, referral, counseling, consumer education, assistance with housing, escort services, legal protective services, and home-makers services.

Concluding, she said, "These are the topics we discuss at our meeting. Maybe you can join us at our meeting. You may have an idea we can put to use."

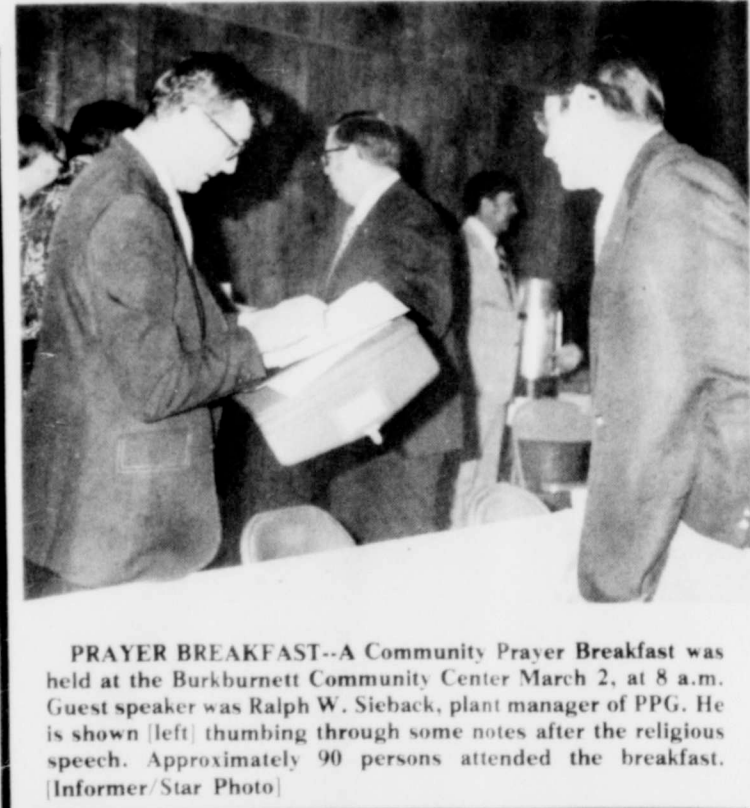
Unconsciousness because of injury or illness is usually a protective act of nature. Bystanders should not try to arouse the victim - no shaking, shouting, no splashing water, no smelling salts, no liquids to the mouth which might choke the unconscious person. He needs rest or he would not be unconscious. Let the victim lie flat if his face is pale - a pillow beneath head and shoulders if he is flushed. Summon medical help - meanwhile control any bleeding, and give mouth to mouth resuscitation if breathing has stopped. Avoid moving the patient if possible.

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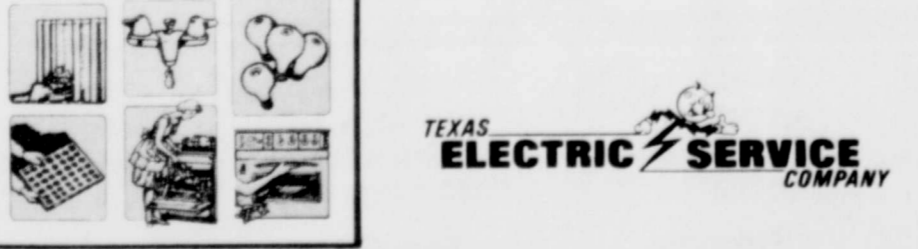

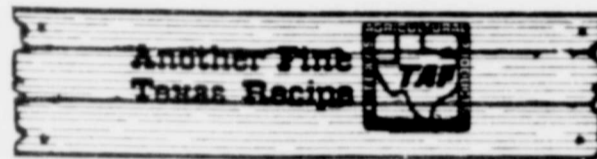

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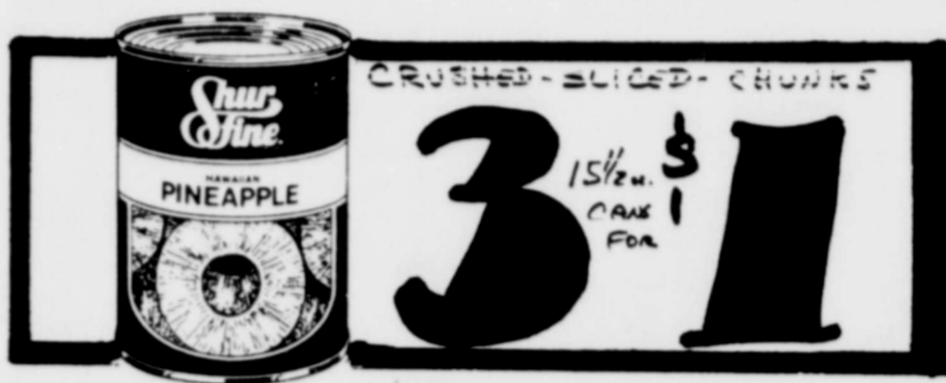

# County Agent News

B.T. HAWS

Most farmers and ranchers neglect to use one of their most important management tools, farm and ranch business records. After a couple of days of frustration at income tax time each year, many farmers resolve to keep better records the next year. However, after their tax forms are out records are once again forgotten.

Good records aid the farm manager in locating strong and weak points in his operation. Proper analysis of the records provides the basis for profitable decisions which will help the farm manager reach his goals. Good farm records show which enterprise might be produced. While one enterprise might be making \$10,000, a second one might be losing \$2,000, thus reducing the total net farm income to \$8,000.

Changes in government farm programs are also making good records necessary as a borrowing tool. With the additional capital required in agriculture today, obtaining adequate credit is an important management decision.

To obtain credit on a sound basis, it is imperative that the lender become acquainted with the farm business. Lenders will be interested in such things as assets owned by the farmer, growth of his business and earnings. Complete records will reveal all three factors as well as provide information of the wise use of credit in the farming operation.

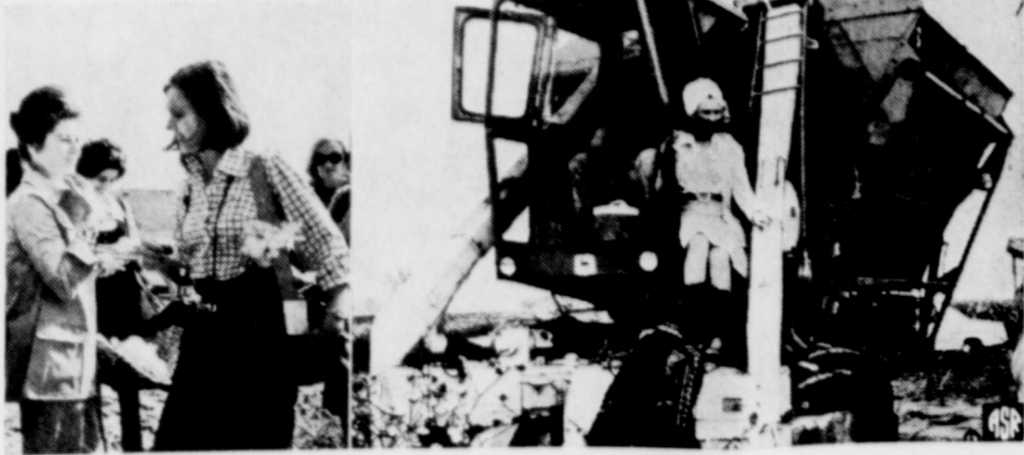

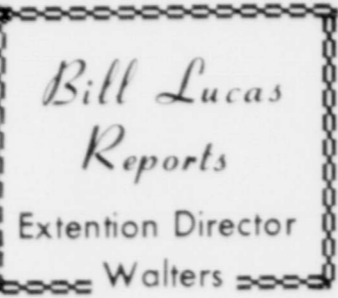

With a plentiful supply of moisture and spring temperatures warming up, we see an increasing interest in home gardens to help decrease the family food bill. We have a number of Fact Sheets that should be of help to the beginning gardener. The Oklahoma Garden Planning Guide, No. 6004, gives the time to plant, feet of row per person, recommended varieties, spacing, and depth to cover seed. Fact Sheet 6006 discusses the use of commercial fertilizer in home gardens. These are available free at your OSU Extension Center.

There have been many articles written about the cost of bread and the various shares received by the farmer, the retailer, the miller, the baker and others in the marketing systems that handle wheat and bread. Most statements are directed toward the pound and one-half loaf of bread.

\*\*\*\*\*

Some segments in our economy have talked of the scarcity of wheat for domestic consumption and some have advocated that bread could go to \$1 per loaf. Also, there have been statements that wheat might go to \$12.50 per bushel or even higher.

Don Paarberg, Director of Economics for the Agriculture Department, testified at a Senate agriculture subcommittee hearing. "There is one thing in this uncertain world of which I am sure if our markets are kept open there will be no shortage of flour in the United States," Paarberg also estimated that each \$1 increase per bushel in wheat price raises the value of bread by about 2 cents.

## Home Demonstration News

They will be able to taste all the entries. 4-H club members from all over the country will participate in the food show.

The Wichita County Home Demonstration Council will meet Tuesday, March 12, at 1:30, at the County Court House. Representatives from each of the home demonstration clubs in the county take part in the council.

Don't be misled by a "dietetic" label on foods. "Dietetic" doesn't necessarily mean the product has fewer calories than the regular product. In fact, many products labeled "dietetic" aren't meant for weight control diets—they're for persons on low sodium, low cholesterol, diabetic or other special diets. Calorie-wise, many dietetic foods don't differ much from regular foods. For example, one-half cup regular ice cream contains 230-248 calories, while the same portion of dietetic ice cream has 200-211 calories. The main difference between them involves substituting sorbitol or mannitol for sugar in the dietetic product.

Sorbitol and mannitol-like sugar-are metabolized as carbohydrates in the body. They provide the same number of calories as sugar, but at a slower rate. This is important for diabetics, who can't metabolize sugar adequately. So, dietetic ice cream—which usually costs more and lacks the taste of regular ice cream—is intended for the diabetic rather than the weight-conscious person. Dieters or weight-watchers will find that ice milk has lower fat content—and fewer calories.

Another example involves "diet" bread, which has the same number of calories per ounce as regular bread—but is sliced a little thinner.

However, dietetic flavored gelatin actually contains fewer calories than regular flavored gelatin—nine calories per one-half cup, compared to 70 calories for regular flavored gelatin.

To find other foods low in calories, read labels. Although some labels furnish the content's calorie count, the ingredient list also provides a key. Ingredients are listed with largest amounts first. Thus, if the first ones are calorie-rich—such as fat or oil, sugar, corn syrup, honey or chocolate—the product probably doesn't rate low in calories.

## WEEKLY MARKET REPORT

COLLEGE STATION--Poultry products may highlight grocery choices this week, according to one observer. Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, reported economical prices on fryer chickens, turkeys (whole bird and parts), and eggs.

Other meat values will include pork and beef, she said. "Best prok values include bone-in hams, ham portions and picnics. Also, Boston butt roasts, shoulder roasts and steaks, end-cut loin roasts and chops."

"Beef values will appear on arm and blade pot roasts and steaks, chuck roasts and steaks, ground beef and boneless stew meat."

Turning to fruit counters, the specialist listed items in good supply with "pleasing" prices as grapefruit, Temple oranges, bananas, apples and pineapples. Also, strawberries, tangelos and tangerines.

"By-the-bag is the most economical way to buy the citrus fruits, if that amount can be used satisfactorily."

"Fresh vegetables are in more generous supply this winter than a year ago because of increased acreage planted," Mrs. Clyatt said.

"No serious shortages of the important fresh vegetable crops have shown up thus far, but onion and potato supplies aren't as large now as they are in most other seasons."

Among the most economical items are cabbage, carrots, broccoli, cooking greens, celery, bulk turnips and rutabagas, she

said, adding that fresh asparagus is available at first-of-the-season prices.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: Saving a few pennies on each item makes many dollars every year.

If food prices seem too high, it pays to watch pennies, shop for advertised specials and change buying habits.

## Screwworm Program Gets Money

AUSTIN--The screwworm eradication plan, threatened last month by lack of financing, has been granted federal funding on a week to week basis through the end of the fiscal year.

Inflation had doubled the cost of producing sterile screwworm flies in the past six months.

"This additional federal money will insure continuation of a program that protects livestock owners and provides more beef for consumers," said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Screwworms are the parasitic larvae of the screwworm fly which infest open, untreated wounds in warm-blooded animals. They cause serious injury and frequently kill the infested animal.

Screwworm eradication officials had expressed concern about controlling the sporadic outbreaks of the pest with the approach of spring, the prime time for screwworm buildups in Texas.

## Bright Blue Flame Sign Of Efficiency

AUSTIN--Liquid petroleum gas users may be able to save on both energy and money with a simple check of their gas flames, according to the Consumer Services Division of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Users of LP gas should check all gas flames to determine if they are burning

at their most efficient levels. The flame on a gas burner should be a bright blue and solid all around the burner.

If the flame is pale blue with yellow, orange or white in it, it is not set correctly and is getting too much air.

Nearly 500,000 Texas mobile home owners and 134,000 farmers use liquid petroleum gas, while 74 percent of the wells and farm pick-ups in the state are run on LP gas.

## \$7.1 Million Federal Allocation to Help Conservation Practices

AUSTIN--A \$7.1 million federal allocation to Texas farmers for conservation programs is expected to help improve environmental quality in the state, said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

The United States Department of Agriculture has announced that Texas farmers and forest landowners would receive \$7,160,000 of cost-share assistance in 1974 under the new Rural Environmental Conservation Program (RECP).

This program, approved by Congress in August 1973, replaces the Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) which was terminated last spring.

RECP will be administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and is designed to share with farmers and forest landowners from 50 to 75 per cent of the cost of implementing approved annual and long-range conservation practices.

"This program was desperately needed since REAP was eliminated last year," White said. "Since there will be no set-aside requirements this year, Texas will have about 2.7 million more acres available for production which will increase the potential hazard of erosion."

The allocation for Texas represents nearly 10 per cent

of the national appropriation of \$78 million. Texas farmers will receive a total of \$6,723,000 in cost-share programs, and forest landowners will receive \$437,000 in the Forestry Incentives Program in counties designed for the program.

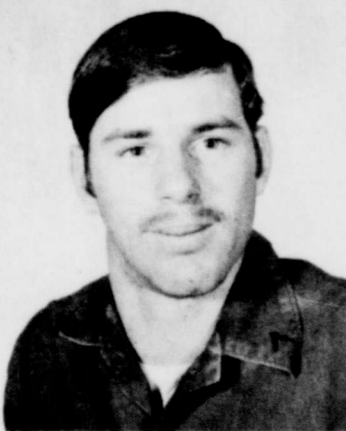

training as an artillery cannoneer. Currently, he is assigned to Battery C, 2nd Battalion, 37th Field Artillery. He is the battery commander's driver.

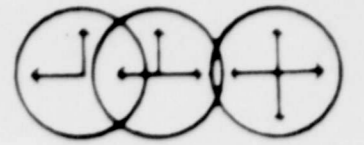

costly business offices or service center in any of the cities except in Fort Worth, Arlington, and Grand Prairie--each city having a population of will over 50,000.

The letter also stated that TESCO's earnings investment in Burk Burnett are less than for the entire system or for Wichita Falls, justifying the rate increase.

Bill Vincent later told the Informer Star. "The third and final reading on the proposed rate increase will be March 18. It will be the most important reading. We need this increase. Inflation has hit the electric company just as it has the rest of us--possibly even harder since my compan's ability to provide electric power depends upon its ability to acquire fuel with which to generate that power."

"Some areas in Texas have already experienced brownouts and electric power shortages because companies serving those areas were not in a strong enough position to cope with the sudden emergency of the energy crisis. TESCO will spend \$700 million during the next five years on additional supplies of gas and fuel oil, equipment to bring it here and store it, on new lignite-fired generating plants in East Texas, and on the planned nuclear generating plant near Glen Rose," he said.

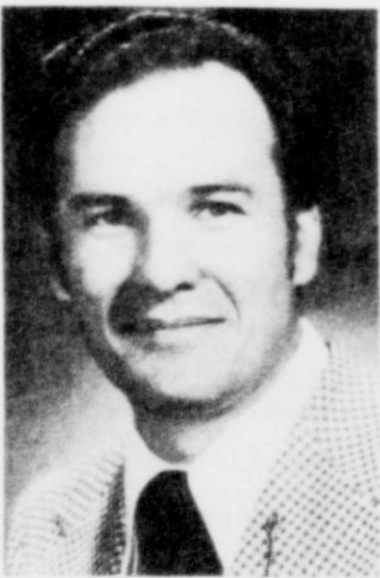
He was cited for meritorious achievement during the rescue of the crew of a fishing boat
